





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Harbor Container Terminal Project

Dec. 6, Los Angeles Harbor Commissioners approved the Berth 136-147 TraPac container terminal expansion project - first major capital improvement project in the San Pedro Bay Port in seven years. The TraPac container terminal project is also the first major project in the nation's leading seaport complex to apply groundbreaking emissions mitigation measures outlined in the San Pedro Bay Ports Clean Air Action Plan (CAAP) which was approved a year ago by Los Angeles and Long Beach port com-

"Today we move from talking about how we're going to "grow green" at the Port of Los Angeles to actually doing it out on the terminals," said S. David Freeman, president of the Los Angeles Harbor Commission. "This project sets the new industry standard for responsible and environmentally sustainable cargo terminal expansion."

Port of Los Angeles Executive Director Geraldine Knatz, Ph.D., added: "Our main goal for 2007 was to bring a major construction project to our Board with an environmental document that everyone could feel good about, and

we've done it. For the first time ever, we've addressed the health risks associated with a terminal expansion project and we've found ways to significantly reduce pollutants - all while addressing increased trade, adding a rail yard and creating hundreds of jobs at TraPac."

The TraPac Terminal expansion, between Berths 136 and 147 on the northwest perimeter of the Port, will allow TraPac to expand cargo handling in an efficient manner from 900,000 TEUs (baseline year 2003) to 2.4 million TEUs by 2025. At the same time, particulate matter of less than 2.5 microns will be reduced by 75 percent and nitrogen oxides (NOx) will drop by 55 percent below baseline levels as a result of mitigation measures applied during project operations. By 2015, total project emissions of volatile organic compounds (VOC), nitrogen oxides (NOx), sulphur oxides (SOx), and particulate matter (PM10 and PM2.5) will be reduced approximately 50 percent. The health risks associated with the modernized terminal operations will be well below regulatory standards of significance and will reduce the estimated cancer risk associated with terminal operations to below baseline levels in large parts of Wilmington and San Pedro.

A variety of environmental mitigation measures are included in the project: requirements of vessel speed reductions when ships are transiting


within the South Coast Air Basin; use of lower-sulfur fuel in ships; plugging ships into shore-side electric power while at berth (AMP or Alternative Maritime Power); use of clean container handling terminal equipment; construction of a new on-dock rail facility; trafficrelieving surface road and terminal entry improvements; clean trucks meeting EPA 2007 standards; and energy-efficient "Gold" LEED standard terminal offices.

Benefits to the local com-

munity incorporated in the project include an open, 30-acre buffer area between the TraPac container terminal and the Wilmington community, 300 new terminal jobs and a total net employment of as many as 5,433 regional jobs annually connected directly or indirectly to termi-

nal operations at build out, and 2,800 construction jobs at peak construction. The Berth 136-147 container terminal operation will generate approximately \$1.5 billion to \$1.8 billion in revenues. Annual tax revenues associated with construction jobs for the peak year of build-out activity could be as much as \$24.1 million in federal taxes, \$5.6 million in state taxes and \$2.4 million in local taxes.

HARBOR JOB GENERATION

As many as 918,800 jobs - or one out of every eight jobs in the five-county Southern California region - are related to the Port of Los Angeles, according to a study focused on the local and regional economic impacts of the nation's number one container port. The study, conducted earlier this year by Lancaster, Pa.-based Martin Associates, shows that the number of jobs connected to the Port of Los Angeles have more than tripled since a 1996 study estimated that 259,100 regional jobs were connected to the Port of Los Angeles. The threefold rise in jobs has largely paralleled the rise in goods movement since 1996, when the port handled 2.7 million TEUs (20-foot equivalent units) and was estimated to facilitate 1 out of every 24 jobs in the region.

"This study shows the magnitude of jobs and economic value connected to our operations," said Port of Los Angeles Executive Director Geraldine Knatz, Ph.D. "It's a strong reminder of the vital roles port operations and the goods movement industries play in our Southern California economy, and it's impetus for the green-growth strategy that we are forging in order to reduce port emissions and continue to develop our operations to create more regional jobs in the

Based on 2006 figures, the study calculated 130,869 port-related "industry jobs" spread across each of the following operational categories: marine cargo activity (121,600 jobs), cruise (2,512 jobs), fishing (1,404 jobs), marinas (1,581 jobs), and other Port tenants including Ports O' Call (3,772 jobs). Among the "industry jobs" cited in the study, 47,105 are direct jobs in port operations and an estimated 83,764 are indirect or induced jobs that are created by the spending of firms and individuals directly employed by Port related operations. For example, an industry job may be a longshoreman at the World Cruise Terminal, and indirect jobs may be a bus operator who shuttles cruise passengers from the airports to the World Cruise Terminal, or the mechanic that maintains the bus, which receives a portion of its business from cruise operations.

While "industry jobs" are tied to Port operations, according to the study Port related economic activity also generates an estimated 787,979 "port user" jobs regionally, which are jobs related to the economic activity associated with the value of the trade that is tied to cargo shipped through the Port of Los Angeles. These jobs are associated with the production of goods for export and those involved in the finishing, wholesaling, and retailing of imported goods.

PUBLIC WORKS AWARDS

The City walked away with numerous awards as part of the Southern California Chapter of the American Public Works Association's 8th annual Awards Luncheon Dec. 6.

Sanitation won awards for two Projects of the Year, the first the Sewer Science Resource Video program, and the second, its Project Management Guidelines Manual.

The Department also won for its National Public Works Week promotions.

The projects were among 37 that were awarded at the ceremony.

"Sewer Science Resource Videos were developed to foster environmental awareness among students and teachers in the Los Angeles Unified School District," said Sanitation Bureau Senior Environmental Engineer Michael Simspon, Project Manager for both projects. "A teacher's Resource Video complements instructions in the Sewer Science Resource Manual and guides teachers and mentors on how to prepare and present the Sewer Science Education Program," he said. "The video shows and explains in detail the operations of wastewater treatment process-

In 2005, the Bureau of Sanitation initiated plans to improve business efficiency and project management capabilities that eventually became its first set of Project Management Guidelines (PMGs), now recognized as a solution for improvement of business practices. "The PMG started as an educational program that provided project management training to 120 employees," Simpson said. "It has evolved into a critical component of the Bureau's overall knowledge retention strategy and addresses the impacts of an aging workforce," added Bureau Director Enrique C. Zaldivar.

The Board of Public Works Public Affairs Office (PAO) coordinated several National Public Works Week activities throughout the week, May 20-26. Among these was Public Works LIVE, A Parade of Talents. "This first-ever talent show featured six Public Works employees singing and playing instruments during a lunch hour event," said Cora Jackson-Fossett, Board of Public Works Public Affairs Director. "City Council, Public Works Commissioners and Bureau Directors recognized them and presented certificates to more than 60 Public Works employees for significant contributions to operations and work programs."

A major outreach goal of Public Works Week 2007 was to reach the student population of Los Angeles, in part, through facility tours, and neighborhood cleanup programs. "PAO coordinated a student tour of a newly constructed fire station, a project of the department's Bureaus of Engineering and Contract Administration," Jackson-Fossett said. "PAO also coordinated participation of several schools in Ocean Day, held at Dockweiler State Beach." The Public Affairs Office also coordinated a sanitation yard open house, a tree presentation and street lighting demonstration.

The new appointees will be responsible for law enforcement and security at the City's four airports: Los Angeles International (LAX), LA/Ontario International (ONT), LA/Palmdale Regional (PMD) and Van Nuys (VNY) general aviation.

The mayor swore in Centeno as the sixth chief of Airport Police since the force was established in 1946. Centeno joined the Airport Police Division as an assistant chief of police last February. He is a retired lieutenant with 28 years of service with the Santa Monica Police Department, where he commanded a number of divisions including Special Enforcement, Traffic Enforcement, Internal Affairs, Office of Operations, and the Special Policing District. He is a decorated police officer, having received the department's Medal of Courage and Life-Saving Medal. Chief Centeno received his Bachelor of arts degree from California State University, Northridge, and is a graduate of the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Va.

"The appointment of Chief George Centeno and the new executive command team exemplifies our commitment to build a world-class airport police organization for the protection of our 68 million passengers who fly annually through the airports owned and operated by the City of Los Angeles," Villaraigosa said.

"Our core business is to run our four airports safely and efficiently," said Airports Executive Director Gina Marie Lindsey. "Public safety is our number one priority and the appointments of Chief Centeno and the executive command staff will help us continue to meet that goal."

The Airport Police Division's executive command staff reports to James T. Butts Jr., Deputy Executive Director of Law Enforcement and Protection Services, Airports. Butts said, "Chief Centeno is a proven law enforcement professional and valuable addition to our police executive team at Los Angeles World Airports. His training and experience in the area of incident management and operations has already improved the response and recovery protocols used in airport emergencies at our four airports."


Mayor Villaraigosa also swore-in four other Airport Police executive command staff members. They are:

The Airport Police Division is the fourth largest law enforcement agency in Los Angeles County, with more than 1,200 law enforcement, security and staff personnel. It is considered a leader among U.S. airports for implementation of new technology-derived security measures that include the use of artificial intelligence software to randomize vehicle checkpoint deployments. Airport Police officers serve as instructors for law enforcement personnel from other California airports in POST-certified (Police Officers Standards and Training) aviation peace officers training course. The Airport Police Division, in partnership with the Los Angeles Police Department, also has the largest number of bomb-detection canines among U.S. airports. Airport Police officers undergo training at the Los Angeles Police Academy and receive additional training specific to aviation-related law enforcement.



Frank Fabrega, Assistant Chief for Traffic and Security Operations. Fabrega joined the Airport Police Division in February after 32 years with the Santa Monica Police Department in assignments that included SWAT team leader, and supervisor of K-9 officers, Office of Investigations, Recruitment and Training, community relations and media relations. He holds a Bachelor of science degree in criminal justice from California State University, Los Angeles, and a law degree from Ventura College of Law. He is a graduate of the Command College for Executive Leadership and the FBI National Academy.

Southers is a former Santa Monica police officer, a court-qualified gang expert, and a member of the Rio Hondo Police Academy faculty. He is a senior fellow of the UCLA School of Public Affairs and a Next Generation Fellow of the American Assembly at Columbia University. He earned a Bachelor of arts degree from Brown University and a Master of public administration degree from USC, where he is a doctoral candidate.

He served in increasingly responsible assignments in bike detail, patrol, crime suppression, internal affairs, background investigations, and planning and development. He graduated from the Rio Hondo Police Academy and has completed Police Officers Standards and Training (POST) management and leadership courses. Walker has received numerous departmental awards and commendations for incident command and leadership response during several high-profile events at LAX.

RECALLED TOYS DON'T BELONG IN TRASH

The City's Public Works Bureau of Sanitation reminds residents that products such as toys that have been recalled for containing lead-based paint and other hazardous and/or toxic material should be not be discarded in the regular trash.

"A number of recent product recalls involve toys containing lead-based paint and other hazardous material used in the manufacturing process," cautions Sanitation Director Enrique Zaldivar. "While we are not part of any recall process instituted by manufacturers or retailers, we do strongly encourage residents who have these products to contact and return them to their manufacturers or stores. At the same time, we understand there are those who, as a last option, need to discard these recalled products. We would like to remind them to do so responsibly. Discarding items containing lead-based paint and other hazardous material into the environment, through the regular trash, can bring the material full circle and right back into our homes.'

Lead is a neurotoxic heavy metal that, when ingested or inhaled and absorbed, can harm virtually every system in the human body, especially the brain. It is extremely difficult to clean up when dispersed into the environment. Once discarded into the regular trash, the lead finds its way into landfills where it can leach through the soil and into underground springs and waterways or groundwater. Groundwater is a source of drinking water.

"We invite residents to properly dispose of their hazardous materials at our S.A.F.E. Centers located throughout the City," said Board of Public Works President Cynthia Ruiz.

S.A.F.E stands for Solvents, Automotives, Flammables and Electronics - items hazardous to the environment (including people and animals) that should not be disposed of in the regular trash and should instead be delivered to a S.A.F.E. Collection Center.

AIRPORTS — Construction and Maintenance employees from the LA/Ontario International Airport (ONT) Field Crew (east) and Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) Asphalt Paving Crew (west), along with maintenance employees from Van Nuys Regional Airport, joined forces to repave the roads leading into the Ontario terminal areas.

Airports Maintenance Supervisors Timothy Gulla, Susan Smetana and Victor Rocha managed the project before winter rains could cause more damage to the roadway. Crews removed more than a mile of roadway on Terminal Way, connecting Airport Drive and the two main terminals. While Ontario's two terminals remained open, crews removed more than one acre of asphalt surface each day, then replaced it with a new surface.

"Replacing deteriorated asphalt is part of ongoing roadway maintenance that will ensure passenger safety into future years," said Joe Maldonado, Ontario Director of Airport Maintenance. "Travelers now have a smooth ride in the terminal area.

Paving The Way At Ontario

"This job was the largest project that involved the cooperation of many Construction and Maintenance crews and a job well done by all employees and sections that were involved."

The LAX asphalt paving crew brought heavy equipment to complete the job in-house at a cost savings

Following the paving each day, Airports Survey Crews and the Ontario field paint crew re-striped each lane so vehicle traffic could flow normally in sections that had been paved daily.

The groups worked jointly from 4 a.m. and 4 p.m., between Oct. 29 through Nov. 9 to remove approximately 275,000 square feet of roadway material in front of Ontario's Terminal 2 and Terminal 4 and apply a new asphalt surface. By working together, the crews completed the job one week ahead of schedule.

Ontario Traffic Control personnel assisted in directing and expediting traffic flow to alternate locations for passenger pickup and drop-off during the renovation.



West Valley Shelter Re-Opens

ANIMAL SERVICES — The newly expanded West Valley Animal Care Center re-opened with a public event Nov. 29.

The center is a 50,000-square-foot building with 95,806 square feet of parking and landscaping.

The Care Center features multiple cat rooms and special cat play areas, in addition to increasing the number of cat cages from 99 to 167. The dog kennels have an outdoor feel, but the dogs have access to enclosed air-conditioned spaces to escape the extreme heat of the summer.

Other features include a community conference and training center, a hearing office, getacquainted vards, livestock area and a ten-stall barn. A second phase for West Valley is planned in the next few years that will include a remodel and update of the medical areas, loading dock, and other back-of-house facilities.

In recognition of their service during the construction of the project, the staff of West Valley were awarded the City of Los Angeles' prestigious Civilian Career Services Award for Outstanding Teamwork May 11.

Port of Los Angeles: **Timeline**

1542: Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo discovered the "Bay of Smokes." Little did he know that the desolate tidal flats would be transformed into one of the largest, busiest and most successful manmade harbors in the world. Tidal flats and marshes remained pristine for more than 200 years largely because Europe was concentrating its New World colonization on America's **East Coast.**

1771: Spanish explorers established a mission 40 miles inland from San Pedro. Mission monks were first traders to use the harbor. The Spanish prohibited settlers from conducting business with other countries, restricting their trade to two ships a year carrying goods from Spain's House of Trades. Despite restrictions, San Pedro

1805: The Leila Byrd was the first American trading ship to call at San Pedro, bringing sugar, textiles and household goods in exchange for otter pelts and provi-

1822: Independent Mexican government lifted oppressive restrictions. San Pedro became a robust commercial center and an attractive home for new settlers.

1848: California under American control. Business at San Pedro harbor booms. It's evident that the harbor needed to be expanded to accommodate increasing cargo volume for a growing Los Angeles population.

1850: Phineas Banning began the first of a lifetime of ventures that earned him the name, "Father of Los Angeles Harbor." Ventures included a freight and passenger transportation business and the founding of Wilmington, adjacent to the wharf he built to serve his business empire.

1869: Los Angeles and San Pedro Railroad began service between the bay and Los Angeles. This 21-mile stretch of track was the first railroad in Southern California and marked the beginning of a new era of development for the harbor

1871: The main channel is dredged to minus-10 feet. A breakwater is built between Rattlesnake Island (now Terminal Island) and Deadman's Island (formerly located near Terminal Island).

1885: Commerce in San Pedro skyrockets. Port handles 500,000 tons of import and export cargo annually.

1897: The great free-harbor fight is settled. Rear Admiral John C. Walker recommended that port development continue in plans for port develo ment further up the coast and setting the stage for the modern era of the Port of Los Angeles.

1906: City of Los Angeles annexes a 16mile strip of land on the outskirts of San Pedro and Wilmington — towns that three years later would join the City of Los

1907: Port of Los Angeles is officially founded with the creation of the Los **Angeles Board of Harbor Commissioners.**

1911-12: The first 8,500-foot section of the breakwater is completed. The main channel is widened to 800 feet and dredged to minus-30 feet. Southern Pacific Railroad completes its first major wharf in San

1914: Panama Canal opens. As the nearest major American port northwest of the Panama Canal, the Port of Los Angeles became the natural port-of-call for most transpacific and coastal users.

1920s: Dynamic growth comes to the Port, marked by a boom in petroleum, lumber and citrus trade. For the first time in history, Los Angeles surpassed San Francisco as the West Coast's busiest seaport and ranked second only to New York in foreign export tonnage.

1937: Construction of the 18,500-foot-long extension of the middle breakwater is completed. World War II: Shipbuilding quickly became the Port's prime economic activity, with shipyards collectively employing more than 90,000 workers. Post World War II: Cargo containers adopted into commercial use, changing the industry forever.

1959: Matson Navigation Company's Hawaiian Merchant made its first shipment of 20 cargo containers, marking the beginning of the containerized cargo revolution. Car carriers also became common during this period.

1960s: It becomes financially infeasible, and in many cases impossible, for large ships to pass through the Panama Canal. One solution was the creation of a "land bridge" from the Port of Los Angeles to destinations throughout the U.S. via trucks and

1983: Port completes dredging of the Main Channel to minus-45 feet.

1985: Port handles one million containers in a year for the first time. Four years later, container traffic exceeded two million con-

1986: Port opens the Intermodal Container Transfer Facility, providing for the rapid transfer of containers from the Port's marine terminals to trains.

1994: Dredging for Pier 300/400 begins, the largest capital improvement undertaking of any U.S. seaport and the Port's most ambitious development project since its

1996: The Los Angeles City Council designated the Vincent Thomas Bridge as the City's Official Welcoming Monument.

1997: APL Limited's Global Gateway South opens, considered to be one of the world's largest and most technologically advanced ocean and rail container terminals. The Terminal Island Container Transfer Facility is also completed, responding to the needs of Evergreen and NYK Line for on-dock intermodal capability.

1999: The world's largest shipping line, Maersk Sealand, commits to be the Port's first customer at Pier 400. The new partnership is estimated to bring the Port \$2 billion a 25-year lease. APM Terminals division of Maersk) is currently the only Port tenant located on Pier 400.

2000: The Port completes Pier 400 dredging and landfill program, the largest such project in America, a significant milestone in positioning the Port to accommodate the tremendous growth in international trade well into the 21st century.

2006: Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach jointly release the San Pedro Bay Ports Clean Air Action Plan. This historical plan aims to reduce emissions by 50 percent over the next five years. The Port of Los Angeles set itself as an environmental steward and model for ports around the

Harbor: 100 Years of Leadership

Here's a brief look at the present and the history of the Port of Los Angeles.

HARBOR — The Port of Los Angeles, Southern California's gateway to international commerce, is in San Pedro Bay, just 20 miles south of downtown Los Angeles.

This booming seaport not only sustains its competitive edge with record-setting cargo operations, but is also known for its groundbreaking environmental initiatives, progressive security measures and diverse recreational and education-

The Port of Los Angeles is a department of the City of Los Angeles and is often referred to as the Los Angeles Harbor Department. The Port is operated and managed under a State Tidelands

Trust that grants local municipalities jurisdiction over ports and stipulates that activities must be related to commerce, navigation and fisheries. A five-member Board of Harbor Commissioners are appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the Los Angeles City Council to provide direction and create policy for the Port.

As a proprietary and self-supporting department, the Port is not supported by taxes. Instead, revenue is derived from fees for shipping services such as dockage, wharfage, pilotage, storage, property rentals, royalties and other Port services. Considered a landlord port, the Port of Los Angeles leases it property to tenants who then, in turn, operate their own facilities.

The Port encompasses 7500 acres. 43 miles founding of the Port of Los Angeles.

In the early part of the 20th Century, the Port bustled with longshore gangs unloading millions of board feet of lumber for local construction projects. Thousands of commercial fishermen and workers in a dozen canneries were involved in catching and processing tuna. More than 20,000 ship builders were working in four yards on various cargo and tanker vessels. Busy and colorful commercial areas sprang up adjacent to the Port to accommodate these workers as well as the ship crews that would be in port of up to 10 days at a time.

The Port today may seem almost serene by comparison, yet it is part of the largest container complex in the United States, handling 3000 vessel arrivals a year, some of which transport as many as 5,000 cargo containers each voyage. A gateway for international commerce and an economic engine for the region, the Port supports one out of every 24 jobs in Southern California. ■





HOUSING — On Nov. 17, a team of walkers from Housing raised more than \$6,300 toward helping the homeless as part of the HomeWalk 5K walk.

The United Way of Greater Los Angeles, the Fannie Mae Foundation and PATH partners spearheaded the HomeWalk 5K Family Walk at Exposition Park to raise funds for homeless programs, and educate participants about the causes of homelessness, the situations facing homeless people, and how homelessness can be eradicated. HomeWalk took place simultaneously in Washington, D.C. and across six other cities on the same day. This was the first such walk in Los

On any given night, 48,000 people are homeless in the City of Los Angeles (73,000 in Los Angeles County), nearly half of them women and children. The National Alliance to End Homelessness estimates that 600,000 families with 1.35 children experience homelessness each year, accounting for about half of the national

All told, the HomeWalk 5K Family Walk raised more than \$700,000. More than 4,000 walkers participated in the event, including 14 City Department teams. The 25 walkers from Housing exceeded their initial \$5,000 goal by raising more than \$6,300. Among all local teams, Housing raised the ninth highest amount. Congratulations to all walkers, and big thanks to all who made donations!

Small Steps to Weight Loss

s we begin a new year, the top New Year's Aresolution on many people's minds is weight loss. A majority of us hop into a crash diet, feasting on lettuce day after day, day after day, until we are sick of salads and give up. Although drastic diets can produce big results, small changes in our lives can add up to bigger and longer-lasting results.

A few City Employees share the small steps they took to keep the weight off.

Kathy Fatherree, Senior Personnel Analyst I, Personnel, started with one small change. First, she made Wednesday nights salad nights in her home. This made her not only learn more salad recipes, but also enlist her children's help in preparing dinner before she comes home. Once salad nights were well established in her household, she started on her next small step.

Having 19 years of service behind her, she knew that a sedentary job lulls us into physical inactivity. Twice a week, she would take a walk during her lunchtime from the Personnel Building to the Mall or just around her build-

"I still have my burgers every now and then," she says. "What I actually did was cut down on my portion sizes and ate more fish and chicken for dinner."

More than a year after her first step, Kathy joined Jenny Craig, which gives her an added

Alice Gong, Civil Engineer, Public Works/Sanitation, started her small step when she noticed how much time she was spending sitting during the weekends at her sons' ballgame practices. One day, she took her running

shoes with her. While her older boys were at practice, she took an easy jog around the track in the adjacent field. She began to see results when she took her youngest son with her on the jogs and he was falling behind her.

"The trouble with this small step is that once the kids' ball season stops, you need to take another small step to replace the activity such as going to the gym, " she reflects.

"Cut out dinners out," said Wayne Lawson, Division Engineer, Public Works/Engineering. Wayne stopped eating out for dinner when he realized how rich the foods were and how large the portions were. He then started making simple balanced dinners in small portion at home.

He substituted whole grains or whole wheat bread for white bread. He saw that he was consuming less starch, more fruits and vegetables, and started losing weight.

When asked the secret to his progress, Wayne said, "Small changes in your life are easier to accept than large ones."

The key point here is that sticking to one or two small steps will keep you focused more than a dozen changes in your lifestyle.

My small step this year is to substitute a half-portion of mayonnaise with nonfat yogurt whenever I am making a salad that requires mayonnaise, such as egg salad, chicken salad or tuna salad. I don't miss the full mayo flavor, and I feel better knowing that I am adding something healthier to my diet.

Watch Channel 35 On Demand Online

Happy New Year! I hope all the readers of Alive! have had an enjoyable holiday season and that 2008 will be a very prosperous year for all.

Last month, LA CityView 35 successfully launched its video-on-demand service over the Internet. Now besides being able to view live streaming of Channel 35 24/7, you can watch your favorite shows at your convenience.

This was the second phase of the content on-demand project that began last year in partnership with the City Clerk's office. The first phase was launched in early 2007, when City Council meetings were made available on the Internet, archived and indexed for up to a year. Now, anyone can simply log on and click on a Council meeting date and instantly the video and agenda for that meeting are displayed. You can even "jump" to a particular item of interest without having to watch the entire meeting. The feedback on this first phase has been tremen-

The second phase involved original programming produced by Channel 35 to be provided on-demand. Thanks to the work of ITA staff, the second phase was launched in early December and in an initial period, more than 80 hours of content is now available for viewing on demand. Shows focusing on the LAPD and the Departments on Disability and Aging, to name a few, are featured.

TSUNAMI-READY:

Councilwoman and Club Member Janice Hahn announced Dec. 14 that the Port of Los Angeles will be tsunami ready early in 2008. Following the Asian tsunami of 2005, Councilwoman Hahn called on the Port of Los Angeles to work with the City's Emergency Preparedness Department and the Department of Transportation to create a preparedness and warning system, as well as an evacuation plan.

In response, the Port of Los Angeles hired an outside consultant to help create the system. Inundation maps were created and obtained, and evacuation routes have been determined. Currently, the port is conducting public outreach and has mailed preparedness pamphlets to area residents, as well as businesses located in or near the port. Meetings with local neighborhood councils and other community groups are pending. Once outreach is complete, tsunami warning signs will be installed along the coast, which is scheduled for early next year.

"I have been calling for the port to be tsunami ready for more than two years because we know how devastating such a large wave could be, not only to human life, but also to operations at the port," Councilwoman Hahn said. "In the event of an earthquake on the Catalina fault, we would have less than 10 minutes to evacuate our port and coastal areas. We must be prepared."

In addition to a tsunami plan, the Councilwoman has also called for a recovery plan at the Port of Los Angeles in the event of a disaster. The Port of Los Angeles recently awarded a contract to a consultant to create such a plan, which is expected in 2008.

"In the case of a terrorist attack, or a natural disaster such as a tsunami, we must be prepared to recover as quickly as possible," the Councilwoman added. "Such a plan is vital not only to our local economy but to the national and world economies. The Public Policy Institute of California found that a significant disruption at the ports could cost the national economy \$45 billion-with 64% of the effects felt within the Los Angeles region. We must find a way to be back up and running as quickly as possible.

REC AND PARKS AWARDS:

Rec and Parks will receive two 2007 Awards of Excellence from the California Society of Recreation and Parks (CPRS), it was announced Dec. 14. The Department Awards are for the Griffith Observatory and an environmental "Campostable" program at residential camps.

Griffith Observatory, which won in the Facility Design and Park Planning Category, undertook a unique and challenging renovation which preserved the historical components of this Los Angeles icon while doubling the space. According to Jon Kirk Mukri, the Department General Manager, "The Observatory needed more space, but adding to the classic lines would destroy the look and the only option was to go underground. The \$93-million project met the extraordinary architecture and engineering challenges of the endeavor and we're gratified to have this acknowledgement."

The "Campostable" program, winning in the Maintenance Management and Operations Category, began with a commitment to providing a cleaner environment and helping to raise ecological awareness. Both the Griffith Park Boys Camp and Camp Hollywood Girls Camp provided meals served on biodegradable paper products. All camp meals during the summer months were served with biodegradable paper products, including plates, bowls and napkins. According to Mukri, "This initial effort at two City resident camps is in keeping with the Department's mission of educating young people on the importance of being good stewards of the environment through conservation and the understanding of eco-system and wildlife."

The CPRS Awards Program recognizes excellence of those agencies and individuals that develop and manage programs, parks, and facilities that embody the core values of the recreation profession and align with the mission of parks and recreation to promote participation in recreation, safety and health, and to protect environmental resources. The Awards will be presented at the CPRS Conference in Long Beach in late February.

The two cranes are ..

... oh so close to the Vincent Thomas Bridge

... and through. Whew!

Whew, That Was Close

■ New 220-foot-tall container cranes pass under the Vincent Thomas Bridge with only feet to spare.

HARBOR — Two new container cranes from Japan were delivered Dec. 13 to the Port of Los Angeles and carefully navigated under the Vincent Thomas Bridge on the way to the TraPac terminal. The cranes came within five feet of the bridge's undercarriage but passed under without incident as television helicopters and film crews captured the scene.

This delivery, precisely timed for the lowest tide possible, marks the first arrival of cranes under the bridge since 2002. The cranes were delivered on a barge that was lowered to the water line to allow bridge clearance. Upon arrival at the terminal, the barge was raised up to the dock level. The cranes were to be rolled onto the terminal over the course of several days

Each crane cost approximately \$7 million. They are 220 feet at top of A-frame, 285 feet with boom stowed and weigh more than 300 tons each. They can lift up to 50.8 tons, and their booms extend out 170 feet, capable of working a ship with 19 container rows across.

The cranes were built by Paceco-Mitsui of Japan and took 18 months to build and 21 days to travel across the Pacific.

These cranes will help TraPac more than double its container volume over the next 30 years from about 900,000 TEUs to nearly 2.4 million TEUs, in accordance with the terminal's expansion plans approved earlier this month by the Los Angeles Harbor Commission.

BRIDGES NEAR HANSEN DAM:

Public Works is working on two bridge improvement projects near Hansen Dam, said Public Works Board President Cynthia Ruiz. "Construction of the Foothill Boulevard Bridge Replacement project, just upstream of the dam, is under way. However, the Glenoaks Boulevard Bridge Widening project, downstream of the dam, has been postponed until March," Ruiz

"Working in the river channel requires extra safety precautions and we want all our contractors to work in a safe environment," City Engineer Gary Lee Moore said. "While construction has started on the Foothill bridge, the start on Glenoaks bridge has been postponed due to potential Los Angeles County Flood Control District water release risks from the dam." Completion is expected in March 2009.


Public Works Commissioners recently awarded contracts for both projects. MCM Construction, Inc., received \$7.9 million for the Foothill Bridge project and Olivas Valdez, Inc. was awarded \$1.9 million for the Glenoaks Bridge project.

Bureau of Engineering (BOE) staff met extensively with residents to address concerns during the design phase of the Foothill Boulevard bridge project. "As a result, the Replacement Bridge will mimic the original designs," said City Engineer Moore. "The roadway, however, will be slightly wider to provide for safety shoulders."

Architectural features include new decorative light poles made by creating new molds from old pole bases to recreate original design patterns. In addition, barriers will have similar openings to the originals, except spacing will be slightly smaller to meet code safety requirements.

"With a budget of \$650 million, the bridge program includes 57 active projects and works extensively with Caltrans, FHWA, Metro, Transportation and other Public Works bureaus," Moore said. BOE manages this program under the oversight of the Seismic Governance Committee. Engineering Bureau prepares preliminary designs, specifications and estimates of major public improvement projects and is responsible for subdivision requirements, checking public improvement plans of private developers, issuing Engineering permits and preparing construction cost estimates.

"BOE also provides construction contract management and is responsible for Capital Improvement Projects for the City, including sewer systems, street and other infrastructures," Moore added.

Unusual City Archives

Entries

■ Here are some points of interest from the L.A. Archives.

The following are records from the City Archives. The first one is our oldest record, dating from 1827. The others are a census from 1836; the first City Seal from 1854-1905; an 1879 Health Officer's report to the City Council; and finally the first City automated record, the annual report of Mayor Cameron Thom in 1883. Enjoy!



1827

The City's oldest record was written in Spanish and later translated in the mid-19th century. It is a plea by a man named Hilario Machado, a retired Corporal of the Company of the Port of San Diego. He is writing this letter to Don Franco Maria Ruiz, Retired Captain. Machado claims he presented himself before the Commandant of said Port, requesting for early retirement from the army due to illness. He noted he served faithfully in the military service. Machado was then given permanent retirement

This letter, written by an embarrassed Machado, asks the Superior authority, Don Franco Maria Ruiz, "to assist me monetarily, with any amount whatever, as I have a family and am very much in need. I implore that aid be extended to me from the neighboring Missions or from the Military tax imposed in this town." This missive was dated June 8, 1827.

As you can see by the photograph of this letter, there is a two-and-half inch left margin for a response to the Machado letter. There were two responses to Machado's letter. Finally, on Oct. 10, 1827, Machado was notified he would receive the following, 1,216 "ps," one bit and 9/8 grains.





1836

The first census of Los Angeles was translated into English and listed as the "Register of the City of Los Angeles and its Jurisdictions -Year 1836." Dr. Doyce B. Nunis Jr., Distinguished Professor Emeritus of History from the University of Southern California and an authority on southern California history, provides us with important information about the title of this census. Granted Los Angeles became an American city in 1850 by virtue of the California State mandate. But by virtue of the Mexican Congress on May 23, 1835, "The pueblo of Los Angeles in Alta California [was] erected as a city." There were two early annexations at that time, referring to the term "jurisdictions" in the census title. The first were the Missions of San Gabriel and San Fernando in 1826. The second group was ranchos during the 1830s: San Pedro, Santa Gertrudes, San Rafael, San Jose de Garcia Simi; and Santa Ana. The population in 1836, recorded during the Mexican era, as 2,228. This historic document lists familiar names of Feliz, Lugo, Sepulveda and Verdugo.







1854 – 1905

The City's first seal was proposed by City Councilman Ezra Drown on Jan. 30, 1854. The verbatim statement from the Common Council Minutes read:

"Mr. Drown proposed that the City provide itself with a seal, to be attached to public documents requiring the same, and that the Secretary attend to this matter. The seal showing in its center a bunch of grapes and leaves of the grapevine, the whole surrounded with the following inscription: 'The Common Council of the City of Los Angeles;' which, being put to discussion, was agreed to and the Secretary instructed to see it done."

In 1905, as the City was maturing and becoming more cosmopolitan, the City Fathers decided that Los Angeles was no longer just an agrarian City and had our current City Seal designed and described in Ordinance 10,834. A City Attorney from England was the creator of the seal. What is interesting is that Los Angeles County decided to use the cluster of grapes for its seal after the City of Los Angeles did away with

1879

By 1879, the City of Los Angeles was given its first Charter mandated by the state of California. One of the major occurrences on how City government was to conduct itself was to require department heads to write annual reports to the City

In a report filed Nov. 13, 1879 by Dr. Walter Lindley, Health Officer, Lindley praises the new sewer systems in Los Angeles, with the exception of the "sanitary evil" in Chinatown, with dilapidated buildings and overcrowding. He notes the situation "is so bad that a committee was formed of the Chief of Police, the City Engineer and the Health Officer were to report on the sanitary conditions of [old]

Chinatown.' His other statements included that Los Angeles had become a haven for invalids as a resort community. He praised the orange groves and the temperate climate. In another area of his responsibilities, he noted that, from Jan. 1 through Nov. 1, 1879, that 223 babies were born, 119 male and 104 females.

His mortality report stated that there had been 175 stillbirths, and 50 of those deaths succumbed in City hospitals. There are also lists of mortalities by diseases broken into categories that are difficult to deci-

1883

In 1883, Cameron Thom was the mayor of Los Angeles. His term was from 1882-84. Under his administration, the third City Hall on Spring and Second Streets was built. During his tenure as mayor, the first typed document was recorded. It was written to the Honorable Council and dated Nov. 10, 1883, possibly considered an annual report. Those were Victorian times, and this report had distinctive flourishes of words not found in today's governmental procedures. For example, Thom wrote in the beginning of his report, "I beg leave in a very general way to report that our moral, sanitary and business condition is good." He continues:

"As an indication of the first, I direct your attention to the fact that more churches and schoolhouses have been finished, and are in course of erection within your limits than can be found elsewhere in the entire land, where the population is not greater than ours. As proof of the second, I call your attention to the statistics of your Health Officer for the past twelve months; and in no direction can you turn your eye, or bend your ear without seeing, and hearing unmistakable evidences of a thrift, and prosperity that within itself almost partakes of the mar-

The document represents, with many corrections and additions in pen, a true human aspect to government not to be found in today's historical records. It is a true jewel!





The moment you drive your brand new car off the dealer lot, its value plummets—as much as 30 percent! The used auto market is Los Angeles is at an all-time low, and car values are not what they used to be. With a few exceptions, a car that you paid \$30,000 for six months ago might easily be worth less than \$20,000. If you have a loan or a lease on your car, then you are probably "upside down" for the first few years of the term.

Our customer was "short" \$3,000 on the difference between her loan and the value of her car.

Enter gap insurance!

As the name implies, gap insurance covers what traditional car insurance doesn't. In other words, it closes the gap between what your auto insurance company pays if your car is stolen or totaled and what you owe the finance company. Gap coverage is a very inexpensive endorsement that can be added to most automobile policies to provide this valuable coverage.

"Even though gap insurance is important for people who buy cars, it is essential for those who lease," says Mary Butler, senior editor of cars.com. "Gap insurance basically originated with leasing." The upside-down nature of a typical lease is even more common than a purchase situation because the lessee usually has no trade-in and usually puts little or nothing down. Similar to a purchase, if the car is a total loss, you owe the difference between what you have paid and what you owe on the balance of the lease.

That's why gap insurance is a must for many drivers. In fact, gap insurance is usually mandated by lease contracts or included within them. If a gap policy is required but not included in your contract, you should make sure you add it to your auto insurance coverage. If gap coverage is included in the car lease, check to see how much is offered and how much you're going to be paying for it. (In some cases, lease contracts may include what

is known as a gap waiver, which protects you from gap charges in the event that the leased vehicle is declared a total loss — eliminating the need for a gap policy.)

A few things to keep in mind when buying gap insurance:

- Although most people purchase it when a lease is initiated, some car insurance companies will sell you a gap policy any time during the lease term.
- You must be in compliance with all terms of the lease.
- Your gap insurance policy may not be honored if you don't have collision and comprehensive insurance coverage. Further, you may not be able to get the coverage if you are financing a used vehicle.




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




Calico Ghost



Calico's Census.



Hello again!

This month, we travel to Calico Ghost Town, an "Old West mining adventure" in our great state of California. Have you ever been to a real ghost town?

Calico was founded in 1881 and grew to a population of about 1,200 with 22 saloons and more than 500 silver mines. Calico became one of the richest mining districts in California, producing \$86 million in silver

During the mid-1890s, the price of silver dropped, and Calico's silver mines were no longer economically viable. With the end of borax mining in the region in 1907, the town became completely abandoned. The last original inhabitant of Calico before it was abandoned, Lucy Bell Lane, died in the 1960s. Her house remains as the main museum in town.

In 1951, Walter Knott, founder of Knott's Berry Farm, purchased the town and began restoring it to its original condition, referencing old photographs. Though five of the original town buildings exist today, many others were recreated as replicas of their originals on preexisting foundations. In 1966, Walter Knott donated the town to San Bernardino County, and Calico became a county regional park. Today, the park operates mine tours, gunfight stunt shows, gold panning, a restaurant, the Calico & Odess Railroad and a number of general merchandise stores. It is open daily, and requires an entrance fee. During the tours, one may see silver ore so rich that there are gray spots of silver in the rock.

Walk the streets and examine the life of miners and townspeople, and you may meet Dorsey the Mail Dog (portrayed by Pilot, a Delta Society therapy dog), and visit the original cemetery. Calico is a state historic landmark and survived in the early 1900s because of borax mining within the district. This was the last place in California that the picturesque "20-mule teams" were used. A narrow-gauge railroad operates within town limits, and a hard rock silver mine offers underground exploration. Lil's Saloon and two other eating establishments line Main Street, along with variety of mercantile stores, a schoolhouse, blacksmith shop, and gold panning operation. The bathhouse and barber shop are open daily, and old-fashioned remedies can be viewed at the drugstore. Calico's infamous "Character Hall of Fame" is at the Town Hall building. In the canyons below town, a full-service campground, camping cabins, and bunkhouse provide the opportunity for extended stays.

Some believe that Calico is haunted by the spirits of miners. The town was the basis for the Kenny Rogers and the First Edition album, "The Ballad of Calico."


Calico is a registered California historic monument, and is one of a number of ghost towns in California. It is the "official state silver rush ghost town" of California.

If you are wondering, "Can I stay the night?" The answer is yes, Camping is available. There are about 265 sites, 46 full hookups, 58 partial hookups, three group camping areas, tent and off-road vehicle camping, camping cabins, and admission to Ghost Town included in camping fees, except during special events. The lively events and living history reenactments are hallmarks of this exciting park. Facilities include hot showers, restrooms, public phones, grills, fire rings, restaurants and shops. Calico Festivals during the year are

- Calico Civil War (Presidents' Day weekend, February)
- Calico Spring Festival (Mother's Day Weekend, May)
- Calico Days (Columbus Day weekend in October)
- Calico Ghost Haunt (October)
- Calico Heritage Fest (November)
- Christmas in Calico (December)

Legislative Update:



Six former members of the Board of Administration of the San Diego City Employees Retirement system are facing criminal charges in relation to actions taken to

increase pension benefits and allegedly making those increases contingent upon a reduction in the City of San Diego's

fund. The criminal prosecution filed by the County District Attorney included appointed members and elected members (city employees and retirees).

required contribution to the retirement

On Sept. 7, the California Court of Appeal issued its decision regarding the prosecution under Government Code Section 1090, according to a published legal analysis.

If the decision is not reversed by the California Supreme Court, and if the State legislature does not enact legislation correcting the decision, the following adverse consequences will result:

n No public employee will be permitted to participate in negotiations of contracts through collective bargaining.

n No public agencies will be permitted to enter into any contracts with private companies, such as Kaiser Permanente and other medical insurance providers if contracts provide a financial benefit to public employees and retirees.

n No member of the retirement board will be permitted to act upon contracts that will result in benefits to its members.

Ken is pleased to report that the 2008 health care Board of Directors actions were completed prior to this court deci-

He's asked the City Attorney's representative what the procedure will be for the COLA (Cost of Living) vote next spring. He was informed that under a "legal necessity," the decision permits the Board of Directors to act. Under such a case, the Mayor's four appointees, none of whom are City employees, can act as the two elected City Employees. If a quorum is short, one of the disqualified members may be selected.

The interpretation of what can and cannot be considered a "legal necessity" will be up to City Attorney's decision.

The LACERS Board of Directors has joined dozens of other California public pension boards in submitting an amicus curiae (friend of the court) legal brief, urging the Supreme Court to hear an appeal.

Will the California Supreme Court hear the case, and if yes, when? How soon will the California legislator approve clar-

Until one of the other is accomplished, Ken is prohibited from voting on any item that would benefit retirees. However, in his opinion, he will and legally can talk in favor of such items and lobby other commissioners to do the right thing and help retirees.

Where the Wild Things Are

■ Hal and entourage begin the New Year on a safari.



Cape of Good Hope.

For a number of years, Evelyn and I have discussed going on safari in Africa. We asked Evelyn's cousins, Myrna and Don, if they wanted to go with us. They specifically wanted to see the Cape of Good Hope and Victoria Falls, in addition to spending time viewing the animals. When you think of going on safari in Africa, you automatically think of East Africa. If you look at a map of Africa, you will see that there is a great distance between the Cape and Kenya and Tanzania, which are in East Africa. This would involve a great deal of lost time in traveling between

We started researching the various options by contacting a number of tour companies that specialized in Africa. I even attended a presentation at the Auto Club on Africa. As luck would have it we found that the counties of Botswana and Zimbabwe have great viewing of animals and were still not overrun with tourists. With the Cape being in South Africa and both Botswana and Zimbabwe on the borders the distances were not great. Victoria Falls is on the Zambezi River in Zimbabwe

We selected Ultimate Africa Safaris (15611 SE Fairwood Blvd., Renton, Wash., 98058, [800] 461-0682, www.ultimateafrica.com) to set up our trip. I contacted Ian Proctor, the managing director, and told him that we wanted to see the Cape and Victoria Falls and also the animals and asked him to put together an itinerary. By this time our daughter's in-laws,

Effie and Pierre, had singed on, so there would be six of us traveling.

We left Los Angeles May 11 on United Airlines to London's Heathrow Airport, arriving at Terminal 3 at about 1:30 p.m. the next day. We passed through immigration and then claimed our luggage. Our connection to Cape Town, South Africa, on British Airways was in Terminal 4. The quickest way to Terminal 4 turned out to be by 'Underground" (subway), which is free between terminals. Because we were limited to the amount of luggage we could take on safari, we decided to leave a bag in London for the four days we would spend in London on our return. After a little research I decided to leave our bag at "Left Luggage Storage" at Terminal 4, which cost about \$6 a day. It is secured, and they x-ray all bags.

After checking in with British Airways we had about five hours before our flight. One of the benefits of traveling business class is that you can use the private airline waiting rooms. They are very comfortable and provide free snacks and beverages while you wait for your flight. You could even check your e-mail free. We boarded the plane at 7:30 pm on

After an uneventful flight, we arrived in Cape Town early Sunday morning, May 13, Mother's Day. Cape Town is nine hours ahead of Los Angeles and one hour ahead of London. After clearing customs we were met by a representative of Wilderness Safaris (www.wilderness-safaris.co.za), our guides for most of our trip. We were driven to the Victoria and Alfred Waterfront to the Cape Grace Hotel (West Quay, V&A Waterfront, Cape Town 8002, South Africa), voted the world's best hotel by the readers of Condé Nast Traveler.

After a short nap we met the rest of our party and decided to explore the V&F Waterfront. For your information, Alfred was Queen Victoria's second son and he laid the first load of stones to start construction of the breakwater for the Cape Town harbor in 1860. The waterfront has a number of shopping malls, cinemas, restaurants, pubs and taverns, and entertainment and activities for the whole family. It reminded us of the Santa Monica Promenade. We stopped at one of the pubs for a quick snack and something to drink and then visited the Two Oceans Aquarium, South Africa's largest. I had changed some traveler's checks for South Africa's rand, but we mostly used credit cards

to pay for purchases and meals, as the rate of exchange is generally better with a credit card. South Africa is very inexpensive: a nice dinner for two, with wine and drinks before, was around \$35.

The next morning, we had a great buffet breakfast, included in the price of the room, in the hotel dining room. Our guide, Steve, was waiting for us in the lobby, and we started our tour of the Cape Peninsula. Cape Town is the capital of the Western Cape Province and the Parliamentary capital of South Africa. It is near the southern tip of Africa, about 25 miles from the Cape of Good Hope. The administrative capital of South Africa is Pretoria.

Our first stop was Hout Bay, about halfway down the west side of the peninsula. We boarded a boat to go out to Duiker Island, a Cape Fur seal and bird sanctuary. The ride out to the island was a little rough, but we got a good look at the seals and on the way back to the harbor saw a number of por-

Because we were in the southern hemisphere (the start of their winter), we had had some concerns about the weather. So far we had bright blue skies and temperatures that were very close to what we had left in Los



Angeles—mid-70s during the day and mid-50s in the evening. In fact the weather for the whole trip was excellent; we had only one day that wasn't perfect, and that meant only a little light rain.

Back on tour, we drove across the peninsula to the east side, driving through Simon's Town, a naval base. Just south of Simon's Town, we stopped at Boulders, famous for its thriving colony of African penguins, a warmweather penguin that nests in the sand near the shoreline. Although set in the middle of a residential area, it is one the few sites where this endangered bird can be seen at close

As we continued south, we entered the Cape of Good Hope Nature Reserve, where we saw our first baboons. This caused great excitement among all of us. Little did we know that these baboons were very different from the ones we would see later.

Our first stop was at the Cape Point Lighthouse. As I got out of the van, I spotted a large male baboon grab a woman's purse, which she was not about to let go of. As she and the baboon continued the struggle, her husband was hitting the baboon with a plastic

bag until the baboon let go and the woman fell to the ground. Luckily she was not hurt.

Our guide told us that people feed the baboons, and they associate us with food. If they see you with some food, they will try to take it (kind of like the bears in Yosemite). The government

employs uniformed baboon chasers to help keep the area safe. It was a little unsettling with the baboons walking around loose. This was one of the few times we saw any aggression by an animal toward humans during our

We had lunch at the Two Oceans Restaurant, which gets its name because some say that this is where the Atlantic and Indian Oceans merge. There is some question as to that happening in this area, because the Cape of Good Hope is not the southernmost point on the African continent, which is Cape Agulhas. The Cape of Good Hope is the most southwesterly point on the continent.

After lunch, we rode the funicular up to the lighthouse to see the spectacular view of the Cape. We decided to walk down and stopped briefly to take pictures of the baboons and ostriches. After a stop at the overlook of Cape of Good Hope to have our picture taken in front of the sign, we started our drive up the west side of the peninsula.

Our last stop today was at the Kristenbosch National Botanical Garden, known for its beauty and diversity of cape flora. It was a very nice way to end our first full day in Africa.

Of course any trip has to have shopping, but because we were limited to luggage (26 pounds each), we asked the hotel if they could ship our purchase back home. I knew this would not be cheap, but I wasn't prepared for the figure they quoted. But we had already made our purchases so we just decided to send it home no matter the cost. If I had thought about it in advance, I could have had the tour company ship the package to our last stop, and it would have been much cheaper. Prices were very reasonable in South Africa, with the dollar being very strong. We got some very good bargains, so the additional cost of shipping wasn't too bad.

Our tour the next day was to the town of Stellenbosch in a region known for its vineyards and wineries, about a 30-minute drive from Cape Town. It is the second oldest town

in South Africa after Cape Town, settled in 1679. On our way, we drove around the downtown area of Cape Town and then drove up Signal Hill for a wonderful view of the cape area. We would have liked to go to the top of Table Mountain, but the cable car was not running. On our way to Stellenbosch, we stopped at a cheetah preservation station and were able to go into the caged area and pet a male cheetah.

In Stellenbosch, we stopped for lunch at the de Goue Druif Hotel, built in 1811, and then visited the Village Museum, a collection of historic houses from 1709 to 1850, each restored and furnished in the style of its particular period. On the way back to Cape Town, we visited a local winery, and I must say that the South African wines were very comparable to California wines.

After some more shopping, we had dinner in the hotel and made an early night of it because we were leaving the hotel at 5 a.m. to catch our flight, which would start us on our way to Botswana.

We saw only a very small part of South Africa, but we liked what we saw.

City Contribution Falls

The Los Angeles City Employees' Retirement System (LACERS) announced the annual City Contribution Rate payable on July 15, 2008 is 20.10 percent, signifying a 2.69 percent decrease from the previous year due to outstanding performance of the LAC-ERS investment portfolio and lower than expected healthcare costs.

The Segal Company presented the finding as part of the annual Actuarial Valuation and Review for Retirement and Health Benefits. The report was presented to the LACERS Board of Administration at its Nov. 13 meet-

"The actuarial study is further evidence of the strength of LACERS investments," Robert Aguallo Jr., General Manager, LAC-ERS. "We have had double-digit returns on

our portfolio since 2004. We have contained costs while still providing excellent customer service to our Active and Retired Members."

LACERS funded ratio for retirement allowances, rose from 77.8 percent to 81.7 percent. This increase is attributed to LAC-ERS exceptional investment returns during the past fiscal year (+19.4 percent for June

"Our funded status is amazing when you consider we also pre-fund retiree health benefits," said Eric L. Holoman, president of the LACERS Board of Administration. The funded ratio for retiree health benefits is 68.5 per-

"LACERS has been pre-funding health benefits since 1988 and is considered a leader

The total amount of the City's Contribution for fiscal year 2008-09 is estimated at \$382.5 million, based on the actuarial valuation. Employees contribute up to 6 percent of their income towards their retirement. LACERS funding for fiscal year 2006-07 came from three sources:

- 5 percent City contribution;
- 17 percent employee contribution; and
- 78 percent LACERS investments.

LACERS is responsible for the administration of the City's pension plan, to more than 30,000 active employees and 15,000 retirees and beneficiaries. The LACERS portfolio has \$11.6 billion in assets.

LACERS Is Ahead

The Los Angeles City Employees' Retirement System (LACERS) General Manager Robert Aguallo Jr. announced Dec. 4 that he is pleased with the results of the Management Audit brought by the Mayor, City Council and City Controller.

The Management Audit is required to be performed every five years, pursuant to the City Charter. This is LACERS' first Management Audit under this Charter mandate.

"LACERS is a leader among public employee pension systems in investments, retirement and health benefits, and customer service," Aguallo said. "We were confident the audit would highlight these strengths and identify a few areas where we may have room to grow." In the Management Audit, LACERS is commended in several areas:

- LACERS structures and work processes are designed to facilitate manager oversight and quality assurance;
- LACERS and the City for having the foresight to plan ahead to fund Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB);
- LACERS' overall administrative expense is near the mean of a group of comparablesized funds and there is a measure of efficiency, especially considering that LAC-ERS, unlike most other public funds, also administers retiree health care benefits; and

■ LACERS' making its customer satisfaction surveys an integral tool to help it deliver high quality products and services to its Members.

"The audit also recognized we administer a top-tier asset allocation strategy, best management practices, and reliable benefits delivery program," Aguallo said. "Our strategic plan guides our efforts and has been a key factor in our success."

"I am proud of the results of the management audit," said Eric L. Holoman, President, LACERS Board of Administration. "Our staff and the Board work together to provide a governance structure and an investment program that helps ensures a secure retirement for our Members.

"We had an unprecedented 19.4 percent return on our investments for fiscal year 06-07. Our investments include exciting new ventures including the real estate market with urban infill and workforce housing developments, private equity, clean tech, and environmental opportunities," Holoman said.

"We look forward to building on these strengths in light of the recommendations of the audit."

In the coming month, the Board of Administration will consider the recommendations of the audit.
