

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LAX Begins FlyAway Service from Union Station

through Union Station on a daily basis, so with this kind of daily population to draw from I'm sure the new Union Station Flyaway will be a huge success."

The new FlyAway bus service takes passengers between Union Station in downtown Los Angeles and Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) terminals using freeway carpool lanes. Mayor Antonio R. Villaraigosa was among the passengers on the first bus from Union Station following a news conference and inaugural ceremonies.

The new nonstop FlyAway from Union Station will operate from Berth 9 at the Patsaouras/Gateway Transit Plaza, on the east side of the trains at Union Station and accessed via Vignes Street. Buses will run in both directions every 30 minutes between the hours of 5 a.m. and 1 a.m., and every hour from 1 a.m. to 5 a.m. The buses will depart Union Station and LAX on the hour and half-hour.

FlyAway buses will drop-off passengers at LAX on the Upper/Departures Level in front of each terminal. Passengers departing LAX will be picked up on the Lower/Arrivals Level in front of each terminal under green signs marked "FlyAway, Buses and Long-Distance Vans."

The 20-mile, 45-minute (in most conditions) ride will cost \$3 one-way for adults, \$2 for children between 2 and 12 years, and free for children under 2 years. Tickets will be available from a kiosk staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week at the Patsaouras/ Gateway Transit Plaza.

Parking for up to 30

days is available at Gateway Center Garage (enter on Vignes Street) for \$6 a day. Five hundred covered parking spaces are available for FlyAway customers.

Cash only is accepted for the bus ride. Unlike public buses, FlyAway buses are designed with luggage bays and feature cushioned seats. Porter service will be available to riders.

The ride from Union Station, which takes advantage of high-occupancy-vehicle lanes, takes less

than 45 minutes during peak traffic periods. At the kickoff event March 15,

Councilman (and Club Member) Tom LaBonge said, "There was great progress made today by a collaboration of many people, including our mayor and the Council, the LA Department of Airports and all who work for the City of Los Angeles."

World Airports Executive Director Lydia Kennard said, "We're really proud of this new facility, and we hope that it will be a

great success not only for service to LAX but also hopefully one day service to Ontario airport from Union Station. I'd like to really welcome and thank our staff – Jim Ritchie, Michael Biagi, Susan Collette and Barbara Martinoff – who were the heart and soul of this project; we know it will be a great success and a great service for the people who use

our wonderful airport."

In collaboration with other law enforcement agencies, Los A n g e l e s Airport Police will ride the F l y A w a y

buses on a random basis and patrol station stops on foot. Bomb detection canine teams will conduct periodic sweeps of the buses, station stops and luggage-staging areas. This security operation will also include the Van Nuys FlyAway bus service.

The new service is part of World Airports' ground transportation initiatives to expand its FlyAway bus system to improve passenger convenience and reduce traffic congestion. The new service from Union Station builds upon World Airports' experience operating the popular FlyAway service from Van Nuys in the San Fernando Valley. The Van Nuys FlyAway has served over 18 million riders and saved 396 million vehicle miles traveled in the region since it began in 1975. World Airports ground transportation experts estimate 2,000-plus cars are removed from local streets and freeways everyday due to VNY FlyAway operations. A new state-of-the-art FlyAway terminal opened at Van Nuys Airport in December 2004. More than 2,000 spaces in a five-level parking structure and another 500 spaces in a surface lot are available at VNY.

The new Union Station location is part of a plan that will eventually add seven more locations around Southern California to the FlyAway system by 2015. World Airports also plans to add FlyAway service to its other commercial passenger facilities at Ontario International and Palmdale Regional Airports as demand warrants.

Expansion of the bus service is a requirement of the LAX Master Plan Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program and one of the conditions of the recent settlement of lawsuits filed against the LAX Master Plan.

The Club thanks Club Board Chairman Michael Biagi for his assistance in producing this article, and we congratulate him for helping to create this much-needed service.



Thanks for Saving Lives

■ LAX Police Officers recognized for saving lives by using defibrillators.

AIRPORTS — Seven Los Angeles Airport Police Officers earned recognition for saving the lives of three passengers through the use of Automated External Defibrillators (AED) as the passengers traveled through Los Angeles International Airport (LAX). The incidents being recognized all occurred since 2003.

Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa and Fire Chief William Bamattre presented Certificates of Commendation to Airport Police Officers William Handley, Vern Williams, Richard Taylor, Gregg Iwamiya, Tanansuk Chow and Thomas Dye and Sgt. Steven Zouzounis. The Officers were recognized for saving the lives of three cardiac arrest victims by using an AED. An AED is a mechanical/electrical instrument used to apply

an electrical shock to a person whose heart is in fibrillation. The shock is intended to cause the heart to defibrillate and return to a more normal rhythm

Villaraigosa and Bamattre used the officers' commendations made at the City Council to highlight a new public service announcement about the life-saving utility of AEDs.

LAX has installed AEDs in all terminals in 2003. All Airport Police Officers involved have received training in the use of AEDs.



Thwarted Purse Snatching


Animal Services officer's quick action makes her a hero.

THE CITY COUNCIL **HEADS TO VAN NUYS**

COUNCIL — The City Council unanimously approved a motion by Councilman Greig Smith March 10 to hold complete City Council meetings at the Valley Municipal Building (Van Nuys City Hall) once a month to allow Valley residents easier access to hear and comment on issues before City Council.

"I'm a big believer in improving access to and transparency in government," Councilman Smith said. "Residents of the Northwest Valley should not have to drive all the way downtown through heavy traffic to make their voices heard on government issues that directly affect them. Holding City Council meetings at Van Nuys City Hall will bring government to the public." The motion was part of Councilman Smith's persistent efforts to make the Valley's voice heard in City Hall and make City government more accessible and transparent for Valley residents. In 2005, Councilman Smith also introduced legislation to use videoconferencing technology that now allows residents to hear and make public comments on issues before City Council from Van Nuys City Hall. The City's Information Technology Agency will also implement an advanced system that would allow technicians at City Hall remotely control video camera equipment to film the City Council in Van Nuys for broadcast on City Channel 35.

The photo in your newsletter shows the Los Angeles Police Memorial, located in front of the Parker Center.

In 1969, John J. McMahon, Vice President and General Manager of KABC-TV, began fundraising for a memorial to honor members of the Los Angeles police force who died while serving their community. The architectural firm of Charles Luckman and Associates, which had close ties to Mayor Sam Yorty, volunteered its service, and Horace Farmer, a designer at the firm, was assigned the project.

Farmer related the memorial to the massing and geometry of the surrounding International styled buildings by adapting an earlier design of his for a block of skyscrapers unified by a



common sloping roof. Four square columns representing the authority and strength of the members of the Los Angeles Police Department who were killed in the line of duty rise from the center of a reflecting pool. The 45-degree slope at the top of each column symbolizes the lives cut short while the different heights refer to differences in the years of service of the slain police officers. Each column measures 2'9" on each side; the height ranges from 15'3" for the shortest, to 18' for two columns and to 20' for the tallest. The black color of both the columns and the polished granite bordering the pool create an appropriate somber tone. An inscription, "In memory of the me of the Los Angeles Police Department who have given their lives in the line of duty" is now covered by a plaque that honors all the officers—both men and women—who died while serving our city. The names of fallen officers are inscribed in the marble border of the pool. Due to cost restrictions, the columns were constructed not of solid granite as originally planned, but with sheets of flame-finished Bergen Senite granite from Italy over a steel frame.

On October 1, 1971, the \$75,000 memorial was dedicated on the northwest corner of Parker Center during ceremonies led by actor Jack Webb, the star of Dragnet, the popular television series about the Los Angeles Police Department. The major address that day, however, was given by the Attorney General of the United States and Nixon's closest advisor, John N. Mitchell. Rather than honoring the memory and sacrifice of the city's slain officers, and using the occasion as a time for healing and reconciliation, Mitchell, who later was sentenced to prison for conspiring with the President of the United States to obstruct justice in connection with the Watergate break-in, gave a political speech attacking dissenters. Our country, he warned, was threatened by the "tyranny of the mob" as well as by the emergence of "a whole new type of criminal-the fanatic revolutionary who kills with bombs and ambushes police, who inflames mobs to violence." As passions defining that divisive and contentious era have faded, the Police Memorial has become accepted as a commemorative setting for an annual renewal of our respect for those who serve the common good. This somber memorial says to those who daily pass, here is a place to honor those who died while protecting our community and now is the moment to hear and remember the cries of the families shattered by the sacrifice of loved ones. The materials and forms speak of permanence but the memorial is not frozen in time. It does not anchor the present with a fixed event in the past. Indeed, the memorial remains uncompleted because it records in perpetuity our imperfections with a list of officers that continues to grow.



Travel and the Value of Service

This month's travel column was inspired by a five-year-old washing machine. During those five years, this machine has needed 18 service calls. It has never worked well. It has had mold and mildew problems, and continual drainage problems. About a year ago, I found out I was not alone with this problem. There was a class-action suit that I was notified about. As part of the settlement, the manufacturer came out to fix the washer...again. The fix lasted 104 days, just two weeks longer than the 90 days that were guaranteed. After hours on hold, disconnections too numerous to count, being advised that managers were rarely available, and letters to the company president and vice presidents that went unanswered, I accepted that the company had defeated me. When I purchased the washer, I was able to justify \$1,100 cost because of the company's reputation for superior quality and reliability. I could excuse the breakdown in quality and reliability, but not the lack of customer service. The result is that I will never purchase another appliance from the company. For me, the company fell short on delivering as promised.

My company sells travel, and this whole washing machine thing had me evaluate how well we do when it comes to service, and also how well our suppliers do. Just how

important is service? So much of it is tied to expectations. Our clients expect much more from a Ritz-Carlton hotel than they do from a Holiday Inn. People realize that both hotels provide beds to sleep in, but some people are willing to pay much more for the extra service, which includes "free" amenities. In luxury hotels, that could mean bettertrained staff at check-in, more luxurious beds, marble bathrooms, free bottled water, and deluxe shampoos and conditioners.

Why do some people select a truly luxury cruise over a more mass-market product? While the ships might visit the same ports, one cruise can offer rates from \$150 to \$200 per day, while the luxury brand can be at least twice that. But, just like in hotels, many can justify the additional expense because

of their perceived value. A smaller ship with larger rooms, superi-

or food and more personalized attention can be appealing. Some include wine at dinner and free cocktails. A few welcome families and do not charge for soft drinks. It is often the little things that add up. The cruise line also pays more for its food, and its higher staff-to-passenger ratio.

It works the same with airlines. None of us really believes the food in first class is worth hundreds more dollars. But, the additional legroom, more comfortable seats and faster check-in are features that add to the whole experience, and some are willing to pay the cost for those features. It is always funny to me when people purchase first-class air for a flight that lasts hours, and then compromises on the hotel they are in for days.

If we agree to pay more for a product, whether it is a hotel room, cruise or washing machine, we have reasonable expectations to receive the intangibles we paid for. When a company falls short in delivering the extra value proposition we purchased, we are usually less inclined to shrug our shoulders as if it does not matter. It certainly does matter! The hotel, tour and cruise companies who charge more for their products than their competition usually (thankfully) fulfill their promises and exceed expectations. That is how they continue to thrive.

Of course nothing is 100 percent. We recently stayed at a very expensive luxury hotel Las Vegas. We understand paying a daily rate for Internet service, but I did not think it was right that the hotel did not provide a free Ethernet adapter in the room. Even some of the cheap motels offer that. To add insult to injury, they had an Ethernet adapter in the mini-bar available for purchase at \$12. Don't you just hate the nickel and dime-ing? When we visited Vegas the next time, we stayed at a different luxury hotel, The Wynn. The first thing I checked was whether or not they charged for the Ethernet adapter. They did not. We have moved several clients over to the Wynn. Once again, it is the little things. We take service very seriously at Cruise and Resort, Inc. We are proud of our association with your Club. With the exception of domestic air tickets, we never charge for our services. We are available by phone, e-mail or via the Internet. Unlike others who do all their business online, we actually prefer that you call us. We believe in building relationships. From this column, you can tell that we value honesty very highly. We have no problem sharing our opinions with clients, both positive and negative. We want your expectations of whatever you purchase to be in line with what you will likely receive. We provide value, and ultimately, isn't that what we are all looking for?

Libraries Win Green Awards

LIBRARY — The U. S. Green Building Council has announced that the Lake View Terrace Branch Library is one of only 17 buildings worldwide to receive its Platinum Level LEED Award for environmentally sustainable design. The Sun Valley Branch received a Gold Level LEED Award. The LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Green Building rating system is a voluntary, consensus-based national standard established by the building industry for developing high-performance, sustainable buildings. Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa, and Councilmembers Alex Padilla and Tony Cardenas-in whose districts the branches are located- accepted the Platinum and Gold plaques from the U.S. Green Building Council's Los Angeles Chapter March 6 at the Lake View Terrace Branch, 12002 Osborne St. Following a brief program, they joined other dignitaries on a tour of the library's innovative environmental features. The branch library is the second facility in the City of Los Angeles to earn the Platinum Level LEED Award, according to the U.S. Green Building Council. The Audubon Center at the Ernest E. Debs Regional Park received the Platinum designation in 2003. As a model "green" building, the Lake View Terrace Branch was designed to have a minimal impact on the environment through the use of recycled materials and features that conserve energy and water. The facility's distinctive evaporative cooling tower and windows that automatically open and close to circulate air are among the unique features that contributed to its

Platinum Level Award. Other systems that help control the building's interior and exterior temperatures include high-rated insulation materials, glazing and extended roof overhangs to reduce heat absorption. The building contains carpet and walls made of recycled materials, a bamboo floor in the lobby and meeting room, plumbing fixtures that use 20





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

All Aboard!

■ The early years of the Southern Pacific Railroad in Los Angeles.

Los Angeles has had the reputation of being one of the most improbable cities in the world. First, before Cityhood in 1850, it was a drop-off point between two missions. Second, there was no major water source other than the Los Angeles River for a City population that grew by leaps and bounds by the end of the 19th and into the early 20th centuries. And. third, a monumental change occurred when the iron horse, the railroads, arrived in Los Angeles and converted a sleepy ranching and agricultural community into a major economic force in the western United States. This happened in 1873, with the arrival of the Southern Pacific Railroad at the edge of the San Pedro Bay

Prior to the arrival of the Southern Pacific in the Los Angeles area, a pioneer by the name of Phineas Banning (1830-85), known as the Father of the Los Angeles Harbor, lived in Wilmington, named for his hometown in Delaware. Banning, a mover and shaker in 1851,was a Teamster, hauling people and goods to Los Angeles. Later he replaced oxcarts with stagecoaches. In time he also had contracts to supply merchandise and wares to government posts into Arizona.

Banning built the first rail line in Los Angeles with a government subsidy. It ran from the tidewater in San Pedro to Alameda Street near the Plaza called the Los Angeles & San Pedro Railroad (LA&SP). The year was 1869. In time, the Banning innovation became the second extension in California of the nation's Southern Pacific in 1873.

At the same time, in 1869, four major players from northern California had their own focus on railroading, but at a transcontinental level. These four gentlemen were Collis P. Huntington, Henry Huntington's uncle; Charles Crocker; Mark Hopkins; and Leland Stanford. Their interests related linking their newly completed Central Pacific Railroad (CP) from Sacramento to the Union Pacific (UP) in Ogden, Utah. This became a reality when, on May 10, 1869, the striking of the Golden Spike became a monumental event that merged the United States from east to west at Promontory Point, Utah. It should be noted that these four major brokers were also involved, a year earlier, in purchasing a controlling interest in the Southern Pacific. Supposedly, the only real claims to this event are seen in an 1866 congressional paper authorizing rail construction from San Francisco to the Arizona border, somewhere near Mojave. Southern Pacific was a subsidiary of the Central Pacific, moving toward transcontinental status with eastern railroads.

Los Angeles did not become involved with the Southern Pacific until 1872. At that time this major railway had extended its Northern Lines from south of San Jose toward the San Joaquin Valley toward the town of Goshen. This became Southern Pacific's land-grant territory from the federal government. This began on December 31, 1869.

Between 1869 and 1872, southern California leaders were fearful that Los Angeles might be overlooked by the major railroads and remain a parochial country town or village. It was decided that a delegation of prominent Californians including former Governor John G. Downey and Los Angeles merchant Harris Newmark meet with then-Southern Pacific President Collis P. Huntington in San Francisco. According to authors Larry Mullaly and Bruce Petty in their publication, The Southern Pacific in Los Angeles, 1873-1996, the following is what occurred:

Huntington displayed some engineer's maps ... and showed the railroad, if constructed in Los Angeles at all, would have to enter the city. Huntington had a price. As a condition for coming to Los Angeles, he demanded both a public subsidy and title to the 22-milelong Los Angeles & San Pedro Railroad conditions which were begrudgingly accepted by a plurality of City and county voters Nov. 5, 1872.

The results of the election found in the City Council Minutes, volume Eight (8), dated November 7, 1872, showed that 1,051 votes were cast, of which 897 votes were for the transfer of the City Railroad Stock to the SP and 154 votes were against the transfer. At that time, the boundaries for the Council were divided into wards, of which there were three. The first two wards each had three Councilmen, while the third ward had four representatives.

The election also obligated the City and county to pay the Southern Pacific five percent of the entire taxable property of the county, in the form of county bonds. All the above-mentioned stock in the Los Angeles & San Pedro amounted to \$527,730, and 60 acres of land in the City for right of way, depot and workshop grounds were to be transferred to Southern Pacific. In return, the major railroad promised to build 50 miles of new tracks on three new lines out of Los Angeles within fifteen months of the election. Los Angeles County. In 1877, the City Council granted certain privileges to the 16-mile-long Los Angeles and Independence Railroad Company (LA&I), originally connecting Los Angeles to Santa Monica and purchased by Southern Pacific. One of the many issues granted by the City to the LA&I was to connect its depot

by right of way on San Pedro Street to the Southern Pacific on Alameda Street at the intersection of First Street. Results would be for passengers and trains to travel from the City to the sea, and to also be part of a future transcontinental line.

The powers that be decided that Southern Pacific should move north to San Francisco through the Mojave Desert. In 1876, the burgeoning San Fernando Valley was being advertised as a mecca for new landowners. Plots of land for homeowners were selling between \$10 and \$25 each. Farmland was selling between \$5 and \$40 an acre. The railroad was the conduit to bring future buyers to the "land of plenty." After Southern Pacific built its tunnel to the Valley, farmland rose to \$150 an acre. The San Fernando Tunnel was considered at the time a monumental design.

Newspapers hailed the San Fernando Tunnel as one of the majestic feats built in the United States in the 19th century. The 6,976foot-long tunnel was begun in January 1875, with a construction force of 1500 men, mainly Chinese. The mile long tunnel near Newhall was excavated below San Fernando Pass. Problems of safety arose because of issues relating to the caving-in of the soft geologic formation. Nevertheless, tracks were laid and the tunnel, which still exists, was completed in August 1876. Within a month, the Southern Pacific rails were joined from Los Angeles to northern California.

Beginning in 1881, Southern Pacific began running the Sunset Limited from San Francisco through Los Angeles to New Orleans. It was considered a modern, comfortable "Pullman Palace." This was the third new line Collis Huntington promised as part of the negotiations with the City and county of Los Angeles back in 1873. In time, Southern Pacific built another more deluxe passenger train called the Golden State Limited in 1903. This line traveled from Los Angeles to Chicago.

An integral part of railroad systems are the depots. Los Angeles acquired its first depot in 1869, when Phineas Banning built the depot for his LA&SP. By 1874, the Southern Pacific used that facility for freight and passengers until 1876. The location was at Commercial and Alameda Streets, two blocks south of the present Union Station. Another depot, the original Los Angeles Junction, was built by the Southern Pacific on San Fernando Street in 1876, later to become a depot-hotel from 1882 to 1902. The LA&I depot acquired by the Southern Pacific in 1877 on San Pedro Street was closed, but continued as a commuter stop until 1889. There was one more early station, the Arcade Depot built in 1889, near First and Alameda Streets, on what was originally an orange grove.

Major changes for the Southern Pacific came with the 20th century. This railroad was then the largest transportation system in the world. There was close to 10,000 miles of railroad track and 16,000 miles of water lines, an instrumental necessity for the growth and development of its operation and developing communities along the way.

Also, in August 1900, Collis Huntington, one of the original railroad barons, died. Within a year, a monumental change occurred for the Southern Pacific. Control of Southern Pacific passed into the hands of Edward H. Harriman, a New York financier, railroad magnate and father of the great 20th-century financier and politician W. Averell Harriman. At that time Harriman also owned the Union Pacific, the Illinois Central and the Oregon Trunk Line railroads. The Southern Pacific was now the consummate railroad because of the Harriman acumen and money to improve its operations and facilities. The Southern Pacific remained the most vigorous iron horse in the Los Angeles area over the Santa Fe and the Union Pacific until 1996. But that would be a continuing story for another time unless there is interest in reading the above-mentioned book, The Southern Pacific in Los Angeles, 1873-1996.

The Board of Harbor Commissioners was created Dec. 9, 1907, marking the founding of the Port

Cruising to Asia

Hal and friends chart their three-week cruise to Asia. Part I.

Towards the end of 2004, friends Ron and Lynn mentioned that they were going on a Southeast Asia and China cruise in October 2005 on Princess Cruises. They had booked with another couple, Lanny and Elaine, whom we also knew. The first couple has been friends of ours for a long time; in fact I'm the godfather of their oldest daughter. They are very busy attorneys, and I didn't think they would really take the three weeks necessary for the trip, but I decided to also book a cabin and I didn't' have to make a decision until last August. We were already scheduled to go on the three-week northern European cruise in June (documented in the last few issues of *Alive!*), and I was pretty sure we would cancel the Asian cruise.

It was to be a 17-day cruise on the Diamond Princess starting in Xingang, China (the port for Beijing), and ending in Bangkok, Thailand. The other ports were Nagasaki and Okinawa, Japan; Shanghai and Hong Kong, China; Taipei, Taiwan; Nha Trang and Ho Chi Min City (Saigon), Vietnam; and Singapore. In most cases we had a day at sea between ports, which made this cruise a lot easier then the Northern European Cruise.

The price for the cruise (only) was just under \$7,000 for an outside deluxe cabin with a balcony. This was much less then the European Cruise on Celebrity. After I made the deposit I didn't worry too much about the trip because I was busy planning our June cruise. But I did get our in-laws, Effie and Pierre, to also book the Asian cruise, so now we had four couples scheduled to go. Around the first part of July I started to think about the Asian trip, and I was surprised that so far everyone was still going. I had done nothing about air transportation, and I started looking for the best way to get to Beijing and back home from Bangkok. I wanted to go business class and use mileage if I could. I couldn't find any upgradeable seats (buy economy and upgrade to business class using mileage), so I ended up getting two "free" United Airlines business class tickets for 150,000 miles each. It used most of our miles on United, but those tickets cost about \$5,000 each, so if you think about it's a good deal. We were to leave LAX in the morning Oct. 21, change planes in San Francisco and arrive in Beijing in the early evening Oct. 22. We returned from Bangkok Nov. 11, changed planes in Narita, Japan, and arrived at LAX. We had been to China 20 years ago, and I

didn't think we needed to see the sights around Beijing again, so we didn't take a precruise tour package. We did take the postcruise package in Bangkok, but only the hotel and transfer package: no tours.

Traveling with four couples does pose some problems, including getting everyone to agree on anything. We had a

pre-cruise meeting to decide on the postcruise package, and that was our first disagreement. We couldn't decide on which hotel package to take. It took about three weeks before we finally agreed. Another issue was tours off the ship and eating. Because some of us had visited some of the cruise ports, it was decided that we would each pick our own tours, and if any were the same, we would book together. In the end this worked out well.

As for dining, Princess has both traditional and open dinning; traditional means your dinner is either early or late seating and you always are at the same table with the same wait staff. Open seating allows you to pick from five different restaurants, and you can eat anytime you want during dining hours. We had chosen the open seating, and we decided that each day one couple would select a restaurant and check with everyone to see who wanted to dine that evening and then make the reservation. If you didn't want to dine with everyone that was also okay. Being together for three weeks can sometimes put a strain on any relationship, so having time on your own was very important. In the end, both the tours and dining worked out fine. During our European Cruise, we had one of our cell phones set up for international service. While it worked in some places it was not satisfactory, so I got on the Internet and found an international phone service from www.mobal.com. I purchased a phone from them for a flat fee of \$49 and then I paid for usage by the country I was in. The \$49 phone would not work in the United States or Japan, but was good every place else. The phone has a British phone number, and incoming calls were about a \$1 per minute; outgoing calls varied from \$1.50 per minute in Singapore to \$6.95 per minute in Vietnam. Charges were billed to my credit card as I used the phone. It worked very well, and Lanny also had one. We were able to call each other to pick a place to meet after port tours. If I had to do it again

I would purchase the more expensive phone, which gives you more options.

On board the Princess we also had Internet availability, and because we were platinum club members (five or more cruises with Princess), the usage was free, which turned out to be a great deal for keeping in touch with home.

About a month before we were to leave, I got a call from my travel agent saying that Princess had offered us a different cabin. I checked it out on the deck plan, and I could see that it was a lot bigger than the one I booked, and so I told her to go ahead and take it. I did not notice that it was a handicapped cabin. I finally figured it out about a week before we were to leave, and Evelyn was really upset because the bathrooms have roll-in showers and not a lot of storage space. She told me that when you take a shower, the water is knee deep in the bathroom. It was too late to change again, and I was in the doghouse. The cabin was big, more than 300 square feet, about 100 square feet larger then the cabin we originally booked. It had lots of closet space but no extra chairs, and the bath was as Evelyn pictured. The first thing I did was to have our cabin steward (Carlito) bring us a couple of extra chairs, and in the bathroom I had him add a table. The first time I used the shower I found that Evelyn was right, and there was water everywhere. This was not a problem; I used my trusty screwdriver and redirected the drainage system. After that, we had no more water problems. I liked the large shower, and the room was great.


You may be one of the millions of Americans who changes jobs or retires each year and receives a distribution from your employer's retirement plan. Naturally, you will be faced with many questions that may dramatically affect your financial future.

Perhaps the most important decision you will have to make is determining when you will access this money. If you don't use this money right away, you have a significant opportunity to build your retirement wealth through continued tax-deferred compounding.

If you should need immediate access to these funds, you should be aware that your withdrawals would be considered income for tax purposes in the year they are received.

Spending this financial windfall may seem attractive, but it could be costly to your future financial security. You will have to pay ordinary income tax on any distribution you take from your retirement plan, and if you are under age 59.5, you may also owe a 10 percent premature distribution tax.

Special tax treatments, such as 10-year averaging, may be available to individuals born before January 1, 1936, who meet specific IRS requirements. However, even with these special options, you will still lose the opportunity for tax deferral on the future growth of your retirement assets. This can have a dramatic effect on the financial resources available to you during your retirement years—so make your decision carefully. An IRA rollover permits you to continue to defer taxes on your retirement plan distribution, thus allowing your money the potential to grow faster than in a regular savings account. Most distributions from qualified retirement plans can be rolled over to a traditional IRA. With the recent passage of the Economic Growth and Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2001, there is even greater flexibility for IRA holders in distributing and moving assets both among IRAs and among various other retirement arrangements. As a result, IRAs can be more popular than ever as vehicles for accumulating, hold-



of equal and substantial payments for five years or to age 59.5 (whichever is longer) and avoid a 10 percent premature distribution penalty.

If continuing to defer taxes with an IRA Rollover is the preferred action step for you, ask your employer to send your distribution directly to your traditional IRA custodian. If the distribution is paid to you instead, your

employer generally is required to withhold 20 percent of the distribution for federal income taxes. If the 20 percent is withheld, you can still avoid taxes on the entire distribution if you rollover the amount that you received plus the amount of the withholding within 60 days. Presumably, you will get a refund of the withheld amount when you file that year's taxes.

If you roll your retirement plan distribution into a traditional IRA, you may want to explore the taxfree income opportunities available with the Roth IRA. Your modified adjusted gross income must be \$100,000 or less and you must be either single or file a joint tax return with your spouse to be eligible to convert your traditional IRA to a Roth. You should consider such factors as your current and future tax rates, when you plan to use the money in your IRA, and your risk tolerance when making your choice. Before making any decisions about your retirement plan distribution, seek the advice of a Tax Accountant and a Financial Advisor to fully understand your rollover options and the tax consequences of those options. Most importantly, remember that a flexible and dynamic retirement investment strategy strives to result in the bright future you envision for you and your family.

■ Water, Power African American group presented event that honored history makers.

WPAAA — For some, it was a chance to meet African Americans who made a difference. For many it was an opportunity to revisit memories that shaped and strengthened their lives that prepared them to overcome life's obstacles, both professionally and personally.

On Feb. 28, the Water and Power African American Association (WPAAA) and the Dunbar Economic Development Corporation presented "A Celebration of African American History Makers," which commemorated the achievements of African Americans who changed the world and celebrated those individuals who are in the process of making history. Some of these history makers were part of the day's entertainment.

"One of the purposes of Black History Month is to highlight and acknowledge African American men and women who made numerous valuable contributions from inventions used on a daily basis to technology, entertainment, sports, medical breakthroughs – and more – all an integral and essential part of American history," said Marie Y. Lemelle, WPAAA President.

During the two-hour event taped by LA Cityview Channel 35, hundreds of people arrived at the DWP auditorium to share in the rich culture and traditions that are an undeniable part of the fabric of this nation. History was everywhere in the DWP auditorium, from the large posters of Dolphin's of Hollywood to the black and white photographs of the famous musicians of Central Avenue.

In the weeks leading up to the day of the event, it was surprising to learn that many people were nos-

talgic about how their lives were touched by these African American history makers scheduled to perform that day. "The potentially grand scale of the 'Celebration of African American History Makers' becomes an intimate experience when the attendees begin to say to each other 'Remember when...?' or 'Did you know...?'" said Michael Dolphin, Dunbar Economic Development Corporation Board Member. "When those responses include 'I didn't know that, but I would be excited to know more,' then the event has achieved a greater success."

Jacqueline Boddie, Jesse Frescas, Joseph "Tommy" Johnson and Richard Lee were just a few of the many attendees who reminisced about the performers who offered the audience a chance to remember the days gone by, the present time, and a glimpse into the future.

"The performances were stellar – from the poetic Watts Prophets, legendary Tom Reed, jazz giant Billy Mitchell, the young talents of jazz vocalist Alexandra Isley and saxophonist Daniel Richardson and the exotic Amelia M'Baye to the raw rhythm of Conney Williams and from the soulful sounds of Voices of Power to the tower of strength Harry Flourney – it was a mix of smooth sounds, exuberance, and humor," Lemelle said. "After nearly 40 years in the business, the Watts Prophets will never lose their cool."

For Jacqueline Boddie, her memories of the Watts Prophets go back to 1972. "I was a performing arts student at Los Angeles Southwest College and a struggling single mom with two young boys," said Boddie, a clerk typist at DWP with more than 16 years of service. "Otis O'Solomon, Amde Hamilton and Richard Dedeaux were great role models for my sons because of their literary skills, positive messages and forward-thinking approach to life." Boddie added that in her part-time profession as a singer, dancer and actor, there were many times that she and the Watts Prophets shared the same stage where she found much joy and solace listening to the prolific performers.

Conney Williams performs a poem dedicated to the Hurricane Katrina survivors entitled, "She Gone." Williams

is accompanied by Ryan Cross on bass.

Jesse Frescas, a reprographic operator with DWP for more than 25 years of City service, was thrilled to meet his hometown legend – Harry Flournoy, who was part of the historic Texas Western College basketball team—the first team to start five black players to win the NCAA championship. (Flournoy's wife, Sukari, works for the DWP.) Frescas was born and raised about a mile from the Texas Western College campus in El Paso, Texas. "I don't recall ever missing a game," said Frescas.

"The team was fantastic; I never lost faith in their ability to win," he said. Frescas recalled how proud the City of El Paso was of the team accomplished for the town, the community, and the State of Texas.

In January, the Disney movie, Glory Road, about the road to victory for an all-black starting lineup in a college basketball championship game was released. The painful story of discrimination and disrespect was made public in a tremendous way. "It was really sad and emotional for me to see what they experienced," Frescas said. "Harry and the team really had class because they never let the negativity overcome them. That's admirable."

A few weeks later, Frescas read about "A Celebration of African American History Makers" in the February issue of *Alive!* and the DWP's Contact newsletter and learned that Harry was going to be one of the performers, and that his wife, Sukari, worked at DWP.

"I called the WPAAA President and asked if I

could meet Harry and take a photo with him," Frescas said. "She arranged it, and I could not have been more thrilled."

"I called the WPAAA President Marie Lemelle and asked if I could meet Harry and take a photo with

him," Frescas said. "Meeting Harry for the first time after seeing him play 40 years ago, brought back many good memories of TWC and the rest of the team."

LAFD Inspector II Joseph "Tommy" Johnson, with 25 years of City service, had a different career mindset in the 1960s and early '70s. "I was a found-ing member of Los Angeles based The Johnson's 3+1 Band," he said.

"After winning a recording contract with Venture Records, we met Tom Reed," Johnson said. "Tom liked what he heard and was instrumental in our exposure to the greater Los Angeles area." The Johnson's 3+1 Band played at many of Tom Reed's record hops and other events hosted by him. "Being a man of character, Tom maintained contact and included us in his book, The Black Music History of Los Angeles – Its Roots."

For those of us who missed out on the musical talents of the Johnson's 3+1 Band, you may remember his talented younger brothers – George and Louis – of the popular duo The Brothers Johnson.

At the end of the day, many marked Feb. 28 as a journey to nostalgic times and added another missing chapter about African American History Makers to the history books of their minds.

"All in all, this celebration was an elevated recognition and appreciation of the rich academic, professional and cultural legacies of African Americans within this City. Those of us associated with the Dunbar Economic Development Corporation (EDC) were elated to have the opportunity to be a part of it," Dolphin said. "We will be thrilled to partner again next year."







Take Guesswork Out Of Behavioral Interviews



INTERVIEW SKILLS, PART 2: Behavioral Questions

You've finally settled into your chair to face your interviewers and the battery of questions for which you have prepared. You've done your homework. You know about the job and the company or department. You've mapped out your answers to all the usual questions and have even engaged in a mock interview. You are ready.

The panel smiles and asks "traditional questions" number one and two. You smile back. You breeze through the questions. You're looking good. Your confidence swells. The panel smiles again and without warning, throws you a curveball. You're not quite sure what hit you. They are now asking a succession of questions like:

• Think about a difficult co-worker, boss or other person. What made this person difficult? How did you successfully interact with

premise that "the most accurate predictor of future performance is past performance in a similar situation."

Rather than focusing on your résumé, an interviewer may instead ask you open-ended, close-ended, theoretical or leading questions. They may also use the dreaded "why" questions.

So, now what do you do? Can you prepare for a behavioral interview? Just its very name conjures up punishment-type pain.

Thankfully, there is a way to successfully and, for the most part, painlessly handle behavioral interviews:

- The first step is, as in all things, to "know thyself." Look at your background and figure out what skills you do have that you can relate to those required for the job or position. What are your top "selling" skills?
- Next, analyze the skills required for the position you are applying for. In other words, "know the position."
- Always give concrete examples of how you

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this person?

- Talk about a complex problem and how you solved it. Describe any different perspectives or approaches you used to solve the problem.
- Describe a situation wherein you were not pleased with the outcome of a project that you were in charge of. What could you have changed? What did you learn?
- How do you determine priorities? Describe a situation wherein you missed a deadline. What did you learn?
- Describe a situation wherein you had to conform to a policy with which you did not agree.

Time out!

These are called behavioral interview questions and have, in many instances, replaced and/or supplemented traditional interview questions.

Traditional interview questions are résuméfocused and are used to evaluate skills, capabilities and levels of experience. Behavioral interview questions, on the other hand, focus on the candidate's behavior based on the demonstrated your skills in past experiences. If you can, quantify your results to add to your credibility.


- Learn how to tell a story that has, as with all stories, a beginning, a middle and an end. State the problem or situation at the beginning of your story. Talk about the action you took to address the problem or situation for the middle part of your story. Conclude your story with the result of your action. Be careful not to go off on a tangent or ramble on when telling your story.
- Finally, just as with traditional interviews, you can practice telling your behavioral stories. Think up past experiences, personal or professional, wherein you used the very skills the job you are interviewing for requires. Write them down. Practice telling them.

This being accomplished, you go on with your interview. The panel is still smiling. There are no curveballs. You are grinning from ear to ear as you confidently thank the panel for their time. They thank you for yours. You've aced the interview. You know it. They know it, too.

Fire Station 83 Opens

FIRE DEPT. — The new Fire Station 83 in Encino is open for business, after a ribbon-cutting ceremony Feb. 26.

The new station is at 4960 Balboa Blvd. Groundbreaking for new Fire Station 83 took place April 26, 2004.

It replaced old Fire Station 83, whose increasingly troublesome electrical, mechanical and plumbing systems could no longer support a modern, diverse and efficient workforce, and furthermore, the overcrowded and antiquated facility did not allow the flexibility and safety necessary to promptly serve the community.

Many of Old Fire Station 83's neighbors were known to look on in amazement as the staff at the single-bay Fire Station would scramble around the clock to move one or more vehicles when an emergency response would call for only the Engine Company or the Ambulance, merely to see the process repeated again and again as the crews returned to quarters and were dispatched to subsequent emergencies.

Because the property beneath Old Fire Station 83 was too small to support a new or revamped Fire Station, Proposition F of November 2000 has provided the community with a new 15,250 square-foot Fire Station on a one-acre lot at 4960 Balboa Boulevard – almost across the street from the Old Station.

Built to exacting safety, seismic and efficiency standards at a combined cost of less than \$7 million, the new station houses a four-person Paramedic-Assessment Engine Company, a two-person Paramedic Rescue Ambulance and an Emergency Medical Services Battalion Captain.

The new energy efficient six-bay facility features an important "drive through" feature that prevents the need to block traffic on Balboa Boulevard when rehousing large fire apparatus.

The new station will also serve as a home base for cross-staffed specialty vehicles and support units, including an Emergency Lighting Unit for use at major emergencies and disasters, a full-sized four-wheel drive Brush Patrol for preventing and assisting with emergencies in the adjacent Santa Monica Mountains, as well as a nimble Off-Road Micro Utility Vehicle for handling medical emergencies and patient transport at large public events, such as the festivals held year-round at nearby Lake Balboa and the Sepulveda Basin Recreation Area. Every year California has more than 1,000 earthquakes. Most of them we do not even feel. Does your family know what to do if they are at home, work or school?

Things to do before an earthquake:

- Create a family earthquake plan and designate a place to meet.
- Practice how to drop, cover and hold.
- Learn first aid.
- Keep emergency phone numbers and a phone number of an out-of-state contact.
- Make sure you have a working smoke alarm (with extra batteries).
- Learn where the gas, water and electricity shutoffs are.
- Secure your water heater and appliances with earthquake safety straps
- Make an emergency kit with the following items: handy-wipes, plastic bags, pet supplies, extra money, food (special foods), water, manual can opener, medicine, first-aid kit, photo ID of your children and pets, tools, walking shoes, clothes, solar blanket, flashlight, battery-operated radio and extra batteries
- Make an emergency kit for your home, auto and office.
- Have an extra wheelchair, cane, glasses and hearing aid (extra batteries) for special-needs people.
- Check chimneys roof and wall foundations for stability (should be done by a licensed contractor).

During an earthquake:

- Drop, cover and hold (stay under safe cover until the shaking stops).
- Stay away from windows and doors.
- If inside, stay there unless you feel your life is in danger.
- In a car, pull over to the side of the road. Stay in your car.
- If you are in a wheelchair, stay in the chair, lock your wheel brakes and protect your head with your arms as best as you can.
- In a high-rise building, and you are not near a desk or table, move against an interior wall. Protect your head with your arms
- Do not use an elevator

After an earthquake:

- Stay calm.
- Make sure your family and pets are all accounted for. Avoid broken glass (make sure you are wearing shoes). ■ If you smell gas, get out and shut off the gas and electricity . Check for structural damage (if you do not feel safe, get out). Listen to your battery-operated radio for emergency information. ■ If in a car, drive to a safe location. Do not park under an overpass. ■ If outside, get away from buildings, electrical wires, and trees. ■ I want every one to "Make every day Emergency Preparedness Day!





Baseball, Bunnies and Brownies

With the start of major league baseball and Easter coming up quickly, I can't but help but think of food. I know, I'm strange to think about food but that's what you get with a chef. Unlike in the previous five April editions of Cooking with the Club, I'm going to try something new and have a mix of recipes for you. They're unique in that it's not the usual recipes for honeybaked ham, deviled eggs or grilled hot dogs – not that there's anything wrong with ham, eggs or hot dogs.

Outfielder's Taco Heaven is a combination of Mexican and American cooking styles and flavors. I can't see how you can go wrong with the ingredients and, what's more incredible is the marriage of flavors. As you might have guessed, this recipe is not a new idea. In fact, Taco Bell has the double-decker taco on its menu and is similar in flavor this recipe.



Now let's turn to the maker of the Easter egg: the chicken. The Mother of All Chickens recipe is another perfect example of my cooking mantra – easy cooking is the most delicious cooking. You need only a few key ingredients, a whole chicken and place it in the oven. Yummy.

I'd like to thank Michael Bentner for his Letter to the Editor about brownies in the March edition of *Alive!* Although I have some knowledge of the culinary arts, I have limited knowledge of pastries. While I was thinking of a solution for Michael, John Hawkins, Club CEO, brought me a piece of his homemade brownies. It was magnificent – professional grade in my book. So I enlisted John to share his brownie recipe along with preparation details. Ladies and gentlemen, please welcome Chef Hawkins! (Applause!)

"Thank you, Chef Larios!," John says. "Don't ask me why, but one day I just woke up and had the desire to make my own brownies from scratch. Over the years I have been experimenting with different recipes, but this one is my favorite; I call it 'The Club Brownie.'

Outfielder's Taco Heaven

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 pound ground beef
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 cup pasteurized cheese spread
 1 (16 surges) cap refried block have
- 1 (16 ounce) can refried black beans, warmed
 12 (6 inch) flour tortillas, warmed
- 12 (6 men) no
 12 taco shells
- 2 cups shredded red leaf lettuce
- 1 cup chopped tomatoes
- 2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 1 (2.25 ounce) can sliced ripe olives, drained
- 1 (8 ounce) jar thick and chunky salsa or taco sauce

DIRECTIONS:

In medium skillet over medium-high heat, cook ground beef; add the salt and pepper, stirring until crumbly and no longer pink. Drain fat. Stir in cheese spread and cook until heated through.

To assemble, spread heaping tablespoon of refried beans on each flour tortilla. Place taco shell in center. Fold sides of flour tortilla onto taco shell to stick. Fill each taco shell with about 2 tablespoons beef mixture.

Top with lettuce, tomatoes, cheese and ripe olives. Serve with salsa or taco sauce.



"First, for the guys reading this, you need to realize that making brownies is about the easiest thing on the planet, just short of tying your own shoes (which is why I haven't let my kids make them on their own yet). The second thing you need to realize is that it doesn't take very much time to make them, maybe 15 minutes to melt the chocolate and mix the ingredients and another 30 to bake them. The third thing you need to know is that you don't even need a mixer, all you need is a saucepan (like the kind you heat your tomato soup up in) and a spoon to mix the ingredients. Oh, and you'll need an

8 by 8 baking pan (it's not the one your mom made lasagna in, it's half the size; although you can use the bigger one; you'll just have to double the recipe)."

Okay, let's get started!



The Club Brownies By John Hawkins, Club CEO

INGREDIENTS:

- A cube of butter
- (to be more precise, 1/2 cup)
- 2 ounces of unsweetened cooking chocolate (hey guys, don't get the semi-sweet cooking chocolate, as tempting as it might be)





First, melt the chocolate and the cube of butter in the saucepan. Make sure you put the heat on the lowest setting possible. If you have a "simmer" setting use that. Stir every minute or so.




- 1 cup of sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon of vanilla (real, not artificial vanilla)
- 3/4 cup of all purpose flour (I use the unbleached flour)





Stir lightly until everything is mixed in. After that you just add the flour, stirring it in until you have one nice big chocolate glob. If you want nuts (chopped walnuts), now's the time to stir them in. If you want a nice jolt of extra chocolate, mix in a handful of chocolate chips. Then, you simply dump it into the cooking pan and cook it at 350 degrees for exactly 30 minutes.







INGREDIENTS:

- 1 (2 to 3 pound) whole chicken, cut into pieces
- 1/2 cup honey, warmed slightly
- 1/2 cup prepared mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 tablespoon of salt and pepper

DIRECTIONS:

In a small bowl, combine the warm honey, mustard, nutmeg, salt and pepper and mix until well blended. Smear onto the chicken pieces, coating well. Refrigerate and let sit for a half-hour.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C).

Bake in the preheated oven for 30 minutes, or until done and chicken juices run clear. You can also grill or broil for 30 minutes, turning chicken pieces after 15 minutes of cooking.



Once everything is melted remove the pan from the heat and stir in (you can simply use a spoon) the sugar, eggs and vanilla.



I only use natural vanilla, it's not real cheap but it's worth it.

Once you take them out, let them cool down for an hour or so ... and enjoy!

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
