

There was an open seat and, looking at the candidates who were running, I was not thrilled from the candidates, so I put my name in on the very last day. It's too much of an important job that required somebody who was a little bit more dedicated to the community and to the service of the community. Pomona's mayor is not a full-time mayor like the City of L.A. so I don't have staff. It's a parttime position. That's why I've had to keep my job in L.A. So it really requires somebody who is interested in the betterment of the community and has that in their heart.

Alive !: I can imagine. How did that get into your heart?

Norma Torres: I live here. I've just purchased my third home here in the city. I have seen North Pomona, primarily the district that I have represented, go from being really bad as far as graffiti and lack of involvement from the community to being very proactive and expecting a lot more from local government. I want to see the rest of the city move in that direction.

Alive !: How do you balance working for the City of L.A., and being Mayor of Pomona? You must be busy.

Norma Torres: I work graveyard. It's a great thing that just happened. Our captain just changed our hours. We used to work from 11 p.m. to 7:30 in the morning. Well, she changed our hours to 10 to 6:30 in the morning, which has really worked out great for me. It's too early in the morning to set any meetings, so it forces me to come home and go to bed. That means I'm not available most mornings unless it's my day off and I go straight home, go to bed, get up around noon and I start my day here at city hall at 3 p.m.

Alivel: What's your favorite part about being mayor?

Norma Torres: Visiting the schools. I love talking to the kids. It's great; they're so innocent and they mean well. They don't really know much about their government, and they have such high expectations; I really encourage them to talk to their parents and instill those same types of expectations in their parents. Unless the community gets involved, our city will continue to be the last in everything - even though we're the fifth largest city in the county.

Alive !: But I see some changes. How is Pomona changing?

Norma Torres: Downtown Pomona is going through a major renovation. We have the only Latin American museum, where its focus is on Latinos who were born and lived in the U.S. We have the only ceramics museum that's a 100 percent ceramics museum in the country. Most of the museums that show ceramic art, they're

a combination of this and that, but this is 100 percent ceramics

Alive !: That's impressive. What is the hardest part about being the mayor?

Norma Torres: Developing. We certainly need more shopping and entertainment opportunities here in the city. I look at development around us. At every town they've stopped and looked and done something and kept on going. When it came to Pomona they sort of just jumped over and kept on going. It's very difficult for me to look at that and see where have we failed; what can we do better? The first day of last week we held the very first redevelopment meeting and we invited major retailers like the Lewis Corporation to come in and tell us what is it, what can we do better to get you to build an entertainment facility center here in the city of Pomona, provide more shopping opportunities for our residents? I think we're the biggest exporters of tax dollars in the surrounding areas. So a lot of positive things came out of that.

Alive !: Sounds like it did, yeah. How many Pomona city employees are there?

Norma Torres: Let's see. Close to 800.

Alive !: How connected to those city employees are you? Is it the same as the mayor in L.A. would have?

Norma Torres: I have a little bit more of a personal relationship with them because I am so hands-on. Like I said, I don't have a staff, a team of people who would meet with developers and only deal with that. We're a one-stop shop. We're very old with small-town mentality, and that's my biggest challenge right there. That's something that I need to change. That could only be done through a charter amendment.

Alive !: If you do that, what would you amend?

Norma Torres: That we would have more of a representation, more of a full-time position for the mayor and for the city council.

Alivel: Since Pomona is growing, it will need that. Do you think it'll happen on your watch?

Norma Torres: It won't happen for me on my watch, but I certainly hope that I can make that happen for the next person.

Alive !: That's good thinking. What are the top three things that just tickle you pink about Pomona?

Norma Torres: I think we have very good parks in the city of Pomona. That's one of the things. I think we have a great downtown and what we have to offer in housing. Let's say in Pasadena you can buy an old home and it'll cost you a million dollars. You can come to Pomona and buy an even better home for half of that! Look at our homes. We have three historic districts. They are just beautiful!

Alive: How do people address you in the city? Norma Torres: Norma.

Alive !: Mayor Norma or Norma?

Norma Torres: During the official council meetings they call me Madame Mayor and I'm still having a hard time with that but that's what they refer to me as, Madame Mayor.

Alive !: Madame Mayor. I like that! Do many L.A. City employees know that you're Madame Mayor of Pomona?

Norma Torres: Oh, yeah. And you know what? It's funny because in L.A. my coworkers call me Mayor.

Alive !: And now even more might call you that, since you're going to be in Alive! Do you like the newspaper?

Norma Torres: I love you guys.

Alive !: We love sharing the details about what people in the City do. What's the hardest thing about being a PSR?

Norma Torres: My job as a PSR, we're really a support service, support for the officers in the field, support for everybody, for the citizens, of going out and doing the community fairs and all of that. That's the fun part of our job. We are a support service.

It's interesting to me to sometimes see people protesting in front of Parker Center against police brutality or against something that we have done or somebody else has done; the same people leaving have been victims of crime and call us and I love it because this is America. Right? This is the part that I love: They talk to us and they were just protesting. They talk to us and we're going to give them the same level of service that anyone else in the City gets.

My operator number is 432, and when I do a community workshop or I go out to a neighborhood watch group, I always

[tell people] my operator number is 432. I'm very proud of that because when you call me I am going to give you the best service. I'm going to treat you like if you were a member of my family asking for help, and it's work that goes unnoticed for most of the time. The department is getting a little bit better over the last few years at celebrating the good things that we do. There is no room for mistakes in our job, really not at all, so whether you're working days or nights you have to be alert and you have to really know your job. Training is very difficult.

Alive!: How long have you been a PSR?

Norma Torres: I started in June of 1991.

Alive !: What did you do before that?

Norma Torres: I used to sell stainless steel valves and fittings. Elbows and valves and pipe in L.A. I did that for 10 years.

Alive !: I bet you know all sorts of lingo.

Norma Torres: Yeah, and I think the best job has been the job with the LAPD and I'm really proud of the work that we do in the community.

Alive !: Thanks for your time, Madame Mayor! Norma Torres: Thank you!



Five scholarships will be awarded in amounts of \$3,500, \$2,000, \$1,000 and two for \$500 (each).



POLICE, FIRE DEPTS. — Fire Station 89 in North Hollywood hosted the fourth annual St. Baldrick's head shaving event March 17 to once again raise funds for childhood cancer research. The local event was part of a nationwide campaign to "shave a way to conquer kid's cancer."

"St. Baldrick's is completely about the kids," says the LAPD's Sergeant Greg Doyle, co-

organizer of the event whose own young son is a cancer survivor. "We want to see cancer in all forms wiped out in our lifetime but we most certainly want to see childhood cancer beaten so this year we're dedicating our event to the memory of John Taggart, the son of fire fighter Kelly Taggart who was diagnosed with neuroblatoma at age two and lost his 3.5-year battle this past year."

"We hope our head shaving event here at the fire station and others like it across the country will make a difference so that some day kids will never again lose their hair and, most importantly, their lives due to cancer," added LAFD Captain Waldie Brangham.

The public was invited to attend and participate as a donor and/or a shavee. The primary beneficiary of St. Baldrick's is CureSearch National Childhood Cancer Foundation - which supports CureSearch Children's Oncology Group - the world's foremost childhood cancer research organization. The St. Baldrick's Celebration was dreamt up by a group of business executives in New York City in 1999 with the first event occurring in 2000. For quite a while the men, all of whom have Irish roots, had been observing St. Patrick's Day in the traditional way – pints at their favorite

pub, with music and laughter in great supply. They decided to give their celebration a little twist and help young children diagnosed with cancer who typically lose their hair during treatment. It started as a "I'll shave my head if you will" conversation and then the group recruited volunteers to have their heads shaved in public

in return for pledges of financial support. What began with a goal of "\$17,000 on the 17th," has snowballed with astonishing results. Nearly 16.000 shavees, including more than 1,000 women, have shaved their heads at 554 St. Baldrick's celebrations, raising more than \$12 million

Evaluation skills (also known as listening skills) can be extremely helpful to supervisors or to employees preparing to supervise in the future. How? The Toastmaster evaluation method teaches the evaluator to acknowledge and reenforce the speaker's strengths and give concrete feedback to the speaker that inspires the speaker to continuously strive for improvement. Eventually, every improvement is a new personal best. If you apply the Toastmaster's method as a supervisor, you will find that you motivate your employees at the same time as you build a positive relationship with your employees.

Pioneer Toastmasters winners attended the Toastmasters International Area 42 and 43 Evaluation Speech Contest March 22 at 1200 W. Seventh Street. There they competed against club winners from several other Downtown Toastmasters clubs. They returned victorious with two trophies: Dominic Buenaventura as the first-place winner of the Area 43 Evaluation Contest, and Kari Iwai (Bureau of Sanitation Management Analyst II) won first place in the Area 43 International Speech Contest.

"I'm learning so much from seeing the speakers at the area level," Kari said. Dominic

and Kari will advance to the Division Contest in late April.


Runner and Follow Vehicle for Aussie Queensland Police came a long way to take part in this challenge.



Justice Shelved?

■ Was City Librarian Mary Jones a victim of sexual discrimination in 1905?

In 1905, the City of Los Angeles was going through a growth spurt. The population had risen to beyond 100,000 residents. The "City Fathers" were truly feeling Los Angeles no longer could be considered a provincial agricultural community of orange groves and vineyards. As a matter of fact, the City Seal was changed that year from a "seal of a cluster of grapes" to the present City Seal for that very reason. City government had also grown. The 1889 Charter, the City's first home rule Charter, was amended in 1903.

On March 8, 1878, the Public Library was established. This facility proved that Los Angeles was moving in a new direction. The new era was an educational and cultural move from rampant gambling and narcotics in the City. With the 1889 Charter, the Mayor appointed a two-year term for five unpaid Directors, who would develop a management and administrative program for the Library. Four years later the appointment for Directors



Los Angeles Park, was situated between Fifth and Sixth Streets between Olive and Hill Streets. The new library finally became a reality in 1926, but not at that exact location.

Mary L. Jones, head librarian of the Los Angeles Public Library was dismissed by four of the five Directors of the Los Angeles Public Library on June 13, 1905. The five men were prominent Los Angelenos: J.W. Trueworthy, President; Isidore B. Dockweiler, Willoughby Rodman, Siegfried G. Marshutz and Foster C. Wright. Mr. Rodman declined from asking for the librarian's removal. Miss Jones was dismissed without previous discussion and without opportunity to defend herself.

The Directors had already picked her replacement. His name was Charles Fletcher Lummis, a noted cultural and literary phenomenon who had been a Los Angeles Times reporter and editor, among other things. Rumor was that Los Angeles was becoming a major city in America and the head of the library should be a man who had management skills.

This case was considered so egregious that it became a Library Investigation by the City Council, Council of the Whole. The proceed-

> ings of this investigation, eight volumes in all, may be found in the Los Angeles City Archives. The investigation, according to Volume I, January 24, 1906, states, "There seems to have been some trouble in the Library and there has been a proposition brought before the council removing four of the library board, and...is to start an investigation as to the cause why they were removed."

It was Mayor Owen McAleer "who removed these four trustees." The removal came about because many powerful women's associations, in particular The Friday Morning Club, were upset over the manner of dismissal of Miss Jones by the Library Directors. The Mayor then asked the Council to investigate the issue. The Council replied that the Mayor could easily take care of the matter. But, the Directors refused to

That was when the Mayor dismissed the Library Board and sent the fact to the City Council, asking for action to either affirm or reject his action. The four Library Directors removed were Isidore B. Dockweiler; Dr. J.W. Trueworthy, President; Foster C. Wright; and S.G. Marshutz.

The bickering between the Mayor, the Council, the "dismissed Directors" and the citizens continued through the summer and fall of 1905. Finally, it was decided to have a formal investigation by the Council's Committee of the Whole.

In some ways this investigation became a circus. It was difficult to determine who was telling the truth and who wasn't. The meetings were held over a four-week period at 7:30 p.m. There was always a full crowd.

The first gathering was held Jan. 24, 1906. That day the Times reported that the powerful women of the community asked to have 16 people subpoenaed, including the Mayor; W.S. Rodman, the fifth Director, who didn't vote to dismiss Miss Jones; and Celia Gleason. Miss Jones's assistant for four years. who remained in good stead with the Library Directors. The Council was hoping for a quick resolve that night with the subpoena of the Mayor and his quick reply to their questions. But the Mayor did not appear. Instead, his attorney appeared and claimed he would not let his client be cross-examined by Councilman Houghton or Miss Jones's attorney, Mr. Harris. It appeared the Mayor was the one on trial!

At the second session, Jan. 31, 1906, the Mayor testified. Within the formal investigation papers, the Mayor's attorney, a Mr. Miller, interjected answers for the Mayor. The Council wanted the Mayor to state that he had been aware of the Library Directors' decision to remove Miss Jones from the Library, and that he had concurred with their decision. And, if this were so, why he removed the Directors and asked for a formal investigation from the City Council. During cross-examination of the Mayor, he exploded and walked out. Nothing was accomplished.

On Feb. 1, 1906, Mary L. Jones was asked to testify. She had been waiting eight months to give her side of the story. Mary Jones had been dismissed by the four Directors for the following reasons, without her own defense: (1) absence of leave; (2) lack of discipline; (3) insubordination to the Board; (4) threats to resign; (5) threat to accept another job; (6) executive incompetence; and (7) it. Ten days later she sent him a note apologizing for her anger.


Also during Miss Jones's testimony Feb. 1, 1906, she related that on June 13 and 14, 1905, President Trueworthy visited her as the spokesman of the Board. He informed her they wanted her resignation; the next day she appeared in the presence of City Attorney W. B. Matthews to make the request official. President Trueworthy told her "the board had decided that it wanted a man for a librarian; that the income of the library had increased to...sixty-five thousand" and no woman could administer a library with that income. Previously, she had stated she would resign when two or more Directors wished her to leave. She did. And the Board hired their new librarian, Charles F. Lummis.

Testimony continued until Feb. 21, 1906. Some others who were called to testify were Willoughby Rodman, the one dissenting Director on the Library Board; Celia Gleason, the assistant to Mary Jones; Isidore B. Dockweiler, a Library Director, who did not approve of Mary Jones; and a recall of Mary Jones herself. This trial was more like a threering circus. In fact, there had even been petitions to recall Mayor Owen McAleer over this incident.

On Feb. 22, 1906,a Times article notes, "At last the investigation of the library board muddle has dragged its weary length to the finish line. Even the lawyers were so utterly weary of the whole business...they ...refused to plead the case." It was then decided that the Committee of the Whole would make a report to City Council as soon as possible. On March 5, 1906, in City Council Minute Book number 72, this was presented. After a lengthy discussion with the full Council, it was agreed upon "that the request of the Mayor for concurrence in the removal of the Directors named should be denied, and therefore so recommend." The report was adopted.

Charles Lummis remained Librarian until March 1910. What happened to Mary L. Jones after the investigation is unknown to this writer.





was upped to serve for four years. City Council members were forbidden to apply. From 1900 through July 31, 1905, Mary L. Jones was the head Librarian for the Los Angeles Public Library. The Library had been the only City department that hired mainly women. During that time, the City Library was situated in the "old City Hall." It is difficult to determine if that meant the third City Hall (1885-89) that sat on Spring and Second Streets or the then-current fourth City Hall (1889-1929) on Fort Street (today known as Broadway). Newspapers noted in 1905 that a new library was to be built in Central Park. This park, formerly known as let McAleer investigate them because they claimed he was a "silent witness" to the Mary Jones dismissal.

In the "Library Investigation," Volume 2, dated Dec. [Jan.] 31, 1906, much discussion was spent on the trafficking of mail between the Mayor and City Council about who should be responsible for solving the matter of terminating four of the five Directors of the Library. The Mayor had contacted the City Attorney, who advised the Mayor "that the burden of proof in that investigation rested upon the Library Board to substantiate their action in dismissing Miss Jones." The Directors objected. "inharmony" in the management. The crux of the matter really involved three issues: one, a salary increase; two, problems with a library employee, Miss Miller; and three, supplies.

In March 1905, President Trueworthy visited Miss Jones in her office, according to her testimony. Her assistant, Celia Gleason, was present. During the meeting, a salary increase that had been discussed by Mary Jones and the Director at the end of the preceding year, was discussed. According to her testimony, the Director told her that no money was available for salary increases until a new library was built. Miss Jones then asked, "Does this mean you wish me to seek other employment?" His reply, which angered Miss Jones, was, "Well, you would give us plenty of notice, wouldn't vou?" From her testimony, she claimed she was angry, and the Director knew

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



■ Hal and his entourage continue to their cruise in the Far East. Part II.

Our cruise ship, the *Diamond Princess*, was set to sail Oct. 23 from Xingang, China, and Princess required us to be in Beijing on the 22nd, so I scheduled our flight for Oct. 21. Because we were not taking a pre-cruise package, Princess required us to purchase a one night hotel stay and transportation from the Beijing airport to the hotel and from the hotel to the ship the next day. The cost was very reasonable, about \$150 each.

Our United Airlines flight was scheduled to leave LAX at 10:20 a.m. for San Francisco to catch a 1 p.m. flight to Beijing. I had originally booked an earlier flight to San Francisco, but United changed it to the 10:20 flight. I was concerned about weather problem in San Francisco, and I wanted to have enough time between flights for any delay. Well, I was right. When we checked in I asked for boarding passes for the China flight, but was told I could get them only in San Francisco. When we got to the gate and I found out that the flight was delayed, I started to worry. I asked the gate attendant if they would hold the plane for us in San Francisco, but she said no. In the meantime I convinced her to give us our boarding passes for the China flight. We finally boarded the plane to San Francisco at about 11:30 a.m., and we made the China flight with time to spare. In fact, United held the plane for an hour. We still made it to Beijing on time because the pilot was allowed to fly over Russia, which shortened the distance. The flight was fine, and we arrived in Beijing at about 5 p.m. Oct. 22.

I remembered an old and dark airport from our first trip to Beijing 20 years ago. Well, that airport is no more; the new Beijing International Airport is state-of-the-art and very modern. We cleared immigration and then picked up our luggage. A representative from Princess was in the baggage area and took charge of our bags. We had been told to bring an overnight bag because our bags would go directly to the ship. When we left the terminal to get on the bus, there were a number of people waiting to help with our bags. It looked like they were part of the airport service, but they were doing it on their own and expected a tip.

The bus ride to our hotel (New Century) took about an hour, and I was amazed at the changes in the city. Tall building, neon signs (even some in English), freeways and traffic, just like at home. Twenty years ago the streets were filled with bicycles and ox-drawn carts, but now there were cars, buses and trucks. I felt right at home.

The New World Hotel was by the Beijing zoo in a mixed business and residential area. The hotel was on a par with a Hilton hotel and the room was very nice.

After putting our things in the room, we decided to get something to eat. As we were walking though the lobby we ran into our cruisemates Lanny and Elaine. They had arrived into Beijing earlier in the day and were also getting ready to eat. The hotel had a buffet that was a very nice mixture of Chinese and Western foods.

We made plans to meet for breakfast (included as part of the room) the next morning before we caught a 10 a.m. bus to the ship. After breakfast we took a walk around the area and found a large shopping area, with both individual shops and large "department stores" with a multitude of stalls. This is something we did not see 20 years ago, and I was very impressed with what we saw. The drive to the cruise check-in terminal was about two hours. Most of the trip was though farmland, but I did see a few golf courses.

ship, because the new cruise terminal in the harbor was not finished. The check-in process did not go smoothly. First we had to wait in line to get our cabin keys, and then we had to stand in a longer line to clear Chinese immigration. It really was a mess. Princess did bring us bottled water as we waited in line.

Once we cleared immigration, we were to go back to our bus for the short ride to the ship. We were able to make it outside to the bus, but some passengers were stopped by the Chinese authorities. We waited more than an hour before we could continue to the ship.

The first sight of the *Diamond Princess* (launched in March 2004) is very impressive. At 113,000 tons and more than 1,000 feet long, it is a big ship, some may say too big. It holds 2,670 passengers and more than 1,300 crew members. I won't bore you with great detail, but this ship had most everything you would want, even a nine-hole golf putting course and two computerized golf simulators. There were four outside pools and a conservatory consisting of a swimming pool and bar, with a balcony deck and sliding glass roof.

Princess has a personal choice dining pro-

The check-in location, a hotel meeting and convention space, was about 20 minutes from the gram, which allows to you choose either the traditional dinning in the International Dinning Room, with two seating for dinner or anytime dining in one of four different restaurants, where you can dine between 5 and 10 p.m. In addition there are two special-ty restaurants that charged a fee: Sabatini's, which was \$20, and Sterling Steakhouse, \$15. If you wanted to dine more casually, there was the 24-hour Horizon Court and, for lunch, the Prego Pizzeria and Trident Grill for burgers and hot dogs on the pool deck.

Up until our cruise, the four anytime restaurants (Pacific Moon, Santa Fe, Savoy and Vivaldi) had different menus, but now the menu was the same as the traditional dining, with each restaurant having one specialty item, which was the same for the entire cruise. This was a disappointment when we found out, but overall the food and service were very good.

After finding our cabin, which I told you about last month, we set out to explore the

ship before we had to get ready for the mandatory lifeboat drill. The ship was big, but Princess does a good job of providing space that keeps you out of the crowed areas. In fact the only time you noticed the large number of passengers was during the times that you needed to get off the ship for tours and at the three formal nights, when everyone gathered in the same locations.


Effie and Pierre had taken a tour of Beijing offered for those who had not been to the city before and still had not come on board the ship. We found out later that one of the passengers on their bus lost her passport, and that had made them late for the ship. The person who lost the passport was not allowed to board the ship and had to return to the hotel. We later learned that she had dropped the passport at the hotel. She did not catch up to the ship until Shanghai.

It was getting close to dinnertime, so the four of us decided to have dinner. This was our first experience with the personal dining, and we chose the Santa Fe Restaurant. Both the service and food were good, so we felt good about our choice.

The next day we spent at sea on our way to Nagasaki, Japan.





Carefully examine what you seek in your job, your career and your life, and try to maximize the areas that will allow you to be you and not someone else.



Fire Marshal, LAFD Brush clearance is a **Year-round** responsibility

Here are some tips about how to handle brush fires:

- High winds can cause brushfires. Call 9-1-1 if you see smoke or fire in your area
- \blacksquare Listen to the radio and television news for up-to-date information .

By Jimmy Hill;

- Do not fly a kite near power lines or trees.
- If a kite becomes tangled in live wires, do not attempt to retrieve it.
- Possible downed powers line can cause periods of localized power outages. Be careful and treat all traffic signals as four-way stops.
- Use caution when driving in high winds or blowing sand.
- Do not light campfires during periods of high winds.
- Secure all loose items around your house. Watch out for toppled trees and wind-blown debris.

Do you live in an area that has heavy vegetation? The following information may be of help to you:

- Clear all hazardous vegetation and other combustible growth within the first 100 feet surrounding structures. Reduce the amount and/or modify the arrangement of hazardous vegetation within the area comprising the second 100 feet for a total distance of 200 feet from any structure unless otherwise specified.
- Know at least two escape routes out of your area (if possible).
- Take photos of all your important documents.
- Keep garden hoses attached and ready to use.
- If you have a pool, have a pool pump for emergencies.
- Make sure you have a spark arrestor on your chimney.
- Trees shall be trimmed so foliage is no closer then 10 feet from outlet of the chimney.
- Make sure roof surface is free of leaves, needles, twigs and all combustible material

Possible evacuations due to a brush fire:

- Turn off all ceiling and attic fans.
- Close all window shutters and blinds, if they are fire-resistive.
- Be ready to turn off all gas valves.
- Back your car into the garage with windows closed. Keep your keys with you in case of a rapid evacuation.
- Pack car with your most important: items, pets, pictures, photo ID's and extra food for yourself and your pets.
- Move all combustible furniture away from windows and sliding glass doors to avoid ignition from radiant heat of the fire.
- Keep extra flashlight, radio and smoke alarm batteries handy.
- Turn on the lights in all rooms of your house, on the porch, and in the yard to make your house more visible in smoke or darkness.

AIRPORTS — Officials from Los Angeles World Airports held a dedication ceremony March 20 at Ontario International Airport (ONT) to commemorate the reopening of Runway 08L/26R, one of Ontario's two main runways. The \$50 million project entailed reconstruction of the 10,200-foot runway and included the removal and replacement of existing asphalt pavement, signage, runway lights, storm drains, service roads, electrical vault, markings, and taxiway intersections. Runway 08L/26R closed for reconstruction in May 2005 with minimal impact on the airport's 268 daily flight operations.

Ontario Airport handles 7.2 million passengers and 575,000 tons of cargo annually.





Riding with Purpose

DWP Marketing Rep John Lockett raises funds to help fight diabetes.

DWP — When City employee John Lockett discovered that his mother's caretaker, Hasim, is diabetic, Lockett joined the American Diabetes Association's annual Tour de Cure. "I have seen the havoc the disease has caused Hasim and I knew I wanted to do all I could to help find a cure," Lockett said.

Lockett, Vice President of the Water and Power African American Association and a Utility Marketing Representative at the DWP, started cycling to improve his overall health and stamina. "I ride in four major events a year," he said. "The Tour de Cure is my only fundraiser. I chose it because it was a worthy cause and deserves my support."

The SoCal Tour de Cure is set for 6:15 a.m. Saturday, May 20, at El Dorado Park in Long Beach. Cycling is a great family activity, team sport, or you can go solo. The ADA designed the

ride to fit all levels of cyclist with three different routes at 15 miles, 34 miles, or 65 miles.

"I formed the Angel City Pedallers in 2005," Lockett said. "We're L.A.'s team." Lockett who has 12 years of service with the City of Los Angeles, says that the citizens and employees of this great City are all invited to join the Pedallers in their ride towards a cure. "Last year, we raised more than \$3,500 as a team," he said. "This year, I hope we do even better."

Why is the cure for diabetes important? One leading public health official called diabetes the "Rodney Dangerfield" of public health threats. According to the American Diabetes Association, in 2005, surveys confirmed that more than 20 million people have diabetes; however, 6.2 million people don't know it. In 2002, more than 200,000 died because of diabetes. Unfortunately, diabetes prevention and research don't get the attention they deserve.

What is diabetes? Diabetes is defined as having high levels of blood glucose (blood sugar), which provides the main source for energy for the body. Normal blood sugar levels are normally 60 to 100 milligrams per 100 milliliters of blood; it rises after a meal to as much as 150 milligrams per 100 milliliter of blood.

How do you know you have the disease? Many people are unaware that they have diabetes because typically the symptoms don't trigger concern. Some of the symptoms are: frequent urination, excessive thirst, extreme hunger, unusual weight loss, increased fatigue, irritability, and blurry vision. However, the effects of diabetes should be viewed as a major concern.

According to Frank Vinicor, associate director of the Centers for Disease Control, in a 24-hour period across the United States:

■ 4,100 people will be diagnosed

- with diabetes ■ 230 amputations will occur on individuals
- with diabetes ■ 120 patients will enter end-stage kidney
- disease programs as a result of diabetes ■ 55 diabetic people will go blind

The bottom line is, if you don't do anything about diabetes, this is what diabetes can do for

- vou: Amputations
 - Blindness

 - Complications of pregnancy
 - Dental disease
 - Heart disease and stroke
 - High blood pressure
 - Kidney disease
 - Nervous system disease
 - Other life-threatening complications

What can you do to fight diabetes? Now that you have this information, the only way to be certain whether diabetes is affecting you is to talk to a health professional. To find out if you are at risk, take the diabetes risk test at www.diabetes.org/risktest.

Aside from healthy eating, regular exercise, and medical checkups, you can do more to defeat diabetes by assisting the ADA and John Lockett through sponsorship or participation. "Diabetes is a disease, which demands our immediate attention, and the ADA is an organization that deserves our support," Lockett said. CDD Wins 2

Community Development Dept. wins two awards for economic projects.

CDD - The California Association for Local Economic Development (CALED) has just announced two Awards of Merit for Community Development Department (CDD) programs and projects. CALED awards celebrate and recognize successful economic development programs, projects and partnerships.

"The Community Development Department, through its Economic Development Division, offers a comprehensive package of services to retain or attract businesses to the City," said CDD General Manager Clifford Graves. "This award recognition further

underscores the quality of our programs."



One of the Awards of Merit goes to CDD's 636 S. Maple Avenue Intermodal Parking Structure, which received \$10.8 million in assistance from the Industrial Development Authority's Empowerment Zone Bond Program. The Maple Avenue project exemplifies the cooperation and coordination of federal, state and county government and a myriad of local agencies and City departments. Significant impacts will be realized in the downtown area through the provision of 420 parking spaces to facilitate patrons of the busy Fashion District and residents of Santee Village, now under construction. The village is the largest adaptive re-use commercial/residential project in the City of Los Angeles and, when complete, will offer nearly 500 housing units and 25 commercial outlets.

A second CDD project also received an Award of Merit for economic development in the Historic Downtown Core. CDD created the Historic Downtown L.A. Retail project to provide free retail consulting services for any business wishing to move into the downtown area. Right now the area is exploding with new development, loft conversions and new businesses. The Valley Economic Development Center, a CDD partner agency, administers CDD's retail consulting program and offers a number of services including site location, training and loan packaging.

Grilling Is Thrilling

Tt's high time to roll out the charcoal and gas barbe-I ques and get grilling. But if your year has been anything like mine, it's been a challenge on the cold and rainy days to be grilling outdoors. Fortunately, we're on the cusp of summer weather, and grills stashed away in garages around the world must be yearning to get out. People always ask me, which is better, gas or charcoal barbeque sets? And my answer is that it's a person's preference because in terms of taste, the difference is unnoticeable. Personally, if I'm grilling at home, I like using the gas grill because I can light it in seconds and grill for hours, especially if my Uncle Sal and his 20 kids are visiting. In contrast, using a charcoal grill for a large group of people may take a few bags of charcoal and a delicate touch. But if you are looking to take a grill to a tailgate party or park, it's more convenient to take a charcoal grill. I've included some other grill thoughts below. Please enjoy the recipes too. Happy grilling!



Grilling considerations:

- Gas grill prices can go up to about \$5,000, but charcoal grill prices usually don't go over \$500.
- Gas grills heat up in about 10 minutes, whereas coals need about 20 minutes or more to be ready for grilling.
- Gas grill temperatures can be controlled by temperature knob, whereas coals can burn above 500 degrees and require close watching.
- Gas grills provide the convenience of steady heat supply, whereas coals must be replenished.
- Cleaning a gas grill is easier than a coal grill.

Although the taste differences are hard to distinguish, most people believe that, while gas-grilled foods taste good, coal-grilled foods taste great.

Bobby's BB2 Beef Tenderloin

For sensational flavor, rub nice thick tenderloin steaks with olive oil, crushed garlic and meat tenderizer. Let the meat sit for a bit and then grill.

• 2 (2 inch thick) beef tenderloin steaks



Gary's Grilled Shrimp

To turn shrimp easily, use stainless steel, flat-bladed skewers. Round skewers often create large holes, causing the food to slip instead of turn.

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 pounds unpeeled jumbo fresh shrimp
- 1/2 cup lime juice
- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro
- 1 clove garlic, minced
 1 islama and a state of a
- 1 jalapeno pepper, seeded and chopped
 1/4 teaspoon sea salt
- 1/4 teaspoon sea sait
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspooli pep

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Peel shrimp, leaving tails intact, and de-vein, if desired. Combine lime juice and remaining ingredients; pour over shrimp.
- 2. Cover and chill two hours. Remove shrimp, discarding marinade. Thread shrimp on skewers.
- 3. Grill without grill lid, over medium-hot coals (350 to 400 degrees) three minutes on each side or until done. Makes three servings.



2 cloves crushed garlic 1 teaspoon sea salt and pepper

• 1 tablespoon olive oil

DIRECTIONS:

INGREDIENTS:

- 1. Rub meat with olive oil and crushed garlic. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes.
- 2. Preheat grill for medium high heat.
- 3. Use non-stick spray on the grill to help prevent sticking, and place steaks on it. Cook for five to seven minutes per side, or until done.

The Potato 'n' Beef Hamburgers

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 large potato, peeled and shredded
- 1 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- 1 cup chopped fresh mushrooms
- 2 pounds lean ground beef
- 2 (1 ounce) packages dry onion soup mix

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat grill for high heat.
- 2. In a medium bowl, mix together potato, cheese and mushrooms.
- 3. In a large bowl, mix ground beef with onion soup mix. Form into six large burger patties. Make a pocket in each burger; stuff with potato mixture and seal.
- 4. When ready to grill, brush grate with oil. Cook burgers over high heat for five minutes on each side, or until well done. Serve hot.



Honey Mustard Chicken

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 1/2 cup honey and mustard
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat a grill for medium heat.
- 2. Melt butter in a skillet over medium heat. Add the garlic, and cook until fragrant, 1 to 2 minutes. Whisk in honey

mustard sauce along with lemon juice. Reserve half for basting, and brush the other half onto the chicken breasts.

3. Lightly oil or use non-stick spray on the grill, and place chicken on it. Cook for 6 to 8 minutes per side, turning frequently. Baste often during the last 5 minutes. Chicken is done when the meat is firm, and juices run clear.


