■ Personnel Dept. created to protect City's best asset.

As Project Director for the upcoming book on the City of Los Angeles government history covering the years 1850-2000, I am saddened that, with 26 chapters devoted to the development and growth of this incredible institution, there is not a chapter dedicated to the employees that made this unbelievable majestic City possible.

It was not an intentional omission; we had an author who was hired to do the research and writing, but he had too many commitments and had not completed enough work before he left. Therefore, it was too late to find a replacement. A few weeks ago, I spoke with the Personnel Department's General Manager, Margaret (Maggie) Whelan, and offered to rectify the omission by writing an article on this most vital part of City government evolution, the birthplace for employees into the overall City government organization.

But it must be said at this time that the additions and changes within the Civil Service/Personnel Department are vast, but in this short article only a few items are noted.

The history of the Personnel Department begins at the federal level of government in 1883 - the Pendleton Civil Service Reform Act, to be exact, which established the United States Civil Service Commission. After the Civil War, the federal government's system for selecting officials and supervising their work was inconsistent and irrational. During the 19th century, the common adage "to the victor belongs the spoils," otherwise known as the "spoils system," ran rampant. A major national calamity incited the change.

On July 2, 1881, our 20th president, James Garfield, was assassinated by a disgruntled office seeker. The Pendleton Act, sponsored by Senator George H. Pendleton of Ohio and written by the future first chairman of the U.S. Civil Services Commission, Dorman B. Eaton, a staunch opponent of the 'spoils system," was passed into law January 16, 1883. The Act classified certain jobs, removing them from patronage ranks. The Commission administered a system based on merit rather than political connections.

But discontent about City officials and employment in Los Angeles government was expressed by the citizenry as far back in 1879. In February of that year, the newspaper, the Evening Express, reported that "the people of Los Angeles, having been long-suffering and

patient. have seen our hard earned money paid as taxes to irresponsible city officials,...[who] squandered and lost... In return the citizenry demanded that there should be a thorough investigation of the financial affairs of the City, "including moneys collected as taxes or in any way belonging to the City of Los Angeles as well as the various public contracts and disposal of city lands and property." This, too, was part of the "spoils system."

By the 1903 amended 1889 Charter, the City's first Home Rule Charter, the Civil Service Department came into existence. Article XXIII, dedicated to the subject, states in Sec. 229, "The Mayor shall appoint, subject to confirmation by the Council, five persons known...to be devoted to the principles of civil service reform, who shall constitute and be known as the Board of

Civil Service Commissioners." But the "spoils system" did not evaporate. The new Commission not only had to design new policies and procedures, but was also confronted with having to retain employees who had already tainted the system. Though in time, the merit system prevailed and the patronage system died out. One case in the 1930s returned as a political fiasco that truly sent Los Angeles government on its ear.

The new 1903 administration of five Civil Service Commissioners performed four duties that the Charter mandated: (1) Compiling a roster of all City employees and determining their individual Civil Service status; (2) Establishing Civil Service rules and regula-

tions to govern; (3) Classifying all positions under Civil Service needs; and (4) Establishing examination lists to fill City positions. These four mandates remain to this day the foundation of the Personnel Department. In 1903, there were 805 employees. Today, 103 years later, the City government population is about 47,692, including the proprietary departments.

A 1905 Charter amendment resolved that unskilled laborers were able to register as applicants, and if physically fit, were placed in order of application. The 1907 Charter amendment gave the Commission the authority to place at the head of a list any employee injured while engaged in any work for the City. Also, new provisions were made for certain exemptions by request of the department heads. In 1921, a special civil service allowance was given to veterans of war. An additional ten percent was given to honorably discharged war veterans and wives of incapacitated veterans and widows. Also, in that time period, Burton L. Hunter in his 1933 volume, The Evolution of Municipal Organization and Administrative Practices in the City of Los

Angeles, states, "[t]he number of names certified for any appointment was limited to two more names than the number of positions to be filled.

The 1925 Charter afforded the City to begin the modern era of the 20th century. The Civil Service Department shared with other departments many additions and changes of daily business. The following are some examples over the next few years:

(1)-November 1932 prohibited the Board on making limitations and age restrictions for candidate examinations, except for firemen and policemen; (2) May 1933: this was a new section to the Charter for the Board to provide "for the suspension and restoration to eligible lists of persons who were laid off because of lack of work, lack of funds, or other causes, except personal delinquency." (3) September 1934: a charge of \$1 for each application filed for open competitive examinations.

The 1940s and 1950s saw other enactments in the Department through Charter and Ordinance control. But in the 1930s, the old "Patronage System" raised its ugly head

once again. It came during the infamous rule of Mayor Frank Shaw, 1933-39. He was the first Mayor in the country to be recalled. It was concluded he had the most corrupt municipal administration anywhere in the country, including New York and Chicago

His brother, Joe Shaw, who was shown as a "private secretary" on the City's employee list, was in reality the Mayor's "chief fixer" in City Hall, in particular imposing his authority over the Fire and Police Departments. Mayor Shaw's infamous reputation ran

far beyond employee misdoings. The issues were so scandalous the Mayor was recalled in 1937. In 1940, Joseph Shaw was convicted on 66 counts of a variety of civil service issues. On an appeal, the California Supreme Court reversed its decision on Shaw because General Manager Glenn G. Gravatt was found guilty of tampering with Civil Service Department examination scores, way before the Shaw administration came into power.

Ramifications of the misdoings in civil service were corrected by the recall of Mayor Fletcher Bowron (1938-53). There was a review of City job reclassification; test examinations were rewritten; and Bowron removed all the prior Civil Service Commissioners. Glenn Gravatt was discharged as General Manager and replaced by Burton L. Hunter, mentioned above, who served for a two-year period, 1939-41.

Name Change

On April 4, 1967, a ballot was sent to the electorate to change the name from the Civil Service Department to the Personnel Department. The requests for Charter revisions, Sections 70, 71 and 111, were sent from General Manager Muriel M. Morse to Mayor Sam Yorty. In 1966, Sam Yorty sent out a Directive instructing departments to informally refer to the employee Department as the Personnel Department. The reason for the change was due to many more responsibilities of the Department, namely more personnel management, Workman's Compensation, health insurance and more intense training. The Mayor and Council concurred over the

name change. On May 30, 1967, the name change became a reality by election, which was reflected in the 1925 Charter. The name of the Board of Civil Service Commissioners remained the same.


The 1970s gave the Personnel Department greater depth in the needs of the employee. On June 8, 1973, the City's first Affirmative Action Plan was adopted. In August 1974, the Board of Civil Service Commissioners adopted the first City of Los Angeles Affirmative Action Program. Both programs were vital to ending discrimination on many levels, the developing of action plans, and much, much more.

In 2000, a new City Charter came into being. This updated written constitution diminished some of the power of the Civil Service Commissioners, which had been in existence for almost one hundred years, and granted the Executive Staff more operating authority.

The Personnel Department is truly a living, breathing entity. It is not only the employee birthplace, but the structure gives



the employee a total lifestyle from birth to retirement in City government. My only sadness is that there is not enough space to give this monumental Department the total historic story it deserves.





City gem: Point Fermin Lighthouse

■ This City gem is a perfect destination for an easy, end-of-summer day.

> REC AND PARKS — A treasure from the Victorian era offers a peek into the City's past ... and a great view of the Pacific and the Harbor.

The Point Fermin Lighthouse, which dates from 1874 and had been closed to the public, underwent a major restoration in 2002 and reopened the following year. Tours are offered most afternoons (except Mondays).

Kristen Childs, Historic Site Curator and City employee, welcomes fellow City employees – and everyone – to the lighthouse. With Point Fermin Park sur-

rounding the lighthouse and great views of the ocean and Harbor area from its observation room, the lighthouse is a great family destination for a summer daytrip.

Restoration efforts were spurred on in the 1960s by Coast Guard plans to tear down the lighthouse. San Pedro residents William Olesen and John Olguin spearheaded the restoration of the lighthouse to its original appearance, based upon blueprints provided by the Coast Guard.

The lighthouse, one of the oldest light stations on the West Coast, was built on a hilltop west of Pacific Avenue at Gaffey Street and Paseo Del Mar. Built in 1874 as a beacon to ships in one of the nation's busiest ports, the lighthouse no longer contains a functioning light beacon, although it did for many decades. When Pearl Harbor was attacked in 1941, the threat became very real that the West Coast could be next. The Navy seized the lighthouse and dismantled the lantern room as well as removing the lens. They constructed a lookout tower, which served the war effort for several years.

The Victorian building in which it was housed was constructed of bricks with a wood frame and contained a cupola where the lens was mounted. Bricks and lumber shipped around Cape Horn were used to build the station and three cisterns.

Rec and Parks contracted with the federal Lighthouse Service in 1927 to operate the facility, and the house became the residence of a superintendent.

The lighthouse is open from 1 to 4 p.m. every day except Monday, when it is closed.

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
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

Vacation: Refresh, Rejuvenate



You've worked hard all year long and summer is in full swing. You hear bits of conversation around the office about vacations plans other people's plans: a week in the Caribbean or Hawaii, a trip to Mexico, a drive down the coast, a day at Disneyland and the next day at Hurricane Harbor. Yet, here you are, stuck at your desk. No trips planned. No vacation plans, either. Nothing, nada, zip as you scan your calendar trying to schedule meetings especially frustrating since everyone seems to be gone or leaving on vacation.

Why not you? Well, simply put, there's too much work and way too much going on. You've got projects with deadlines about to hit. Besides, who's going to take care of work with everyone else out? Sure, you're stressed. Sure, you're feeling tired and burned out. But, you can handle it. Vacations are for wimps. You're strong. You've got this work ethic. You don't need a vacation. The office might fall apart without you.

Still, there's that nagging deep inside. You need to get away. You haggle with yourself: "Okay, maybe one week max. I'll call in every day. I'll take my cell and laptop and make sure everyone has my contact numbers, including my hotel and room information. Maybe then it would work.'

Notify and remind everyone weekly so that they are mentally prepared. Delegate specific tasks to specific people. Assign and prime a trusted person to be your backup for any emergencies. Program your e-mail, work telephone and pager to say that you are on vacation and will respond when you return. Give contact information for your backup.

If you've been true to work then you must also be true to yourself, to your family and to

Vacation means time to refresh, recoup, rejuvenate. It's a special time to breathe in the goodness and beauty of your life and remind yourself that "yes, this is why I work so hard."

That way, as you return to work, you can then breathe out and say, "Yup, I'm back and look at this pile of work." "Still, it was a great vacation and I'll need to start planning next year's vacation." Why not? It will give you and your family something to look forward to the rest of the year.

Have a great vacation!

I met recently with Councilman Greig Smith, and America Garza met with Councilman Ed Reyes. These meetings were to urge them to consider the increase of our Death Benefit from \$2500 to \$5000.

Legislative Update:

The Board of Administration of the Los Angeles City Employees Retirement System (LACERS) has approved a 3 percent cost of living adjustment for its retired members (those who have been retired less than one year will receive a prorated adjustment). You should see the increase in July's retirement allowance.

Although October seems far away, LACERS is already preparing for this year's health plan Open Enrollment. At this point, I can share with you only some preliminary information. Many of you will be happy to know that you will be able to choose from the same health plan providers as last year. So, if you are happy with your provider, you don't have to change plans. As for the 2007 rates and maximum subsidy, they have not yet been determined. The health plan providers have submitted their initial rates to LACERS, but they are under review and are only the starting point for negotiations, which will begin this month. In the past, final rates were available by July or August, but this year they won't be available until September. This is the first year that Medicare Part D has taken effect and the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services will not know how much money will be available to each health plan provider through Medicare Part D until September. This amount is used to offset your premium

costs, so LACERS cannot finalize rates until this information is received. To accommodate this timeline, LACERS has decided to change this year's Open Enrollment period to Oct. 15 - Nov. 15.

LACERS staff has also been busy planning this year's Open Enrollment events. LACERS has shared with me some details about the Open Enrollment Fair, which promises to be bigger and better than

> previous ones. It will be held at the Los Angeles Convention Center Oct. 25, there we be a free lunch, and everyone in attendance will receive a complimentary travel bag. LACERS has also confirmed

Hong Kong and Vietnam

■ Part five of Hal and company's cruise through Asia.

We had been at sea on the Diamond Princess for three consecutive days because we missed our port stop in Taiwan due to a typhoon, and we were looking forward to getting off the ship.

Our next port of call was Hong Kong, which has been part of China since being returned by Great Britain in 1997. Evelyn and I had been to Hong Kong twice, but this was the first time under China's control. Lanny and Elaine had been here a number of times too, so we decided to skip a tour and just do our own thing. Effie and Pierre, who had not been here, took a ship's tour.

The Diamond Princess was too big to dock at the Victoria Harbor passenger dock, so we were berthed about 45 minutes from the city. We took the ship's bus from the dock for \$5, which dropped us

off at a large shopping complex at the waterfront in Kowloon (mainland Hong Kong). We had decided to go to Stanley Market, a large shopping area on the opposite side of Hong Kong Island. On previous trips we had found a lot of bargains in name brands that were overstocks



or seconds. We decided to take a taxi, but first we needed some Hong Kong dollars, which we got by finding an ATM. It always amazes me when I'm in a foreign country and put my LAfCU ATM card in a machine and out comes money.

I must admit that with all the building

After lunch we walked around the shopping area and found a store that sold Chinese art objects, and we bought a nice wooden bowl. We then walked over to Nathan Road, the Rodeo Drive of Hong Kong. It has become overbuilt and overcrowded, and it was not as I remembered. On our walk back to the bus stop, we stopped in a jewelry store that advertised itself as a factory outlet, and Evelyn brought some jade slides for her necklaces. We got back to the bus pickup point and found the line for our bus to the ship. It wasn't too long, and as we waited we found Effie and Pierre, and they then joined us in line. As we waited the line became very

Apparently to pay us back for missing Taiwan, the Captain got permission to sail out of Hong Kong through the main channel. It was an impressive sight, with the Hong Kong skyline all lit up. It took about

long and buses were arriving very slowly.

After about 30 minutes we were able to

board the bus and headed for the ship.

an hour to clear the port.

Our next stop was Nha Trang, one of Vietnam's most popular seaside destinations. There were four miles of whitesand beaches, with warm Caribbean-like water. It was a popular spot for U.S. servicemen during the Vietnam War. Think China Beach.

Lanny and Elaine took a tour of the countryside, and Effie, Pierre, Evelyn and I explored Nha Trang on our own. At first I was thinking of renting a room at one of the beach hotels and spending the day on the sand, but we thought we should see the sights of the city. We decided to do it on our own by taxi. The ship had a shuttle bus to take us about four miles along the beach to one of the hotels that was the headquarters for the ship. The cost was \$3, and we could have just booked a taxi at the dock. At the hotel we found a taxi driver who spoke some English. We asked for a tour of the city, and we showed him on our map where we wanted to go. He agreed to take us and the charge would be \$10 per person. This turned out to be a very good bargain as the cost of the ship's tour was \$46 per person.

Driving in Nha Trang is a little like a game of "chicken."

There are not a lot of cars but everyone has a motorbike, and I didn't see one stoplight or stop sign. The horn was used to announce your presence to the cars and bikes in your path of travel. You would be surprised at what they could carry on a bike. Many of the women were riding in high-heeled shoes and long dresses.

The first stop was the Long Son Pagoda, built in 1965 to commemorate the Buddhist monks who protested the Diem



regime in the early 1960s by setting themselves on fire. A large white Buddha sat on the hill behind. Our driver couldn't guide us in the pagoda, so one of the students became our guide. As we climbed

to the top of the hill to see the white Buddha we passed a large reclining Buddha. We wanted our picture taken and a person said they would take it and of course they wanted \$5 for doing it. I gave

(without paying the fee) we climbed a lot of steps to get to the top. It gave us another good view of the beach area. The towers were dedicated to the goddess Uroja revered as the symbol of weaving and agriculture.

Our last sightseeing stop was the Hon Chong Promontory, a small rocky peninsula that jutted out into the South China Sea and offered a great view of the bay.

We asked our driver to drop us off at the Dan Market in downtown Nha Trang. The ladies took one look and thought they had hit the mother lode of knockoffs. Every

people selling art and postcards rushed up to us. I always tell them I'll look at their goods when we return, and of course the guy selling the water colors was waiting for me. I said I would buy two of his paintings. He wanted \$10 each and I said \$5, but I overpaid by about \$4 each. We did get them framed and they now hang in our

Ponagar Cham Tower was our next stop, and after we got though the gate We spent about two hours shopping and, in addition to the handbags, we did buy a number of Vietnamese handicrafts. The market reminded me of what Hong Kong's Stanley Market was 20 years ago.

We caught a taxi back to the ship's dock and the Princess. I really liked Nha Trang.

Our next stop would be 200 miles south to Saigon, now known as Ho Chi Minh City. I'll report on that and Singapore next month.



Over the years, Old Fire Station 5's physical space as well as electrical,



mechanical and plumbing systems proved unable to support a modern and diverse workforce. Those working inside the nearly sixdecade-old building experienced a daily struggle to effectively respond to the growing needs of the many people now living, working and traveling in the station's airport-adjacent district.

Because the property beneath Old Fire Station 5 was too small to support a new Regional Fire Station, Proposition F in November 2000 has provided the community with a new 15,250 square-foot Regional Fire Station, a 6,000-square-foot apparatus storage building and a 2,500-square-foot multipurpose room on a two-acre lot.

Groundbreaking for New Fire Station 5 took place May 13, 2004. Built at a cost of \$9.3 million and almost two-and-a-half times the size of the facility it replaced, the new station opened for service April 13, 23 months after groundbreaking. It was built to exacting safety, seismic and efficiency standards.

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

Finance Outstanding Service Awards

■ Office of Finance offers its fourth annual Outstanding Service Awards.

FINANCE — On June 6, the Office of Finance presented its fourth annual Outstanding Service Awards at the New Otani Hotel's Azalea Restaurant. The awards were given to the top 1.7 percent of the Office of Finance workforce for "exceptional performance and dedication to the job."

Six awards were presented.

The Office of Finance was created in 2000 as a result of Charter reform efforts and collects more than \$2 billion in revenue annually from various sources including taxes, licenses, fees and permits that pay for numerous essential municipal services to City residents and businesses.

The following six honorees were recognized for service at a level above and beyond the normal duties of the job:

Administration Division Ken White,

Sr. Management Analyst I

Ken began his City service in November 1986 as a Management Assistant at the Department of Aging. He was first promoted to Management Analyst with the Bureau of Sanitation and then was promoted to Senior Management Analyst in 1994 with the City Clerk's Office. He has been dutifully serving the Office since.

This year, Ken was recognized for the overall outstanding administrative abilities and leadership he demonstrated in his assigned projects during the past year. Some examples of his achievements are: 1) coordination of the offsite printing of the 2005 and 2006 business tax renewals; 2) emergency preparedness activities for the Office of Finance; 3) reallocation of work locations and staff at the Wilshire Office to provide for the new tax auditor positions; and 4) construction coordination of the build-out at the Wilshire Office for those same positions. He facilitated the revision and printing of the tax renewal information to taxpayers so that the contractor could issue the initial mailing of 292,300 renewal booklets in time for the business tax renewal season.

Ken was also a key player in electronic filing of business taxes. As a result of his work, the growth in e-form users, on-line filers and on-time collections earned our Office a Helen Putnam Honorable Mention Award from the League of California Cities.

LATAX Division Jackson Jang. Systems Analyst II

Jackson has a short history with the City. Jackson started with the City in September 2001 at the Office of Finance as a Systems Analyst II. Five years later, Jackson has mastered his role to become the primary expert for the development of both the taxpayer's and revenue reporting financial reports. His involvement includes not only the development of the Crystal Reports for LATAX, but also the discovery of system problems and incorrect taxpayer data. He consistently meets the deadlines regarding the requests for taxpavers' information. Jackson is always helpful above and beyond his assigned duties. He is also central in managing the licensing and maintenance for the entire LATAX hardware and software environment.

This Outstanding Service Award was an additional award for Jackson after having attained a series of Outstanding Attendance Awards from 2002 to 2004.

Revenue Management Division Chandra Flemister, **Principal Clerk, Harbor District Branch**

Chandra began her City service in July 1986 as a Clerk Typist with the Community Development Department. After working several years at Airports, she arrived at the Office of Finance in 2003 on a promotion to Principal Clerk.

This year, Chandra was recognized for outstanding supervisory performance over the span of authority of three public counters. Traveling from office to office, she is responsible for the day-to-day operation. The Harbor District Branch and Field offices benefit from her constant source of infor-

mation and knowledge obtained from prior work experience and relationships formed with other City Departments who cooperate with our tax compliance efforts.

Revenue Management Division Shelia Hamilton-Keel, Principal Clerk, Region II-Hollywood Branch Office

Shelia began her City service in July 1989 as a Clerk Typist with Public Works. Shelia came to the Office of Finance 12 year later in 2001 on a promotion as a Principal Clerk and has since acquired and practiced expert knowledge in tax renewal information.

Shelia was honored for outstanding dedication to duty and excellent leadership skills. As the supervisor over the Hollywood Branch Public Counter, she demonstrated extraordinary leadership during the 2005-06 Business Tax Renewal Season. She provided optimum customer service to the public with her pleasant demeanor and upbeat attitude. With the implementation of LATAX, in-house electronic database system, she faced the new challenges with excellent comprehension, retention and the ability to pass on her knowledge to subordinates and co-workers who greatly depend on her wealth of information to resolve business taxpayers' prob-

Tax and Permit Division Evelyn Fernandez-Melone Senior Tax Auditor, Field Audit I

Evelyn started out with the City as an Auditor with the City Clerk and decided to devote her service to the Office of Finance after the charter change in 2000.

Two promotions later, Evelyn is the Office of Finance's lone member stationed in the Sacramento Sales and Use Tax Operations. Her dedication to her duties resulted in consistent recoveries from errors and misallocations of sales tax reporting by taxpayers.

Over the span of 11 years, Evelyn was able to bring in cash recoveries of more than \$11 million. Her persistence and focus on identifying sales tax errors led to effective audit referrals of non-reporting and/or underpaying business taxes by taxpayers from their sales and/or leasing activities.

Another specialized unit in our Office is the Citywide Collections Unit. This group collects debts of more than \$1,000 owed to the City from all departments. These bills could be unpaid fines from Building Inspectors, damages to parking meters incurred by drivers under the influence, or outstanding bills from people who pulled false alarms on the Fire Department. After the City Attorney signs off, Finance Collection Investigators may represent the City in small claims court for collecting such damages caused by vandalism to public restrooms and traffic collision involving traffic lights.

This year the amazing group of Finance Collection Investigators have already exceeded their revenue target goal of \$9 million and are at \$10.5 million and counting!

Mark has had a very active career with the City since he started in January 1973 as a Law Clerk. His subsequent promotions to Legal Assistant, to Paralegal, to Senior Legal Assistant, to Investigator III, to Chief Investigator, City Attorney Administrator III, and finally to Finance Administrative Coordinator brought him from the City Attorney's Office to the Office of Finance 30 years later, in 2003.

This year, Mark led the effort that resulted in the Unit achieving the 16 Office of Finance goals assigned for FY 2005-06. This includes exceeding the revenue recovery goal by a 43 percent increase in revenue over the last year. In an Office of Finance report that listed 22 recommendations, Mark fully completed 20 of them and is on his way to completing the last two. An example of such an improvement that Mark implemented is reduced delay in collection processing time and crosstraining of investigators so that the cases can be assigned alternately.

He is a self-starter who is able to work independently and is driven to make improvements, as reflected by the above results. Mark's work consistently reflects good judgment, accuracy, thoroughness and consistency in meeting deadlines. He has implemented many of his original ideas for improvements, which has made the Citywide Collection Unit an effective collection unit that outperforms both of the City's collection agencies' collection rates. Mark is a leader who motivates his staff by putting in the extra time and effort necessary for positive results. Combined with his other traits, this quality has gained him the respect and admiration of his staff as well as others that work with him.



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

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The *Alive!* Interview

Brick By Brick

James Feagin started his career laying a thousand bricks a day. Now, he's one of the world's foremost experts on masonry training and inspections. And he works for the City of Los Angeles.

PUBLIC WORKS — Alive! recently interviewed someone you might not have heard of: James Feagin, a Training Officer with the Bureau of Contract Administration, Public Works. He started humbly, but has risen to being considered one of the world's top experts in his field. He's written policy. He's written books. And now he sits on international regulatory boards.

And he's a City employee. Meet James Feagin. —Ed.

Alive!: So you've spent most of your time with the Department doing street work. What does that

James Feagin: Inspecting everything out in the street, curb and gutter, asphalt, street lighting, storm drains, sewers, everything that's involved in the street, we inspect all of that. I got assigned three years ago to a DWP special

project that required deputy inspectors certification, and that project, it's still going, but it lasted for me two years. DWP is taking the open reservoirs out of circulation, I imagine because of the 9/11 terrorist. And they're doing all of their purification of the water under the ground now. It was an \$80 million project. I was doing all of the structural concrete, which was required by the City, because I have the certifications to do the inspections. I left there and I came to training this past January.

Alive!: What do you train them to do?

James Feagin: The class I have in session right now is a deputy inspector's class for masonry. L.A. City Building and Safety requires you to have special licenses to inspect in the City. I have my certifications already, and I'm an instructor certified by the state of California. I am teaching the in-house inspectors how to get their certifications, how to be a certified masonry inspector. So when they leave my class, they should be able to apply for the international exam and take that test, pass the exam. Then they've got to go to Building and Safety and take an exam there, plus an oral. Then they'll be qualified to inspect masonry in the City of Los Angeles.

Alive!: Any kind of masonry?

James Feagin: Any structural masonry.

Alive!: Your years of experience have enabled you to do this.

James Feagin: Yes. Beginning in 1961 I went to the Army and left in 1968, and then I moved to New York City. And during the time in New York City, I was working construction as a bricklayer. Work got slow up there, so what I did was I went and found a Post Office job at night. So I worked both.

Alive!: When you say masonry, you mean ... James Feagin: Brick, block, and stone.

Alive!: How many could you lay in an hour, or a minute, or however you measure it?

James Feagin: It depends on the job, itself, the conditions of it. On the East Coast on straight walls, you had to put in 1,000 brick a day. If you wanted to keep a job as a bricklayer, you've got to do 1,000.

Alive!: And you'd better be good. James Feagin: Yeah.

COMING TO THE CITY

James Feagin: When I was in high school, I used to read the paper every day: California, 70 degrees, Alabama, 20 degrees. And vice versa, when it was 110 degrees back here, it still was 70 degrees there. I took a two-week vacation, just the wife and I. We came out to visit her brother. In construction, the first thing you do, if you're

not looking at buildings, is you check the job market. The wife and I got away from the family and the first thing I did was stop by this one particular job and asked the guy about employment. He says, "You got your tools? I'll put you to work right now."

We cut the vacation a week short and flew back to New York. Two weeks later, I had a U-Haul truck with everything I owned on it, heading back to California. I got here on Thursday. I got the apartment on Friday. I moved in Saturday. I went to work Monday.

The company I went to work for went out of business in two months. I went to work for another company. The business agent sent me out to work that day, and the guy had me lay out a whole building. I went up and told him, "Okay, I'm finished. What did you want me

So two months later, he recommended me to be his sub-foreman. I stayed with that company [Masonry Builders, Inc.] from early '73 until 1988. I was a foreman all that time. Every

In '88, I decided to change ships. I wanted to be an inspector. I've been teaching the bricklayer apprentices hands-on since 1977. I worked with Twining Laboratories as a deputy inspector from 1988 to 2000.

Alive!: How did you get into the City?

James Feagin: I took the entry exam. It was a 180-degree turn for me. My background is structural; structural masonry, structural concrete. It's totally different from public works. Over here, we talk about asphalt and sewers and storm drains. All my career, that was out of the question. But I'm like this, if there's something I want, something I want to accomplish, I'm pretty much going to go after it. I got the green book, the blue book, the S610s and the required manuals, and I studied and I passed the exam. I got picked up on the first round. They put you in categories Alive!: You said something really powerful, that knowledge ain't worth a damn if it's not

James Feagin: Yes. I do that in the City. I also do it with the class at East L.A. Skill center that I teach.

Alive!: Do you miss laying brick?

James Feagin: I miss the roughness of it.

Alive!: The actual physical touching and putting it on in a nice, beautiful straight line that's well laid and well done, the hand-craftedness of it, the pride in craftsmanship.

James Feagin: I still demand that, even when I'm teaching apprentices. This is part of me. I look for perfection. I teach perfection, even though the industry now is demanding that I teach the apprentices production. But I'm saying no, this is my fight right now. I'm

according to your score. So I got picked up on the first round of this particular exam battery there and here I am.

Alive!: Why did you come to the City of L.A.?

James Feagin: I wanted to do something a bit different. I've been in the structural all my life, and the public work sector, that will cover anything inside the property line and outside, so I covered the inside in my previous years. I wanted to cover the outside of the property line. Plus the City had great benefits, also.

A MOTIVATOR

Alive!: What do people who know about you, say about you?

James Feagin: That I'm a motivator. I like to push. If I think I can push you to better yourself, I'm going to do it. I'm not selfish about it. When I say I'm not selfish, there's some people afraid if I teach you this, then you're going to get better than I am. I don't see that. I'm still with that old cliché about knowledge, "It's not worth a damned thing unless you pass it on." I'm not afraid of a job. I feel that if I could go to Timbuktu, I can make a living. That's how competent I feel. Any place in the United States, I just feel like I will make a living.

Alive!: Just by eye.

James Feagin: Just by eye.

Alive!: That's when you're good. James Feagin: You're good.

Alive!: What would your wife say about you?

James Feagin: I was a good listener first of all. She feels that I really love my job. She says, "The way you go out there, the time you spend preparing for it, you love your job. You want to be a perfectionist at it." She knows I won't do anything half-assed. She thinks that my word is my bond. I was born and raised in the South, where a handshake was good enough. If I promise you I'm going to do something for you, then I'm going to be there. I'm going to do it for you.

Alive!: Thanks for your time! James Feagin: Sure.

ast month, I shared with you our plans Last month, I snared with you out plans for our family's trip to London. We arrived back just before the deadline for this column, so I can now let you know how it all went.

The value of the U.S. dollar is not good right now against the British pound. Although we went in style, we still made every attempt to save money whenever

We were able to get a good deal on Air New Zealand from Los Angeles to London. Deals change daily, but we saved \$2,500 per business class flat sleeper seat compared to Virgin, British or American Airlines. The flights originate in New Zealand and some people get off in Los Angeles, occasionally allowing super deals

for those boarding in L.A.

We spent six fabulous nights at the Goring Hotel, a luxury hotel with just 73 rooms. It has been run by the Goring family since 1910. We loved this place! As we say in the business, the hardware

was good, but the software was the best. The General Manager came out to the curb to greet us. At that point, he did not even know that we were the owners of Cruise and Resort. The lobby was welcoming. Everybody smiled and said hello. The Everybody doormen and concierges have been there for decades. The food in their restaurant was the best we had in London. Tip: enjoy lunch on their new terrace overlooking their garden. These are the hottest reservations in town right now, and we can make them for you along with your room reservation.

To get around London, we purchased one-week passes on the tube, London's famous subway system. We needed tickets (called Oyster Cards) only for my wife and me, as the children (11 and under) ride free. We spent about 20 pounds on the Oyster Cards, saving us at least 80 pounds over what it would have cost if we purchased tickets for each ride. The Underground is quite easy to navigate and is quick and fun. Our kids couldn't get enough.

We wanted to take our children (ages 9 and 11) to the famous London theatre. We use a terrific ticket supplier for our clients. He was able to get us hard-to-get Mary Poppins tickets at the Prince Edward Theatre. We purchased the tickets ahead of time in U.S. dollars, saving us half what we would have paid in London! As a bonus, our ticket company charges only an \$8 fee, and our tickets were in the fourth row. The play was spectacular. We all hated to see it end. The acting was toprate and the songs were excellent. Being in the fourth row enabled us to see even the smallest facial expressions. We all agreed that this was our best night in London.

We highly recommend the Big Bus Company's double-decker bus tours that allow you to hop on and off at the various tourist attractions. We had a terrific Beefeater guide at The Tower of London no extra cost for the tour, and it makes the visit much more enjoyable. The London Eye (an enormous Ferris wheel) was an experience not to be missed. The slow-moving ride takes about a half-hour but provides amazing views of the London skyline. For just a few dollars more, you can include a riverboat ride on the Thames, departing from the same location. It lasts about another half-hour, but was another highlight of our trip.

We sweltered in the sun attempting to watch the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace. There were many people there, making it difficult to see anything, especially for our children. I guess it is something that all tourists should do, but it was our least favorite attraction.

Of course, we made a visit to Harrods department store. It is big and impressive, but with the dollar so weak, we really didn't want to do any shopping. The food halls are nice, but the fudge we purchased was not very good. We also enjoyed a small pizza, which served as an appetizer before we went out to dinner. The cost for our appetizer was more than 38 pounds, or \$76 U.S. It was good pizza, but not

that good.

We took a 40-minute train

ride to Hampton Court. The human maze at the property was fun for all of us, and the journey gave us a small taste of the British countryside. I mentioned how easy it was to take trains in England in the last article. It is easy, but you have to be prepared for a few inconveniences. Our return train to central London was called back after a fire in a switching station. Bus rides to different train stations,

cancellations of trains,

changes of platforms and more contributed to a three-hour delay getting back to our hotel. At some point, you just have to roll with it!

Our intentions were to visit the Science Museum, Madam Tussaud's, and the London Dungeon, but we ran out of time

before we could do everything we wanted. In addition to all our tourist visits, we also took on our professional roles and visited some of the other top London hotels we book for our clients. We had tea at The Dorchester. For larger London hotels, this would be our first choice! We also visited Claridge's, the Connought, The Capital, 51 Buckingham Gate, Baglioni, the Lanesborough, Mandarin Oriental, and the Sherlock Holmes hotels. We can certainly discuss these properties with our clients more intelligently now that we have seen them for ourselves.

We had fine dining experiences in several places. We also had dinner one night at a casual chain restaurant called Wagamamas (http://www.wagamama.com). Thank you for all the emails and phone calls A about the Cooking with the Club. I never intended to frighten anyone in thinking that the column had met its end during its two-month hiatus. It was actually purposely done to improve the column. As you can see, I've changed things up a bit. Instead of giving you several quick and easy recipes, I've given you just one, with step-bystep directions on how to cook it - along with some photos along the way.

Robert's Lasagna a la Mexicana is just as it sounds - Mexican-style lasagna. Instead of using tomato-based Italian sauces, I used salsa and enchilada sauce. And while any great lasagna uses pasta to form layers of goodness, I've managed to use corn tortillas as the layering ingredient. Also, instead of using mozzarella cheese (you are welcome to continue using it or

experimenting with any other cheeses), I used a mix of extra sharp cheddar and Monterey jack cheese.

Here's the recipe and the step-by-step look on how to make it. Enjoy!

Robert's Lasagna A La Mexicana

INGREDIENTS AND SUPPLIES:

- 1 large aluminum lasagna-style container
- 1 bag 36 corn tortillas
- 1 bunch cilantro
- 2 lbs ground beef
- 1 tablespoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon sea salt Graded sharp cheddar cheese and
- Monterey Jack cheese • 4 cloves of garlic, crushed
- 1 white onion, diced
- 4 green onions, diced

- 1 can black olives, 8 oz.
- 1 can enchilada sauce, 8 oz.
- 1 can salsa, 12 oz.
- 1 can refried beans, 12 oz.
- 1 can crema Mexicana (found in most supermarkets from the Cacique brand)
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 1 tablespoon cumin
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- Nonstick spray



DIRECTIONS:



Dice cilantro, white onion, green onions and olives, if not already diced.

- 5 Place several tortillas to form the first layer. Spread refried beans, beef, green onions, olives and top with the graded cheeses along with a sprinkle of cilantro.
- **6** Drizzle some of the enchilada sauce over that layer.
- Begin the process of placing the tortillas once again and then the salsa over that. Repeat steps 3 to 5 until you've reached the top.
- 8 Once you've reached the top of the container (or you've run out of ingredients), add the rest of the enchilada sauce to cover the entire surface, then cover that with more cheese. Sprinkle with cilantro and olives. To finish, spray the top with the nonstick spray to help prevent burning.



Add olive oil to pan on medium heat. Then add pepper, salt, garlic, white onion, paprika and cumin. Cook ground beef until brown, but leave some pink beef will achieve its final cooking while in the oven.

3 Heat refried beans in another pan over medium heat with occasional stirring until hot.



Spray nonstick spray on all over aluminum container and pour some of the salsa first - this will help to prevent the bottom from becoming burnt while in the oven.



Cover with aluminum foil and bake in the oven for 30 minutes at 350 F or until the cheese begins to bubble.



Let stand for 15 minutes before cutting a slice of the lasagna. Drizzle the crema Mexicana over the portion and serve.



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

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
