See the stars this October!

The City boasts many great institutions for the family. In August, Club Director of Member Services Angel Gomez took his family to the Cabrillo Marine Aquarium in San Pedro. This month, he's exploring outer space at the world renowned Griffith Observatory in Griffith Park.

The Observatory's Director, Dr. Ed Krupp, is a Club Member and a great friend of the Club. He was generous with his time to give Angel's family a personal tour.

So come along!

Griffith Observatory

Griffith Observatory is an icon of Los Angeles, a national leader in public astronomy, a beloved civic gathering place, and one of southern California's most popular attractions. The Observatory is located on the southern slope of Mount Hollywood in Griffith Park, just above the Los Feliz neighborhood.

The mission of Griffith Observatory is to inspire everyone to observe, ponder, and understand the sky.

One of the City's most popular and treasured institutions, Griffith Observatory first opened its doors in 1935.

The observatory closed in 2002 for renovation and a major expansion of exhibit space. It reopened to the public Nov. 3, 2006. First stop for Angel's family: the Foucault pendulum. With them is Traci Slacum pendulum. The \$93-million renova-

tion, paid in part by a public bond issue, restored the building, as well as replaced the aging planetarium dome. The building was expanded underground, with completely new exhibits, a café, gift shop, and the new Leonard Nimoy Event Horizon

theater. One wall inside the building is covered with the largest astronomically accurate image ever constructed (152 feet long by 20 feet high), called The Big Picture, depicting the Virgo Cluster of galaxies; visitors can explore the highly detailed image from within arm's reach or through telescopes.



Wilder Hall of the Eye

The Hall of the Eye illustrates the nature and progress of human observation of the sky and the tools used for that exploration. This exhibit gallery focuses on how people have observed the sky and the often profound impact those observations have had on people and society. Exhibits in the gallery and adjacent alcoves include:

- Using the Sky
- Extending the Eye
- Observing in California
- Beyond the Visible
- Tesla Coil

The Cosmic Connection, the corridor linking the historic building above with the new Gunther Depths of Space below, provides the transition from ground-based and more familiar astronomy to a new realm of cosmic perspective. The main element in this passageway is a 150-foot timeline of the universe whimsically composed of celestial-themed jewelry in the glass case that lines the corridor. Features in this area include:

- Cosmic Connection
- Wormhole Stairway
- Center Of Gravity (information desk, donor wall, dedication plaque)

Gunther Depths of Space

The large new Richard and Lois Gunther Depths of Space exhibit gallery is activated by the recent transformation of cosmic perspective that began when people first ventured into space. No longer is observation and understanding of the sky bonded to the ground and framed by the horizon. The Gunther Depths of Space is filled with exhibits that are as monumental and unique as the ideas they illustrate:

- The Planets
- Our Earth
- Our Solar System
- Other Worlds, Other Stars
- Milky Way Galaxy
- Iconic Universe
- A Familiar Star Pattern
- Our Address
- The Big Picture
- The Big Picture-Related Exhibits (Field Guides, Depth of Space, Einstein)

The Big Picture is the largest astronomically accurate image ever constructed (152 feet long by 20 feet high), depicting the Virgo Cluster of galaxies. This very wide photo is the equivalent perspective of the width of your finger held at arm's length.



- Sunset and Moonset Radial Lines
- West Observation Terraces ■ East Observation Terrace
- Rebel Without a Cause Monument
- Roof Observation Deck

Edge of Space Mezzanine

The Edge of Space occupies the mezzanine area in the new Richard and Lois Gunther Depths of Space exhibit gallery. It provides visitors with an experience that bridges the more familiar earth-bound orientation toward the universe with a more cosmic perspective informed by the most sophisticated astronomical instruments ever built. The zone showcases samples of the universe that come to earth from space or that we acquire through space exploration. Exhibits and features on the mezzanine include:

- The Big Picture-Related Exhibits (observing telescopes)
- Pieces of the Skv
- Cloud and Spark Chambers
- Our Moon
- Cosmic News
- Entrances to Leonard Nimoy Event Horizon theater

Ahmanson Hall of the Sky

The Hall of the Sky establishes each person's connection to the primary objects in our sky: the moon and the sun. The end of the hall is anchored by one of the largest public solar telescopes in the United States. Exhibits in the gallery and nearby alcoves include:

- Coelostat and Solar Telescopes (white-light image, spectrohelioscope, spectroscope)
- The Active Sun: Recent spacecraft data illustrate the power and dynamics of our sun.
- Our Sun Is a Star
- Elements
- Supernova (including spectroscopes)
- West Alcoves (i.e., Day & Night, Seasons, Moon Phases, etc.,)

Dr. Krupp explains the importance of how the elements were made the universe and how those same elements are in us.

RLACEI Legislative Update by Ken Spiker

Cummary of LACERS' Health **3** Plan and Benefit Changes for 2013: On Aug. 14, the LACERS Board of Administration approved the 2013 health plan premium

The LACERS annual medical plan premium cost for 2013 is estimated to increase 7.9 percent, from \$90.1 million to \$97.2 million. While the amount of this increase is significant, it is below LACERS' 2013 actuarial assumed medical trend rate of 8.5 percent. LACERS' annual dental plan premium cost for 2013 is estimated to increase 1.1 percent, from \$8.8 million to \$8.9 million.

The overall cost of LACERS' health and welfare program (medical, vision, and dental plans) is estimated to increase 7.3 percent, from \$99.5 million to \$106.7 million. These amounts were achieved through negotia-

tions with the health plan carriers by LACERS' staff, its health and welfare consultant (Keenan and Associates), and guidance from the Board's Benefits Administration Committee. Negotiations yielded a \$1.1 million reduction in annual premium costs.

On Aug. 28, the LACERS' Board of Administration approved recommendations from its Benefits Administration Committee to increase the 2013 maximum medical plan premium subsidy from

LARFPA General Mtg. Discussed Pensions, Interim GM, Upcoming Elections

action. Then Bill Raggio gave our Act is going to affect our memthe funding status of the pension fund and the future increases in the City's contribution rate.

Bill Raggio has been doing an outstanding job as the interim General Manager and is really being treated unfairly. He was the number one candidate and appointed unanimously by the Commission. The mayor failed to confirm Bill Raggio and wanted the testing redone to provide a wider search because of some error in the Personnel Dept. A new search is under way. Why does the Pension Dept. have to pay for someone else's mistake?

Several days later we attended a meeting with Dolores and Vince Foley from the DWP Retirees Association, and Ed Harding and Hal Danowitz from the RLACEI, where we discussed some of the issues our associations are facing - rising costs of healthcare and how the Affordable Health Care

Malaysia, and Flying **Backward Home**

On a 28-day cruise, Hal and Co. complete their long journey.

PART TEN

On Oct. 11, Evelyn and I, with our cousins Don and Myrna, left for Rome, where we were going to board the Ocean Princess Oct. 15 to sail for 28 days to Singapore. On the cruise we were scheduled to visit Sorrento, Italy; Athens; Ephesus, Turkey; through the Suez Canal; two ports in Egypt; Aqaba, Jordan; Dubai in the United Arab Emirates; Muscat, Oman; and India. In India, we were scheduled to take a side trip to the Taj Mahal. Finally, the cruise would take us to Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, before ending in Singapore. We both had reserved mini-suites on deck eight. The Ocean Princess is a small ship, which accommodates only slightly more than 600 passengers and a crew of 250.



After leaving Cochin, India, we spent the next four days at sea sailing toward Kuala Lumpur. I took the time to write my notes on our adventures to the Taj Mahal a few days before. The bus ride was so bumpy that I was unable to use my iPad. Since we left Cochin, the weather continued to be on the hot side, partly cloudy with the seas mostly calm.

I talked to the tour office about the Kuala Lumpur (KL) "on-your-own" tour. We were waitlisted, and I wanted to know my options. The downtown area of KL is about a 90-minute ride from the port, with the cost of a taxi about \$100. There was a shuttle bus from the ship to a local mall, but Evelyn and I really wanted to get into the city.

The night before was the last formal hight of the cruise, and the captain hosted a farewell party before dinner. At dinner we exchanged address information with our tablemates; it's standard operating procedure, but we never kept in touch. Maybe it will be different this time; we seem to have a very compatible group.

We completed most of our packing and would finish up that evening. We got confirmation for the KL "on-your-

The bus ride into KL took about one hour because we did not hit a "jam," as they refer to traffic jams here. Don and Myrna had been here before and decided not to go into KL. The bus dropped us off at the KLCC, a large shopping mall next to the Petronas Towers. The twin towers were at one time the tallest buildings in the world but have been surpassed by the Burj Khalifa in Dubai, the tallest building in the world. The towers do remain the tallest twin towers in the world (they are attached to each other by a sky bridge). You may remember them featured in Entrapment, a

move with Sean Connery and Katherine Zeta-Jones.

We went in the mall to exchange money and use the bathroom. Exchanging money was easier than using the first bathroom I visited. I opened the door to the stall, and all I saw was a white enamel-fitted hole in the ground. I just didn't feel I had the necessary skills to use this facility, so I found another bathroom with more familiar Western hardware. Evelyn had routinely found them throughout our trip as an option to the more conventional Western facilities.

After that, Evelyn made her first purchase of the day, a Starbucks mug that said Malaysia. As the mall had the same stores that we had at home, we left for more local shopping and were advised

We found a lot of souvenirs in the City Market, and everyone was willing to bargain. We spent a good deal of time here. We had heard stories concerning the conditions in KL, but we found a relatively clean city. There was some trash, but nothing like we saw in India. The area around the Petronas Towers was pristine, and I understood that since the towers were built there had been a lot of development in the area. We saw active cranes and large construction projects around the city.

We walked over to Chinatown and also had success in the stalls there. In most cases we paid half the starting price. In some stalls there was a sign that said fixed price, but then we found the price to be reasonable. By now most of the overcast had burned off and the temperature was probably at least in the high 80s, with the humidity above that. It was okay in the shade, but in the full sun it was a bit daunting.

We were getting hungry, but I just didn't trust eating in any of the local street restaurants around Chinatown, so we stopped at McDonald's. It was full of school kids doing their homework, but we managed to get a table. We found the food to be just like home. Evelyn is still giving me a hard time, saying the bao buns from the street vendors looked great.

We decided to return to the City Market to pick up a few more souvenirs. After that we took a taxi back to the KLCC mall to catch the bus back to the ship. We had a little time to kill, so we sat at Starbucks and used its free Wi-fi. Evelyn returned the Malaysia mug for one with the name Kuala Lumpur. We got back to the ship at about 5 p.m.

We needed to finish packing and missed cocktails with Don and Myrna and the last entertainment show. We did manage to buy a nice photo of us and then have a drink before dinner. The ship took photos every time we got on or off, and on formal nights; that

The ship docked in Singapore at

about 7 a.m. We had to be out of our cabin by 8 a.m., even though we were not getting off the ship until 9:10 a.m. After breakfast, we sat in the Tahitian Lounge until we were called to get off the ship. For those of you who have not taken a cruise, the ship arranges disembarkation based on earliest flights out and early tours ending at the airport. Those traveling independently were let off last. This minimizes a bottleneck at immigration or customs or just finding your luggage in the cruise terminal. In general the cruise lines have gotten pretty good at managing this process, and with only about 500 of us getting off (and not return-

I had been concerned about the customs information that we had received concerning a 5 percent duty, but they just put all of our bags through the X-ray machine and sent us on our way. Myrna found a van driver who would take us to our hotel (Crowne Plaza) at the airport. The cost was 45 Singapore dollars. That was good price, with the U.S. dollar worth around 1.22 Singapore dollars.

We waited only about an hour to get into our room at the hotel. After we settled in we took a taxi to the Singapore Flyer, the tallest observation wheel in the world. Evelyn and I had been on the London Eye, which was

After that we took a cab to Orchard Road, the main shopping area of Singapore. We didn't have much time before it began to rain very hard. We were in Singapore in 2006 and saw the highlights. We would have gone into Raffles Hotel and had a Singapore Sling as the drink was invented there, but with the rain we

We ate in the hotel that night. Our flight home was to leave the next morning at 7:20 a.m., so we needed to get up early. The hotel is attached to the airport's terminal three, where our flight on United Airlines was to leave. We were to change planes in Tokyo before arriving at LAX.

A word about the hotel: Our room was

large with a big TV, and both a tub and a shower. The hotel was nine stories tall, and the floors opened to the outside. The best part, as I said before, was that it was attached to terminal three, where our United flight left from.

We had dinner in the hotel restaurant. They had both a buffet and menu options. Evelyn and I had the buffet for 52 SD, and it was very good. They offered sushi, roast beef, pork, chicken, and many fish dishes. Except for the roast beef, every dish was prepared in an Asian style. I was very impressed. The desserts and the entire presentation were quite something. It was one of the nicest buffets we had had in a while.

Don and Myrna, being adventurous eaters, had a club sandwich, which they said was excellent. I had about 140 SD left, which was not enough to pay for dinner, so I put the dinner on my room. When I checked out, I paid part of the bill with SD. I thought it was a creative way to get rid of the last of my foreign money.

We had a 4:15 a.m. wakeup call and left the room at 5:15 a.m. The bellman put our bags onto a terminal cart, and we pushed it to the United check-in. We were all flying business class so after checking in we had coffee and sweet rolls in the lounge before boarding. The security check was done at the gate, and I was picked for extra checking. That put me at the head of the line, where I got a pat down, and they checked my carry-on for whatever they were checking for. The Chengi Airport was beautiful and very well run. We could learn a thing or two from them.

The flight to Tokyo took about six hours, and we had a two- or three-hour layover until our flight to LA. Based on the timing,



I think the flight to LA would take around nine hours.

We landed at Narita Airport in Tokyo about 20 minutes late due to air traffic. As we were to transfer to another international flight, we didn't have to deal with immigration or customs. We did have go through a security line that X-rayed our carry-ons. We sat in the lounge long enough for Don to have a beer and then we walked to the gate. I was picked for another security check, this time for explosives. They swabbed my hands and carry-on and then had me take off my shoes and checked the soles of my feet. It didn't take long, and everyone was very polite.

The flight home took a little longer than nine hours. After dinner we both slept around five hours. We woke with an hour and half left to LA. The seats in business class lay flat, and it was easy to get into a comfortable position. Our seats faced backwards, we flew backwards the whole time.

We landed on time and after clearing immigration and customs in the record time of a little more than an hour, our van picked us up and drove us home. Now for the unpacking, laundry and starting to plan where to go next.



\$1.190 to \$1.367 - the maximum allowed by the Los Angeles Administrative Code. With this increase, Retired Members receiving the maximum subsidy will be able to cover

the premium cost of two-party coverage in the Kaiser Permanente HMO (non-Medicare) plan, as well as one-party coverage in the Anthem Blue Cross HMO and PPO plans (for members not enrolled in Medicare or enrolled in only Medicare Part B). Also, because the maximum medical plan premium subsidy increased at a higher rate than the increases in the Anthem Blue Cross HMO and PPO plan premiums, members receiving a medical subsidy and enrolled in these plans with two-party coverage will see decreases in premium deductions from their monthly allowance. Most members enrolled in a LACERS' medical plan do not have premium payroll deductions.

Despite LACERS being faced with a steep increase of 14.8 percent in the Kaiser Permanente HMO plan premium, which accounted for approximately 60 percent of the overall increase to LACERS' medical plan premiums, the resulting overall increase of 7.9 percent in LACERS' annual medical plan premium cost is a fair one, considering that it is less than the Actuarial Assumed Medical Trend Rate and was achieved without any plan design changes, such as increases to co-pays.

In 2013, the amount of overall medical plan premium costs that LACERS will subsidize is increasing from 91.2 percent to approximately 92.7 percent. This means that the amount of overall premium costs paid by members through payroll deductions will decrease from 8.8 percent to 7.3 percent. These results were attained through the dedication and hard work of LACERS' staff and LACERS' health and welfare consultant, under the direction of LACERS' Benefits Administration Committee.

RLACEI Legislative Report by Michael Karsch

The biggest headline in retirement I news in August was the Legislature's passing of Gov. Jerry Brown's pension reform proposal late at night on the last day of the session, Aug. 31. This reform pertains to the state-run pension systems for state workers, and city employees belonging to the state-run system (several charter cities do not belong, such as San Francisco, Los Angeles, Fresno, San Diego and San Jose). Since most of Gov. Brown's reform proposal was eventually incorporated into the bill, it can be assumed that the governor will sign this measure sometime in September.

The new reform bill caps pensionable income at the Social Security contribution and wage base of \$110,100 (or 120 percent of that limit for those not in Social Security). The governor had sought a guaranteed hybrid option involving a 401(k)-style savings account, but the Legislature rejected that. The reform requires active employees to pay half of their cost for their pension. It increases the retirement age by two years or more. Pension spiking is prohibited, and a pension is based on the highest three-year average of an employee. Double dipping is prohibited, as is purchasing of airtime, retroactive benefit increases, and pension holidays. Most of the current use of three percent formulas for calculating a pension is rolled back.

Also of note, in August is a report by Moody's Investors Service that more California cities are likely to file for bankruptcy and experience bond defaults. Moody's Investors' Service does not expect a majority of cities experiencing

distress to go that far, but at least several more cities in California, namely in the Inland Empire and the Central Valley are likely to do so. Their report cites the precarious real-estate situation in those areas showing high foreclosures, cheap financing and speculative development. The report also cites falling property taxes and sales taxes throughout the state, but most severely in the interior areas. Comment is also made that Prop. 13 limits a city's ability to adjust property taxes. Moody's is concerned about how the issuance of municipal debt is changing, suggesting that select issues of such debt may mean changes in ratings. The League of California Cities takes issue with Moody's claim that California cities have not been subjected to state spending cuts and that more state oversight is needed. The league argues that cities suffered the \$2 billion loss in assorted revenue from the abolition of the redevelopment agencies, and the loss of \$130 million in local vehicle license fee revenues. Lastly, the league points out that California cities have kept up very strong commitments to financial obligations by making tough spending cuts, raising local taxes and fees and partnering with employees and residents to

avoid deeper cuts.

Remembering Ranger

One of the world's best urban search and rescue dogs, Ranger, passed away Aug. 25. He partnered with LAFD Inspector/Paramedic Deresa Teller, Club Member.

n Aug. 25, the LAFD and the United States lost one of its best urban search and rescue dogs, Ranger, who died from cancer. His leader, Inspector/Paramedic Deresa Keller, LAFD and USAR California Task Force One, and others were at his side.

After his training through the Search Dog Foundation and achieving Advanced FEMA Certification, Ranger and Deresa deployed to a

deadly mudslide in La Conchita and to Hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Ike. Calling on his boundless energy and great "bark alert" – the bark sounded when finding a live victim - Ranger always performed with excellence. Ranger, a border collie, grew to be one of the best urban search and rescue dogs in the nation.

As Deresa tells it: "Ranger was an incredible Search Dog, and that was his true passion in life. When he would search a rubble pile for a test or training in front of people who had not seen him before, they would always ask me, 'Where did you get this dog?' and 'Do you breed any more?'

"When we would travel by plane and Ranger would wear his Search Dog vest, he would often go and smell certain people's luggage. Of course they would ask me, 'What does he search for?' I would tell

Ranger became part of our household when Jesa was 10. I was divorced at that time and on the nights Jesa stayed at my house, Ranger always slept in her room. Even though Jesa was very aware of the diabetes



and renovate 23 libraries. Szabo has championed innovative library services that address critical community needs in areas such as health disparities, workforce development, adult literacy, school readiness and emergent literacy for preschoolers.

He also initiated "eCampus," a robust online learning environment with virtual courses, career readiness resources, live tutoring and other lifelong learning tools. Szabo has advocated for initiatives that foster and celebrate diversity including the renovation and expansion of the Library's Auburn Avenue Research Library on African American Culture and History and the establishment of LGBT

Sister Cities

LA reaches out to the world through its quietly effective Sister Cities program.

ost of us don't usually have any Most of us don't dodain, impact on the relationships of our own country with any of the other countries on this planet. These relationships are usually initiated, developed and maintained by our nation's chief executive and his professional diplomats within the State and Defense and various other departments. As mere people - members of the community, rarely we do not have the opportunity to become involved in organized, sophisticated and positive ways directed to bringing about a more peaceful and fruitful society.

President Dwight D Eisenhower in 1956 sought to change this when he convened a White House conference on "citizen diplomacy" - that is, people-topeople contacts (with assistance from local governments) that encourage participants to promote peace through forming international partnerships that factor in economic development, cross-cultural exchange and global cooperation. Thus was born the sister cities movement, where a group of individuals in a city in the United States interested in these goals would strike up a meeting with a mirror image group in another country. However, in Los Angeles in spite of the 53 years of existence of the Sister Cities program, the benefits it produces are neither well known nor fully appreciated.

In 1959, the City of Los Angeles, with its wide diversity of population, numerous international contacts and ever-present energy, jumped aboard with Nagoya, Japan and Eilat, Israel as our first sister

Avak Keotahian of the Chief Legislative Analyst's office described the selection process of a sister city in a 2006 memo-

"In selecting a sister city for Los Angeles, various criteria of suitability are used such as: similarities with Los Angeles (e.g., is there a harbor, are there economic and cultural exchange possibilities), the presence of a sizable community in Los Angeles of persons whose original origin is in the proposed sister city, whether there is a dedicated group of persons willing to raise funds and work on the sister city program on a volunteer basis. Most importantly, it is necessary to determine that the proposed sister city already does not have a sister city relationship with any other city in the United States. Sister Cities International, the national organization which coordinates sister city programs, has a policy to not recognize, with rare exception, more than one sister city relationship between a foreign city and a city in the U.S. The City of Los Angeles also adheres to this policy."

Sister cities are established by City Council resolution. The programs for each sister city are operated by citizen committees whose appointments are confirmed by the City Council.

As the City of Los Angeles has so many sister cities currently (25 at last count) it is necessary to have a local coordinating body - in this case, Sister Cities of Los Angeles, Inc., which was incorporated in 1992. The Chairperson for many years and at present, is Fourth District Councilman Tom LaBonge, Club Member.

The City does not provide any funding for its Sister Cities Program other than annual dues paid to Sister Cities International. All sister city committees do their own fundraising. The sister cities are listed here:

- There are also two Friendship Cities: Lodz, Poland, and London, U.K.

As might be expected, some of the committees are more active than others. Some, like Auckland, Beirut, Berlin, Bussan, Guangzhou and St. Petersburg, have their own Websites and carry on elaborate programs promoting international peace, trade and cultural exchange. Others have periodic celebrations that recall the pleasures (or pains) of the home country and raise funds to carry on the good work. Public officials of sister cities invariably visit City Hall in association with their sister cities committees and are especially recognized by the City Council. Technicians vital to governing are welcomed by their twinned cities' staffs as well as by their sister cities committees.

On Sept. 27, 2001, Sister Cities of Los Angeles held its annual Gala Celebration at the Gilmore Adobe at the Farmers Market at Third and Fairfax honoring the Consular Corps of Los Angeles and Stelle Feuers for her many years of leadership service to the organization. The latest annual Gala Celebration was held last month at the Farmer's Market. The event recognized several Sister City anniversaries – the 50th anniversary of the program with Salvador, Brazil; the 45th anniversaries with Busan, Korea, and Berlin, Germany; and the 40th anniversary with Mumbai, India.

In a recent interview, Councilman LaBonge expressed a personal reason for his enthusiasm in energizing our sister cities program: "Basically, I want people to be self-starters and figure it out themselves, and raise money and help expose other people to this progra You know, raise money to bring children, young adults here! Student exchanges! Professional exchanges! Help people, like we were helped. Somebody helped me when I was traveling in Europe 30 years ago, so I go out of my way to try to help somebody now."



Peace of Mind

 $B \\ \mbox{elow}$ is a list of insurance jargon you'll most likely run into when reviewing your coverage and hope it offers clarification to understanding your policies. A big factor in understanding your insurance coverage is to comprehend the lingo that insurance companies often use.

Premium: amount of money charged for your insur-

Insurance: a type of risks management used primarily to protect against the risk of an uncertain loss. Insurance is defined as the reasonable transfer of the risk of a loss from one entity to another, in exchange for payment.

Insurer is a company selling the insurance; the insured or policyholder, is the person buying the insurance policy for which an insurance policy is issued.

Beneficiary: the person who will receive the money or other benefits after the death of the insured. I always recommend a backup beneficiary - the contingent or secondary. For instance, many City Employees will list only one beneficiary such as their spouse or parent, so it's best to know that when you add a secondary beneficiary, benefits will be received only by the secondary if the primary beneficiary and the insured pass away together.

Claim: A formal request to an insurance company

asking for a payment based on the terms of the insurance

Policy: A contract between the insurer and the insured, known as the policyholder.

Certificate of Coverage: this documents serves to provide evidence of your insurance policy. Typically, this document contains the specifications of the insurance policy.

Indemnity: to compensate or replace loss. In property and casualty contract, the objective is to restore an insured to the same financial position after the loss that he or she was in prior to the loss but the insured should not be able to profit by damage or destruction of property, nor should the insured be in a worse financial position after a loss. In life insurance the situation is totally different because the payment to the beneficiary of the insured can place the beneficiary to a much better financial position at the death of an insured than he or she was in prior to the death. Our Long Term Care policy pays a monthly indemnity so you receive the full amount of benefits you applied for, not the reimbursement amount.

Elimination Period: The time that must pass after filling a claim before policyholder can collect insurance benefits, also known as a waiting period.

Underwriting: A risk assessment handled by the insurance carrier usually done before the policy is issued. It's the process of identifying and classifying the degree of risk represented by a proposed insured. In my experience, I have seen insurance companies request the applicant's medical records dating back the past 10 years depending on the medical condition, and decisions can take weeks.

Rider: Not to be confused with a backseat driver – in the insurance world, this word identifies an add-on coverage purchased separately from the basic policy and provides additional benefits that can sometimes have additional costs. For instance, we allow riders on our Group Term Life insurance to add additional benefits to cover their dependents for life insurance, called a Dependent Life insurance rider.





Hello again, everyone!

ow, do we have an adventure for you this month! We traveled outside our Golden State, through the Silver State (Nevada), across the north tip of the Grand Canyon State (Arizona) and continued up to a gorgeous place named after a Mormon pioneer, Ebenezer Bryce. Do you know our destination yet?

We went to Bryce Canyon National Park in Utah. This place is amazing! My wife, Cathy, and I always said, "When the boys are old enough we should go to Bryce Canyon." So, now that our boys are 11 and 9, it was a good time to go. The trip was absolutely worth the wait!

Bryce Canyon became a national park in 1928. Small by National Park standards, the 56.2 square miles of Bryce Canyon National Park occupy the eastern edge of the Paunsaugunt Plateau in south-central Utah. The park is not a canyon. R ather, it is a spectacular series of more than a dozen amphitheaters, each of which is carved at least 1,000 feet into the limestone of the Paunsaugunt Plateau.

Day Hikes:

The easiest trail is the half-mile (one way) section of Rim Trail between Sunset and Sunrise Points. Other sections of the Rim Trail (which extends 5.5 miles between Fairyland and Bryce Points) have steeper terrain. The Fairyland Loop (8 miles round trip), Peekaboo Loop (4.8 or 5.5 miles round trip), Queen's Garden (1.7 miles round trip) and Navajo Loop (1.5 miles round trip) trails wind down through the rock formations along steep grades. The Peekaboo Loop Trail also serves as a horse trail.

We stayed in Bryce Canyon for seven days. If you ever seen the movie Cars, that is what Bryce Canyon resembles. We began our first hike of the trip, Navajo/Queens Trail, the most popular trail recommended by a friendly Park Ranger. If you start at the Queen's site and hike down, it is gorgeous; however, when you get to the other side coming back up the Navajo side, you will be going up some very, very steep switchbacks, that was the most difficult section of the trail.

On the last day, we hiked this trail one more time, and this time we started on the Navajo side and walked down the switchbacks and back up on Queen's trail. That was so much easier. Nonetheless, there were amazing views either way. This place is breathtaking!

We rented ATVs right outside the Canyon and took a few hours riding in the area next to Bryce Canyon to see all of nature's beautiful trees and landscapes.

On another day, we took a horseback-riding tour for a half-day that we had set up in advance. We were given a short safety class and told not to be alarmed, that each horse was going to walk very close to the edge of the trail. The instructors joked and said this was so we could get a good look over the edge!

The tour used horses and mules; they were all very beautiful and well-kept animals. We loved the horses and

This was one of the best *Be Alive!* adventures to date. If you ever get a chance to visit Utah, I would recommend this area. Bryce Canyon rocked!










- Water your Christmas tree every day.

- Purchase a carbon monoxide detector for your home.
- Check www.recalls.gov to see if any items in your home (including cribs) have been recalled.
- Write down emergency contact information for your family and make sure everyone has these numbers.
- Use a fireplace screen.
- Put on safety glasses before any DIY



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Cole's

There will always be an argument over the originator of the French Dip and over who does it best. Everyone has their tastes and favorites, so this article won't be about the food or the debate.

This is about Cole's itself, the oldest continuously operating restaurant and saloon in Los Angeles. Harry Cole established his restaurant in 1908 at the bottom of the Pacific Electric Building. At the time, this was the tallest building west of the Mississippi. It

also housed the main terminal for the Pacific Electric Railway which eventually became the largest electric railway system in the world.

In 1933, when California lifted the ban on beer thus signaling the end of Prohibition, Cole's sold a record 19,000 gallons of beer on the first day! There are also stories about the infamous Mickey





Cohen, a gangster and bookie, who was a Cole's regular from the 1930's till his death in 1976, so you really are walking into history when you take a seat inside. The penny tiles, stain glass and expansive wood bar are shown off best by the warm soft light. It gives one a glimpse into what life may have looked like at the turn of the century.

Cole's was designated a Historical Landmark and a State Point of Historical Interest in 1974. After a million dollar restoration in 2008, it is still going

LINGUINE WITH SHRIMP, GARLIC AND ASPARAGUS

Italian cuisine is my favorite to make when I am home. It feels like home cooking.

When I have a little extra time, I will make homemade pasta instead of buying the dried pasta at the grocery store. It cooks much faster than dried pasta, so care must be taken not to overcook.

For this month, I have made a pasta dish here that doesn't include a tomato-based sauce. Extra virgin olive oil acts as the sauce in this dish, so if you can, get a quality bottle. Email me if you would like some suggestions on brands.

Lastly, although the ingredients and their quantities are listed, please view them as a recommendation. You are free to add more or less of any these ingredients. Some of you may want more shrimp or more olive oil. Italian cooking is all about improvisation, so experiment!

Linguine with Shrimp, Garlic and Asparagus

INGREDIENTS:

- 1/2 pound linguine pasta
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tablespoons white wine (optional)
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons dried parsley
- 3 stalks asparagus
- Pinch of salt and pepper
- 1/2 to 1 pound medium shrimp (peeled and deveined)
- Pinch of hot red pepper flakes



Make sure the pasta is semolina; the ingredient tends to absorb water less than pasta that doesn't have it. Check the ingredients list on the pasta packaging.

DIRECTIONS:



Prepare your ingredients. Wash the asparagus and shrimp. Grate the cheese, mince the garlic and devein the shrimp. Boil the water in a pot and add a tablespoon of olive oil, salt and pepper. Let the seasoned water come to a boil. Then add the linguine and let cook for about 10 to 15 minutes. Do not overcook.



Remove the water from the pasta with a strainer. And then add the cooked shrimp to the pan. Mix the ingredients and add more olive oil if the pasta begins to stick. Turn off the heat and let cool. Add Parmesan cheese and dried parsley at the top of the pasta that is on the plate.

Serves 4 to 6



Place another pan over medium heat and add the minced garlic, diced asparagus, red pepper flakes, shrimp, salt and pepper. Let cook until the shrimp and asparagus have cooked thoroughly. Add a lid to cover the pan to help with the cooking process. Stir occasionally.



Plate the pasta on the center of the plate and add some more Parmesan cheese and sprinkle the dried parsley around the plate.

Buenaventura, Elliot Kim, and Warren Liu from Public Works/Engineering.






