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

The traffic events, in which the 405 Freeway was closed in both directions for the better part of a weekend each time, caused widespread heavy traffic conditions through the Sepulveda Pass and outlying neighborhoods. This congestion impacted the response of emergency apparatus into those areas and had the potential to cause delays in providing life-saving assistance to residents and passersby.

To improve response times in these areas, two Motorcycle Response Teams were put into operation. The teams provided enhanced service to the affected area by allowing a two member Motor Team to maneuver through traffic in response to an emergency incident. By strategically placing a two-member team on both the East and West sides of the 405 Freeway, response coverage was enhanced. These teams will also maintain a patrol in their assigned areas providing up to the minute intelligence on access and egress issues as well as continuous monitoring of alternate response routes. The Carmageddon experiment worked well for the team, leading

cycle operations. Each member has participated in some form of motorcycle racing, some at a professional level. This cadre also has extensive experience as off-road tour guides; safety and medical sweep riders for off-road race events, and all have performed these duties in day, night and inclement weather environments inside and

Each operator possesses a motorcycle endorsement on their driver's license, and each has participated in a motorcycle safety course outside the United States. tailored to emergency responders. These operators range from Firefighter Paramedics to Fire Captains. Each has at some point managed an incident requiring coordinating of ground and air resources and has provided continuous intelligence during prolonged periods.

Each of the operators is equipped with a helmet-mounted com-Communications munication system. The system allows each rider to communicate with LAFD Dispatch, other emergency resources and each other. Each operator will also have a cell phone available to support radio capabilities.

The operators will wear matching riding gear designed for protection, comfort and durability, meeting all applicable safety standards. The uniforms are designed to easily identify the members as LAFD field personnel.

Equipment

Each Motor Team will be equipped with a cache of basic life support (BLS) equipment, which will include an automated external defibrillator (AED), oxygen, and additional equipment. This equipment will allow the members to handle most incidents until additional assistance arrives. This equipment will be carried in a light and mobile kit attached to the rear rack of the motorcycles. The motorcycles have also been equipped with saddlebags to allow for stowing addi-

Each operator will also have a GPS unit tional safety equipment. attached to the motorcycle, a radio and compact department maps.

Training

While each operator selected for this team has an extensive motorcycle operator background, each rider was required to attend a motorcycle safety course tailored to emergency responders put on by the Motorcycle

Safety Foundation in Irvine. In addition, each operator has had a awareness course followed by a rider orientation with the KLR 650 riding in the designated operational area of the 405-Freeway incident.

Because of the need to travel on fire roads and the sensitive climate towards conservation, each rider was required to complete a US Forest Service endorsed "Tread Lightly" trail conservation course.

Finally, on April 29, the LAFD motorcycle team began pavement and trail training with the LAPD's off-road detail. That training is depicted on these pages.

Response and Responsibility

When arriving first on-scene, operators will take appropriate action in managing the incident and rendering the appropriate basic care. During all medical incidents, care will be continuous until the transfer of care can be made to an LAFD resource. If a fire incident occurs, the Motor Team will assume the role of Field Observer, providing information critical to the management of the incident.



to the department's decision to support the team full-time. The team is now undergoing extensive training by the LAPD's motorcycle trainers and undergoing equipment upgrades.

The motorcycle team uses identical Kawasaki street legal KLR 650 dual-purpose motorcycles loaned to the department by Kawasaki. **Apparatus** These KLR 650 motorcycles can maneuver through traffic and have off-road capabilities, which allows them to be used on alternate access routes such as trails and fire roads. The motorcycles have been outfitted with custom graphics, providing clear identification as an LAFD vehicle. They have also been outfitted with saddlebags and GPS systems. These motorcycles will be outfitted with emergency

The team is working with Kawasaki to return the current motorlighting or sirens. cycles and obtain new ones with updated equipment.

The motorcycles are staffed with sworn LAFD personnel selected from a cadre of individuals having extensive experience in motor-Staffing

Rubber Meets the Road

'Innovation Is... a Core Value'



On May 9. Alive! editor John Burnes interviewed Capt. Craig White, program coordinator of the LAFD's Disaster Preparedness Motorcycle Program, 26 years of City service. The interview took place in the conference room of Fire Station 88 in Sherman Oaks; FS 88 is also the home of the LAFD's Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) team, of which Capt. White is a member. - Ed.

Alive!: Let's start with this: What is the motorcycle program designed to do?

CAPT. CRAIG WHITE: The motorcycle program is designed to provide an ultimate means of getting responders on scene of any type of incident, whether it be medical or anything where we have to get responders through traffic and get them on scene in a timely man-

ner. That was the basis of the program that was put into place during Carmageddon.

Other things that the motorcycle program can accomplish are putting resources out on high hazard days during brush season to do fire patrols. We're in a disaster-prone area, with earthquakes. When we have infrastructure down, the motorcycles have the ability to traverse the terrain that maybe the fire apparatus can't get through. So it's an alternate means to get resources on scene when we may not be able to get large fire apparatus there.

Was the first reason it was created for pavement or trails?

CRAIG: A little of both. With Carmageddon, we wanted to make sure that we could cover the fire roads, to be able to get from the top of Mulholland down to Sunset or down to the valley side. And some of those access routes are dirt roads, or fire roads. We wanted to make sure we could traverse anything that we

So you were looking for dirt road capability even in the very beginning.

CRAIG: Correct. We use what are called dualsport motorcycles. They're made to travel on both dirt and street.

Is there medical equipment on board?

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CRAIG: Yes. We looked at what we could face during Carmageddon. And obviously, the most important thing was the medical side. By having a cache of medical items on board, we can get two EMTs on scene and provide basic life support medical care until we could get them transported. The motorcycles run in pairs of two, so each bike has a bag in the back. Split between the two bikes you have oxygen, an automatic external defibrillator, and trauma gear - bandages, wraps, ice packs, that kind of thing. Anything that we would face with an EMT-level ambulance we have the ability to handle until we can get transport capabilities on scene. So, we can handle most anything other than advanced life support. The goal in the future is to incorporate that advanced life support side of it by having an EMT and a paramedic riding together as a team. The ultimate goal is to provide the next level of service and treatment.

And how did the program do during Carmageddon?

CRAIG: It was a success in our eyes. The first time around, everybody either went away or stayed away and we really didn't have very many calls, and we didn't have much traffic. So the event itself and the public information piece was a success in making sure that we didn't have those issues.

But the second time around [Carmageddon II], we had several incidents up in the Mulholland

area, and the motorcycles were able to get on scene and provide the information or patient care they needed prior to the resources getting on scene. It worked out well. We learned a lot; that was the biggest thing. It was a trial program. It hadn't been done before so we tested a lot of different things. We wanted to make sure to go out on to the fire roads and make sure we could traverse the fire roads with no problems. We really put that motorcycle through its test. It really covered everything that we threw at it. It accomplished the missions that we were looking at.

We did some additional things. We wanted to provide information back to the command post. and be basically intelligence out in the field of access routes, any closures, and any high trafficimpacted areas. So, we patrolled through the area and made sure that we had areas covered for communications. We did some other things with them, too, not just that medical aspect. It went well.

I was surprised at the reaction of the public when we were out on the fire roads up off of dirt Mulholland. I was pleased with their reaction.

How did they react?

CRAIG: Out on the trails, when the public saw the graphics on the motorcycles reading "LAFD" and saw that we were firefighters, they thought, wow, what a great concept. We probably made 100 contacts during those weekends out on the trails. And every one of them was positive!

Personnel

Have you moved

past the trial phase now?

CRAIG: It was a trial during Carmageddon. It's approved now, and there are some steps that we have to take in trying to get the motorcycles and equipment purchased. We had to assess the training that we were going to do with the LAPD, which is helping out immensely in what



we're doing. Developing the roster of deployable members is the next step. We have to get a prerequisite course ironed out. [The team members] will take that course and a practical exam, and then get selected on the team.

So, the current members are kind of the trial personnel but you're going to be formalizing the personnel.

CRAIG: Correct. Our current folks are the initial cadre, the ones who are putting the program together. And then applicants will come in and get tested. We're trying to make sure that we get the best candidate for the position because you can't just put anybody on the bike and send them out there. We're trying to come up with a good pathway for them to be successful in the program and provide the service to the citizens.

The majority of the people in the initial cadre have managed some type of an incident from a motorcycle perspective. Some of them are chase riders for motorcycle tours in Mexico. All of them have raced in some type of motor sport, and that's a key component to making sure the program was successful. When you're riding, when you've been in competition, you have a different sense of what's around. You're not focused on, okay, what gear am I in, where's the brake, where's the clutch. All of that has to be second nature. With these folks, that that's all second nature. They're constantly thinking about traffic and what's ahead of them, or what's beside them. That's the kind of rider we're looking for. For this to be successful, obviously, we've got to make sure that we have the safest and strongest riders we can have.

And I wanted to make sure I had trainers on the team. The initial cadre all has something additional to bring to this program, and that was key to making sure the program was successful.

Is the motorcycle program part of the Urban Search and Rescue Team, the USAR team?

CRAIG: It's not a part of USAR. I'm assigned to Urban Search and Rescue 88. That's my dayto-day assignment. This is an extra component. The members who do it are in different spots. It's an ancillary mission for us, not a part of our day-to-day job.

The motorcycle program falls under Disaster Preparedness. I'm the program coordinator. And then I report to the Disaster Preparedness section chief. And then that falls under Special Operations and then ultimately to the Emergency Services Bureau.

So the federal government wouldn't be calling you like they would call you for Urban Search and Rescue?

CRAIG: No. And it's not tied to FEMA. It's not tied to our L.A. City Search and Rescue, although it can be used as a tool for that. We can be deployed for things like wide-area searches for lost or missing hikers, etc.

Origins

How did it get started?

CRAIG: It got started during the planning phase for Carmageddon. We had an incident management team put together for that, and I was the logistics section chief. And during the planning phase, the CHP, LAPD and Caltrans were discussing the traffic issues. They were going to saturate the areas with their motor units because they didn't feel they would be able to get their cars through. It kind of sparked an idea in my head. I've always been a motorcycle enthusiast. It just kind of clicked that, hey, we need to look at our access issues and we need to come up with a better way.

The Incident Commander listened to the plan that we put together and said, 'Let's see what we can do.' We put together a partnership with Kawasaki and got the bikes donated. Within a few weeks we had a program up and running. Everything kind of came together.

Are you available for deployment now?

CRAIG: The initial group is available now. We still have the bikes here. We still have the ability to put the resource in place. We want to make sure we have that training in place before we bring more folks into the mix. Right now we're trying to push it in the special events area, marathons, parades, those kinds of things. Our bicycle medic program has been in place for several years. They're activated quite often in different special events. So this would be a tool to augment those.

How far away are you from deployment of the full team?

CRAIG: I would say probably in the fall or early winter. We have to have a certain amount of time for the folks to get the prerequisite courses. We're putting that together now. We are working through budgetary issues.

Trail Blazers

I think there are other departments in the States and maybe even in the world that have pavement motorcycle programs, but maybe not so many on dirt roads, trails or fire roads. Is that true?

CRAIG: Yes, I've talked to several agencies out there. And for the most part they're focused mainly on the street side. They're using street bikes. But their areas of response don't have the same kind of things that we do. In Southern California and in the City of Los Angeles, I don't think people realize how much open space there is and how many open trails there are. So, by having the ability to take these bikes off road and rescue lost hikers or mountain bikers down, or equestrian issues at Hanson Dam, that kind of thing, to be able to get out on the trail

with that resource and provide the care needed - it becomes a multi-mission platform. We can really cover every part of the City with that piece of equipment. So it's very versatile.

You've been riding bikes your whole life. CRAIG: Yes.

Did you ever think that this would be another way you could serve the City?

CRAIG: It had always been in the back of my head. We've talked about it for a long time. They put horses into play for high-hazard days with the mounted fire patrol. So, we thought we could have motorcycles doing the same thing. The opportunity came up and the timing was right. Honestly, I didn't think we would ever see it. But we put together a very usable, very needed option for providing service. Our goal is to make it a model, and we hope other agencies look at it and say, 'This is something we should look at.'

The program as a whole just goes to show what our department is able to do and the type of people we have. When we are faced with an issue or a hurdle, the ability of the L.A. Fire Dept. to come up with a plan to meet the needs of whatever it is, is strong. We put to use the diversity of the Fire Dept., not just in culture and gender, but the diversity of the background and knowledge of the people we have on this job. And the administration is proactive and lets the innovations come through. Innovation is one of our core values. I think we excel in that. We see something, and we get over that hurdle. We're going to find a way. That's one of the strong suits of this Fire Dept. - we're going to get it done.



RLACEI Legislative Report - Pension Law and Policy by Michael Karsch

The pension issue was prime time for the April meeting of the League of California Cities in April. Three speakers represented the spectrum of city management (City Manager Ron Bates of Pico Rivera), organized labor (Steve Koffroth, representing AFSCME), and a statewide newsletter on public sector pensions (Amy Brown of the Public Retirement Journal). The bottom line was that California lawmakers and other stakeholders have sorted out and enacted pension reform that will stand for at least a few years. The governor and legislature enacted pension reform last year that makes some changes that affect current employees,

but the bulk of reform is for new hires. Brown said that most of the pension controversy has calmed down with the defeat last November of Prop. 32 (prohibiting political contributions by payroll deduction) and the passage of Prop. 30 (increases state sales tax and income tax). Koffroth believed we would not see much more in pension reform because the unfunded liability issue is not a problem. Bates, who has served as the president of the Southern California Councils of Government and president of the state League of California Cities, affirmed that the major benefit of the reform won't be seen for about 40 years when active City hires after this reform will begin retiring under the new terms. He added that some complications exist for government employees who move from one agency to

another, but the pension promised at the end of their careers should be intact.

Ten days after the League of Cities meeting, the Wall Street Journal reported on another pension reform package, this one for private sector, multi-employer pension plans affecting 10.3 million workers and retirees. The proposal would amend the Employee Retirement Income Security Act that has been on the books since 1974, affecting such sectors as construction, trucking and retail food. The key element in the proposal, which is from both organized labor and employer groups, is the ability to reduce current retiree benefits. The federal law covers about 1,450 multi-employer pension plans, most of which are satisfactorily funded, except 150 of those plans facing insolvency.

Another court test of the limits of "pension reform" might be brewing around one of the country's most troubled state pension plans. The Illinois House of Representatives has passed a bill to limit state pensions, but it is far from clear whether it will survive a legal test claiming that this violates the state constitution, which bars changes that result in benefits that are "diminished or impaired."

The plan, backed by Democratic House Speaker Mike Madigan, is designed to limit cost

of living increases for future retirees; increase retirement ages; boost employee pension contributions: and exempt pension changes from union negotiations.

Madigan told Reuters that the plan will survive a challenge that it violates the state's constitutional protection of pension benefits, but another Democrat, Senate President John Cullerton, says the unions are right that the benefits cannot be reduced.

The question being asked here, as in other jurisdictions, is whether the constitutional language is absolute. Here the 1970 constitution states that public pensions are "an enforceable contractual relationship, the benefits of which shall not be diminished or impaired."

House Speaker Madigan argues the state has a right to change the pension promises when other vital services could be cut because of the high costs of the pensions, a bill totaling more than \$6 billion per year in state contributions.

Legal commentators are split on how the question will be decided. Tyrone Fahner, a former Illinois attorney general who now works for a business group, believes that "[the state] has the absolute power to preserve the state and its basic functions."

However, John Marshall Law School Professor Ann Lousin, a constitutional expert, believes that the courts may view that the state is not doing everything that it can to raise tax money, such as levying a tax on pension or Social Security benefits as other states do. If viewed that way, the state may lose the argument that it is compelled either to cut pension benefits or vital services.

Legislative Update By Ken Spiker

The LACERS Board and staff were I very busy in 2012. Here are some highlights from the year that iust ended.

Investments

LACERS' portfolio returned an outstanding 14.5 percent, gross of fees, for the 2012 calendar year, placing LACERS in the top quartile for our peer group. The total fund outperformed the policy benchmark by 0.25 percent. Three of the largest portfolio asset classes that represent more than 80 percent of the total fund investments, U.S. equity, non-U.S. equity, and fixed income, beat their respective benchmarks by respectable margins. Private market investments, including private equity and real estate, trailed their respective benchmarks, but, with anticipation that outperformance will be realized in 2014. The domestic economic environment has strengthened with debt dele-

veraging, reduced unemployment, and rising housing prices. Fears of European Union (EU) instability have calmed for now by the approval of debt restructuring plans of some of the most financially challenged EU member nations. Growth regions such as Asia and Latin America continue to be attractive to investors who are eager to earn above-average returns. An improved global economy is an ideal backdrop for stronger investment returns across all major asset classes.

During 2012, our Board conducted an asset allocation analysis to help ensure our investment portfolio is well positioned for the current and anticipated market conditions. This is a very important decision and can account for up to 90 percent of the investment returns (much more so than any specific investments).

The Board of LACERS' investment staff looks forward to 2013 and will be conducting multiple money manager searches that will support our updated asset allocation from both return and risk perspectives.

Actuarial

During 2012, the Board decided to transition our actuarial cost method from Projected Unit Credit to a more desirable funding methodology known as Entry Age Normal. This change provides for more level contributions from the City to the System throughout each Member's career and aligns our accounting and financial reporting process with the new Governmental Accounting Standards Board's guidelines.

Benefits

LACERS Board and staff successfully negotiated overall healthcare cost increases that were below the medical trend rate. This means that the increases we negotiated for the 2013 plan year were lower than predicted compared to increases taking place throughout the country. We were able to do this without having to resort to benefit reductions or increased cost sharing.

Sad Senegal **History**

Hal and Co. continue their cruise from Cape Town to England.

PART EIGHT



Evelyn and I took a 38-day trip, which included four days at the Botlierskop Safari Resort near George, South Africa; a 28-day cruise on the Ocean Princess from Cape Town, South Africa, to London; and four days in London at the end. Don and Myrna, our cousins, took the cruise with us.

The itinerary was as follows: Cape Town; Lüderitz and Walvis Bay, Namibia; Cotonou, Benin; Lome, Togo; Dakar, Senegal; Mindelo, Cape Verde Islands: Santa Cruz de Tenerife. Canary Islands; Casablanca, Morocco; Cadiz, Spain; Lisbon, Portugal; Le Havre, France; and Dover, England.

As we continue the story, we are now halfway through the cruise and are coming up to Dakar, Senegal. We had a tour booked to go to Ile de Goree, an island off the coast that was the site of slave detention and the major point of departure in this area

Before we left home, I joined a Website called Cruise Critic, which features a bulletin board online for cruises so that passengers on the same cruise can set up private tours and exchange information. On that day, they had a get-together and we went. We had already met a member who we played bridge with. He organized a tour to Marrakech when we were in Casablanca. Anyway, he had a cancellation and asked if we wanted to go. Evelyn did but I didn't want to do a seven-hour roundtrip bus drive. You have only a couple of hours once you get there. Evelyn said I had better find her something to do in Casablanca or I was in trouble. We have toured Casablanca before,

but we never got to the really good markets, so my task was to find out where they were so we could go there for shopping. We had already done the regular city tour and the grand Mosque. Casablanca isn't as romantic as Rick portrayed it in the movie.

One of my food complaints was that there was no bread for sandwiches at the lunch buffet. They have readymade sandwiches, but that day they were carving roast beef, and it dawned on me to go to the grill and get a hamburger bun and make a roast beef sandwich. We were on this same ship six months ago and I never thought of doing

We played bridge and awaited the results. In duplicate you never know how well vou do until everyone plays the same hand and the results are tallied. You can bid and make a contract, but someone may bid a better contract and make it. We just waited to see. The results were not good.

The Cruise Critic get-together was informative. We then had a better understanding of how it worked, and it was something that we may use or contribute to in the future.

The entertainment that night was Shan O'Shay. Billed as a comic, he was more a funny impressionist singer. He started out slow but improved as the show progressed. He was a good friend of Hyperion Knight the pianist, and Don thought they were a couple.

We played music trivia in the Casino Lounge, and our team scored 17 out of 25. We thought the score was pretty good and we finished third. All the questions were multiple choice, so maybe that helped a little. Our team name is now "Deck 8," as all of our cabins were on the eighth deck.

We docked the next morning before 7 a.m. and awaited clearance to go ashore. We were going to Ile de Goree to see the slave history sites. Evelyn was already nervous about missing shopping. On this cruise, Princess had a free shuttle in every port, a departure from past practices. I noticed a lot of improvement in the support of independent travel. They provided a lot more information on doing things on your own, not just on a Princess tour.

We left the ship at 8:30 a.m. for our tour. It was a chartered ferry, so we were picked up quite close to our ship's berth. It was about a 15-minute ride to the island. We were in groups of about 30 people. It took a while to get organized, and the one group visited the slave house and the rest took a walking tour of the island. It has been inhabited since the late 1400s, and between 1536 and 1848 (the date France abolished slavery), 15 to 20 million souls were sent to the Americas as slaves, and millions died in transit. According to what we have read, approximately 40 million Africans were captured during the 300 years slavery was practiced. How many actually made it to the new world is unknown.

During our walkabout, we were trailed by many sellers of local merchandise. We brought two hats for \$10 and then got two more for \$5. Then we bought a couple of T-shirts and some local jewelry.

We bought four small sand paintings. The sand paintings are a local craft, where sands of different shades are used with glue made from a local tree called the Monkey Bread tree.

We then returned to the slave house (the current one was built in 1776) for our tour. It

was heartbreaking to see the conditions that the people were forced to endure and the inhuman treatment. The door of no return was the last time most would ever see Africa. This door led directly to a seawall, and you either got on the ship or were pushed into

the sea. The island was the most westerly point in Africa and as such was closest to the Americas. This was one of the reasons that a great deal of the slave trade was here.

Our last stop was the Fort, and we heard an interesting explanation of life in Senegal. More than 80 percent of the population is Muslim, and many had up to four wives.

Of the five West African countries that we visited, Senegal was the most developed. The city of Dakar, the capital, was founded just more than 100 years ago, even though it has a fine harbor. Before that, most trade took place near or on Goree Island. In 1677, the French captured the island from the Dutch. The French controlled Senegal until 1960,

when the country gained independence. During World War II, there was a naval battle between British/free French and Vichy French, who controlled Senegal. The battle was called off after several British battleships were damaged, and Senegal stayed under Vichy control until 1943.

We returned to the ship for lunch and decided to take the ship's shuttle to Independence Square and walk around.

Many people were selling the same things we had already purchased. Don and Myrna decided to go back to the ship, but Evelyn wanted to look around some more. A local latched on to us and wanted to show us where the central market was. We couldn't shake him - he wouldn't take no for an answer. Finally we

turned around and started to walk back to the shuttle and somehow he thought that Evelyn insulted him and he wanted to know why I let my wife insult him. He wasn't angry or threatening, but it was very uncomfortable. We finally made it back to the shuttle stop. The shuttle was just loading, and we found Don and Myrna already aboard. In the end, I gave the guy a couple of dollars. As I was getting on the shuttle, through the crowd of sellers I could feel someone trying to get into my pocket and I slapped the hand away. We were told by the local guide on boarding the shuttle from the ship to be careful because there would be pickpockets around the shuttle stop. We never felt afraid in any of our stops, and we were not afraid here.

We had dinner in the buffet with a couple from the cabin next door to us. They were about 10 years younger than us and

were very well traveled.


We took on 200 tons of fuel and were still at the fueling dock at midnight.

The next day we headed to the Cape Verde Islands and the city of Mindelo; the seas were a little rougher. The ship rocked a little more than usual. We turned back the clock an hour the night before and we were only six hours ahead of Los Angeles.

There was a shuttle from the ship to the town center, and for this one there was a \$16 roundtrip fee per person. We had an afternoon tour, so I didn't think we would need the shuttle. This was the first time Princess charged for the shuttle. I asked the tour desk about the shuttle charge and was told that if the town were within walking distance (and with no obstacles), there would be a charge for shuttle. If you can't walk, there was no charge.

We finished up our bridge lesson and waited for trivia to begin. The Cruise Critic group met for lunch that day, and Evelyn and I went. We skipped bridge that afternoon because we wanted to meet with the future cruise desk to plan our next cruise. If we booked on the ship, we received a lower deposit and a room credit. No matter what, you can always cancel up to 90 days prior to departure without penalty. Also the weather was very nice - not to hot or humid - and I wanted to lie out by the pool.

Evelyn and I enjoyed the Cruise Critic lunch: we sat with two ladies from Australia and an Indian couple from San Francisco. All of these people have cruise knowledge, which they were willing to share, and you can learn a lot. It gave me a chance to meet people with common interests. It was like going to Friday night services to meet all

We talked to the representatives at the future cruise desk, and we looked at a couple of cruises for next year.

We ate in the dining room. It seemed that on sea days we ate in the dining room, but on port days at the buffet. The next day we were in Mindelo, Cape Verde Islands. The next two days we were at sea and then in the Canary Islands. The first sea day meant a formal night, so we would eat in the dining room, and the next night we had a reservation in Sabatini's, the upscale Italian restaurant.

That night was the second concert of Hyperion Knight, and he was excellent. While the playing was good, his explanation of each piece and information about the composer made the evening enjoyable.

LACERS launched its new wellness program, LACERS WELL, for our retired members. A retiree-only wellness program is a rarity, but staff and our health insurance carriers are committed to providing an accessible, fun and educational program that we can all participate in to whatever degrees we can – whether by using the online resources or participating in one of the workshops, or both.

Staff successfully applied for and received an additional \$2.1 million from the federal government under its Early Retiree Reinsurance Program (ERRP). In addition to the \$3.8 million received in 2011, LACERS received \$5.9 million in funds that otherwise would have been paid by some of our retirees and LACERS.

LACERS' benefits staff is also gearing up to begin administration of a second tier of retirement benefits. Tier 2, enacted by the City Council, for new members hired on or after July 1, 2013. These benefits will require new employees to work longer to earn their retirement benefits. which includes a 75 percent maximum and two percent retirement factor, compared to the 100 percent maximum and 2.16 percent retirement factor applicable to Tier 1 members.

We also received an "unqualified" opinion from the CPA firm, Brown Armstrong, regarding our annual financial statements. An "unqualified" opinion is the highest level and, therefore, the most desirable result. And, for the 13th

year running, LACERS was awarded a certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA).

Administration

The Board awarded a contract to Levi, Ray & Shoup to replace its then-current Pension Administration System with a more modern and functional system to assist LACERS' staff in providing better customer service and interactivity to our members, both active and retired. Staff happily anticipates kicking off this multiyear project in 2013.

Life Saver


Kenny Lampton's quick actions merit him a Public Works honor.

Public Works/Sanitation Refuse Collection Supervisor Kenneth Lampton was recognized at the April 17 Board of Public Works meeting with a certificate for his quick and decisive actions in providing first aid to his colleague, Refuse Collection Truck Operator II Randy Armour, who had suffered a serious injury. By Kenneth coming to his aid in a short time frame, Randy's injury was kept under control and saved his life.

According to an account by Daniel McKay, Public Works, last December, RCTO Randy Armour was attempting to unload televisions from his E-waste route when he fell onto a

very sharp tube on the back of a television, causing a serve laceration to the back of his upper left leg. As a result, he was losing blood very rapidly and fortunately was able to jump down off of the back of the box van and come to the front of the yard on the street in front of the clerical office, where he asked two community service workers for help. They came into the office and notified Daniel McKay that a driver was hurt and to come quickly. They led him to Randy. Daniel ran back into the clerical office and had the staff call the paramedics and simultaneously saw Supervisor Kenny Lampton, who acted very quickly, removing his belt and tying it around Randy's leg to stop the bleeding. Supervisor Lampton remained







Differences In Disability Plans

What purpose does your disability insurance plan serve, if any? Do you know the differences among the diversity of disability plans out there? For instance, you may have heard of short-term disability, long-term disability, permanent disability and state disability insurance issued

Let's take a closer look. In comparison, short-term disability insurance will pay only a maximum of up to two years and typically does not cover on-the-job injuries. Most short-term plans designate a set benefit amount each month, and a much shorter waiting period to pay out a benefit. Here's a hypothetical example of a short-term disability at work: You suffer an injury while gardening at home and tear a ligament. It's been more than 14 days since you're able to go to work and perform

your duties. You're now eligible to claim on your benefits your pre-selected amount of \$1,500 per month until you can go back to work or, if out indefinitely, you can collect up to two years maximum (whichever

In contrast, long-term disability insurance (LTDi), sometimes referred to as permanent disability, serves to protect your income for a much longer duration in the event of permanent disability. LTDi will pay a percentage of your salary until you reach the age of 65 or can go back to work, whichever comes first. LTDi covers injury or illness, both on or off the job, giving you a much more comprehensive coverage than a short-term disability. While both disability plans pay out a monthly benefit, with short-term disability you must choose a set amount of benefit and, depending on

With the Club's LTDi, the benefit payout is a percentage of 60 to 70 percent of your current income.

You can have one without the other, and you can have both. If you tailor your policies to co-exist, you can plan it so there is no lapse in coverage, and when the short-term disability comes to an end. the long-term disability will begin. Any one of our benefit counselors would be happy to review your policies to help you avoid a lapse in coverage.

As a City or DWP employee, most of you are not making contributions to state disability insurance (SDI). Therefore, most of you will not qualify to claim benefits

Also, did vou know that you are not required to use all your vacation time for

the Club's disability plan to pay? In fact we encourage you to not use your vacation time if you are out due to an illness/injury.

Simply ask yourself if you currently do not have the Club's disability plan, is your sick time enough for you to sustain your lifestyle? Do you have a back-up plan for your income if you can not go to work due to an injury or illness?







The Airport Police Dept. mourns the loss of 12-year veteran Officer Anthony Edwards,

who passed away May 9 from medical complications after running a 5K Memorial Run to honor Airport Police Officer Tommy Scott, his academy classmate killed in the line of duty in April 2005. Officer Edwards, 46, joined Airport Police on Oct. 7, 2001, and was assigned to Patrol Services at LAX.

The Tommy Scott Memorial Run was in addition to the Tommy Scott Memorial Ride (on motorcycles). They were both held to raise funds for the Tommy Scott Scholarship Fund.

"The entire Airport Police force is saddened by the sudden loss of Officer Edwards, who was dedicated to supporting his fellow officers and to ensuring the safety and security of the traveling public," said Airport Police Chief Patrick Gannon. "We extend our deepest sympathies to his family, friends and close colleagues. Airport Police will honor Officer Edwards just as he was there to honor Officer

Officer Edwards was born Oct. 15, 1966, and lived in Santa Clarita. He graduated from the Rio Hondo Police Academy Class 161 on Feb. 21, 2002. Prior to joining Airport Police, he worked as a security officer at LAX.

He is survived by his wife of 25 years, Candace Edwards; son, Anthony Jr., 21; daughter, Ashley, 24; brothers Keith, Maurice, Donald, and William; sisters, Cynthia and

Darlene Edwards; and sister Marsha Gilmore; as well as other relatives.

5. Comprehensive

We take it for granted because it's something that we been buying since we bought our first car, but some of the most frequent questions I get are people asking me to explain what car insurance covers.

Your car insurance policy may include six coverages. Each coverage is priced separately.

1. Bodily Injury Liability

This coverage applies to injuries that you, the designated driver or policyholder, cause to someone else. You and family members listed on the policy are also covered when driving someone else's car with their permission.

It's very important to have enough liability insurance, because if you are involved in a serious accident, you may be sued for a large sum of money. Definitely consider buying more than the state-required minimum to protect assets such as your home and savings.

2. Medical Payments

This coverage pays for the treatment of injuries to the driver and passengers of the policyholder's car. At its broadest, this can cover medical payments, lost wages and the cost of replacing services normally performed by someone injured in an auto accident. It may also cover funeral costs.



3. Property Damage Liability

This coverage pays for damage you (or someone driving your car with your permission) may cause to someone else's property. Usually this means damage to someone else's car, but it also includes damage to lamp posts, telephone poles, fences, buildings or other structures your car hit.

4. Collision

This coverage pays for damage to your car resulting from a collision with another car, object or as a result of flipping over. It also covers damage caused by potholes. Collision coverage is generally sold with a deductible of \$250 to

Comprehensive insurance will also reimburse you if your windshield is cracked or shattered. Some companies offer glass coverage with or without a deductible.

6. Uninsured and Underinsured **Motorist Coverage**

This coverage will reimburse you, a member of your family, or a designated driver if one of you is hit by an uninsured or hit-and-run driver.

Underinsured motorist coverage comes into play when an at-fault driver has insufficient insurance to pay for your total loss. This coverage will also protect you if you are hit as a pedestrian.



Ceremony for Chief Gannon

On May 9, Patrick Gannon was sworn in as the new Chief of the Airport Police Dept. Senior officials from federal, state and local law

enforcement, military, and airports witnessed U.S. Congresswoman Janice Hahn administer the oath of office to Chief Gannon. The appointment and swearing in of Chief Gannon were celebrated at the Flight Path Learning Center and Museum at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX).

Airports Deputy Executive Director of Law Enforcement and Homeland Security Services Arif Alikhan officially swore in Chief Gannon on Nov. 26, shortly after his appointment to the post.

The Airport Police Honor Guard began the May 9 ceremony by posting the colors, and the Transportation Security Administration-LAX (TSA) Choir performed the National Anthem. Airport police Chaplain Timothy Cheatwood offered a prayer.

Deputy Executive Director Alikhan said, "On behalf of the over 1,100 civilian personnel and sworn officers of the LAWA Police Division, we are very fortunate to have Pat Gannon join the LAWA team and rejoin the City of Los Angeles family after 34 years of distinguished service."

Congresswoman Hahn, Club Member and former City Councilwoman, presented Chief Gannon a Certificate of Special Recognition from the U.S. House of Representatives to

commemorate the event and to recognize Chief Gannon for his service to the public.

Congresswoman Hahn told Chief Gannon, "The men and women in this department, that you are about to lead, are some of the finest. We have charged them with an incredible

experience with Chief Gannon as a partner throughout both their careers with LAPD. He described Chief Gannon as "the most compassionate, honest, straightforward, intelligent, and well-thought individual I have ever worked

In his remarks, Chief Gannon thanked all of Airport Police in helping to make his transition easier and described Airport Police employees as "a tremendous group of professionals who work to keep our airports safe and secure." He added, "Our responsibility as Airport Police is that we are going to be, if we are not already, the best aviation law-enforcement agency in America." He said he believes "Los Angeles Airport Police Division has greatness and can achieve enormous

things if everyone pulls together and sees challenges as opportunities and not as obstacles to success."

He also thanked Airport Police Assistant Chiefs Ethel McGuire, Michael Hyams and Brian Walker; police and fire captains; division administrative staff; and officers in the rank-and-file who have embraced his mission and pushed it forward.

Chief Gannon also expressed gratitude to the family of Officer Tommy Scott, who served four years with Airport Police before losing his life in the line of duty in 2005. Chief Gannon said, "The sacrifice the Scott family has made for the good of the City of Los Angeles and the good of this region in losing their precious son makes it a privilege to work with the family. They are such positive people that it makes us much more positive."

Since that time, the chief has accomplished several goals, including the establishment of "vertical staff meetings" with both civilian and sworn employees. In May on his 100th day in office, the chief outlined additional goals, including: assigning specific missions and strategies; community policing; managing large incidents; and Airport Police Division becoming a leader in aviation law enforcement.



Founded by Councilman Dennis P. Zine, the Z Awards for ExZellence is in its 11th and final year and recognizes individuals for their ongoing dedication, commitment, and "exzellence" in their professional lives and outstanding contributions in the areas of law enforcement, public safety, and emergency services. Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, and the California Highway Patrol.

Officer III Brian McClary LAPD Valley Traffic Division

Officer III Brian McClary has been a member of the LAPD for more than 24 years and has been assigned to Valley Traffic Division (VTD) for the past 16 years. During his time at VTD, Officer McClary has worked as a collision investigator in the Detective Section. During this past year, Officer McClary was the primary col-

lision investigator for some of the most horrific traffic accidents that the San Fernando Valley experienced. Due to Officer McClary's extensive investigative knowledge, he is a regular instructor at the Department's Basic Collision Investigation School and is a member of the Multi-Disciplinary Collision Investigation Team. In the last year, Officer McClary earned eight commendations where he was recognized for his professionalism, teamwork, investigative expertise, tactics and keen observation skills. Recently he was recognized for coordinating with the National Hockey League to have the Stanley Cup on display for a fundraising photo opportunity. The money was utilized to pay for a new VTD fallen officer memorial. Officer McClary was also the recipient of the 2012 MADD "Deuce Award," which represents all his DUI arrests from the previous year. Remarkably, this year's MADD Award is the 12th time Officer McClary has been recognized for his DUI enforcement efforts during his career.



Sgt. Douglas Winger LAPD West Valley Area

Cgt. Douglas Winger has been with the LAPD for 16 years and has held a multitude of assignments, both in patrol and specialized divisions throughout the Department, including the Mental Evaluation Unit. His knowledge about the various signs and symptoms of people suffering from mental illness is so expansive that

he provided Roll Call training to his personnel on how to respond to field contacts with the mentally ill community. Following the Sept. 11, 2001 World Trade Center bombings and other terrorist attacks against the United States, Sgt. Winger was selected as one of the Multi-Assault Counter Terrorism Action Capabilities School's cadre members. As a MACTAC Instructor, Sgt. Winger has provided West Valley Area patrol officers with enhanced counterterrorism training to better prepare the West Valley field force to respond to critical incidents. He also serves as the Gang Enforcement Detail Supervisor, a highly coveted position requiring sound judgment and solid leadership skills.



Officer Adam Smith California Highway Patrol

fficer Adam Christopher Smith has spent the last seven years of his 12-year California Highway Patrol (CHP) career in the West Valley Area Division and has demonstrated an outstanding commitment to safety, security and service to the citizens of California. Officer Smith was born in the San Fernando Valley and was raised

in Woodland Hills, where he was a Law Enforcement Explorer Cadet at the West Valley CHP Station from 1994 to 2000. His many details include: Motorcycle Officer, Protective Service Detail, Public Information Officer, Officer in Charge, and Child Safety Seat Technician. One of the highlights of Officer Smith's career was responding to a Department of Justice stop, wherein the suspect had a car full of merchandise - he eventually discovered that all of the items recovered belonged to the mother of LA City Councilman Richard Alarcon.



Sgt. II Cathy Riggs LAPD Topanga Area

oining the LAPD in 1994, Sgt. II Cathy Riggs rose to the rank of J Sergeant in 1999 and joined the Topanga Transition Team in July 2008 as an Assistant Watch Commander. Sgt. Riggs was immediately tasked with completing the Area Standing Plans, the department's preplanned responses for unusual occurrences of every type

imaginable. On Sept. 12, 2008, she responded to the scene of the tragic Metrolink Train collision, where fellow Officer Spree Desha lost her life. Sgt. Riggs provided support to Officer Desha's family, including escorting her parents to Washington, D.C. for Police Memorial Week and the viewing of their daughter's name on the National Police Memorial. Just one month after the Metrolink tragedy, Sgt. Riggs and the Transition Team were mobilized once again to respond to the Sesnon Wildfire that lasted for four days and burned approximately 14,000 acres. Sgt. Riggs recognizes potential issues and seeks out of the box solutions far in advance of disasters. As an example of this innovative risk management thinking, she

reached out to private industry security personnel and joined with the Westfield Topanga Mall to teach, drill and assess active shooter scenarios in traditional soft targets with mass population. Additionally, in the wake of the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting in Connecticut, Sgt. Riggs met with her daughter's school principal and offered to provide training to the staff in such emergency situations. This eventually led to the creation of a program called "Seconds Count" in the Topanga Area, which brings together school administrators, psychologists, social workers, mental health experts, community organizations and multiple law enforcement agencies in a concerted effort to keep school violence at bay. Sgt. Riggs has also survived cancer, wherein she lost a good portion of her jaw and is a living testament to the power of positive thinking and resilience during times of hardship.



Capt. David Rejino LAFD Battalion 17

apt. David Rejino has been a member of the LAFD for 25 years and has been assigned to Fire Station 72 in the Canoga Park area since 2008. During his career, he has held the ranks of Firefighter III, Hazardous Materials Specialist, Apparatus Operator, and since 2007, Fire Capt. Rejino and his crew pro-

vide quality fire prevention education, fire safety awareness, and disaster preparedness instruction to the community. Examples of these initiatives include the Halloween Safety and Awareness Program, which teaches children and their families about wearing proper costumes and understanding the guidelines for risk-free "trick-or-treating" and a project that educates children, their parents, and teachers on the importance of wearing bike helmets, preventing serious pediatric head injuries. Capt. Rejino also trains volunteer firefighters for the City of La Habra Heights, where he also holds the rank of Captain. Through his passion for this work, many of the young men and women that he mentors in this volunteer position achieve their career goal of becoming professional firefighters. In fact, one of the current members of his crew at Fire Station 72 is one of those firefighters he trained from La Habra Heights.



Firefighter III Todd Harris LAFD Battalion 17

 $\Gamma^{}_{13}$ years, 12 of which have been spent working in the West Valley at Fire Station 73 in Reseda, Fire Station 106 in West Hills, and currently at Fire Station 105 in Woodland Hills. For the past 10 years, Firefighter Harris has been a part of the handpicked

40-member Brush Task Force, educating and verifying compliance of residential properties to clearance requirements throughout the City. Some of his distinctions and specializations include: certified member of the LAFD Tractor Unit, certified Swift Water rescue technician, and licensed commercial pilot for both fixed-wing and rotor aircraft. He also volunteers as an instructor for the LAFD Cadet program in West Hills, where he helps prepare young men and women who would like to pursue a career in the fire service. Prior to his time with the LAFD, Todd served as an LA County Deputy Sheriff working in the Custody Division, Patrol Division, Gang Suppression Team, and Warrant Unit. Firefighter Harris continues in his law enforcement career working on his days off as a Reserve Deputy.

Deputy Darren Martin is a 16-year veteran of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department (LASD) and is assigned to the Transit Services Bureau. He has been the driving force behind enforcement elements of the Orange Line and maintains an active role in every aspect, including the Orange Line Extension,

photo enforcement, and basic maintenance along the route. Deputy Martin regularly conducts audits and studies across all bus lines and developed the Deployment Strategy to maximize LASD coverage while maintaining fiscal prudence. Because of his diligence and attention to statistical detail, the Orange Line and Valley Transit Buses enjoy relatively low crime rates. He also regularly meets with school administrators of the local junior high and high schools and was the key author of the Transit Juvenile Diversion Program. This program, the first of its kind, aims to reduce juvenile misconduct on Metro buses by educating youths on the merits of public transportation while simultaneously keeping them in the classroom and out of the criminal justice system.

Remembering Tommy Scott

Airport Police raises \$2,100 for scholarships during **Tommy E. Scott Memorial Ride.**

Airport Police offi-cers raised nearly \$2,100 from a memorial ride to donate to the Tommy E. Scott Scholarship Fund available to collegebound children of airport employees. The Third Annual Tommy E. Scott Memorial Ride was held April 27 in

honor of Airport Police Officer Tommy E. Scott, who was killed in the line of duty April 29, 2005. The procession traveled from the Airport Police station at LAX to Officer Scott's gravesite in a Forest Lawn cemetery in North Hollywood, and then on to Malibu.

Officer Scott joined the Airport Police in 2001, and was 35 at the time of his death. He was the first Airport Police officer to be killed in the line of duty during the 59-year history of the force. Prior to joining the force, he served 15 years with Rec and Parks. Officer Scott was killed while stopping a suspicious man, William Sadowski, in a vehicle near LAX. Sadowski was convicted of carjacking and first-degree murder and was sentenced to life in prison without possibility of parole.

Airport Police Officers Julio Aparicio, George Chen, Paul Mosqueda, Robert Yanez, Rito Torres and Daniel Yu organized this year's event, which attracted 60 officers and civilians (on personal time) to ride or drive personal motorcycles or vehicles the 28-mile route. The number of participants was four times greater than last year's participation. A sum of \$2,095 was raised from donations, T-shirt sales, and

Officer Scott's parents, Hubert and JoAnn Carter-Scott, requested the funds be donated to the Tommy E. Scott Scholarship Fund, sponsored by the Association of Airport Employees (AAE), a nonprofit organization. Airport Police Motor Officers Julio Aparicio and George Chen presented a check to AAE President Jimmy Sparks during a recent AAE meeting.



Bells of the Camino

Spend any time driving along our coast looks a bit like a Shepard's crook. That would be one of the bells of El Camino window and see a bell on a pole that


would be one of the bells of El Camino Real. Spanish for "The Royal Road" (and

really any road that was under the Spanish crown was a camino real) it connected 21 missions, 4 presidios and several pueblos from San Diego to Sonoma. When Mexico won is independence from Spain, no road in California was a camino real any longer but with the Mission Revival movement of the early 20th century the name was revived and

In 1892, Anna Pitcher of Pasadena began an movement to preserve a part of the Camino Real. In 1902 the California Federation of Women's Clubs adopted the cause and decided to place distinctive bells along the route. The first of these bells was unveiled in 1906. There were 450 in all.

During a recent stop at a rest area in Gavoita, I managed to get up close to one of these bells. There is a small plaque attached to the pole which reads "In 1906, guidepost bells were placed along El Camino Real to guide early travelers and to preserve this historic route which linked California's Missions beginning in 1769"

El Camino Real is a California Historic Landmark.

Angel's Be Alix Hello everyone!

This month we are going to the city of I rvine. I thought, let's take it easy this month and just walk on flat ground. With that in mind, I looked around and found the prefect spot - Irvine's Ranch Water District San Joaquin Marsh and Wildlife Sanctuary. This is a truly hidden gem in Orange County. The relaxing atmosphere is apparent the moment you park your car. The volunteer staff is so help-

ful - they almost forced us to take binoculars and checked the sizes for my boys, and gave us the rundown on the area and sent us on our merry way.

The Sanctuary Walk

Wow! This wildlife sanctuary is right in the middle of Irvine, with about 12 miles of trails. The place is amazing for bird watchers, joggers and walkers, and serves as a living laboratory location for students, teachers and the general public.

As you park your car, you will see a few structures like homes that serve as educational rooms. The San Joaquin Marsh Campus houses the Audubon House; the Duck Club; the IRWD

Visitors Center at the Marsh House; the IRWD Learning Center; the Sea and Sage Audubon House; and the Caretaker's House. The Marsh House, a 1920s-era farmhouse from the original Irvine Ranch, is now home to an interpretive center where visitors can learn about the marsh, water conservation and environmental protection. The first building you will see will be Audubon House. Next to that is the Duck Club, which is adjacent to Audubon House. Go inside each

one and spend some time looking around and finding out what wonderful animal life is just a few steps away.

Important information: The wetlands are a critical component of IRWD's Natural Treatment System, as they naturally clean urban runoff from San Diego Creek and help to

protect the environmentally sensitive Upper Newport Bay. After interacting with the bulrush and other plants for seven to ten days, up to 70 percent of the nitrogen is removed. The cleaner water is returned to the creek to continue its journey to Upper Newport Bay and the

They chatted, and Hynda was recruited as an Alive! columnist soon thereafter. "I've learned a lot about the city I was born in and now work in. It's been an education and a pleasure. 





TACOS DE CARNE ASADA

am always in search of quick, easy and delicious recipes, and Tacos de Carne Asada is no exception. At closer inspection, the recipe Lould be a top-ten pick for its flavor and easy preparation. There are many versions of carne asada tacos – some call for rice and beans while others are just plain with hot sauce. In my version, I use a few extra ingredients including sour cream and Monterey Jack cheese. I also grilled some corn on the cob and a few artichokes as a side dish. This is optional, but you can do the same or make some rice

If your carne asada was defrosting but you placed the beef on the grill before the entire cut of beef had been thawed, it will end up cooked well on the outside but undercooked inside. A solution to this is to place the meat in the oven for about 15 minutes at 375 degrees F so that the inside of the beef is cooked through as well. Enjoy!

Tacos de Carne Asada

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 pound seasoned skirt steak (or flank steak)
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 1/4 cup cilantro, chopped
- 1 tablespoon julienned chives
- 6 corn tortillas (approximate)
- Red and/or green salsa
- 1/4 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- Diced tomatoes (optional)
- Avocado cubed (optional)
- 2 corncobs (optional)



You may use other cuts of beef including tenderloin, New York steak and filet mignon. Have the butcher prepare the carne asada, or some markets already have them prepared and ready to cook.

Carne Asada:

Spanish for "roasted (broiled) meat," carne asada is a popular Mexican specialty of thin strips of beef marinated in lime juice and other seasonings and quickly grilled. Traditionally tenderloin or New York steak is used, though flank steak or skirt steak is often substituted. Carne asada can be eaten on its own with sides of rice and beans, or cut into smaller pieces and used in other Mexican specialties including enchiladas, quesadillas or

DIRECTIONS:



With a well-thawed steak, place the meat on high heat on top of a barbeque grill. Grill both sides for about three minutes each, and then reduce heat to medium heat. Place two corncobs on the grill as well. Close barbeque lid.



Turn steak over on other side once it has browned well. Turn the corn as well. The color should be similar to this photo.



I use a meat thermometer to check the internal temperature. For the steak to be cooked medium, I want the internal temperature to be at 145 degrees F.




On a hot iron skillet or comal, place your corn tortillas there and turn over once one side is toasted



Take two warmed tortillas, add slices of the carne asada, cheese, salsa, diced chives, cilantro, sour cream and optional diced tomatoes and avocado. Plate. Enjoy!
