Beauty Deeper Than the Dirt

The Smart Move

What's Your Financial IQ?

ran across a publication the other day called *Financial Fitness for Life*. It is produced by the Council for Economic Education (CEE) and is designed for students from grades six through nine. The CEE has long known that students exposed to the "economic way of thinking" are more self-confident and capable of making smart financial decisions. They also do a better job of saving and investing, building solid careers, and acting as informed citizens. In other words, when they gain an understanding of how the "real" world works, they improve their prospects for better lives in it.

Unfortunately most folks don't get the opportunity to learn the valuable lessons the program teaches at that early age, or at any age, for that matter. Focusing on one important section of the program (saving) can help a lot of folks who now are wandering towards retirement. Most are without a clue of how they are going to get there and how they are going to fare during those golden years. Here are a few of the questions that the program explores with regards to saving. Remember the program is targeted to kids in grades six through nine. See how you would fare if you were going to take the test by answering the questions below:

- What is a long-term savings goal?
- Why are there different kinds of savings plans?
- What about inflation?
- What is the role of banks and other financial institutions?
- How can compound interest help make people rich?
- What is the Rule of 72?
- What is a bond?
- How do bonds provide income?
- How is a U.S. Savings Bond different from other bonds?
- What are stocks?
- Which pays a better return, a stock or a bond?

- Why own bonds if stocks pay more?
- What does "buy low, sell high" mean?
- Do you buy stock directly from a
- company?Why does investing in companies matter?
- What are financial intermediaries?
- What about risk?
- How do you minimize risk?
- Should investors keep some money in "liquid" investments?

I suspect that many questions went unanswered simply because we have not been schooled in these areas.

Finally, the study concluded with the following exhortation.

These are the "Five Golden Rules for Investment" that children and every adult should know:


1. Live below your means and save the difference.

- 2. Start saving now and save as much as you can on a regular basis.
- 3. Decide to save for the long term compound interest is effortless wealth. Remember that compound interest means earning interest on interest.
- 4. Investigate before you invest. Get the best deals.
- Take risks to get better returns. Be prudent, but remember that the stock market has provided a better return than most other types of investments over the long term.



Covering a Large Judgment

What happens if you have a *big* claim against you?

Sometimes it happens. You can get involved in a large claim, where the lawsuit can easily reach hundreds of thousands of dollars.

An umbrella liability policy, or excess liability policy, is the best way to protect yourself against a potential large claim. And dollar for dollar, it could be the cheapest insurance ever! You can get millions of dollars of coverage for a few hundred dollars.

If you are ever sued, your standard homeowners or car policy will provide you with some liability coverage, paying for judgments against you and your attorney's fees, up to a limit set in the policy. However, in our litigious society, you may want to have an extra layer of liability protection. That's what a personal umbrella liability policy provides.

An umbrella policy kicks in when you reach the limit on the underlying liability coverage in a homeowners, renters, condo or car policy. It will also cover you for things including libel and slander.

For about \$150 to \$300 per year, you can buy a \$1 million personal umbrella liability policy. The next million will cost about \$75, and \$50 for every million dollars after that.

Because the personal umbrella policy goes into effect after the underlying coverage is exhausted, there are certain limits that usually must be met to purchase this coverage. Most insurers will want you to have about \$250,000 of liability insurance on your car policy and \$300,000 of liability insurance on your homeowners policy before selling you an umbrella liability policy for \$1 million of additional coverage.

The umbrella liability policy gets its name from the concept that this policy comes down on top of your other policies, and "covers" them (and subsequently, you!). Umbrella insurance is "over-andabove" coverage. An umbrella policy doesn't replace your homeowners or car insurance, but it extends them to cover liability claims in excess of the amount your "underlying" policies cover.

No one plans on having a bad accident, and we certainly hope you don't,

but in today's society, the amount that you could be sued for can easily run into the millions.

If you own a pool, a trampoline or a dog, experts say you absolutely need umbrella insurance. If you own an edgy cat, collect guns, have a child who plays football, or tend to bump into things in the supermarket parking lot, you need umbrella insurance also.

Another benefit of an umbrella liability policy is that a good policy can actually provide you coverage for things that you don't have coverage for elsewhere. If you ever rent a Jet Ski or boat while on vacation, or borrow your neighbor's scooter for a spin around the neighborhood, then you will benefit from knowing that often your umbrella policy can provide coverage for these exposures also.

When an individual decides to sue you after slipping on your sidewalk, being bitten by your shepherd, getting in the way of your ninth hole tee shot, or being sideswiped by your Suburban, their attorney will look for "deep pockets." Your assets, your earnings and even your future earnings potential will be closely scrutinized.

If you own a home in Southern California, a sailboat, a chunk of Google stock, or just hold a degree, you are well worth going after. The attorney will try to get the lion's share of the settlement from other players, perhaps the crew who put down the sidewalk or the golf course's architect, but he still will try to shake a few bucks loose from you. And while these dollars might not mean much in terms of the overall settlement, to you they could mean the loss of your home, your savings and part of a paycheck for years to come.

Umbrella liability policies generally are written in increments of \$1 million, and are surprisingly affordable. Some policies cover legal expenses, and some do not. Ask, and be sure to cover legal expenses if you can, as they can be exorbitant. Every policy has exclusions; read them carefully because they can put large holes in your safety net. If damage caused by certain breeds of dog is not covered, for instance, and you own that dog, then that policy is not for you.

They are a chance for the whole family to look at the sun, moon, visible planets and other objects, to try out a variety of telescopes, and to talk to knowledgeable amateur astronomers about the sky and their equipment.

Why LACERS Invests **In Real Estate**

From time to time I like to give you background on how your retirement plan works. This month's topic is real estate, one of the important components of the investments that support your pension.

To ensure that we will always have enough money to support the pension and health benefits, LACERS diversifies using carefully thought-out plans to spread investments among different asset classes. The plan uses asset allocation to diversify into stocks, bonds, real estate and alternative investments, since the ups and downs (volatility) of each class tends to be on a different cycle. That is, when stocks are going down, other classes such as bonds or real estate may be going up or holding their value.

LACERS not only diversifies to invest five percent of its total assets into real estate, but it also makes diversified investments inside of the real estate portfolio. It would be unwise, for instance, to put all of the plan's money in a shopping center in Portland, Ore., when any number of unforeseen events could cause that investment to lose value. The old adage, "Don't put all your eggs in one basket," certainly applies. Instead, LACERS diversifies its investments several ways: ■ By style (comparatively low

risk core properties along with more volatile, but higher returning strategies called value added [medium risk] and opportunistic [higher risk])

- By geography (United States: east, south, Midwest, west, as well as international).
- By property type (apartment, office, industrial, retail, hotel and other).

LACERS' newly hired real estate consultant, the Townsend Group, just gave a report to the Board on our performance compared to two benchmarks used in the industry to measure how we are doing; our performance was very good. Here are the returns over the following time periods: ■ One year: 12.2 percent;

- Three years: 11.9 percent; and
- Five years: 3.3 percent.

The multi-year totals are the average return per year over the time period.

> Between 2010 and 2013, 17 states enacted legislation that reduced, suspended or eliminated COLAs for current workers and often for current retirees. New Jersey, Rhode Island and Oklahoma essentially eliminated the COLA for the foreseeable future (Wall Street Journal). Eight other states (Colorado, Florida, Illinois, Minnesota, Montana,

New Mexico, Ohio and South Dakota) either reduced or temporarily suspended the guarantee or shifted to a CPI-Linked COLA. Of the 17 states that reduced their COLA, 12 have been challenged in court. The courts have ruled in nine states, and in all but one case, the cuts have been upheld. In summary, the Wall Street Journal article noted that COLAs are not considered to be a contractual right in most of these states. COLAs are viewed very differently than core benefits.



attended a great meeting with more than 300 members enjoying the camaraderie of fellow workers and the great barbequed food prepared by the Rattler's Barbeque restaurant (it was so good it almost melts in your mouth). This took place after the meeting, when Fire and Police Pensions General Manager Ray Ciranna presented a superb report on the status of our Fire and Police Pension System.

Ray really got the members attention when he started with the announcement that our pension fund is the highest it has ever been at more than \$18 billion. This was an increase of more than \$2 bil-

lion since June 30, 2013, with a 13.1 percent return on the fund's investments. Wow, what a great achievement of Chief Investment Officer Tom Lopez and his team.

The system is only 83.1 percent funded, but funding should be on the rise if we continue to make double-digit returns on our investments. Combining all of the active personal, retirees and dependent children and parents makes a grand total more than 25,780 members served by the Pension Department. And, to pay for all of the benefits our members receive will cost \$1.16 billion in the fiscal year, 2014-15. These items were just a few of the highlights presented by Ray before he answered many questions from the floor.

The nominating committee made recommendations for Officers and four Directors for the coming year, then opened nominations from the floor. There were no nominations from the floor. The Committee's recommendations are President Paul Enox; Vice President Bob Olsen; Secretary Will Gartland; Treasurer Jimmy Hill; and Directors Ken Buzzell, Jim Chastain, Ray Case, Art Placencia and Garrett Zimmon. Election of the Offices and Directors will take place at the September meeting.

I look forward to seeing you at the September meeting. We will have another great speaker along with coffee and donuts.

Near the Northern Lights

Hal and Co. enjoy a cruise from London to New York, with plenty of stops.

My wife, Evelyn, and I took a cruise on the Caribbean Princess from London (Southampton) around the British Isles and then crossed the pond to New York City.

The ports were Southampton, Guernsey (Saint Peter Port), Cork (Ireland), Dublin (Ireland), Liverpool (England), Glasgow (Scotland), Belfast (Northern Ireland), Edinburgh (Scotland), Invergordon (Scotland), Le Havre (France), Southampton (England), Bergen (Norway), Shetland Island (United Kingdom), Faroe Island (Denmark), Akureyri (Iceland), Isafjordur (Iceland), Reykjavik (Iceland), Nanortalik (Greenland), St John (Newfoundland, Canada), and New York City. It was two cruises back to back; the first part took 12 days, and part two took 16 days. We departed Aug. 14 and returned Sept. 15.

As we continue the story last Sept. 2, we were at sea with calm waters and overcast skies. The temperature was just below 50 degrees. Before we were to reach Akrueyri, Iceland, we would cross the Arctic Circle.

I found a new drink to enjoy. I always order a Jack Daniel's on the rocks, which

cost \$6.95. A server in the bar told me to order a JD Manhattan, but hold the sweet vermouth and the sherry, and put it in a glass with ice. It cost \$7.95, but you get a double shot of JD. *Hal then shared this important information with most of the staff on the ship. At first they didn't understand, but then we got an* "ah-Ha!" look. – Evelyn

Evelyn went shopping on board the ship at a sale, which was like Filine's Basement or Ohrbach's, if you remember either of them. The ship wasn't scheduled to be in this area again until the summer of 2014, so

everything left over from any port between the Mediterranean and Greenland they needed to get rid of. It was really not worth the time or energy unless you wanted a hat or T-shirt indicating someplace you had not been. She came back empty-handed.

We were invited to visit the bridge; we have done this on our last three cruises. We met our group in the lobby just outside the bridge area. There were 12 people, more then we have had before on a bridge tour on other ships. Usually they take only four people. The Officer of the Watch described various equipment. The bridge is wider across than the width of the rest of the ship. There are always two spotters and two officers on a four-hour watch. Things are done as automatically as possible. This was the first time we had been to the bridge without meeting the captain. Anyway it was still an interesting experience, and we enjoyed it. the Port of Akrueyri, Iceland. We were looking forward to the sail into Akrueyri harbor because it was up a very beautiful fjord, and I suspected the scenery would be outstanding. Iceland is about the size of Virginia, with a population of just over 300,000.

We docked at 7 a.m. We didn't have any tours booked, and we left the ship around 9 a.m. It was only a short walk to the center of town. We stopped at the information center and booked an afternoon tour to the Godafoss Waterfall. Godafoss translates to "falls of the gods." It

was a two-and-a-half-hour tour and the cost was \$80 each. The ship charged \$109 for the same tour, and a taxi would do the same for \$160 US, which works if you have four people. Akureyri has a population of 18,000 and is called the capital of north Iceland. There were no indigenous people when the Norwegians first sailed, around 900 AD, to Iceland, probably by accident. They found

so we were able to start the tour. The drive to the falls took about 40 minutes. The ride was through rolling hills and small mountains. It snowed last night and the mountains were covered in white. As I said, the falls are called "the falls of the gods" because this was where the ruler of Iceland made a choice in 1000 AD to choose Christianity over paganism. The falls were impressive, but they were not Niagara. Due to the delay in leaving

a green and temperate land, warmed by the gulf current, although they didn't know that at the time.

We spent about two hours walking around the town, buying souvenirs and such. Iceland is not cheap and may be more expensive then Bergen. The weather when we left the ship was about 45 degrees, sunny with no wind. It was pleasant to walk around. On our way back to the ship, the winds picked up, making it feel a lot colder. We brought heavy coats and gloves, so we were toasty.

We saw a group of preschoolers crossing a street with their teachers, and all of them wore child-sized neon-colored safety vests. Even the adults did; they looked so cute. And it is a good idea. because of the number of people on the tour, the tour company brought coffee and cake at the cafe for us, and they offered the woman who gave up her seat a different tour for the afternoon. On the way back to the ship we had a photo stop overlooking the bay. The area is very big in agriculture, sheep, and thermal energy.

Back aboard, we set sail for Isafjordur, and sailing out of the fjord was picturesque.

We had dinner with the bridge director and his wife and a couple from Connecticut. Everyone had interesting stories, and it made stuff as much as you can into a paper-thin bag and the crew will wash it for \$20. We will never have to do that again on Princess because, on our next cruise, we will have Elite status and have free laundry. *Hal can't wait. – Evelyn*

We get a lot of perks from Princess because of their loyalty program. Like the airlines, cruise lines want you to choose them for your travels. By picking one cruise line you get the benefit of the loyalty program faster than if you spread your cruising around.

Isafjordur is the municipal center of the West Fjords peninsula. It is one of the least-populated and oldest inhabited areas of Iceland. The population of Isafjordur is about 1,300.

We decided to have breakfast in the dining room, but there was a long line so we ended up in Sabatini's instead. I still wanted to try the dining room to compare with the breakfast in the buffet.

With our tender passes, we didn't have to wait in line to go ashore. The walk from the dock to the information center is about a half-mile. We picked up a map, but I don't think we could have gotten lost. The town center is about two streets, four or five blocks long. We managed to find a magnet with the town name on it.

It is a fishing village, and we saw them icing down the fish for shipment. We went into the supermarket to check out the local prices. It was more expensive here, but most everything is imported. We spent around two hours, which was more than enough. The weather in Isafjordur was cool, 50-plus degrees with no wind and mostly sunny. We needed just a warm coat.

We hoped to see the Northern Lights. We talked to someone who was able to see them the night before from the ship from 10 to 11 p.m.

Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, started that night, and there was going to be services with a rabbi, which we would attend. The service was nice, not too short or long. There were about 40 people in attendance. The rabbi was from Israel, but was American.

We had dinner in the buffet to try it out. It was good, but the dining room feels better.

The next day we were scheduled to visit

After lunch, we met the tour and found out they had overbooked by one person. Luckily one lady gave up her seat,

The next morning, we awoke to the sound of the tenders being lowered for

our visit to Isafjordur, Iceland. The sound would wake the dead.


That day was \$20 laundry day – you It was probably due to the portions and the presentation.



Meiji Shrine: Vacation Edition



Yoyogi Park sprawls out over nearly 175 acres and is one of the largest parks in Tokyo, Japan. It houses the Meiji Memorial Picture Gallery, the National Stadium, the Meiji Memorial Hall which is now

used for Shinto Weddings and the Meiji Shrine. I paid this park a visit recently but my day was spent almost entirely at the Shrine.

Construction began on the shrine in 1915 and was finished in 1926. It was dedicated to the Emperor Meiji and Empress Shoken. The area is covered with nearly 365 different species of trees which were donated from all parts of Japan when the shrine was established. The original building was destroyed in WWII and what you see now was completed in 1958 through a public fund raising effort.

Passing through the first great Torii gate takes you a leisurely walk on a wide path, through the next Torii gate and on to the shrine complex. We were lucky enough to have a guide on hand to explain what we were seeing, offering up tidbits on history, the finer points of Shinto religion and the general care of this historic property.

It was a calm, wonderful experience and if you are ever in Tokyo, take the train to Harajuku Station to visit this lovely space.

In a memo to staff, Airports Executive Director Gina Marie Lindsey wrote: "His stellar perfor-



Which way to go, Oak Grove or Mathis Canyon Trail?

Hello everyone!

This month we travel south into Orange County to Laguna Beach. There are two places you should stop and explore. The first is Alta Laguna Park, and the second is Top of the World Park. Both these parks are in Laguna Beach because... I'm kidding you. They are two names for the same park!

There are amazing views and lots of trails to choose from. These are must-see locations.

(Some trivia: The park is named Top of the World Park because it's about a thousand feet above sea level.)

Let's begin!

The Hike: The park is very nice, immediately giving you views everywhere you look. It's a true 360-degree view! The sea breeze is nice, too. Here are two trail options:

Trail Option 1: Starting at the Alta Laguna Park, you can travel across the top of the mountain ridge on West Ridge Road until you reach Wood Canyon Trail, then turn back, and that should be about three miles. That is the easy route.

Trail Option 2: Go down one of the trails at the end of West Ridge Road. However, if you choose to go down one of the trails, you will be adding another four miles, so you will be hiking at least seven miles or more. That is what I did, but I forgot to tell my family. I was not their favorite person, to say the least!

Also, if you hike the extra miles, of course you will add more hiking time. We were out in the sun for almost four hours. The good news is that we survived (!), and my tracking app

okay. You could get yourself in deep trouble. Overall, this is a gorgeous place to hike with all the amazing views!

Finally, and this is very important: Beware of the wildlife in the area. Warning signs are posted.

I recommend you hike at least the three-mile ridge-top trail. It is easy walking for all ages. If you want to go farther, please bring extra water, and start early in the day. If you happen to go in the early morning, take some photos with your Alive! newspaper and email them to me at agomez@cityemployeesclub.com. Bring plenty of water snacks and maybe spend a little time just walking and enjoying the scenery.

About

The Cadet Program offers youths an opportunity to develop skills that will help them throughout their lives, while working with one of the finest law enforcement agencies in the country. The program is offered at each of the 21 community police stations across the City, as well as at two specialized divisions – Metropolitan Division and Communications Division.

Cadets are as diverse as the City they represent. Each comes from different backgrounds and has different goals and paths that they are following to get there. However, all Cadets display a desire to achieve excellence within their own lives and to then leverage those achievements to positively impact the community where they live.

But before someone can begin experiencing the benefits of being a Cadet, they must first meet the eligibility requirements and go through the Cadet Academy as a recruit.

Mission

The LAPD Cadet Program has four principal goals:

- To recruit young men and women interested in building positive relationships between police and the youths of our communities.
- To provide a forum in which young people can provide community service while working with law enforcement.
- To provide character training, public speaking and academic instruction that prepares young people for their future.
- To offer physical training that will result in improved physical fitness for all who participate in the program.

Eligibility

Cadets must meet the following condi-

Between 13 and 20 years of age

- Doing well in school
- Have no record of serious arrests or convictions
- Maintain good moral character
- Present a written recommendation from a teacher, faith leader or other responsible adult who is not a relative.
- Obtain a medical examination (to qualify for insurance)
- Attend and graduate from the Cadet Academy
- Demonstrate a willingness to serve the community and participate in Cadet activities.

United States citizenship is not a requirement to participate in any of the LAPD youth programs.





DWP Landscaping is replacing its thirsty lawns with beautiful designs that save water.

The DWP has long had a landscape crew to manage the foliage on its properties, but two droughts – first in the late 1980s and early 1990s, and the now – have changed how the department uses water on its own sites.

In October 2012, the beginning of the current drought, one of historic proportions, a major shift took place, and the department created the Landscape Capital division, which does more than just tend to the grass and flowers – it redesigns to replace all the water-thirsty plants with smarter elements, both plants

and hardscapes.

The DWP's Landscape Capital division is run by Carlos Gomez, Construction and Maintenance Superintendent for Field Operations, Support Services Division, and Charlie Kagan, Sr. Park Maintenance Supervisor.

"We saw a need to convert some of our high maintenance and water consuming facilities into more water-friendly and less maintenance-usage facilities," Carlos says. "We asked for volunteers from our Landscape Operations crew while informing crew members that they would be performing other task besides lawn and plant care. They would be using equipment such as ditch witches, compactors and the skid-steer while learning about irrigation installation.

"It is vital that our crews take into account the area where the



project is located, as some plants that thrive near the coast would not be a good choice in the North San Fernando Valley."

In this feature, Carlos and Charlie describe how they go about redesigning the DWP's lawns, and how the results are helping the City to save water at a critical time.

To Plant, and to Educate

On June 11, Club Vice President of Operations Robert Larios and Alive! editor John Burnes sat down with DWP Landscaping's Carlos Gomez, Construction and Maintenance Superintendent, Operational Support Services Division, Field Operations, 30 years of City service; and Charles Kagan, Sr. Park Maintenance Supervisor, 27 years. The interview took place at the department's Vose Street Yard in North Hollywood.

First, tell us your paths to get to your current positions.

CHARLES KAGAN: I first started in Recreation and Parks, working in golf, and I moved up to Public Works/ Street Services in the Landscape Division. Then I was promoted over here to Water and Power/vector control, and then moved up to Senior Park Maintenance Supervisor in the landscape section.

Great. Carlos?

CARLOS A. GOMEZ: I started back in 1984 as a Maintenance and Construction Helper at Castaic Power Plant. In '99 I was promoted to Building Repairer, and in 2000 to a Labor Supervisor with ISS Construction. In 2007 I became a Construction Maintenance Supervisor, and this year I became Superintendent for Facility Maintenance.

Carlos, what is the function of the DWP Landscaping Department? What does the department do?

CARLOS: We have more than 150 facilities that we have to maintain, from Boulder City, Nev., to the Eastern Sierras – our Bishop facility, Independence, Lone Pine and Big Pine. We also have outlying facilities like Castaic Power Plant, Power Plants 1 and 2, then all the areas in the San Fernando and L.A. metro region.

One of our main objectives is to give all our internal customers the facilities that best represent the Department of Water and Power. By that, I mean, let's make them showplaces, while at the same time reducing maintenance and water

consumption, which we are doing at this time.

It's not just for looks. You're being very environmentally friendly.

CARLOS: That is a very true. Over the last year and a half we started a capital division here within our landscape division. Their primary goal is to convert a lot of the facilities that are high-water-consuming and convert them to be more water-friendly. We're going in there, removing all the sod, the plants and anything that consumes lots of water. We're using decomposed granite, different types of mulch and soils, and putting in water-friendly plants.

CHARLES: Carlos has said it right. We're using different-colored rocks, materials and various drought-resistant plants to be maintenance-, environmentally-, and water-friendly.

The Design Process

You're not just installing these, but you're designing them, too, right? Talk about the design process.

CHARLES: Sure. We are going from water-consuming facilities that have lots of turf, to Californiafriendly native plants. We use different concepts such as Mediterranean, arid, or a combination of both, depending on where the locations are. There's no cookie-cutter design. Each station has its own natural look, depending upon the layout. We basically look at the facility, start designing it, and retrofit the irrigation system to low water usage. We do designs that fit the community. This is evident as we have received positive feedback from the ratepayers we serve.

Our designs basically come together as a group effort. We take everyone's input. We'll come up with a rough design concept, brainstorm it with everybody, lay it out, and make sure the community and management are happy, so everyone's on board.

Once everyone is on board, the project goes full steam ahead, as we like to get in and out of the neighborhood as to cause the least amount of inconvenience to the neighbors.

Tell us a little bit more about the community. What is their reaction to a project once it's finished?

CHARLES: Our most recent project was Distribution Station DS-91 up in Tarzana/ Encino. It had 9,000

> square feet of sod, plants and other materials that required removal.

g feedback, we modified our design and moved forward.
 We've gone from a facility that consumed lots of water, to a facility that uses minimal water. It uses decomposed granite, volcanic rock, California crushed gold rock, and includes succulents, and drought-tolerant
 California-friendly plants.
 CARLOS: It's not something we throw together

overnight. Projects such as DS-91 had a lot of lush green area. We did not want to put a lot of decomposed granite and walk away, as this would not look good – the neighborhood has a tropical look. DWP held meetings with the community. We illustrated our proposed drawings, keeping in mind the budget allocated for this project. We always want to give DWP and our valued ratepayers the biggest bang for their buck. We discussed the project with our in-house architect, Agvani Sargsyan, as she assists with our landscape designs. Once the design was agreed upon by all, including the community, we moved forward to complete this project in a timely manner. Our goal was met as the facility now saves thousands of gallons of water and requires less maintenance.

Precious Resources

Saving water and maintenance costs is what it's all about.

CARLOS: Like everybody else in the City, we've been hit with budget cutbacks. If we can take a facility like DS-91 that requires 10 hours a week for maintenance, and cut it down to where it uses two or three hours, that's a big plus for Water and Power.

Is there any sort of number that tells how much water is being saved at these locations?

CHARLES: Yes, there's data. The type of sprinkler head tells you how many gallons per minute it puts out. We do the math – gallons per minute, gallons per day, gallons per month. When we retrofit the system with the new heads, it's the same process again. The newer heads use a lot less water. I would say it's roughly a 70 percent savings of water.

CARLOS: We're in a historic drought right now. If we go back in time, we all remember Southern California as having ample water; everybody wanted everything lush and green. As time has moved forward, we understand here at the DWP that we need to be the trailblazers in showing the public that we should be getting rid of all these lush green lawns and replace them with items including crushed rock, water-friendly native plants, and low water-consuming irrigation systems.

The big thing I see is that we are the example; we are the ones who say, look at what you can do. We're presenting to the public all the ideas. We are putting plant names on placards at each station so the general public can identify the plants that work in that neighborhood.

Models for the Public

You touched a little bit about what people are doing with their lawns and their gardens now. What's your advice to them? What should they be growing or designing?

CHARLES: They can look at the Department facilities.



CARLOS: We strongly recommend that they get rid of their lush green lawns and go to more drought-tolerant landscaping. The DWP is offering rebates; you have to be pre-approved from the department first. [See related story.]

CHARLES: The public can still make their house look tropical. There are different ways of doing it. They don't have to go with all California natives or California-friendlies, but they can mix and match their plants with a nice design and conserve water. That's the main point - they can remove a lawn and conserve water and still have a nice-looking house

CARLOS: That's the same message we're trying to convey when we revamp the distribution stations. It looks gorgeous out there. In some places, they can save up to 70 percent of their water bill, if not more.

I know Charlie and I agree on this - we both strongly encourage people to take advantage of the Department's rebate program as California faces a record drought.

An Education Mission

Has anybody been doing it? Have you noticed any shifting in the community, even small beginnings, anything like that?

CARLOS: In some of the areas where we've revamped these distribution stations, we have driven around and noticed changing landscapes. DS-91 was a perfect example - a lot of the public was coming up to our crews and asking us, "Hey, what kind of plants are these? Can you give us the name of that gravel?" They're helping themselves because they're going to see a major savings in their water bill.

You have more than just a landscaping function. You have an educational mission, too,

CARLOS: That would be very accurate.

CHARLES: It's very accurate, because we've had people come up to us and want us to help them. We have given them advice on the type of plants, irrigation systems and aggregates they can use. We've noticed some community members changing their landscapes.

CARLOS: Not only are we giving ideas, but Water and Power also offers free classes to the customers to attend to learn about the projects and get ideas on what they can do. That information is on the Website.

What do you wish people knew about what you and your crew do?

CHARLES: The crews work really hard and take tremendous pride in the work they perform daily. They are smart and give their heart and soul to the job they perform.

CARLOS: I'll tell you what: I would put any one of the crews I oversee against anybody in private industry. That's how proud and sure I am that they would hold their own, because they are a very hardworking staff here at the DWP.

What comments do you get from the good work that you're doing?

CHARLES: At each of the stations we have converted, the community has praised the work that the DWP has performed.

CARLOS: At DS-28, with all the dog lovers in that area- they just praised the heck out of the department, as we made it "doggie friendly".

CHARLES: It's all been positive. The crews take tremendous pride in the work they perform.

CARLOS: We're both adamant that if people come up and ask our crews questions, we want our crews to take the time and answer the questions for the public, because it's in our best interest. We want them to know what plants we recommend. In the long run it's going to help the department save money, and it also gives us a positive image in the community. These guys are the frontline people. These guys are the first thing that the public sees. The customer drives by, sees a facility and says, "Wow, that looks beautiful." If it doesn't look beautiful, we get the worst effect; that is, "What the heck are these people doing out there?" That's what we don't want. We want everybody to think extremely positively of the DWP.

CHARLES: We get good feedback, and people comment on the design and nature of the project. It's really interesting how they pick up on the small details that we take for granted

because we've done it so often. "Hey, you left the regular shrubs there. You didn't rip out everything." And we explain to them that, "You could do that at your house, too. You don't have to demo your whole yard. You just do areas of it to make it drought tolerant or California friendly," because there are shrubs and trees that you don't have to touch; you just work around the main structures and the framework of the station or the facility to make it look good and blend in with the community.

What about your support staff?

CARLOS: People don't get to see one group that makes us all function and that doesn't get the recognition they deserve, and that's our support staff - our clerical staff, our people behind the scenes. Yes, our crews are out there doing the landscape operations, and the general public sees them. But if it weren't for our support staff securing the contracts for plants and materials, our capital projects wouldn't be finished in a timely manner.

CHARLES: They make things click really quickly. It's teamwork.

CARLOS: That's exactly what I was going to sav!

CHARLES: They're an integral part of our work.

CARLOS: Without them we fail. It's as simple as that.

Our first project, DS-86, probably took us four to five months to complete because the support wasn't in place. Now we go to a place like DS–91, where our support staff has put the contracts in place - we just pick up the phone; the contracts are all in place; the materials, the plants, and everything else arrives; and our crews can focus just on their job of changing out the old and putting in the new. I think our support staff is too often forgotten.

We'll include them, for sure.

CARLOS: Great. And on a side note, I think the newspaper you guys put together is awesome. I personally enjoy reading the articles.

Thanks. And thanks for the tour and interview today, too.

CARLOS: Thank you.



Get Paid to Redo Your Lawn

DWP offers incentive program. You must apply online first.

You could be paid to convert your grassy lawn to a droughtresistant mix. And the amount has just been raised.

DWP launched its Landscape Incentive Program in 2009, which involves replacing turf grass with Californiafriendly plants, mulch and permeable pathways. Since turf grass is very expensive to maintain, requiring heavy water use and lots of attention, the California-friendly Landscape Incentive Program can save you money and, more importantly, save water for both residential and commercial customers.

Application pre-approval is required before starting any landscape project.

Since May, the single family residential program now pays \$3 per square foot of healthy, green grass removed and converted to drought-tolerant landscaping.



The team, plus additional resources inside and outside the DWP, officially opened the new garden last November.


Aqueduct Centennial Garden features:

The Centennial Garden around the time of its dedication last November





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





Getting LA Back 2 Work

Unique City program is helping those laid off to find new jobs.

With funding from the United States Government, the City's Economic and Workforce Development Dept. has launched the second year of its Getting LA Back 2 Work program, which accepts employees laid off from certain organizations (including the City of LA) and retrains them to better find work.

The program is funded by a \$17 million National Emergency Grant under the Department of Labor. This grant targets displaced workers from specific public agencies and private companies identified from the Department of Labor. The grant provides qualified displaced workers with up to \$7,500 in training and placement support.

The City is partnering with 18 WorkSource Centers located throughout Los Angeles. The goal is to identify 2,000 dislocated workers and get them enrolled, trained and placed in jobs.

"We want to urge everyone qualified for this grant to take advantage of all the funding and services available to them, especially the \$10,000 in free training to help them become more skilled and marketable to reenter the workforce," says Scott Lee, Program Director. "Our ultimate goal is 'Getting LA Back 2 Work.""

The specialized training includes: assessment (basic skills, career and vocational aptitude); customized training; employment preparation (résumé and interview skills); job/paid internship placement assistance; vocational training; on-the-job training; and supportive services (bus tokens, work clothes, tools, child care etc.).

To qualify for this program, you must:

- Have been laid off from one of the listed employers (see the Website for the complete list)
- Have a valid California drivers license and Social Security card or a valid U.S. passport
- Have unemployment insurance documentation and a lay-off notice, if applicable, and
- Be registered with available Selective Service (for men only).

The program predicts that new jobs could be coming in the following industries: healthcare, advance manufacturing (i.e., biotech, high-tech manufacturing), logistics, hospitality, construction, entertainment and fashion.

"On its face, the concept is a good one," says Jan Perry, General Manager, Economic/ Workforce Development, Club Member. "We need to be much more aggressive in expanding our universe of contacts. That requires intelligent outreach and effective use of social media. To that end you will see a deeper collaboration from our Department with stakeholders and partners to help Get LA Back 2 Work."

City Layoffs

If you know of anyone who has been laid off from the City of Los Angeles from April 2010 to present, they may qualify for a Department of Labor grant up to \$10,000 in free training. They may qualify if they are 1) still unemployed; or 2) returned to work but suffered a loss in wages.



Making Sense of Your Deductions

The City Employees Club offers you a multitude of options when it comes to billing, including payroll and pension deductions. The benefit of automatic deductions from your paycheck offers the convenience of not having to write and mail a check every month. What happens when you accrue so many deductions that you've forgotten what you've signed up for? For starters, you can contact the City Flex office or DWP benefits office for clarification.

It is important to familiarize yourself with your deductions and what those acronyms represent on your paystub. For example, if you have insurance with the City Employees Club, you will see a deduction code of "LACEA 41." You are always welcome to contact us for clarification of your benefits and request a statement. The benefit statement will include a breakdown of your benefit coverage and monthly premiums. It is a good idea to do this as often as you receive a paystub or at minimum on a quarterly basis to assess sufficient coverage and protection for you and your family.

One of the issues I face every week is a lapse in coverage without the member's knowledge. This can be avoided by periodically checking your benefits. If we catch it in a timely manner, typically within 60 days, we can reinstate benefits. Unfortunately, when the benefits have lapsed and exceeded the 60 days allowed, the plan will cancel permanently. To obtain your benefits again, you will have to reapply and be subjected to medical underwriting. Going through medical underwriting is an evaluation of risk taken by the insurance carrier. The carrier has the right to decline coverage if there has been debilitating changes to your health, and you will not be able to attain the benefits you once had. If your benefits are important to you, it behooves you to keep an eye on your deductions, especially if there has been a recent change in family or employment status.

Have you agreed to payroll deductions but wonder why you received a bill from

the Club? If you are out on leave, disability, have retired or transferred to another DWP or City department, you will experience a lapse in your deductions. You will have to contact each organization with which you have benefits (including the Club) to ensure appropriate billing. Also, if you recently made changes to your deductions, it will not reflect on your paystub until four to six weeks later. So, to avoid

a lapse in your coverage, please make sure you follow up with our billing department if you are out on leave or have transferred.



BEEF ENCHILADAS

Enchiladas are a specialty dish in Mexico. There are a variety of simple and complicated ways to make them. For instance, the enchilada sauce can be made from scratch and may take many hours of simmering before it is ready for drizzling over the tortillas. Some may even go as far as hand-making the tortillas for the most authentic of flavors.

However, I have put together a simpler recipe that holds the flavors very well. Feel free to substitute the ground beef for chicken, shrimp or fish. Just remember to cook them as the instructions suggest. *iBuen provecho!*

Beef Enchiladas

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1 medium white onion, finely chopped
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1 to 2 15-oz, cans red enchilada sauce
- 5 to 7 medium flour tortillas
- 2 cups shredded Monterey jack cheese
- 1 2.25-oz. can sliced black olives
- 1/4 cup cilantro
- Sea salt and pepper to taste



Substitute the Monterey jack cheese with cheddar cheese or a Mexican cheese that melts well. You may also substitute the ground beef for chicken, shrimp or fish.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Finely chop the white onion, mince the garlic, and shred the cheese. Cook the onions on medium in a skillet and add the ground beef as well. Season with sea salt and freshly cracked pepper. Stir until browned.

Add the cooked onion, garlic and ground beef to the flour tortillas. Sprinkle the shredded cheese over the ground beef and roll the tortillas tightly.

Add some enchilada sauce to 2 the bottom of a baking pan or aluminum lasagna pan and place the rolled tortillas with seam down. This will help prevent them from sticking to the bottom. Add the rest of the enchilada sauce evenly over the top of the rolled tortillas. Add the rest of the cheese and sprinkle the sliced black olives over the top.
