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

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

Hello again, everyone!

This month we travel to a historic state park in Whittier, about 15 miles southeast of Los Angeles. The park is about five acres in size, and it contains a home that's a 19th century adobe ranch house. The home was owned by Pio de Jesus Pico IV, twice governor of Alta California under Mexican rule. This historic park has a home, a garden and horse stables, and is rich with California history.

#### Let's begin.

Be Alive. Feb. 2018

The Walk: When you arrive you will see a spacious green field protected by a gated enclosure; front and center is the Pio Pico House. There is a walkway up to the house, and off to the side is a garden. This is an easy and very enjoyable walk.

The park is very simple but has lots of history. The landowner was Pio de Jesus Pico IV; he was born in 1801. Pio Pico was a father, businessman, revolutionary, cattle rancher, politician and part owner of 532,000 acres in Southern California. He lived until 1894 and he was the last governor of "Mexican California."

Thanks to the Volunteers: Pio Pico State Historic Park has been slated for closure twice but has remained open because of the efforts of many volunteers. Pio Pico Park was one of the 48 California state parks proposed for closure; if it were not for the Friends of Pio Pico and the City of Whittier together raising \$80,000, the Pio Pico Park would have been forced to close its doors. This is an amazing part of history, and we can make a difference. Please visit our state parks, and consider donating some time and you will get such a rewarding feeling.



# **Private Equity Report: Diversification Is Key**



It has been more than a year since I reported to you on one of our investment asset classes that is very important to funding our LACERS pension: private equity.

Private equity investments are long-term investments that carry a higher risk of volatility (prices going up and down), but also the promise of much higher returns than other investments. The old adage certainly applies here: There is no free lunch in investing.

LACERS has set a target of a 12 percent allocation to private equity, and as of our most recent report, 10.3 percent of the total LACERS fund was committed to this asset class representing about \$1.6 billion.

A key to a successful program in this field is diversification. Wouldn't it be great to know exactly what investment would be guaranteed to outperform other investments? Well, no one has figured out how to be right on each choice, so the only sensible route is to diversify.

In private equity we diversify using several factors:

 Vintage years (we make purchases each year since some years will end up being much better than others). of diversifying our investments and getting high returns. 86 percent of the funds go to private companies, while the other 14 percent is invested in the public markets.

LACERS' investments are in various strategies, but the most popular is buyout. In a buyout, investors purchase a struggling company, install new management, run the business and later sell it either as a public company or a private firm. There are also other strategies, but 55 percent of our total private equity portfolio is going to buyout funds. Venture capital, the next most popular sector, is currently receiving 15 percent of our investments.

LACERS returns for the 1-, 3-, 5- and 10-year period lagged the benchmark for those periods, but exceeded the benchmark for inception to date, with an 11 percent return. The inception date for our current private equity manager, Portfolio Advisors, is January 2014.

Here are the private equity returns (yearly annualized):

- 1 year: 15.7 percent
- 3 years: 8.4 percent
- 5 years: 12.5 percent
- 10 years: 8.5 percent

These are very good returns on private equity, but the underperformance compared to the benchmark (a broad based US stock index plus 3 percent) should

- Geography (78 percent US investments and 22 percent international).
- Sectors (different types of investment strategies).

Legislative Report: Pension Law and Policy, By Michael Karsch

We're not too old to run for office! In New Jersey two months ago, a retiree at the age of 93 won the local election for mayor of Tinton Falls by 53 percent of the vote against the incumbent! (California City News.org). Maybe the rest of New Jersey (and beyond) could benefit from considering the potential of the more seasoned, more experienced people in our communities to run for office. The Trenton Falls mayor will not have to be too personally concerned about pension reform in New Jersey, where his state faces huge pension deficits in the coming decades. Fitch Ratings (as reported by Burypensions Blog in mid-December) reported that states with the highest pension burdens were Illinois (net pension liabilities of \$151.5 billion), New Jersey (\$91.8 billion), Massachusetts (\$48.9 billion), and Kentucky (\$32.8 billion).

The Los Angeles *Daily Journal* newspaper gave us a report by Daniel Grunfeld, who is from Pardee RAND Graduate School, leadership positions in *Continues next page*

two international law firms, deputy chief of staff for policy under former Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa, and president/CEO of Public Counsel. He reports that the pension crisis in California is getting worse and needs major reform. "California leads the nation in pension underfunding." He blames the "inherent dynamics of public-sector contract negotiations in a democracy." The unions demand greater support for retiring government employees, but the unions are loath to use the unions' ultimate tool of a strike (in many cases, it is illegal), so negotiations center more on post-job benefits in the pension system. This leads, Grunfeld explains, to labor agreements compounding over the years into higher and higher unfunded liabilities.

He discusses the efforts at reform, namely the Legislature's and Governor's Pension Reform Act of 2013, and the battle now brewing in litigation in the appeals courts, soon to be decided by the State Supreme Court. As I have written about earlier, the issue is just how far does the "California Rule" go relative to not touching public pensions. The appeal is between the Marin Association of Public Employees et al vs. Marin County Employees Retirement Association

el al. At issue is not only the California Rule but specific issues like pension spiking, what benefits may be counted towards establishing an individual's ultimate pension, the purchase of "air time", etc. Grunfeld cites a Supreme Court case in 1947, Kern vs. City of Long Beach, holding that a pension can be modified, and the pension system should be permitted to make adjustments, in accord with changing conditions and maintaining the integrity of the system.

He also cites the City of San Jose's reform efforts at pension reform for that city that are being challenged by that city's labor unions.

In Colorado (as reported by the Denver Post Dec. 11, 2017), the pension reform proposals center on the issue of cost-of-living increases. The state board recommends lowering the current cap of 2 percent to 1.5 percent. Gov. Hickenlooper supports a lower cap of 1.25 percent, and State Treasurer Stapleton recommends no more COLA increases until the pension system is fully funded. In the years prior to 2010 the retirees had received COLAs of 3.5 percent, but it was lowered to 2 percent in that year.

We flew up on Tuesday morning from LAX to San Francisco International on Southwest Airlines. For short trips they are the best airline, with no baggage charge. Now, if I were planning the trip, I would have flown into Oakland International, one, because it has more Southwest flights; and two, because it is a smaller, less crowded airport that's closer to downtown San Francisco. We stayed at the Andrews Hotel (624 Post St., [800] 926-3739), which is in a great location just two blocks from Union Square. Its small size - just 48 guest rooms - allows the friendly and courteous front desk staff to give you individual attention.

The hotel offers a complimentary Continental breakfast buffet each morning served on each floor, and complimentary coffee and tea in the cozy (small) lobby all day long, along with free Wi-Fi throughout the hotel.

In the evening you can have a complimentary glass of wine at Fino Ristorante & Bar, just off the lobby.

This is how the hotel describes itself: "It was built back in 1905; construction began for the Sultan Turkish Baths, a gentleman's bath and relaxation establishment. It was a

After checking in and getting a quick bite for lunch, we walked around Union Square and the Market Street area. They have done a lot to clean up the area, and there is a lot of high-end shopping. in September; however, another group of paintings from the later period was scheduled to open at the end of September. All of us had been to the d'Orsay, but seeing them again in a close-up showing was great. Evelyn and I were scheduled to go to Napa at the end of September and

We caught a taxi back to Union Square

and the largest Chinese community outside Asia. Since its establishment in the 1840s, it has been highly important and influential in the history and culture of ethnic Chinese immigrants to the United States and North America.

We booked our 10 a.m. tour with Local Taste

of San Francisco which started at the main gate on Grant Street. We met our guide and started our private tour by visiting one of the oldest cathedrals in San Francisco, which survived the 1906 San Francisco earthquake. Next stop was at a music store, where they seemed to have every musical instrument ever made. We stopped to sample some dim sum, which was not very good. We visited a local Buddhist temple, which was very interesting. After a quick stop at a local market, we stopped to watch them make fortune cookies, where they let us put our own fortunes in the cookies. Our last stop was at a teashop, where we tasted at least 15 different types of tea. Except for having to use the bathroom, the experience was good.

Myrna planned for our dinner that evening hope to see the second part of the show. be at the Cliff House (1090 Point Lobos [415] 386-3330), which has been around for vears and is known for its sunset views and is part of the Sutro Historic Landscape District. The first Cliff House was a modest structure, built in 1863 by Sen. John Buckley and C.C. Butler. Perched on spectacular cliffs overlooking the Pacific Ocean, the Cliff House is one of the crown jewels of San Francisco's Golden Gate National Recreation Area, the largest urban park west of the Mississippi River. We had to wait for a table by the window, so we had a drink in the lobby area. The food was just okay, and I was disappointed that the changes made to both the inside and outside of the structure have changed the appearance from a 19th-century building to 20th-century modern. The one attraction we did plan to see was the Birth of Impressionism: Masterpieces From the Musee d'Orsay at the De Young Museum in Golden State Park. The d'Orsay is in Paris and is being renovated. Paris is a sister city to San Francisco, and the almost 100 paintings represented the beginning of the impressionism movement. The current showing ended

Class-A structure, meaning a steel frame that was state of the art for the time. It was a good move on the part of the architects, because some months later, in 1906, the big quake struck the city. Though the fire that followed left its mark, the baths frame was hardly damaged by the earthquake, and repairs didn't take long. The Sultan Baths, which finally opened in 1907, was a full-service affair, with a tiled hot room, a rubbing room, a restaurant, bar, barber, and chiropodist. Bedrooms could be rented as well, and the place had a steamy reputation that didn't arise from the sauna.

"In 1928, the Sultan Baths catered to its last gentleman, and a hotel opened in its place. During the next decades, 624 Post was an office building, a youth hostel, and a number of restaurants (including the China Doll, which had an aquarium spanning most of a wall). In 1981, Harry Andrews acquired the property, renovated it to its original Victorian splendor, and named it after his grandfather, under whose name it flourishes today."

Our room was a petite suite, all of 140

and walked through the Stockton Street Tunnel to go to Fisherman's Wharf. San Francisco is a very hilly city, and normally you would have to climb a hill to get over California Street. But using the tunnel, you can skip the hills. It is about a two-mile walk, and you pass through Chinatown.

We had lunch on Pier 39 where we stopped to watch the seals, and then walked over to Ghirardelli Square for ice cream. The square once had a lot of shops, but is now being converted into a hotel, condominiums and timeshares.

We took the cable car back to Union Square, waited about 45 minutes and paid \$5 to take a very uncomfortable ride with a bunch of smelly tourists.

We had dinner at Fino on the ground floor of the Andrew Hotel adjacent to the lobby. The food was Italian, and overall I give the restaurant a good rating with the exception that it is very noisy.

Thursday was our last full day, and we took a walking tour of Chinatown. It is the oldest Chinatown in North America

We played a little bridge in the afternoon, and for dinner we celebrated Myrna's birthday by eating at Ruth's Chris Steakhouse. The food and service were very good.

In the morning, Evelyn and I decided to go to a breakfast place that was recommended by one of the taxi drivers. Dottie's True Blue Café is a small hole in the wall with about 10 tables and a seven-stool counter. The wait time in the morning is about an hour, but you get to talk to other tourists, and the food is well worth it.

After breakfast, we walked over to Union Square and then back to the hotel where we met up with Don and Myrna. We took a taxi back to the airport to catch our afternoon flight home.

San Francisco is a great short vacation trip, with lots of attractions and very good restaurants.



# When seniors volunteer, it's good for everyone.

"Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed, citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has." – Margaret Mead

As a returned Peace Corps volunteer (Morocco, 1999), I thought I knew a little something about volunteering. For two post-graduate years, I lived in a mud-thatched house with no electricity or running water, to help spread awareness about health and sanitation, in Berber (the native dialect). It was hard, awesome, challenging and amazing, often all at the same time. But it wasn't until I worked for the New York Food Bank that I saw the depths of what volunteering can do within a community. I met dozens of incredible individuals who gave an abundance of their best resources - time, energy and experience - to local soup kitchens and food pantry programs, sometimes seven days a week, to provide hot meals to the underserved. Unlike me, who would have to board an international flight to call it quits from the Peace Corps, these volunteers could decide at any time that they were too tired, too busy or simply no longer emotionally invested in feeding the homeless. But they never did. Rain or shine, they showed up. They changed lives. And in doing so, bettered their own.

So, can "giving of oneself" actually be selfish? Ironically, yes, but this may not be such a bad thing. As a society, we rely heavily on the generosity of strangers. Nonprofits and community organizations depend on volunteers to s-t-r-e-t-c-h limited resources, but research indicates that the return on investment, or ROI. of a volunteer's effort is significant. According to Independent Sector, a coalition of nonprofits for research, organizations gain an average of \$23.07/hour of volunteer time donated. Conversely, studies also show that volunteering provides substantial mental and physical health benefits for those doing the helping. This means that, although no money is exchanged, both the volunteer and the organization can increase in value. This is especially true if said volunteer is provided training, can utilize his or her expertise and past experiences, and is afforded social networking opportunities. By investing in their volunteer's intellectual growth, an



organization becomes stronger and healthier – a true "quid pro quo" where everyone, even bystanders like the community, wins. So while volunteering is generally viewed as altruistic, it can, and perhaps should, be considered as a "what's in it for me?" scenario. Asking what can be personally gleaned from a volunteering opportunity may serve as a catalyst for a more rewarding experience for all parties involved.

Seniors and retirees are uniquely qualified to be exceptional volunteers and to reap the benefits in real time. A lifetime of experience, a flexible schedule and a desire to breathe life back into a hobby or interest, are all helpful tools in a volunteer's toolbox. When seniors work with youths, these multi-generational volunteer groups capitalize on lessons learned and fresh perspectives. From a health standpoint, studies show that senior volunteerism improves longevity and psychological wellness. According to the National Institute on Aging, social, meaningful and productive activities, such as volunteering, may lower the risk of health problems, including dementia and a decline in cognitive health. Additionally, depression and isolation are common but devastating concerns among the aging. According to the Corporation for National and Community Service, volunteerism provides hope in this area by supporting seniors with a viable means to socialize outside the home, enjoy physical activity, and regain a sense of purpose.

# See an Okapi

Zoo welcomes first female okapi calf.

he Los Angeles Zoo welcomes its first-ever female okapi (pronounced oh-KAH-pea) calf born at the Zoo, a unique species often nicknamed the "forest giraffe." The calf was born on Nov. 10 and is the second offspring for mother Opey, 14 years old, and the first for father Jackson, three years old. The couple was paired together as part of an Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) Species Survival Plan (SSP) program to increase the okapi population, which is rapidly declining in the wild. The currently unnamed calf spent the first couple of months behind the scenes bonding with mother and familiarizing herself with her new home and the animal care staff.

Over the last decade, the wild okapi population has dropped, and there are estimated to be between 10,000 and 50,000 left in the wild. There are currently close to 100 okapi in U.S. AZA-accredited facilities.

"There was a time not so long ago when having okapis in a Zoo was extraordinarily rare," said Josh Sisk, Curator of Mammals at the Los Angeles Zoo. "But, due to Species Survival Plan (SSP) programs being so proactive and being able to breed these animals in Zoos, the captive population is doing extremely well."

Guests can now view the female calf and her mother out in their habitat daily, weather permitting. The female calf brings the Zoo's okapi group to four, including mother Opey, father Jackson, and a four-year-old male okapi born in August 2013 named Berani. Berani was the first calf ever born at the L.A. Zoo since okapi were added to the Zoo's collection in 2005



Zoo admission is \$21 for general admission and \$16 for children (ages 2 to 12). No ticket is required for children under age two. Admission for Greater Los Angeles Zoo Association members is free.

# Insurance For El Niño

We are all hoping for lots of rain this winter! We've been fighting this drought for too long, and it would be great to gets lots of water.

Unless that water comes into your living room.

We've had lots of phone calls lately about flood insurance: "What happens if the rain comes rolling in my sliding glass door? Am I covered?"

There is coverage for rain damage, but unless you buy a flood policy, it is quite limited.

Homeowners' policies do not cover damages due to a flood, but they do cover other kinds of water damage. For example, they would generally pay for damage from rain coming through a hole in the roof or a broken window if the hole were caused by strong storm winds. On the other hand, if you have a hidden pipe leaking in your house and over time water damage occurs, that would not be covered.

It pretty much boils down to whether the water damage was caused by a covered peril such as a storm — if the water damage were due to you not keeping your house maintained and repaired, then your insurance would not cover it. If you don't know what water damage is covered, review your home insurance policy or check with your agent now, before any damage occurs.

If sudden water damage occurs to your property, such as with a storm, it is important to dry all wet areas and provide air circulation to aid in the drying process. Also, cover any areas with a tarp to prevent more water damage. Covering, drying and dehumidifying wet areas can help minimize the possibility that mold will accompany water damage. Always contact your insurance agent immediately to start the homeowners' insurance claims process.

# Here's a list of seven possible losses, and whether or not they are covered:

The temperature drops below zero, causing your water pipes to freeze and burst. Your floor is now covered in six inches of water.

Are you covered? Yes, you are covered for water damage from burst pipes, but most policies won't cover you if you've left the house unoccupied and without heat. If that's the case, your claim could be denied because you've failed to perform the necessary upkeep that would prevent the accident.

Water leaks from your backyard pool, ruining your manicured lawn and flooding your living room.

Are you covered? Yes and no — the damages to your living room and your personal property in it are covered, but not the damage to your lawn.

## Your washing machine overflows, flooding the laundry room.

Are you covered? Yes — the extent to which you are covered depends on your insurer's view of the problem: Did you fail to maintain the washer properly, or did sudden, unforeseen damage cause the flood?

#### A sewer backs up, flooding your house.

Are you covered? No — standard policies don't cover it, and many specifically exclude damage from sewer backups. Special endorsements are available, at added cost, for sewers and drains.

#### About United Agencies

During a heavy rainstorm, water leaks through your roof. The roof is damaged, as is furniture.

Are you covered? Yes — while you might not be reimbursed for roof repairs, because that's a house-maintenance issue, the water damage to your home is covered. The damage to your furniture is likely covered if you have the standard H0-3 homeowners' policy, but not if you have the H0-1.

If something more drastic leads to the roof leak (your neighbor's tree falls on the roof, for example), the damage to your roof, home and belongings is covered. (In the tree example, your policy also reimburses you up to a certain amount, usually around \$500, for the cost of removing the tree.)

#### Your bathtub overflows.

Are you covered? Yes, you are even covered if the bathtub overflowed because you forgot to turn off the faucet.

#### A nearby lake or river overflows its banks, causing a flash flood in your living room.

Are you covered? No — flood damage is not covered by homeowners' insurance. You must purchase flood insurance from the federal government. You can purchase flood insurance as long as your community participates in the National Flood Insurance Program.

Fire apparatus is some of the most impressive equipment the City owns. Strong and powerful, these rigs – pumpers, aerials and other assorted vehicles – help keep the City safe.

The men and women Firefighters are not the only heroes – so are the mechanics, carpenters,

This includes the purchase and maintenance of breathing apparatus and oxygen cylinder filling and repair. The apparatus maintenance responsibilities include: the repair and body work of light vehicles, heavy apparatus, and specialized vehicles. The Supply and Maintenance Division



warehouse workers and others who keep these complex rigs on the road, doing their job. This *Alive!* feature takes a look behind the scenes at the division that repairs, maintains and certifies the thousands of trucks, pickups, Suburbans, sedans and

other specialty rigs in the LAFD's vast fleet.

The Supply and Maintenance Division, under

the LAFD's Training and Support Bureau, has the responsibilities for the design, purchase and maintenance of the fire fleet; they also have the responsibility for the purchase of medical supplies, tools, equipment, small engine repair, as well as developing the specifications and purchase of protective gear for members. also handles the logistics of any

large-scale incident warranting a supply and support section. The Purchasing Unit handles any and all purchase orders for all supplies needed to support Fire Stations throughout the City and

supports the grant unit expenditure of allocated grant funds. The Division also has a carpenter shop that repairs ladders, tables, chairs, and any other wood-related project or repair as needed.

For this feature, *Alive!* focuses on the mechanical side of the division – the mechanics and carpenters who keep the department's fleet in tip-top shape. ■

air units at the stations in strategic areas, and then we have field mechanics certified to work on the portable air units. If you have a big incident, they'll bring in a rapid air utility rig to fill the air bottles onsite. Anyway, we maintain those, too.

#### How many vehicles are being repaired here right now?

About 70.

#### Is the Supply and **Maintenance Division** ever involved in an actual emergency?

Sure. We're on scene a lot of times when they request a mechanic. Maybe it's a big incident and they want to make sure all the equipment works. When we had all these fires going on recently, we had a fire mechanic assigned on scene to maintain the vehicle equipment in case they broke down. And if the rigs break down on the road, we're going to be out there on the road. The rigs that come in here usually drive in or they're towed in. But if they won't start or lose a light bar or lose hydraulics or lose charging or whatever out in the field, it doesn't make sense to bring them all the way across town, because our whole issue about supporting the sworn is the response time. I have to get that apparatus back in service as soon as possible so they can continue doing what they need to do. So we have six field mechanics.

#### Are you 24/7?

Our hours here are 6 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. every day. From 3:30 p.m. till six in the morning we're on call, either here or at our facilities in the Valley, City Hall or the Frank Hotchkin Training Facility

#### How often has a truck not gone home?

Usually out of 58 trucks, there are usually a couple a year that we hold back, or we make the repair on the spot.

#### You have a pool of water that you use to test those pressures, etc.

Yes, the test pit engineer has an underground sump. It's basically like a swimming pool underground, and they use that to test the pumping.

All our equipment is sent out every year for calibration before we start the testing process. The aerials are tested from August to December. The pumpers – there are 220 of them approximately-are tested from January to July. We test two a day.

#### **Keeping the Rigs on the Road**

Your mechanical abilities in repairing are obviously really important, but it sounds to me like logistics is just as important figuring out what piece of equipment is where, and when it needs to come in for repairs or inspection – and making sure that everything is moved to where it needs to be, and supplying spare vehicles so that every Fire Station has what it needs, and is never under-equipped. That's a huge job.

#### Yes. We produce a schedule a year in advance. All the

On Jan. 10, Club CEO John Hawkins and Alive! editor John Burnes interviewed Daniel De Leon, Equipment Repair Supervisor, 29 years of service, at the Fire Dept.'s Supply and Maintenance facility in Lincoln Heights. Daniel is one of several repair supervisors at the facility, and in the division.

hanks for the complete tour today, Daniel. We first found out about this amazing facility last year when we were doing a story on **General Services' elevator repair** services - you have several hoists.

Right.

#### Anyway, in your own words give us a broad overview of everything that this facility does.

Sure. We support the Fire Stations and the sworn personnel with the equipment that they wear, the equipment that they use and the apparatus that they drive. We have a triple shop for all the pumpers; we have an aerial shop for the aerial trucks; and we have a light vehicle shop for all the rescue ambulances, plug buggies, Suburbans, sedans ...

#### Plug buggies?

That's what we call a pickup truck. We have the paint shop, so we paint the apparatus here. We have a body shop that makes body shop repairs; and an allied shop, which is composed of the chainsaws, the gurneys, the fire hoses. We repair the fire hose also at the facility here. We have a carpenter shop. Our two carpenters maintain all the ladders on the trucks, and they maintain all the furniture, all the cabinets and all the lockers in the Fire Stations. They also work in conjunction with the maps and drafting in the City. All the Fire Stations have maps of their district, and so we make and install all the frames.

Chief Wade White is the chief of Supply and Maintenance.

#### How would you define how big you are, or how many repairs you complete?

We count the jobs. Today you saw a fire truck here that was getting a new water pump. That's called an in-and-out - they come and go home the same day. Last year, Supply and Maintenance did 5,509 inand-out jobs.

#### Holy cow.

And then there were 653 vehicles changed over, which means extensive repairs that take more than a day. We had 3,604 driver reports, which are field repairs - repairs done in the field, for a variety of reasons. We have six field mechanics who are out full-time throughout the City, and each is assigned approximately 15 stations, plus the airports. We support Van Nuys airport and LAX. We have crash rigs out there – six crash rigs at LAX and two at Van Nuys.

#### We've covered those crash rigs before – they don't travel on regular roads.

Right, they stay at the airport. We have a field mechanic who's exclusive for the airports. He does service other stations, but his main focus is the airports.

The field mechanics are in their own field truck, which is fully supplied with batteries, starters, alternators, electrical components, belts, and so forth. We have another field mechanic who's responsible for the Harbor and fixes all the fireboats there.



And then we have the air units. We have a portable air station for all the air bottles and the oxygen tanks. We have

#### What about the Dept.'s helicopters?

We don't maintain them. General Services maintains them for the Fire Dept.

We're a very big facility, the main facility, but we have the satellite shops, too.

#### Certification

#### And you do a lot more than repair here. You also do certifications.

Right. That's big. Every rig is inspected once a year per NFPA (National Fire Protection Association) compliance and meets manufacturer specifications. The aerial fleet just finished certification, and that runs from August till December. Every truck is brought here once a year for a full certification process. We do a complete aerial test, and that aerial test consists of a full inspection of the whole aerial ladder, an operational test, a time test and a weight test, a drift test, and a twist test. Every rig is inspected to make sure it meets manufacturer specification. If it does not, it does not go home [to a Fire Station]. It stays. Once a year, every apparatus is tested.

Fire Stations will know what day they have to come in for scheduled maintenance and certification. We follow up with calls just to keep things on track.

But certain jobs that can't be scheduled a long time in advance, like the water pump job that you saw here, they have to get here in a timely manner if the rig is going to go home the same day. So we manage those communications - "FYI, the sooner you get here, the sooner we start."

#### Who drives them in that situation?

The Firemen at the station. They'll shut down the truck, and when they get the substitute that they need to cover the service, then they drive it in, if it's drivable.

#### How much of what you do is required by law?

We follow the U.S. Dept. of Transportation's guidelines. Everything here is DOT-compliant. And then we go by the NFPA [National Fire Protection Association] standards. That's how we determine what's compliant and what's out of compliance. It's very important that we meet these standards, and if an apparatus doesn't, that's when we take it out of service. The rig has to be safe and it has to be reliable. If it's not, then it's out of service.

# **The Repair Shops**

The mechanics of LAFD's Supply and Maintenance Division take care of some very expensive and incredibly important City gear. Here are the people who keep the rigs on the road, with the safety of LA citizens as their highest priority.

## **The Machine Metal Shop**

The Supply and Maintenance Division's Metal Shop can fabricate pretty much anything that goes on a fire rig. Fire engine parts are in limited supply and can take a long time to order and deliver, and/or be very expensive. To keep the rigs on the road, the machine shop is often called on to fabricate the needed part.









# **Inventory Control**

With many hundreds of rigs that need to be serviced, certified and temporarily replaced while out of commission, logistics becomes a huge deal.

## The Triple (Pumper) Shop

Heavy-duty fire rigs that pump water are known as Triples. The Triple Shop takes care of the repairs, maintenance and certification of these rigs.





The aerial trucks – the fire rigs with the giant telescoping ladders – are generally the biggest rigs the department owns, with the exception of some specialty equipment. Supply and Maintenance performs daily repairs, long-term maintenance and yearly certification.









# Tool Room

Keeping track and maintaining inventory of the nuts, bolts, special testing tools, washers, fittings and many other elements is the job of the Tool Room.

## **Light Vehicles**

Repairing and maintaining ambulances, sedans, Suburbans, pickup trucks, and other light specialty equipment is the responsibility of the Light Vehicle Shop.

### Custom Solutions, When Necessary

#### Talk about the custom manufacturing. Sometimes you machine your own parts.

Yes. When we need to order a part, sometimes there are very long lead times until we can get a new one in. It could be many months; there isn't a huge market for some of these parts. These rigs are custom-built. Ordering the parts can take a long time, and sometimes they can be very expensive.

Sometimes a part is just not available – American LaFrance, which made some of our rigs, is no longer in business – and that's when we have to be a little creative. Our expertise is very high here. We can't have the truck sit, so we have to make the part ourselves. Our metal shop guy can make fenders. He can make everything, actually. So do we order a fender and wait four months to get it, or do we buy the diamond plate and make it ourselves, and have it done by the end of the week? And then the truck is put back in service. It's all about getting the truck back in service to support the sworn. in-house, we control our environment. We send trucks out when they're under warranty, but sometimes they're not the first one on the list to be worked on. Here we triage all the time. In the same way that the Firemen do it at a big incident – how many people to use – it's the same thing we do here; we triage all day long. The rig has a leak? We're sending a field mechanic instantly. We stop what we're doing, we move people around, and we put everybody on it so that the truck goes home.

What's nice about all the facilities is that we all work together to keep the fleet on the road, where they can serve the people of L.A. You need every position working together to win the game, offense and defense. We have our parts department support us, we have our front office, and we have each other. Our main goal is to support the apparatus so we have a safe and reliable apparatus to respond for the citizens. soon as possible, but also to make sure it's safe and reliable, because the Firemen need to have a piece of equipment that's dependable.

#### Talk about your crew.

You'll find that when people come to work here, there's a camaraderie between the people in the different shops that's built not only during the day, but after hours. They work together, and the first thing they do when lunch comes is that all sit together. This morning, one of the guys brought in food and made everybody breakfast on our break time. The cohesiveness– they look forward to that.

You're very welcome. We appreciate that you came to

I haven't met too many. Most of them call us looking for assistance.

We are one of the biggest. Our guys set a very high standard for themselves.

## What do you wish people knew about what good work is being done here?

There's a lot of pride and integrity. There's an efficiency to provide the service for the citizens of L.A. There have been many times when people wanted to outsource a job, and we've proven with our labor force and what it costs to operate the facility, that we can still beat the people on the outside. Many times vendors have knocked at the door, saying that they can do it better and cheaper. But we show them they can't. We're not here for profit. By doing it

#### What do you love about what you do?


I love the people I work with. I love the fact that we do everything in this facility – but you could drive by it and might never know it's a city within the City. I love that, when you work on an apparatus and remember what this apparatus is being used for, to protect property and save lives, you get a good feeling out of that. The Firemen take such great care of these trucks. One of the rigs we're working on in here is from 1995. That rig's more than 22 or 23 years old, and it looks brand new. You would never know it's from 1995.

I like working on them. I get a good feeling knowing what I'm doing makes a big difference. I've been here a long time, and I've built a good working relationship with the Firemen. We interact with each other. When we make a decision, we're looking out for their best interest. We're supporting them.

And the citizens of L.A., too, because they're the beneficiary of all this work.

## **The Body Shop**

# San Fernando Valley Repair Shop

About one-third of the LAFD's Supply and Maintenance repair abilities are housed in the Valley, serving all Valley and some L.A. Basin Fire Stations, and maintaining specialty equipment. Most repair and maintenance functions can be handled here. but some custom machining and certifications are handled at the main Lincoln Heights facility.

The Valley facility handled 1,200 one-day repairs last year, plus many additional long-term repairs. The facility is responsible for more than 400 pieces of LAFD equipment.

The Valley facility is housed at Fire Station 88 on Sepulveda Boulevard in Sherman Oaks. Supervisor is Tony Mastrolia, Equipment Repair Supervisor, 18 years of City service, Club Member.


# **Tire Shop**

# **Invest Your Tax Savings**

Most of us have a surprise coming in our paycheck, thanks to 2018 tax reform. According to the current administration, the new tax plan will save an average family around \$2,200 per year. Broken down on a weekly basis that's a little more than \$40 per week, or around \$180 per month. Think about it: What will you do with an extra \$40 per week in your paycheck? The first step is to recognize the power of time and compound interest and to put that concept to work for you. The best way to ensure your future financial success is to start saving today, even if all you have seems like a paltry sum. "The amount of capital you start with is not nearly as important as getting started early," writes Burton Malkiel in *The Random Walk Guide to Investing*. "Procrastination is the natural assassin of opportunity. Every year you put off investing makes your ultimate retirement goals more difficult to achieve."

The miracle of compound interest is the secret to getting rich slowly. Even modest returns can generate real wealth given enough time and dedication -- mainly time. On its surface, compounding is innocuous, even boring. "So what if my money earns less than three percent in a high yield savings account?" you may ask. "What does it matter if it averages eight percent annual growth in a mutual fund? Why is it important to start investing now?" In the short term, it doesn't make a huge difference — but don't let that fool you. On the slow, sure path to wealth, we need to keep focused on long-term goals. Short-term results are not as important as what will happen over the course of 20 or 30 years.

Let's say you took 50 percent of your windfall, \$20 per week, and invested it at a return of just 4 percent for the next 25 years. That \$20 per week would be worth \$44,691. If you were able to increase your return to 6 percent, that \$20 per week would be worth \$60,379.

# You can make compounding work for you by doing a few simple things:

**1. Start early.** The younger you start, the more time compounding has to work in your favor and the wealthier you can become. The next best thing to

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
- starting early is starting now.
- 2. Make regular investments. Don't be haphazard. Remain disciplined, and make saving for retirement a priority. Do whatever it takes to maximize your contributions.
- **3. Be patient.** Do not touch the money. Compounding works only if you allow your investment to grow. The results will seem slow at first, but continue on. Persevere! Most of the magic of compounding returns comes at the very end. Compounding creates a snowball of money. At first, your returns seem small; but if you are patient, they will become enormous.

Leroy moved to LA in 1963 from Kansas City. He made the move because he was "running from the draft." When he turned 22, he and his friend got in their car and headed to Los Angeles. When they got to LA he found a job as a fry cook and then worked for the Salvation Army. He said back then it was easy to find a job in Los Angeles, but as time went on it got tougher.

He went to Manual High School in Kansas City but dropped out in the middle of 10th grade. Did peer pressure cause him to drop out? He said no — he dropped out because he didn't want to go to school. He said he did a lot of partying but not with alcohol or drugs. As far as drugs he didn't know what weed was until he got to California. He said he had been living on the streets for a long time and that it was nothing new to him. When he was young he used to run away from home and sleep wherever he could. He told me he lives off of Social Security, buying fast food for meals. He gets around on his bicycle, which he affectionately calls his "second pair of legs." I asked him if living on the street was dangerous, and if it still was an "adventure." He replied, "Yes," it's always dangerous, and yes, its still and "adventure"! He said he carries pepper spray with him.

**Airport Police welcome new Officer.** 





### 'Engagement' Chicken

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

- 1 whole chicken, 4 to 5 pounds
- 1 tablespoon sea salt
- 1 tablespoon freshly ground pepper
- 1/2 cup chopped parsley
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 4 lemons
- 1 tablespoon dill
- 1 sprig rosemary
- 8 to 12 medium-sized rose potatoes
- Approximately 12 stalks asparagus



You may use other vegetables to roast along side the chicken.

#### **DIRECTIONS:**



Preheat oven to 400 °F. Wash chicken and drain cavity with cold water; let chicken drain and pat try with paper towel. Pour juice of one lemon all over the outside and

inside of the chicken. Do the same with the extra virgin olive oil. Add the sea salt and pepper to the inside and outside of chicken. Prick two lemons with a fork and place them inside the cavity of the chicken.



Season rose potatoes and asparagus with salt, pepper and olive oil. Lower oven temperature to 350°F and place chicken in roasting pan, with the potatoes along the sides of the chicken. Do not put the asparagus in the pan until the last 15 minutes or they will become mushy. Let cook for about 1 hour and 15 minutes or until meat thermometer reads 180°F. Always insert meat thermometer in a chicken thigh.



Makes 2 Servings

#### [ A Cook's Dictionary ] Dill:

Thought by first-century Romans to be a good luck symbol, dill has been around for thousands of years. This annual herb grows up to a height of about three feet and has feathery green leaves called dill weed, marketed in both fresh and dried forms. The distinctive flavor of fresh dill weed in no way translates to its dried form. Fresh dill does, however, quickly lose its fragrance during heating, so it should be added toward the end of the cooking time. Dill weed is used to flavor many dishes including salads, vegetables, meats, and sauces. The tan, flat dill seed is actually the dried fruit of the herb. Heating brings out the flavor of dill seed, which is stronger and more pungent than that of the leaves. It's most often used in the United States for the brine in which dill pickles are cured.

Once cooked to satisfaction, let chicken rest for 10 minutes before carving. Save the juices from the roasting pan and add to a slice of chicken. This is called the "Marry Me Juice." Garnish with parsley, rosemary and even lemon slices. Plate and enjoy!

### Pacific Northwest, The Yucatán

Here's our intrepid traveler and teacher, Dr. Ed Krupp, Director of the Griffith Observatory, Rec and Parks, on his latest adventures.

"In August, I flew to Idaho Falls, Id., and after some rock art field work continued to the 10,000-foot summit of Fred's Mountain, at Grand Targhee Resort, in westernmost Wyoming, on the west flank of the Tetons, just above Alta, Wyo., and Driggs, Id. I was on the mountain to observe the All-American Transcontinental Total Solar Eclipse of 21 August 2017 with a couple hundred Pomona College alumni and friends, for whom I provided some eclipse presentations and preparation. This mountaintop eclipse strategy was intended to provide a panoramic vista west across the Snake River Plain to watch the shadow of the moon approaching across the landscape in the last few minutes before totality. The eclipse operation was completely successful, and the story of this eclipse is told in the November and December 2016, issues of the Griffith Observer. "With this eclipse plan in mind, I also made arrangements with local archaeologists and rock art experts to examine a few prehistoric rock art sites of Idaho. I included a few other wonders of Idaho in the itinerary, among them, of course, Craters of the Moon National Monument, which was well managed despite the astronomical increase in visitors prompted by the eclipse. The trip ended with a diversion to James Turrell's Roden Crater project in northern Arizona. "A few weeks after my return from Idaho, Wyoming, and Arizona, I departed for Yucatán and an invited return to another monumental Turrell project, Agua de Luz. That trip also provided opportunities to revisit some ancient Maya sites. "Astronomically Alive!, Eď



Haze and smoke from the numerous fires in the American West last summer cut the range of visibility to about 35 miles, but from the first appearance on the horizon, the moon's shadow took more than a minute and half to transport the darkness to my observation post. The brown horizontal band in the distance is smoke, but it did not affect the eclipse in Wyoming."



## Santa Drops In


LAX hosts Christmas event for nearby young students.

## AIRPORTS Ralph Retires

**Club Board Member Ralph Morones** retires from Airports after nearly 45 years of service.

celebration indeed was held Oct. 26, 2017 to note the retirement of longtime Airports employee A and Club Board Member Ralph Morones, who enjoyed a nearly 45-year career with the City. The party was held at the Proud Bird restaurant near LAX.

Here is Ralph's own account of his City career:

April 16, 1973: I started with the DWP as a Steam Plant Assistant Trainee at Harbor Steam Plant, now known as Harbor Electrical Generating Station, in Wilmington. This start date was actually the start of a nineday, do or die, training course at Scattergood Steam Plant. A class of 16 individuals like myself had to complete a short training course and score 70 percent or better over the nine days to be placed in a position at one of the four DWP Steam Plants, now Electrical Generating Stations.

Nov. 25, 1974 to Sept. 24, 1977: I transferred from the Operations Section at Harbor Steam Plant to the Instrument Shop as a Control Mechanic Assistant working with Controls Mechanics and journeymen Instrument Mechanic. This position involved doing minor repairs and preventive maintenance on plant boiler and steam turbine recording instrumentation. This was a training position to be promoted to Controls Mechanic.

Sept. 27, 1977 to April 25, 1978: I was promoted to Control Mechanic at Scattergood Steam Plant and worked for Instrument Mechanic Supervisor George Ford. I did repairs and preventive maintenance on boiler and steam turbine control instru-

mentation. I also provided support to journeymen Instrument Mechanics.

**April 26, 1978 to July** 15, 1983: I was promoted to Instrument Mechanic at Harbor Steam Plant and worked for Instrument Mechanic Supervisor, Gilbert Gonzalez. I worked on plant boiler and steam turbine controls instrumentation.

#### July 18, 1983 to April

**20, 1990:** I transferred to the Central Utility Plant at LAX and worked for Chief Building Operating Engineer Walt Garrick, I worked on CUP gas turbine, boiler and chiller instrumentation in the CUP and the Energy Management Control Systems in the Terminals. I also worked on the LAX Fire Lifesafety systems.

#### April 23, 1990 to March

28, 1997: I was promoted to Instrument Mechanic Supervisor for Public Works/Sanitation at Hyperion Wastewater Treatment Plant. My first assignment there was to work in a specialty unit called the Technical Review Group, where I was one of four Supervisors from four disciplines (electrical, mechanical, plumbing and instrumentation) who reviewed construction drawings and submittals for accuracy and future maintainability. My second and last assignment there was to supervise the Customer Service Center, where my staff of a maintenance mechanic, plumber and plant operator would use a maintenance management system to dispatch work to the four Sanitation wastewater plants.

March 31, 1997 to May 9, 1997: I transferred to the Instrument Shop at LAX and was the shop supervisor for five weeks. I worked under the direction of Chief Building Operating Engineer Walt Garrick and supervised six Instrument Mechanics doing repair and preventive maintenance on gas turbine, boiler and chillers at the CUP. The shop was also responsible for the Energy Management Control System and the LAX Fire Lifesafety Systems.

#### May 11, 1997 to May

6, 2000: I was promoted to Airports Maintenance Superintendent in Construction and Maintenance (C&M) at LAX and worked under the direction of Assistant Chief of C&M Al Carlson. For the first 18 months in this position, I was responsible for all custodial activities at LAX. The custodial activities were a blend of contractor-provided services and in-house Airports employees. The last 18 months in this position, I worked under the direction of Assistant Chief of tion. I was responsible, through subordinate Airport Maintenance Supervisors, for Paving, Concrete, Airfield Paint and the Utility crews doing repairs, reconstruction and preventive maintenance on the LAX airfield, CTA and surrounding areas.

#### May 8, 2000 to June

**23, 2006:** I was promoted to Director of Maintenance Airports at Ontario International Airport (ONT) and worked under the leadership of Airport Manager Jens Rivera, At ONT, I was responsible for the entire C&M organization, which was comprised of more than 225 supervisors, craftsmen and custodians performing routine and preventive maintenance on the ONT terminals, infrastructure, airfield, grounds and the ONT ARFF, Police and Maintenance fleet and support equipment. I was also responsible for the Maintenance Administrative support functions at ONT C&M.

#### June 26, 2006 to retire-

ment: I was promoted to Airport Manager III at LAX and worked under the direction of DED Paul Haney. In this position, I was responsible for the entire C&M organization at LAX. This also included responsibility for C&M activities at ONT, VNY and PMD. In this role, I was responsible for more than 1.400 employees involved in all maintenance function and administrative support activities at the four LAWA airports.

My 44-and-a-half-year career with the City of Los Angeles has come to an end. I have thought about that amount of time that has passed since I first started with the DWP, and it amazes me with all that I have done and who I have met along the way. My journey is now complete, and the memories of the people and places along the way will endure forever in my mind.

I have encountered and worked with many very talented and dedicated professionals at DWP, Public Works and here at Airports.

I will always remember many names and faces from the past because of their unique qualities and outstanding work ethic. I am also fortunate to presently work with many more equally talented individuals with similar qualities and dedication to their work. You are all my friends, my family.

Of all that I have done, though, I can say, without reservation, that the past 11 years at LAX have been the most gratifying and rewarding part of my long career.

Representing all of women and men of Maintenance at LAX, ONT, VNY and PMD, whether in Board meetings, our quarterly gatherings or bi-annual crew meetings, has been a pleasure. Interacting with so many of you, not only as maintenance professionals or as colleagues but as friends and fellow human beings, has been an honor, an inspiration and a privilege that I never took lightly.

I am enriched beyond measure by knowing and caring for each of you, and I will cherish our times together always.

I thank you, and may God bless each and every one of you.






