Skydivers, air shows and vintage craft will be part of Aviation Expo June 21 and 22, presented by Los Angeles World Airports. The family event is free.



Based upon a federal law in 1983, if you worked for an employer, who did not withhold Social Security taxes such as a government agency, the pension you will get based on that work may reduce your Social Security benefits.

Your Social Security offset reduction is based upon a formula that factors in the number of years of substantial earnings. For instance, if you worked 20 years or less in private company, but you also earned a government pension, you may receive only 40 percent or less what would have been your Social Security benefit. For more information, see Federal Publication N0. 05-10007. From the standpoint of equity, this law, which was enacted to "eliminate windfall pension benefits," has only reached the contrary results.

Firstly, when you worked for a private employer, Social Security taxes were withheld from your earnings. Based upon current law, you have to forego a substantial portion of your withholding. Secondly, employees in a private company may earn a pension, the cost of the pension reduces the employer's income tax. Therefore, private pension plans are not only subsidized by tax reductions, but pension offset law does not effect either private pensions or earned Social Security benefits.

I suggest that you contact your Congressman/Congresswoman, and urge the repeal this inequitable federal legislation.

Winter Shelter Program Extension Gives Homeless Chance at Success

For the many of us who work or visit the downtown Civic Center, we are reminded daily of a problem that exists in the City of Los Angeles. It is one that we cannot ignore as we walk the streets of our city's core and neighborhoods. Whether you live in the San Fernando Valley or Downtown Los Angeles, it is likely that you have come face to face with the our city's growing homeless population.

Since taking office two years ago, I have worked to rebuild and improve the level of city services for the Skid Row Community. With the help of the Bureau of Street Services and the Los Angeles Police Department I have increased Public Works Services in Central City East, revitalized and brought forward the Downtown Community Court Project, created 84 beds at SRO Housing for the service resistant homeless, and added an outreach component to the people who live and sleep on the streets. We have worked hard to increase the level of emergency shelter services throughout the City of Los Angeles and to make them available year round.

On May 14, the City Council and the Mayor backed the plan to extend the Winter Shelter Program for the remainder of the year. This marked a new day for the

- South Los Angeles.

City of Los Angeles—a day when the entire Council stood together to acknowledge that homelessness is a citywide problem that must be addressed. The Council's action will provide emergency shelter services for 1,000 people. They will no longer have to live and sleep on the sidewalks of our city. Services to support their needs and assist them towards better supportive housing are now available year-round. Most importantly, the homeless being served at these shelters have let me know how much it means to them to have a safe and clean place to stay.

Now, we need to work toward funding more 24-hour beds with services to really begin helping people move from the streets to a more permanent supportive living situation. We know that this model of service to the homeless is most successful. I will continue to fight for both funding and services for the homeless population. No one deserves to be homeless. It is our job to see that people are given an opportunity to find success in their lives.





Dept. of the Month: Cultural Affairs

Cultural Affairs Department Connects You to the Arts

■ Theater, film, art, museums and youth programs make the City come alive for residents, tourists.

The City's tens of thousands of employees work hard to build the infrastructure and provide the services to keep the City running smoothly.

The Cultural Affairs Department gives residents access to the arts in a cosmopolitan city like Los Angeles. The Department generates and supports high-quality arts and cultural experiences. It provides grants, marketing, development, communication, and strategic relationships with our community's creative partners. Cultural Affairs acts as a catalyst for the delivery of art, culture, and heritage to the entire City.

History

Originally formed in 1925 as the Municipal Arts Department, the Cultural Affairs Department directs the City's arts activities and manages 22 community arts centers as a method of providing cultural services in neighborhoods.

The Cultural Affairs Department was created by an act of the City Council July 1, 1980. In November 1988, the City Council adopted the Los Angeles Endowment for the Arts, a trust fund that provides funding for cultural projects from proceeds of the Transient Occupancy Tax. This fund, along with an annual allocation from the City's General Fund, supports grant programs, festivals, neighborhood-based programs, and both in-school and after-school arts education activities.

In March 1991, the City Council approved the Arts Development Fee

Ordinance, which mandates that arts fees be gathered as mitigation for new construction in the City. The amount of the fee is based on the size and use of the building, expected occupancy, and the value of the arts burden added to the City by each new building occupant. Developers work with the Cultural Affairs Department to add to the fund, create cultural facilities, and commission works of art for their sites.

Divisions and Programs

Through its 18 neighborhood cultural centers, the Community Arts Division offers high quality instruction in the performing, visual, and new media arts; produces solo and group art exhibitions; maintains a Slide Registry of over 2,000 California artists; creates outreach programs for underserved populations; develops special initiatives for youth including the Sony Media Arts Program, which provides training in computer animation and graphics to middle-school students; and promotes numerous festivals during the year that celebrate the cultural diversity of the community.


The Marketing and Development Division markets the City's cultural events by creating thousands of direct mail pieces and promotional materials; maintaining the Department's website; and producing the annual Festival Guide featuring over 200 festivals throughout Los Angeles, as well as producing event calendars for Latino Heritage and African American Heritage months. The Division partners with the

Mayor's office and the City Council to promote local and international economic and artistic development. It works with local, state, and national arts organizations to promote cultural awareness and increase arts education in our communities.

The Youth Arts and Education Program strives to improve the quality and quantity of arts programs for youth by advocating on behalf of youth and the organizations that serve them; providing grant support for in-school and after-school activities; and making resources available to teachers, artists, and parents.

The Cultural Grant Program provides artistic project support to established and emerging nonprofit arts organizations, individual artists, and arts-in-education specialists.

The Historic Preservation Division works to protect, utilize, and promote Los Angeles' cultural, architectural, and historic resources. The Division oversees the City's collection of over 700 Historic-Cultural Monuments and staffs the Cultural Affairs

Through its three professional theater facilities, the Performing Arts Division presents year-round, dance, music, theater, literary, and multi-disciplinary performances; supports the development of emerging and established Los Angeles-based performing artists; and offers workshops for playwrights and writers of all ages.








Up to 300,000 spectators are expected to enjoy displays of some of the world's most celebrated military and vintage aircraft and meet the pilots who fly them. Admission to the

Aviation Expo 2003 is presented by Los Angeles World Airports, a self-supporting department of the City of Los Angeles, which owns and operates a world-class system of four airports: Los Angeles International, Ontario International, Palmdale Regional, and Van Nuys.

Expo is free.

Several exciting aerial demonstrations are planned for the event, including flyovers by the F-117A Stealth Fighter and F-15E Strike Eagle, and a Navy Legacy Flight in which a modern F-18E Super Hornet and a vintage World War II Corsair fighter will soar overhead in formation. Newsbriefs

EXHIBIT AT LAX



Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) and the City of Los Angeles Cultural Affairs Department are marking aviation's centennial with an exhibit entitled *LAX Celebrates 100 Years of Powered Flight*. Arriving international passengers can view the exhibit, located at Los Angeles International Airport's (LAX's) Tom Bradley International Terminal in the U.S. Customs Hall on the Lower/Arrival Level. The exhibit, scheduled through Dec. 31, has artifacts, uniforms, equipment and photographs related to the history of flight.

"The exhibit, LAX Celebrates 100 Years of Powered Flight, reminds us of the pioneers' vision and tenacity," said LAWA Deputy Executive Director of Project Management and Facilities Planning Kim Day, who is responsible for LAWA's Art Exhibits Program. Day added, "The Wright Brothers' first flight continues, to this day, to inspire the next generation of aviation explorers, and LAX is proud to be part of this commemorative history."

LAX is marking its own 75th anniversary this year at the same time the Wright Brothers' historic 1903 powered flight's 100th anniversary is being commemorated nationally.

The exhibition includes photographs detailing the evolution of aircraft and some of the world's greatest planes that changed the history of

flight. Viewers can also glimpse into the future of flight, from the newly designed 600-passenger very large aircraft to ultralight aircraft to pilotless planes.

DUMPING RESULTS



Mayor Jim Hahn announced May 13 that the Bureau of Street Services has arrested 59 people to date for illegally dumping couches, televisions, mattresses and other trash in neighborhood alleys and on local streets. The announcement followed three months of ongoing surveillance operations conducted by the Bureau of Street Services to stop illegal dumpers.

"Illegal dumping in our alleys and on our streets not only contributes to neighborhood blight, but poses a danger to public safety. Illegally dumped trash can block the path of emergency vehicles, slowing them down in responding to emergencies," said Mayor Hahn at an alley near the 11000 block of Graham Ave. in Watts where illegal dumping has been a problem.

"Today we are sending a message to wouldbe-dumpers that dumping in LA is a crime and violators will be caught and prosecuted," said Councilwoman Janice Hahn. "We are now impounding vehicles involved in prostitution and we will soon be doing the same to cars used in dumping. Together, we are letting people know that dumping is no longer tolerated in Los Angeles."

Los Angeles Police Department representatives raised the illegal dumping issue at a TeamWork LA Cabinet meeting. LAPD requested assistance with cleaning up and stopping illegal dumping, noting that trash was preventing officers from patrolling some alleys and that some officers had been injured because of illegally dumped trash that interfered during officer foot pursuits of criminals.

Bureau of Street Services Street Use Inspectors initiated surveillances at chronic dump locations and began arresting individuals who were caught dumping their trash on public streets, alleys, and right of ways. Many of the 59 people who have been arrested for illegal dumping were violating parole for more serious offenses.

"A new energy has been infused into our efforts to eradicate illegal dumping, graffiti and blight in Los Angeles since Mayor Hahn took up the issue and created TeamWork LA," said Bureau of Street Services Director Bill Robertson. "His initiative brings

together representatives from the Mayor's Office and other city departments to solve these neighborhood problems. Now, everyone knows that illegal dumping is, besides being a blight on the community, a serious health and safety hazard."

Illegal dumping has long plagued Los Angeles neighborhoods. Since July 2002, more than 123,000 cubic yards of debris has been collected in South Los Angeles, which accounts for over half of the illegal debris collected citywide during that time. The total amount of debris collected citywide was approximately 245,000 cubic yards.

HOMELAND SECURITY FUNDS

The City of Los Angeles has been designated to receive an additional \$18.87 million through the federal Urban Area Security Initiative. This is the second round of funding



Los Angeles has received through this program, which is administered by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

"I am very pleased that the Department of Homeland Security has moved so quickly to allocate additional funding to protect the nation's largest cities," Mayor Hahn said. "In Los Angeles, we are working hard to prepare our first responders to be ready for any emergency in the post-September 11 environment. We appreciate the federal government's support of and funding for these efforts."

The Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach were also received a grant totaling \$9 million. Since September 2001, Los Angeles has spent more than \$100 million for enhanced security, equipment, and training for first responders. Los Angeles received \$12.42 million in the first round of funding from the Urban Area Security Initiative, which provides funding directly to local governments for security needs.



Take for instance the "Kepi's Kooler" beverage recipe submitted by Bob Pearce. It is refreshing during those hot summer days. Bob tells us that this is a must at barbeques, especially for the Fourth of July. He tells us that it "tastes great and makes you feel great." I am sure that we all agree with Bob on that comment! (It's strictly for adults only. And please enjoy it in moderation!)

Robert Lavelle from the Bureau of Sanitation has submitted

a recipe called Lavelle's California Albacore. Robert says that we "are blessed with people from all parts of the globe and can create some of the most diverse cooking recipes known to mankind. I've got one involving Albacore fillet marinated in Italian herb and garlic dressing."

The barbeque short ribs recipe comes from a couple of LAPD employees who wish to be known only as Martha and Harry. I didn't ask what they do for LAPD. But what I do know is that they submitted a barbecue short ribs recipe that is as good as any.

Lastly, I have added one of my own recipes called Daddy Flank Steak. If you want to make your father happy for Father's Day, this recipe will keep him smiling long after you grill the flank steak and plate it for him.

Kepi's Kooler

Mix one bottle (750 ml) of Captain Morgan's Parrot Bay rum with one bottle (64 oz) of Mauna Lai Mandarin Papaya juice. Chill and serve with pineapple spear.



Daddy Flank Steak

INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 2 tablespoons distilled white vinegar

DIRECTIONS

- 1. In a blender, combine soy sauce, honey, vinegar, ginger, garlic powder and vegetable oil. Blend for 15 seconds.
- 2. Lay steak in a shallow glass or ceramic dish. Pierce flesh all over front and back with a sharp fork. Pour marinade over steak, then turn and coat the other side. Cover, and chill in the refrigerator 8 hours, or overnight.
- 3. Preheat an outdoor grill for high heat.
- 4. Place grate on highest level, and brush lightly with oil. Grill steak for 15 to 20 minutes, turning once, to desired doneness.

Law Enforcement Beef Ribs

• 1/2 cup vegetable oil

• 1 1/2 pounds flank steak

Lavelle's California Albacore

INGREDIENTS

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 1/3 cup chopped onion
- 1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon all purpose flour
- 1 cup apple cider or apple juice
- 3 tablespoons sweet pickle relish

DIRECTIONS

Melt butter in a medium saucepan over low heat; add chopped onion, and sauté until onion is done. Add flour, stirring well. Cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Gradually add apple cider or apple juice, cook over medium heat. stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Stir in remaining ingredients except ribs. Remove sauce from heat, and set aside.

Cut ribs into serving size portions, and grill over low coals 1 hour and 15 minutes. Baste ribs with sauce, and grill 20 more minutes or until desired degree of doneness. Turn and baste frequently with sauce. Serve the remaining sauce with ribs as desired.

- 1 tablespoon catsup
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
- 4 pounds beef short ribs



- Philippine sausage
- Peanut oil
- Salt
- Pepper
- Aeoli Sauce
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons olive oil (or butter)
- 3 cloves of garlic, minced
- 1 large onion, chopped
- Lemon juice
- Cayenne pepper (to taste)

DIRECTIONS



- 1 teaspoon thyme
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- Green pepper (chopped)
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1/2 cup white wine

Add Philippine sausage in 1/4 inch sections by thinly slicing the fillet width-wise halfway through to keep the integrity of the fillet, and lay into a foil basket with top open cooking over low flame on barbeque for a few minutes (3 to 5 depending on the size of the fillet). Heat up some peanut oil and pour the hot peanut oil over the fillet stuffed with Philippine sausage while still broiling. Use a blender and add all ingredients to create the aeoli sauce. Finally, spread over some aeoli sauce cover loosely with foil tent for another 2 minutes or so and you are done.




