





'Pursuing' the LAPD at Expo, Fair, Race Event

On Saturday, Oct. 1, the LAPD plans to host its first "In Pursuit of the LAPD" Expo, 5-K Run and 10-K Run at the Elysian Park Police Academy and you, your family and friends are all invited!

The Expo promises to be a family affair, with special events and activities for all. There will be all sorts of entertainment for kids: a jumper, rock climbing, karate demonstrations, LAPD historical vehicles and lots of freebies courtesy of the LAPD and other organizations and vendors participating in the event.

LAPD's Specialized Units will be on site to share with the public who they are and what they do:

"The focus of the event is to draw and expose the public and media to the various opportunities LAPD has to offer to all ages," LAPD Recruitment Officer Gavin Stieglitz pointed out. "We will have Explorers, Magnet School students and Reserve Officers all participating to share information and encourage qualified candidates to sign up. Recruitment and testing will be provided on the day of the event for those individuals who are ready for a new career – either Reserve Officer or full-time Police Officer." The LAPD Written Test is scheduled at 9:30 a.m. and again at 1:30 p.m.

The big events of the day, the 5-K (3.1 miles) and 10-K (6.2 miles) Runs, promise to be a blast and are open to all so do sign up. Registration costs \$35 per person for the 5-K run and \$40 per person for the 10-K run. Proceeds from the race will go to the LAPD Memorial Foundation, Los Angeles Police Reserve Foundation and the Los Angeles Police Family Support group – organizations that support our officers and their families, especially fallen officers and their families in times of need.

The 5-K and 10-K runs will challenge any runner's stamina – with an aggressive course over hills and dirt trails. The 10-K first-place winner wins based on fastest overall gun start time and gets to drive away in a brand new 2006 Honda vehicle! There will be other prizes, like a three-day, all-expenses-paid trip to Mexico.

Trophies will be awarded to all winners in nine categories:



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What's really neat is that, in the end, all runners walk away with a T-shirt; a goody bag that includes a gift card; a free lunch; and an LAPD medal.

The 5-K run starts at 8 a.m. The 10-K run starts at 8:15 a.m. Those interested can register online at www.Active.com or www.JoinLAPD.com. You may want to register by Sept. 19 because, after that, the registration fee goes up by a few dollars. Late registration is available on the day of the event at 6:30 a.m.

PUBLIC WORKS — Aug. 5, Hillcrest Elementary School in Southwest Los Angeles took part in a unique field trip to the Department of Public Works Buckingham Road Sewer Project site. In all, 36 fifth-grade students walked, under faculty supervision, from the school to the project site approximately one mile away.

Once there, project inspectors briefed them on the sewer project and sewers in general, the roles of the Public Works Bureaus in construction, and the need to maintain and improve the sewer system, as well as safety precautions they should take at and around construction sites. Under close supervision, they were given a tour of the site, which included micro-tunneling equipment used in sewer construction. In a note of thanks, Hillcrest Coordinator Hope Gordon called it a "wonderful, educational experience."

"The students were elated and returned with details of the many things that they learned and insights they gained on their trip to view the Buckingham Sewer Project," said Gordon. "I was impressed with the fact that they were still bubbling with enthusiasm after a long walk back to school on a very hot August day."

"We are so proud that we have been adopted by the Board of Public Works and we look forward to many more shared opportunities," Gordon added.

Part of a Citywide effort to upgrade the sewer system, the Buckingham Road Sewer Project, when completed next year, will replace an old dilapidated pumping plant at the southeast corner of Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard.

■ City offers training programs to help managers address domestic violence issues.

Every year in the United States there are more than three million incidents of domestic violence. That means that every nine seconds, someone is beaten by their domestic partner. More than 4,000 victims of domestic violence are killed each year. The vast majority are women.

Domestic violence does not stay home when victims and abusers go to work.

With nearly one-third of American women reporting physical abuse by an intimate partner at some point in their lives, it is with certainty that domestic violence will affect employees. It can affect productivity, increase absenteeism, raise the risk of violence in the workplace and can cost hundreds of millions of dollars in increased health care costs. According to a United States Department of Justice report, more than 13,000 acts of violence against women are committed each year in the workplace by batterers.

Domestic violence can take different forms, but its goal is always the same – batterers want to control their victims through fear, abusing them physically, sexually, psychologically and economically. Many times the abuser will stalk or attack the victim at work, leading to safety and security issues. Nine-four percent of corporate security directors who were surveyed rank domestic violence as a high security problem.

Thus, domestic violence is not only a business issue but also a security issue – one and the City of Los Angeles is at the forefront in addressing.

In 1998, the City Council adopted the Policy in Support of Employee Victims of Domestic Violence. The policy puts the full weight of the City behind those employees who experience domestic violence; the policy seeks to protect the workplace from perpetrators. It offers assistance and a supportive environment to its employees who experience domestic violence or abuse. It requires that domestic violence cases are taken seriously and holds managers responsible for investigating the potential for violence and taking action accordingly. Additionally, the policy ensures that employees who are in domestic violence relationships have the opportunity to obtain appropriate assistance so that they can remain productive members of the City's workforce. It provides referrals to appropriate community resources, a sensitive and supportive environment and an alternative to discipline when work performance is affected as a result of the battering relationship While many cities across the country have domestic violence workplace policies, the City of Los Angeles is the only one to have a Domestic Violence Resource Team (DVRT). The establishment of DVRT assists with the implementation of the City policy and protocols as well as providing departments and employees with advise, referral and alternatives to disciplinary actions where appropriate.

When Domestic Violence Doesn't Stay At Home

It is the intent of the Domestic Violence Resource Team to determine if a nexus exists between domestic violence or abuse and the cause for proposed discipline. Should a nexus be established, DVRT will assist both the employee and the department with alternatives to discipline including but not limited to holding the discipline in abeyance, providing the employee with work assignments to accommodate the affects of the domestic violence, if possible, and periodic review of employee-victim work performance improvement. The Commission on the Status of Women heads the Domestic Violence Resource Team.

When a supervisor becomes aware that an employee is in an abusive relationship and subjected to harassment, threats or violence by the batterer the supervisor will offer the employee information on the DVRT and other available resources for assistance such as the Employee Assistance Program (EAP), battered women's shelters, legal assistance agencies and/or the employee's union. When warranted, the supervisor will review the facts of the situation. If appropriate the supervisor, in consultation with the City Attorney's office, can request a restraining order against the individual if it would improve the safety of the workplace.

Domestic violence protocols were approved by the City Council in 2001 to assist both supervisors and employees with domestic violence and implementation of the City's policy. The protocols provide uniform steps of action and alternatives to discipline for all departments throughout the City to maintain the greatest opportunity for safe working conditions and to provide a supportive work environment for the employee-victim.

The Commission on the Status of Women, the City Attorney's Office and experts in the field of domestic violence have undertaken a training program to educate supervisors, managers and non-supervisory employees on the nature and effects of domestic violence, the impact of domestic violence on employees in the workplace and strategies for successful interventions. Violence against women has a dramatic and often profound impact on the workforce. The City has recognized that domestic violence knows no boundaries and that its waves create a ripple effect that inevitably enters the workplace. The Policy in Support of Employee Victims of Domestic Violence and Abuse will accomplish its objectives only with the full support of management and employees at all levels of the City. 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

Rosendahl for All

COUNCIL — Bill Rosendahl hopped up on a table to better address the more than 100 neighbors who showed up to meet him at an open house July 28 on Manchester Avenue in Westchester. Rosendahl took office July 1 after defeating Flora Gil Krisiloff in the March runoff.

As soon as he quieted the room, Rosendahl apologized for being stuck in traffic, which was one of his campaign themes. "Gridlock is poor planning," he said to applause.

Reiterating his campaign themes — and pressing the flesh — appeared to be high on his agenda at the open house.

"Every major metropolitan area in the world has more than one airport," he said, touching a nerve with the crowd assembled less than a mile from LAX's northernmost runway. "Why not L.A.? "Regionalism is the answer," he said. "We're all in this together."

On the subject of regionalism, he spoke of reaching out to other constituencies in the area — Santa Monica, Marina del Rey (L.A. County) and Culver City — to find better solutions.

"Development must be tied to transportation and building and safety," he said.

He also talked about supporting the idea of extending the Red Line subway "down Wilshire Boulevard, all the way to the beach," and extending the Green Line into LAX. Both suggestions met with applause.

"My most important job is to serve you," he said before stepping down and shaking hands. "It's all about constituent service. It's about action, not talk."

The open house also served as an introduction of the new staff to the district.

Rosendahl also held an open house July 19 at his West L.A. constituent center on Corinth Avenue.

Could Deficit Put Chill In Budget, Signal New Freeze?

Efforts to end the hiring freeze began in January, when Councilman Dennis Zine drafted a motion asking the CAO to consider lifting the freeze: "I therefore move that the CLA, CAO and the Personnel Department be directed to report with recommendations which would eliminate the existing Managed Employment Process and would once again make the General Managers of City Departments fully accountable for decisions that reflect on their ability to manage their budgets, including staffing, as reflected in the City Charter."

■ After being in place for more than a year and saving the City millions, the hiring freeze ended in July. But the word on the street is that it could return soon.

COUNCIL — With the new City budget taking effect July 1, the City Council also lifted the City's hiring freeze, which had been in place for more than a year. Department managers once again have the authority to fill their open positions. That's good news for City employees who are hiring for — or hoping to take — those positions.

But there is talk that an expected budget deficit mentioned in previous issues of *Alive!* could prompt another freeze put into place. A new freeze could be in effect by the time you read this.

The hiring freeze, put in place by the Chief Accounting Office to save the City money in lean times, required department managers to go through special procedures involving the CAO to fill open positions. The procedure involved justifications, cost analyses and other checksand-balance measures. During normal times, department managers generally do not have to have positions okayed by the CAO.

Without the freeze, managers can now work directly with Personnel, as had been the case before the freeze was put in place. But if the freeze ends, department general managers and/or those who hire will once again have to go through the Chief Accounting Office.

The freeze left a significant number of City positions unfilled, saving the City millions of dollars during the recent budget crunch. A growing economy and the easing of the crunch were considered the reasons for the lifting of the freeze. But a projected budget deficit could bring the freeze right back again. "It is inherent in any City General Manager's job description that they manage the personnel and other expenditures of their department as provided in each year's budget.

"In consideration of the Charter Reform that provided General Managers with Civil Service exemption, it is reasonable to expect that they would be held accountable, for any and all decisions that reflect on their ability to manage their budgets. They are expected to operate the Department [that] they oversee without incurring a deficit; and this is a reflection of their managerial abilities and a test for maintaining their appointment as General Manager.

"The current Managed Employment Process (often referred to as the Hiring Freeze) serves as a handcuff to the General Managers and their ability to exercise their management skills. It serves as a roadblock which forces a reduction in services performed by the personnel of a department rather than permitting the General Manager to prioritize all expenditures as a means to maintain their budget. Chief Accounting Officer William Fujioka reported back that he was willing to discuss the end to the freeze as part of the deliberations for the 2005-06 City budget. The Council passed the \$5.9 billion budget and lifted the freeze.

"This is a strong budget, but we still have to watch it closely," Parks was quoted in the *Los Angeles Daily News* as saying. Parks chairs the Budget and Finance Committee. "We still are facing a \$200 million structural deficit, but we have policies in place to control it.

Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa has indicated that addressing a possible \$200 million deficit would be one of his challenges.

Call to FS 48 and on to FS 101 to end the first day of three days of the relay. It was very hot and humid, but the runners were in great condition and ran without a problem.


The first two runners were Captain Brian





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

As for his funniest moments, he said: "When I can plan 'unharming' head games with fellow traffic officers."


John's retirement plans include going to Arizona to live and enjoy the rest of his time with his wife and family, but "I will come back for early morning breakfast — Squad 5, see you there."

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
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Newsbriefs

BIG SEWER DEDICATED

Councilmember Ed P. Reyes joined more than 100 sewer project workers, City and community leaders July 21 to dedicate the \$162 million Northeast Interceptor Sewer (NEIS) Project.

"The six-mile sewer line provides a much greater capacity for wastewater and will protect the health of our families and children," said Reyes, who helped secure funding for the six-mile sewer line, which snakes through most of Council District One.

"The NEIS also helps prevent events like the 1998 El Niño storms, during which our children were left playing in wastewater that overflowed onto neighborhood streets," Reyes said. "I thank residents for their patience during the construction of the new sewer line. I also commend all who worked on the sewer line, a tremendous undertaking. The NEIS was built as part of Public Works' 10-year, \$2 billion program to upgrade the City sewer system. It extends northward from the Seventh Street Bridge at the Los Angeles River in Boyle Heights to Eagle Rock Boulevard and San Fernando Road in the Glassell Park area. "The new sewer was constructed in a tunnel dug by subterranean drilling equipment an average of 130 feet below ground in order to minimize disruptions to the surrounding neighborhood," said Board of Public Works President Cynthia Ruiz. City Engineer Gary Lee Moore described the NEIS project as " a mammoth undertaking." The tunnel is lined with more than 37,000 pre-cast segments, each weighing more than 2,500 pounds. The piping consists of 1,167 sections, each more than 24-feet-long and weighing 45 tons, Moore said. "Nearly every division of the Bureau of Engineering was involved in NEIS planning, design, environmental documentation, bid and award, and construction management." Moore added. "We are really proud of the outcome."

NEWS RACK BLIGHT

Councilman Greig Smith, Chairman of the City's Public Works Committee, and members of the C.L.E.A.N. (Coalition for LA's Enforcement Applied to News Racks) Coalition marked the implementation of Los Angeles' new news rack ordinance Aug. 17.

"I believe in the broken window theory, where blight leads to the deterioration of communities and the increase of crime," said Councilman Smith. "We will now be able to improve the look of all neighborhoods by ending news rack blight which is prevalent throughout Los Angeles."

As Chair of the Public Works Committee. Councilman spearheaded the efforts to bring the news publishing industry and CLEAN Coalition (an organization comprised of numerous business and community organiza-

tions) together to create a comprehensive ordinance addressing news rack blight.

"We are thrilled with the implementation of this ordinance," said Kerry Morrison, Executive Director of Hollywood Entertainment District and member of the CLEAN Coalition. "We look forward to working with the City and the news publishing industry to reduce the blight on our streets."

Councilmember Wendy Greuel said, "News racks are a nuisance in our communities. On one block alone in Studio City, there are over 157 news racks. The new policy will protect the quality of life for our residents and it will ensure that our neighborhoods remain clean, safe, and beautiful." The City's new news rack ordinance limits news racks by location, number and appearance.

Along with Councilman Greig Smith, Councilmember Wendy Greuel and members of the CLEAN Coalition, press conference attendees included representatives from Public Works' Street Services.




Chalk It Up to Talent

The Los Angeles Dept. of Public Works Task Force for Employee Achievement and Morale is offering one-hour classes to help City employees prepare for job interviews.


The classes, conducted by former Task Force member and retired Senior Personnel Analyst Bob Cutler, also help to boost employee morale and improve career advancement.



Goodbye to Low

Pioneering Commissioner Ronald Low leaves the Board of Public Works.

PUBLIC WORKS — Friends, family and others bade farewell to Commissioner Ronald Low as he leaves the Board of Public Works.

The reception was held in City Hall Hearing Room 350 Aug. 8.

Commissioner Low was appointed to the Board of Public Works by Mayor James K. Hahn in October 2001. This appointment followed a brief stint in the private sector as a consultant, handling governmental affairs and providing legal advice on affordable housing matters.

Low was the first Chinese American to serve on the Board of Public Works, the City's only fulltime policy making commission, during its 98year history. He, along with the four other members of the Board, serve jointly as general manager of the Department of Public Works, the City's third largest municipal agency.

The Department, responsible for construction, maintenance and operation of the City's public facilities and infrastructure, employs more than 5,000 personnel and has an annual budget of more than \$1 billion.

As a Board Commissioner, Low's duties involved a variety of assignments focusing on litigation, procurement and subcontracting opportunities, community outreach and participation, and environmental concerns.

"One of my main goals as a Commissioner" Low said, "[was] to ensure that our vital City services are delivered in an efficient, equitable and balanced manner throughout the City. I also want to make sure that our department reaches out to the public to get as much of their input and participation as possible in the development and delivery of public facilities and infrastructure projects.

"Another goal [was] to promote services and infrastructure projects that will address some of our environmental concerns like improving water and air quality, increasing water conservation, and reducing pollutants from getting into our various water bodies.

"Finally, I [wanted] to make sure that minority, women and other small businesses have an opportunity to compete for our contracting dollars," Low added.

He was responsible for overseeing the day-today operations of the Bureau of Contract Administration. The duties of that Bureau include administering minority, women and other business enterprise subcontractor outreach programs for the Department; equal employment opportunity/affirmative action for City contracts; state and federal prevailing wage laws for public works construction contracts, and City-wide certification of minority, women, other and disadvantaged business enterprises. Low's Bureau assignments also included serving as backup Commissioner in the operations of the Bureau of Sanitation focusing on storm water and water quality issues. Commissioner Low, who at one point was under consideration for an appointment to the State Court Bench, served as the Board's lead man on all legal issues affecting the Department. He also conducted hearings on sewer service charges involving commercial and industrial projects, subcontractor substitution requests on construction projects already underway, and helped mediate miscellaneous disputes.

Commissioner Low served as Department liaison to the offices of the Seventh and Eleventh and Fourteenth Council Districts as well as their respective Neighborhood Councils, the Mayor's Office of Economic Development, the Community Redevelopment Agency and the Departments of General Services and Transportation.

His special assignments included chairing the interdepartmental Oversight Committee for the \$68 million Santa Monica Boulevard Transit Parkway Project, and serving as a member of the Administrative Oversight Committee for Proposition O, the clean beaches and water bill that was passed in the 2004 November general election, and the Settlement Agreement Review Committee for the EPA/Santa Monica Baykeeper lawsuit.

Commissioner Low also served on the Construction Industry Advisory Committee, the Lincoln Corridor Task Force, the Los Angeles and San Gabriel Rivers Watershed Council, and the Citywide Economic Development Cabinet.

Prior to going into private industry as a consultant, Commissioner Low spent 11 years as a deputy City attorney in the Los Angeles City Attorney's Office. As a deputy City attorney, he served as head of litigation for the Community Redevelopment Agency, consulting with the Mayor's Office, City Council and the CRA Board of Commissioners on legal issues relating to redevelopment, land use, contracts and condemnation law.

As the CRA's head of litigation, he supervised all of its litigation matters, including decisions to file or defend actions, proposed litigation and trial strategies and conducted settlement negotiations. During this time he also led the City's \$80 million relocation and land acquisition effort for the Staples Center.

Before joining the CRA in 1995, he worked in the City Attorney's Criminal Division with duties that included prosecuting defendants charged with misdemeanor crimes, as well as receiving special assignments to handle violent crimes, stalking and child and spousal abuse cases. Also during his tenure with the City Attorney's Office, he successfully handled one case, in its entirety, all the way to the United States Supreme Court.

Before coming to the City Attorney's Office in 1989, Low practiced civil litigation with two Los Angeles law firms over a span of five years, litigating cases in both state and federal courts.

In 1978, Low was appointed by California's Lieutenant Governor as executive director of the State Youth Commission, where he directed and coordinated the affairs of the Commission. Commissioner Low has worked on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C., and the State Capitol in Sacramento bringing his experience in State and Federal government with him to the Board.

Low is a graduate of the University of California, Berkeley, where he received his bachelor's degree in criminology with honors in 1973. He received his Master's degree in social work from California State University, Sacramento, in 1975. Then, he graduated with honors from Howard University School of Law in 1983, with a degree in law.


He was admitted to the California State Bar in 1985 and is a member of the Los Angeles County Bar Association (LACBA), the Association of Trial Lawyers of America (ATLA), the National Asian Pacific American Bar Association (NAPA-BA) and several other legal associations.

He is a former member of the Board of Trustees of LACBA and the Board of Governors of NAPABA. He has also served as Treasurer of the NAPABA Law Foundation, which he helped create, and President of the Southern California Chinese Lawyer's Association. He has also served on the National Board of the Council on Legal Education Opportunities.

A resident of Los Angeles for the past 20 years, Low has worked extensively with the local Asian-Pacific American community, in addition to all his professional activities. Moreover, Low has published a case study on the plight of the Amerasian: "No Child Should be Without Love and Protection: The Legal Problems of Amerasians."

Commissioner Low is not only an author but a college instructor as well, having taught various courses in social work at California State University, Sacramento.

LACERS Fund Reaches \$8.8 Billion, An All-Time High

Legislative Update

Ken Spiker, our elected LACERS commissioner, reports that the LACERS Fund has reached an all-time high of \$8.840 billion.

Ken also reports that LACERS provides health insurance for 15,148 retirees and their dependents. The LACERS Administration & Benefits Committee, which Ken chairs, has unanimously approved and sent to the Commission their recommendations for 2006. The Committee is recommending that LACERS administer the new Medicare Prescription Part D program. Thus, retirees will receive all the benefits provided by part D without going through the Federal paperwork. Our premiums may also be lower with LAC-ERS as the contractor.

Ken reports all present health care providers are recommended to continue for 2006. No new coverages, but none of our present coverages lost.

Ed Harding, RLACEI President reports:

"Our annual Picnic Aug. 11 at the Grace E. Simons Lodge was the best one ever. About 200 retirees and friends enjoyed a great meal catered by Chris & Pitts. Our thanks go to Americo Garza for making all the arrangements and to Phil Skarin for publicizing it so effectively. 

While out on a site visit with Member Services Counselor Arlene Herrero, a Club Member asked me the following question, so it will be a great place to start my first column:

What's the difference between a Section 529 College Savings Plan and the Coverdell Education Savings Account – ESA (formerly Education IRA)?

The two plans are actually quite similar. They both offer the benefit of tax-deferred growth and are both tax-free upon withdrawal as long as the money is used for a qualified educational expense such as tuition, room and board, books and supplies. Both plans also allow you to change the beneficiary so that if one child doesn't want to go to college or receives a

The two plans differ mainly in two ways: One being that for the 529 plan, a "qualified educational expense" is limited to post-secondary school, whereas with an ESA you can pull the money out of the account to pay for private elementary school, middle and/or high school. The other difference is the amount that you can contribute to the accounts in any one year. The ESA is limited to \$2,000 per year. The 529 plan has a much higher contribution limit, \$11,000 if you're single, \$22,000 for married couples. The 529 also allows for a special contribution of up to \$55,000 for a single person, \$110,000 for a married couple (certain rules apply).

It's pretty amazing what the government will allow you to put away for college, isn't it? Now if we only had that \$110,000 sitting in a bank account or under our mattresses, wouldn't that be great!

In closing, I want to thank the Club for giving me the opportunity to be part of the City Family. I look forward to our next time together. And don't forget to send me those questions!



Spiker received 2,973 votes, which comprised 78 percent of the total ballots counted. Gary Mattingly received 692 (18 percent) votes. Thomas Meyer was third with 48 votes (1.27 percent). Dwight Coffelt was fourth with 41 votes (1.08 percent). And Zbyslaw J. Petryka was fifth with 10 votes (.26 percent).

Spiker was sworn in at the LACERS Board Meeting July 26.

LACERS looks forward to continue working with Mr. Spiker during his new term, and the Club congratulates Ken on his election.

Salmon Fishing in Canada Got Him Hook, Line, Sinker

 $E_{to fish for salmon. The past two years have not been very successful; you know, more "fishing" than "catching." We caught only a few fish in Alaska and even fewer at Campbell River on Vancouver Island.$

So this year we decided to go back to the one place we knew we would catch our limit, the King Pacific Lodge ([888] 592-5464 or www.kingpacificlodge.com). The lodge is affiliated with the Rosewood Resorts and is on Princess Royal Island, British Columbia. The four-day packages (Friday to Monday) start at \$3250 and include: round-trip floatplane flights between Bella Bella and the lodge; all meals, including an open bar; daily guided ocean fishing (trolling, mooching or fly fishing); processing of the fish; and fishing license and all the gear. We also had to pay for our flight from Los Angeles to Vancouver and from Vancouver to Bella Bella.

We flew from LAX early Friday morning July 22 and arrived in Vancouver at about 10:30 a.m. After clearing Canadian immigration and customs, we stopped in the food court to have lunch. The Vancouver International Airport is very modern and easy to navigate. After lunch we found our way to the Fairmont Hotel, which is part of the airport complex and met the representatives of King Pacific. They took our bags, which were limited in weight to 30 pounds, and we made ourselves comfortable while we waited for the rest of the 30 people who would be traveling to the lodge. We took a shuttle to the South Terminal where the lodge had chartered three planes to take us to Bella Bella. The flight to Bella Bella took about an hour and a half. The weather was clear and we got a great view of the snow-capped Canadian Rockies. At Bella Bella we boarded six-passenger deHavilland Beaver floatplanes for the 50-minute flight to King Pacific. This was a new experience for most of the guests. The plane flew at about 3000 feet and was very noise, but the view was worth the noise. The lodge is located at the end of Bernard Bay and sits on a large barge. Since we had been here last they have build a new 17-room lodge; the old lodge was now being used by the staff. We were the last plane to arrive and the staff was lined up to greet us as we disembarked. We all gathered inside where the staff was introduced and we had Champaign and snacks. We were given a brief orientation and then shown to our accommodations. The room was very large, with two twin beds and a large seating area, which looked out over the wooded island. The bathroom was large with a shower and a Jacuzzi tub. We unpacked quickly and returned to the lounge area. The bar was open and there was most

anything you wanted to drink from beer and soft drinks to wine and liquor. You could either get it yourself or they would bring it to you. The lodge has a staff of 40 to take care of our group of 30; needless to say the service was very good.

Before dinner was served we got a chance to meet most of the guests. The group was very diverse, coming from all over the world. There were a number of children, and the biggest fish (30-pound King) was caught by a 10-year-old girl from Germany.

After a 7 a.m. breakfast, we met our guide, Justin, and boarded the 22-foot Bayliner. The lodge provides all the fishing gear, and we each had a floatation suit and boots that we wore on the boat. The weather for the entire trip was wonderful: calm waters, clear skies and temperatures in the mid-70s.

We caught our first fish as soon as we stopped, but it was a pink salmon and we tossed it back. We did that with all the pinks, because were limited to eight fish total (each) and we were looking for Coho and King, which are both better fighters and much better eating. We were trolling at between 30 and 40 feet, using both live bait and various lures with bardless hooks.

By the time we returned to the lodge for lunch we had each caught a Coho. We went out again at 2 p.m. and fished to 6 p.m. and then returned for dinner. We were catching a lot of fish; we threw most back while waiting for the big one.

The next day we fished from 7 a.m. and took lunch with us and did not return to the lodge until dinnertime. In the early afternoon I finally hooked a big fish; the line went "zing" and the fish started to run. I fought it for about five minutes, but it got off the hook. I guess that is why they call it "fishing" and not "catching." By the end of the day I had caught six fish and Erwin had seven. Our last day of fishing started at 7 a.m., and I caught my last fish one minute before we had to return to the lodge. We both had caught our limit. We left about 4 p.m. for the flight back to Vancouver. This time I got to sit in the co-pilot seat in the deHavilland. By 8 p.m. we were in Vancouver and spent the night at the Fairmont. The next day we flew home with some of our fish (I sent half to be smoked) and arrived safely. The King Pacific Lodge is not just for fishing; it offers hiking, whale watching, kayaking and other actives, which makes it a place for the whole family. There is a helicopter and a floatplane, available for a fee, to take you into the interior for river fly fishing, hiking and other activities.

First CAO Sam Leask Sought 'More Service for Less Money'

From 1951 to 1961, Samuel J. Leask Jr. became the first City Administrative Officer for Los Angeles. But the institution of administrative man-

agement for the City began back in September 1916, by ordinance as the Efficiency Commission. With the 1925 Charter, the office became known as the Bureau of Budget and Efficiency. The Bureau was under the direction of a director appointed by the Mayor under the civil service provisions of the Charter.

Formal Citv

management of Samual Leask Jr., the City's first Chief Accounting Officer. administrative affairs

dates back to the City's first Charter, mandated by the State in 1878. Two important changes occurred. The first was when the City Auditor became an individual office. Prior to that, the president of the Common Council held those duties. This accounting official, elected by the Council, was in charge of the City fiscal books, countersigned warrants, issued licenses and prepared fiscal estimates for the following year. The second became a reality when department heads were mandated to turn in an annual report of actions occurring within in their domain for the prior year.

Another major step in the management of administration came in the City's first homerule Charter of 1889. For the first time, department heads were mandated to account for all purchases and expenditures within their offices. Budgeting as a citywide procedure was in its infancy.

In the new Charter of 1925, the term Auditor changed to Controller. Also, the above mentioned Efficiency Commission became The Bureau of Budget and Efficiency. The 1955 Master's Thesis of the future Los Angeles Harbor General Manager, Fred G. Crawford, noted the duties of the Director of this Bureau were"[to] investigate the administration, methods, standards of efficiency, and duties of positions in various departments of the City, and ...to make recommendations to the Mayor and the Council that would result in improved economy and the Director's involvement with the Salary Standardization Ordinance and the needs of the City Council continued.

But the new decade, the 1950s, abolished the Director position. May 29, 1951, a Charter amendment created the position of the City Administrative Officer. The position duties were elevated to having "administrative and executive ability demonstrated by five years of experience at that level of employment within ten years immediately preceding his appointment." The

City Administrative Officer was appointed by the Mayor subject to the approval of the Council. The duties of the new position were monumental and ever changing. Samuel J. Leask Jr. became the first City Administrative Officer.

When appointed to the new post of City Administrative Officer (CAO) March 14, 1951, by Mayor Fletcher Bowron, Samuel Leask Jr. had accrued a formidable background as a government administrator and business executive prior to his new position. He officially became CAO June 15, 1951, and served in that position until June 30, 1961. His

past responsibilities included being Vice President of the May Department Stores from 1938-42; he held the same position for the J.W. Robinson Stores from 1942-51. During that time he was also President of the California Retailers Association. His government

involvement included a state appointment to the new Unemployment Insurance Program and a federal position in the Advisory Council of the U.S. Employment Service in the 1930s, and during World War II he was the Southern California Director of Price Administration.

Sam Leask Jr. was born March 5, 1894, in Santa Cruz, Calif. He grew up in a family of retail merchants. His father, Samuel Leask Sr., born in Scotland, was a tradesman in the wool and garment business. Sam Jr. worked for his father from the time he left grammar school in 1908. Leask Sr., who owned a Santa Cruz department store, the Seaside Store, gave Sam Jr. the impetus for his understanding of sustained, proper management skills. The store was so viable it remained in business for 81 years. Young Sam, under the tutelage of his father and other staff members, was trained to learn the trade of merchandising. From Sam Jr.'s book, The Work of a Lifetime, he notes, "In line with his viewpoint on career development, my father decided that it would be good for me to pursue my store training for two or three years before going to high school...he [then] installed me as a Buyer for Linens and White Goods at age fourteen." In 1911, his formal high school education continued at the famed Harvard Prep School in Los Angeles.

After graduation from Harvard School, he attended school in Brussels, Belgium. Then with his dad and brother, Haswell, he toured Europe. The trip was cut short because of the onset of World War I. Upon returning home, Sam Jr. went to San Francisco to train at an upscale store for women. Once again, his mentors provided him with excellent practical knowledge of the trade and management skills. Sam remained at the quality store until his father called him home to solve executive staff issues that were causing major problems in the Santa Cruz operation. Sam Jr., much younger then the staff, was able to ameliorate the problems. Samuel J. Leask Jr. was on his management way. He then entered World War I where he served as a lieutenant in the United State Cavalry.

When Samuel J. Leask Jr. entered the world of Los Angeles city government as the first CAO, he brought varied and extensive management skills that offered the municipal organization new and profound skills to this monumental position.

centralized direction and coordination...necessary to secure upper limit of efficiency and economy of operation." He continued, "Some mechanism had to be devised which would bring the operating departments more fully under central control.'

Sam Leask Jr. maintained he was no politician. His primary concern was devoted to providing more efficiency as to more service for less money for the City of Los Angeles and its citizens. With all this in mind, he also claimed that it was imperative "that one cannot ignore the individuals in an organization in an all-out drive for efficiency." He continued that it was necessary for employees to participate in the new provisions. One of his first recommendations was to increase the salaries of policemen and firemen to that of other employee groups within City government.

He also believed in realigning the City's budget system from a "line budget" to that of a "functional budget." The functional budget was broad-based. It would look at similar functions found throughout the City. For example, swimming pools, where better budget control and planning would become more efficient. One of the most important issues he dealt with was Trivia from the City Archives employee salaries. At that time, 85 percent of the operating budget was dedicated to salaries and wages. He designed a program of scientific appraisal of workloads. He claimed that standards be set for measuring work accomplished. But, he realized that in an organization as large as City government not all functions met basic criterion. He, too, managed these issues as he did

others.

efficiency in the conduct of City government.

In 1928, a Charter amendment added a Special Salary Committee, of which the Director was to become a member. New duties were added to the Salary Standardization Ordinance in 1945, where the Director was to receive copies or recommendations from the Civil Service Commissioners to the City Council. The Director's staff researched the recommendations and reported to Council, as well as any other assignments given by the legislative body.

During that decade other additional duties for the Director included making "an annual survey of salaries and wages paid in a representative sample of business establishments and governmental agencies in the Los Angeles...area" that had comparable positions. Also, an "amendment required requests for new or additional positions to be referred to the Director for report[s] and recommendation[s] to the Personnel Committee of the Council." Other amendments to fine-tune

Their philosophies differed, and Leask felt it was time to leave at the age of 67. According to a Los Angeles Times article dated Jan. 7, 1963, upon his retirement, Governor Pat Brown appointed Leask to a health and welfare post with a salary of \$25,000, and then to a 10-year term on the State Personnel Board.

LA Bans Dog Tethering

The City Council passed a vote that bans tethering in the City of Los Angeles. LA Animal Services has made this a top priority and worked on presenting this to Council for more than two years. Animal Services has seen an accumulation of complaints on dogs that have been tethered inhumanely, and a dog that is tethered is three times more likely to bite than a dog that is not.

These were unacceptable conditions and bad odds," states General Manager Guerdon Stuckey. "So LA Animal Services set out to pass an ordinance that would ban tethering, and we did.'

Such complaints that the Department received for tethering were entanglement; dogs hanging themselves; no access to food, water or shelter; and dogs that had the collars imbedded in their necks that were in need of medical treatment. That's why the Department sought the ban.

The municipal code that was passed clearly defines that a dog must not be tethered. It does have caging requirements if needed. The law also has a provision that you can tether your dog if you are completing a temporary task, like repairing your fence, having a party, giving security for the gardener, etc.

But also is very clear on how to tether your dog. For example, the length of the tether

must be three times the length of the dog and it must be with a body harness, free from entanglement with access to food, water and shelter at all times.

"This is a great accomplishment for LA Animal Services," said Commander David Diliberto.

Penalties for noncompliance:

A violation of this law may be punishable as either an infraction or a misdemeanor at the sole discretion of the Los Angeles City Attorney's Office. The maximum penalty for a conviction of this tethering law as an infraction is a fine of \$250. The maximum penalty for a conviction of this law as a misdemeanor is a fine of \$1,000, imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not more than six months, or by both a fine and imprisonment.

Reese will chair the International Planning Committee and oversee an Honorary Committee, currently being established.

"The Cultural Affairs Department looks forward to hosting this unprecedented discourse on music, including current issues which revolve around digital advancements and the livelihood of artists," says Reese, who was previously the Director of Cultural Affairs for Dallas, Texas, prior to being selected to lead Los Angeles' Cultural Affairs Department.

The World Forum on Music is being mounted as a global knowledge platform on music and society in the 21st Century. It provides innovative opportunities for government officials, industry executives and professionals, scholars, artists and students to engage in serious debates on current key issues. First of its kind, it seeks synergies across different sectors and societies, thereby exploring and effectively integrating different perspectives. The World Forum on Music will address issues relating to music and social change, music education and training, technology and public access, and copyright and the livelihood of music makers.

The International Music Council (IMC), a non-governmental advisory body on music, considers the experience of music and music making a vital part of the everyday life of all people. The International Music Council monitors the availability of access to music for all; it informs widely about music and the right to it; and it exercises advocacy when needed.


Ahlswede on keyboards, Rudy Roman on sax, Hirth Martinez on guitar and Paul Costellanos on trombone.



Mines Field was dedicated and opened as the official airport of Los Angeles in 1930. When Mines Field was opened it covered 640 acres.

The name was changed to Los Angeles Airport in 1941 and to Los Angeles International Airport in 1949. The current airport covers 3,425 acres, and is the third busiest airport in the United States. Hanger #1 is located at 5701 W. Imperial Hwy. It was designed by the architectural firm of Gable & Wyant. It was declared historic cultural monument #44 on Nov. 16, 1966.




Batman Begins Rated PG-13 Adults and adolescents My Score: 4 (out of 5)

Tailgating!

50 Yard-Line Jalapeños

INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 lb. ground beef
- 10-12 popper-size jalapeños
- Small onion
- 1 lb. bacon
- 12 oz to 1lb. Monterey Jack cheese w/jalapeños



DIRECTIONS:

Chop onion and brown in small amount of oil. Add hamburger and brown and drain. Grate cheese and mix with hamburger. Cut top of jalapeños and core out the seeds. Slit down to 1/4 inch from bottom. Stuff with hamburger mixture. Wrap slice of bacon around popper. Stick with toothpick if necessary. Grill over coals until done.

Sun Devil Refried Bean Dip

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1 package taco seasoning 1 can refried beans
- Tomatoes and scallions, chopped
- Shredded cheese (such as cheddar)

DIRECTIONS:

- Mix together taco mix, sour cream and mayonnaise.
- Add layers (in order from bottom to top):
- Refried beans
- Taco mix
- Shredded cheese
- Chopped tomatoes and scallions
- For larger gatherings, double the recipe.

Hint: when spreading the refried beans in the bottom of your serving dish, you may find this hard since it's just out of the can. Try spooning the beans into a bowl first, then microwave for a short time. This will soften the refried beans, making it easier to spread in your dish.

Stadium-Grilled Bratwurst

INGREDIENTS

- 6 each bratwurst sausages
- 1 chopped onion
- 6 rolls
- Your favorite mustard

DIRECTIONS:

Combine the sausages, beer and onion in a saucepan. Simmer for 30 minutes. Drain well and grill for 10 minutes, turning frequently, or until browned on all sides.



When you combine families, neighbors and fans with game day (that means pregame, halftime, and post-game), what do you get? Tailgating! With football, tailgating is the name of the game. It is as if the football forefathers

the game. It is as if the football forefathers created football holidays just for us – which requires us to make great football food.

Where did tailgating begin? It would seem that our tailgating forefathers had their first tailgate during the first college football game between Rutgers and Princeton in 1869. Others would argue that Yale had the honor. Or maybe tailgating first happened at other locations around the country. But really, what true tailgater would rather waste time arguing history instead of enjoying a deliciously grilled brat or hot dog?

Here are a few recipes that will do well while you cheer on your favorite team. Take, for instance, the Sun Devil Refried Bean Dip. It is a simple recipe that calls for several ingredients and then mixing them together in a bowl. If you are looking for a low-fat version, substitute non-fat sour cream, low-fat mayonnaise and low fat cheddar cheese. That way, you can reduce the fat content by as much as 60 percent without affecting the flavor. Trojan Steak is a recipe that requires a marinade; it's necessary that you marinate it for 24 hours. Once the 24 hours are over, it is time to grill it on the barbeque. Believe me, this is a recipe that is up for a national title!

50 Yard Line Jalapeños is another stellar recipe. After grilling, you will be surprised how the jalapeños have mellowed and have a slightly sweet taste.

A tailgate cannot be called as such without the all-important bratwurst. It is the right of passage for diehard football fans. Brats are best cooked on the grill but they can be boiled or sautéed on a pan, too. I personally prefer the grill because I like the slight crispiness that develops on bratwursts when grilling them. After you cook them, it is important to find a mustard variety that you like. Try Stadium-Crilled Bratwurst:





Serve in rolls with your favorite mustard.

Trojan Steak

INGREDIENTS

- 2 flank steaks about 2 1/2 lbs.
- 2/3 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup hot pepper sauce
- 1/3 cup Worcestershire sauce
- 4 tblsp dry red wine
- 4 tblsp red wine vinegar
- 2 1/2 tbsp dark brown sugar
- 2 cloves minced garlic
- 2 tblsp A-1 steak sauce



DIRECTIONS:

Mix all ingredients (except the steak) into mixing bowl and then pour over the steaks for at least 24 hours, but two days would be better. Remove the steaks (save the marinade) and grill over hot coals till done, about 5 minutes a side. Meanwhile, bring to a boil and reduce the marinade in a saucepan by about one-third. Let the steaks rest 10 minutes or so. Cut on the grain and serve with reduced sauce poured over.
