

High Claims Nix Insurance Refund Checks

■ A 50 percent jump in claims means there will be no refund checks this year.



CLUB HEADQUARTERS — The Club's life insurance promises to be there for those in need. And during a year of extreme demands on those funds, the Club's program delivered.

But because of the high number of claims this year, for only the third time in 78 years, there will be no life insurance refund checks for Club Member Policyholders.

In fiscal year 2006, the Club paid out more than \$3.9 million — a 50 percent increase from last year — in claims. That 50 percent jump consumed the funds that in most years are redistributed back to policyholders.

The insurance program worked exactly as it





"Whereas Edward L. Piña began his career as an exempt Maintenance and Construction Helper on January 20, 1975, and worked in that capacity with Public Works; and

"Whereas Edward L. Piña was promoted to a regular position in 1978 as a Maintenance and Construction Helper with Rec and Parks; and

"Whereas Edward L. Piña was appointed to a Mechanical Repairer I position on an emergency appointment in 1980, within Rec and Parks; and

LACERS a Top Performer

■ Retirement fund significantly tops its benchmark rate.

LACERS — For the period ending June 30, the Los Angeles City Employees' Retirement System (LAC-ERS) reported that LACERS total investment portfolio was up 12.4 percent over the last 12-month period, significantly beating its annual 8 percent benchmark rate of return used in the valuation of its total assets. LACERS' assets were valued at \$9.3 billion – up \$1 billion from the previous fiscal year ending June 30, 2005.

Three significant factors account for this rise the performance returns of LACERS' non-U.S. equity, real estate, and private equity portfolios, which were up 28.9 percent, 25.6 percent and 27.5 percent, respectively, for the year. LACERS' domestic equity portfolio was up 10.6 percent during that time period. Bonds posted a flat return of .1 percent for the year. Both asset classes outperformed their benchmarks over all longer time periods.

LACERS continues to perform in the top quartile of public pension funds for one-, two-, three-, four-, and five-year time periods. "Our performance is the result of a true collaboration between the Board of Administration, our consultants, and our investment staff," said LACERS Board President Eric Holoman. "Our focus on costs while pursuing prudent alternative investment strategies has served our members well."

A recent cost-effective analysis of LACERS fund performed by Cost Effective Measurement, Inc. found that LACERS generated higher returns at lower cost and with lower risk when compared to its peer group of U.S. pension funds with assets from \$6.9 billion to \$14 billion. Its five-year investment return was 7.8 percent, which was above its peer median of 6.5 percent. LACERS' total asset management costs of 38.6 basis points were also below its comparison benchmark cost of 47.9 basis points, suggesting that the fund was low cost by -9.3 basis points. And its five-year implementation risk was 0.6 percent, well below its peer median of 1.2 percent.

LACERS pension fund has assets of more than \$9.8 billion and administers benefits for 27, 000 employees and 14,000 retirees. LACERS health benefits program is a \$63 million-a-year program covering more than 10,000 retirees and surviving

Seeing America in a Mustang

■ Hal travels from Nashville to Los Angeles and meets up with the Opry, Elvis and asteroid craters.

It has been more 40 years since my last road trip. In fact, my last trip brought me from college in Toledo, Ohio, to Los Angeles in 1963, and that was in the middle of winter. So when one of my good friends asked if I would like to fly back to Nashville last spring and drive the new Ford Mustang he won, I couldn't resist.

The first thing I did was hop on the computer to see what route would be the best during that time of the year. I dismissed any of the northern routes as being too cold. So that left either Interstate 40 straight through or branch off on Interstate 10 for a more southerly route. After discussing this with my friend, Marv, we decided on I-40 all the way, which would take us from Nashville to Memphis, Okalahoma City, Albuquerque and then to Los Angeles.

I flew into Nashville on Tuesday afternoon. Marv and his wife picked me up, and we drove to the Opryland Hotel. Marv had gotten tickets to the Grand Ole Opry radio show (www.opry.com), so we decided to hang out at the hotel and have dinner before the show. It's a great hotel, completely enclosed with everything you would need in a destination resort. The only problem is that it is a half-hour drive from downtown Nashville.

We had dinner at the Aquarium Restaurant in the Opry Mills Mall. The dining room was surrounded by a 200,000-gallon, floor-to-ceiling aquarium. The food was so-so, but the fish were enjoyable.

Producers of the radio show say is the longest running radio show. It features the best in country, bluegrass and Cajun music, with some comedy tossed in for good measure. We saw 12 performers, of which three were Country Music Hall of Fame members.

The next day, Marv and his wife, Barbara, were going to pick up the car, so I had the day on my own. We were staying at the downtown Hilton Hotel directly across from the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum, so I made that my first stop.

I'm not much of a country music fan, but

the museum, which claims to be the largest popular music museum in the world, is a not-to-be-missed experience.

I booked a tour of the Hermitage and Belle Meade Plantation with Gray Line Tours. The Hermitage is the 1837 mansion built by Andrew Jackson for his family. I had a guided tour of the mansion and then was allowed to walk around the grounds, which have the tombs of Andrew and Rachel Jackson.

Belle Meade Plantation was built in 1853 to breed racehorses. Because it was not growing crops, it was not destroyed during the Civil

War and retains many of the original buildings. What was most interesting is that almost all of the thoroughbred bloodlines can be traced to this plantation.

The first night we spent some time on Broadway, which has many country music bars. The next night we stopped by the Bluebird Café (4104 Hillsboro Pike), which showcases new country singers and writers.

Thursday morning, we put Marv's wife on a plane for Los Angeles and we drove to Memphis, only about 200 miles from Nashville. If Nashville is the home of country music, then Memphis is the home of rock and roll. Our first stop was Graceland (3734 Elvis Presley Blvd.), the home of Elvis Presley.

The year 2006 is the 50th anniversary of Elvis's first hit, "Heartbreak Hotel." A year later, in March 1957, Elvis brought Graceland for himself and his parents. We purchased a combination ticket, which included: man-

sion tour, automobile museum, Elvis' custom jets and the Sincerely Elvis Museum. To me, Graceland was the highlight of the trip. The presentation of the memorabilia made me feel that I was there with Elvis and his family. His daughter still owes the house and stays there when she is in Memphis.

I was really looking forward to having Memphis barbeque, so we asked the hotel for a recommendation. They sent us to the Rendezvous (52 S. Second St.), down an ally in the basement of a very large building. We had dry-rubbed ribs served on paper plates, and the meal was great.

After dinner, we walked around Beale Street, which is like Bourbon Street in New Orleans, except Beale Street has rows of rock and roll bars. At night they close off the street to cars and you can take your drinks from bar to bar.

Next stop was Oklahoma City, 475 miles from Memphis. We arrived in the late afternoon and stopped at the Oklahoma City National Memorial and Museum.

> us in free. We entered the park at the north entrance just off I-40 and stopped at the Painted Desert Visitor Center. We followed the road north, stopping to see the Painted Desert landscape and then headed south into the Petrified Forest, exiting at the south entrance at US-180. We stopped along the way a few times to get a closer few of the petrified wood. As we drove through the park we could see the remains of Route 66, and I remembered my first trip here in 1962 when you could just stop along the road and see the petri-

The visitor center has an interesting display of information on meteors and space activity.

We still felt good, so we decided to drive to Laughlin, Nev., and stay the night and drive to Los Angeles in the morning.



He received another round of applause. This month, he will receive a lot of more recognition as his beautifully renovated Griffith Observatory opens to the public. It should be open by the time you read this.





Villaraigosa, Mayor of the City of Los Angeles and all of its astronomically incorporated territory.'

Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa at a press conference enthused "When you think about the universe and its limitless possibilities, I think about Los Angeles, the City without limits, the City of incredible possibilities. It is fitting that we have a world-class observatory here in Los Angeles that has once again been restored to its world-class status and renovation.'

"As we all know, this Observatory is one of the greatest icons in all of America," said Councilman and Club Member Tom LaBonge, who worked hard in the renovation effort. "This stacks up to all the great buildings and monuments in this country. I love it tremendously as a building [and] the way it presents astronomy to countless numbers of people, including our school children, which is so important."

Credit to All Departments


"The new and improved [Observatory] could not have been done without City employees," Jon Kirk Mukri, General Manager, Rec and Parks, told Club CEO John Hawkins at the conference. "Just about every single department has played a key role in making this what it is. It's just not Rec and Parks, not just Bureau of Engineering; we had every single department. Without them, this would not have been here, period. There's no other way to say it.'

Is this one of the most exciting times for the City in the last ten years?

"Longer than that," he said. "This eclipses the reopening of City Hall. This building has been an icon since 1934 and it really reflects the character of Los Angeles. Reopening this gives the gift right back to the people who made this all happen: City employees and taxpayers. It's their building.

About the Observatory and the Renovation

pened in 1935, Griffith Observatory is one of the best- $\mathsf{U}_{\mathsf{known}}^{\mathsf{points}}$ and most visited public observatories in the world. Operated by Rec and Parks, the Observatory welcomed nearly 70 million visitors into the building prior to closing for renovation in January 2002. Construction on the renovation and expansion project began in October 2002. Pfeiffer Partners, Inc., in association with Levin & Associates Architects, are the architects for the project, working together with Rec and Parks, the Bureau of Engineering, and Friends of the Observatory. Amoroso was the renovation construction contractor. Exhibits were designed by C&G Partners LLC and fabricated and installed by Maltbie, Inc.

How to Get In, and How to Get There

■ Reservations are required, and you'll have to take a shuttle, at least for awhile,

In response to the overwhelming number of projected visitors to the Observatory, a temporary visitor access program has been implemented, featuring a timed-entry and shuttle reservation system that will prevent long waits and overcrowding. In addition, 48 hours in advance, a limited number of timed-entry reservations will become available for hikers and cyclists who want to visit the Observatory.

During the months after reopening, there will be absolutely no drive-up access to the Observatory permitted. Everyone must have a timed-entry reservation to be admitted to the Observatory.

Reservations guarantee entry to Griffith Observatory and seats on a shuttle to and from the Observatory. Two points of departure with adequate parking have been established: the parking lot at the Hollywood and Highland entertainment complex in Hollywood; and the current Griffith Observatory Satellite, adjacent to the Los Angeles Zoo and Botanical Gardens, in Griffith Park. At Hollywood & Highland, visitors will find their shuttle bus at Orange Court, the tour bus departure on Orange Dr. near Hollywood Blvd.

- Reservations may be made in-person at a reservation center at the Griffith Observatory Satellite (4800 Western Heritage Way, Los Angeles, CA 90027).





Dealing With Difficult People

It's a typical afternoon at the office and you're thinking about getting that cup of coffee to help you through the remainder of the day. You're almost done with your phone conversation when you hear loud voices coming from somewhere in the office. You hear bits and snatches of conversation. Two employees are going at it - arguing. Frustration is in the air. Tension is mounting. Then, kaboom, a major explosion! One of them yells and is now totally out of control. Someone steps in. Whispers. One of the frustrated employees leaves. Dead silence follows. There's a collective sigh. Everyone back to work – if you can after all that. This would be the best time to go get that cup of coffee.

Work is not always a walk in the park. There are goals and tasks at hand and yes, a lot of frustration on many different levels. Some deal with the frustration better than others do. Unfortunately, there are a handful (and I hope just a handful) of people who will resort to knee-jerk reactions when things start to get a little rough. They become extremely difficult. So, how does one cope?

Sometimes, just being able to recognize certain types of difficult people can help us cope and deal with them. A book by Rick Brinkman and Rick Kirschner called Dealing with People You Can't Stand lists the types of difficult people based on behavior. Here they are:

The Sherman Tank or Steamroller

This is your office bully – hostile, aggressive and angry. The Sherman Tank will leave you feeling flattened if you happen to be a target or happen to just be in the way.

The Sniper

The Sniper will use any or a combination of the following to make you feel and look foolish or inept: eye rolling, rude and stinging negative remarks, criticism, sarcasm and humor. The Sniper is also classified as hostile-

• The Exploder or Grenade

Being with an Exploder is like sitting atop a volcano. One minute calm and composed and the next minute: kaboom! You've got a major, out-of-control explosion! You'll never know what hit you. Needless to say, this type is hostile-aggressive.

• The Complainer or Whiner

The Complainer is a miserable person who feels utterly helpless against a mean, cruel and unjust world. This person whines to the wrong people, refuses to do anything to resolve any complaint(s) and only feel validated when others share in the misery.

• The Clam/ Blank Wall / The Nothing

Talking to this person would be like talking to a blank wall. You get nothing. No conversation. No emotion. No verbal signals. No nonverbal signals. Nothing!

The Negativist or The No Person

This person personifies the Grim Reaper, spreading doom and gloom and darkness. Beware. The Negativist will sap your drive, energy and strength and will not stop until you are exhausted.

• The Know-It-All or Expert

This person can either be knowledgeable in his/her own wright or can be a phony expert. Whatever the case, the Know-It-All likes to lecture and wield great authority and knowledge, quoting facts and figures (true or otherwise). The Expert (at everything) must always be right and cannot stand to be corrected or contradicted. However, the Expert has no problem going out of his/her way to correct

• The Super Agreeable or Yes Person

Whatever the request is, the answer is a compulsive "ves" or "sure" or "no problem. This person is extremely nice and ever-soeager to please. Unfortunately, the Super Agreeable can also take on much more than he/she can handle and so will most likely let you down simply because the load heaped on is more than this person can handle.

• The Indecisive/Maybe Person

Decisions are excruciating and painful for the Indecisive, who is too terrified to make a decision, lest the decision render someone with hurt feelings or, God forbid, be the wrong decision. Whatever the question is, the answer will be delayed and/or result in a "maybe."

I hope that identifying the types of difficult people we all have to put up with leaves us in a better position to cope with them. We all can react to frustration occasionally in one or more ways described above. The difference is that difficult people are defined through the consistency of their responses.

The agency was started in 1953 by Bob Lloyd, and in 1963 he added a partner, Ken Sommerville.

Alive!: What services and products are you offering Club members?

Jeff Gelineau: As an agency, we provide a full range of insurance products. Most specifically we will work with Club members on their home and auto insurance. And any other toys that people like to insure, like boats, motorcycles, RVs, even ATVs and things like that, jet skis. We also help people out with investment properties, like small apartment buildings or rental houses, things like that. We insure those,

Alive!: What makes United Agencies different from other agencies that offer those types of products?

Jeff Gelineau: There are two main kinds of insurance agencies. There is what is called a direct agency. These agents are contractually bound to one insurance company.

The other kind of agency in the United States is independent agents like us. Independent agents sign contracts with as many insurance companies as they can to represent different insurance companies. United Agencies is an independent agent.

Alive!: You do the shopping for the customer, don't you? In the sense that you are looking out for everything they need.

Jeff Gelineau: Right.

Direct writer insurance companies do a good job. [But if your conditions change,] all of the sudden you are paying a lot of money because they are not structured to insure those kind of risks. So the advantage of dealing with an independent agent is that we have got lots of different companies.

Alive!: Lots of resources. Jeff Gelineau: Yeah.

Alive!: As we walked into your office today, we noticed that, much like the Club office, there is someone at the front handling the phones and greeting people as they walk in. And then as we walked into your office, I noticed this framed

Jeff Gelineau: The Company Vision.

Alive!: Can you tell us a little bit about that?

Jeff Gelineau: We are committed to having a live person answer the phone. In today's mar-

provide. And even with technology, technology tempts you to do away with a live person and, you know, just have the whole thing handled by voice mails and those message machines where you press one and press two. But we are committed to having our customers talk to someone when they call. (See related story.)

And we are also committed to our community. We try to find ways to give back to the people we work with. Right now we are working with the Burbank School District in providing schools supplies for kids here in Burbank that need them. We delivered more than 100 backpacks in September to school kids.

So that is kind of where we are. It is all about people.

Alive!: You are in the relationship business, aren't you?

Jeff Gelineau: Exactly. Insurance is not a product. There is nothing you can put in a bag, nothing you can deliver. All you are doing is you are delivering a promise of security, of financial repair to a person's injury. And that is based on trust. So it is based on relationships.

We have to maintain great relationships with our customers because they have lots of choice in insurance. They could go anywhere. But we want them to appreciate and value dealing

Alive!: How many of your employees work in liability insurance, like auto insurance and homeowners' insurance?

Jeff Gelineau: We have seven employees who specialize solely in personal insurance.

CURRENT TRENDS

Alive!: Do you foresee any issues in the auto insurance industry that might affect Club members in the near future?

Jeff Gelineau: There are some really good things coming in the auto insurance industry. We have got two companies that have announced some pretty major reductions in their rates. Mercury is taking a 22 percent decrease [in premiums] for people with children, teens, teen drivers. Safeco's decrease is between an eight and 20 percent decrease. So the good news right now is that the rates are coming down. That should be really good news

Too often people just kind of just pay the premium. Every six months the bill comes and people pay it and do not really get a competitive look. You really should reassess what you are paying every three to five years. Get a competitive quote to make sure that you are

Our computer system automatically quotes from 20 companies.

Alive!: Some of our Club members live in other states: Nevada, Arizona, even some other states. Would you be able to insure these people in these other states?

Jeff Gelineau: We are appointed in 49 states. So pretty much in every state we are able to write insurance.

KEEPING FAMILIES STRONG

Jeff Gelineau: One of the focuses of the Club is to just help its members make decisions that are good for their members' family. We feel we shine as an agency in our ability to explain the insurance products that each person needs and discuss what is best for them and their family. We can look at a lot of different products and see how one might serve you better than the other. We have been doing this for a long time. It is a matter of making intelligent decisions.

Alive!: What are the cheapest cars to insure for a 16-year-old these days?

Jeff Gelineau: That is a good question. The key thing when you have a teenager is to understand that they are probably going to be in an accident. So in my opinion, you do not want to give them a car that is too expensive. That is where a lot of the [insurance] cost is.

Alive!: Are there going to be any incentives for Club members to switch to United Agencies?



Beautiful Bridge

■ Rec and Parks completes its handsome Echo Park Lake Bridge project.

REC AND PARKS — Recreation and Parks staff has put the finishing touches on the reconstructed Echo Park Lake Bridge, completing their work an entire week before the 29th annual Lotus

Deteriorated to the point where it was unsafe to cross, the bridge and island were closed to park users. In the interim, with the exception of the occasional filming or special event, the island has become a de facto bird sanctuary.

Rec and Parks' Metro Griffith Park Construction Services crews, under the supervision of Larry Mottler, stripped the bridge of all its wood decking and rails, all the way down to the steel support structure. With pontoons as a work platform, the crew stripped the paint, rebuilt the wooden deck and railing, repaved the approach, and finally repainted the bridge. At the urging of the Echo Park Historical Society, several layers of red paint were peeled away from the steel structure to expose four or more layers of green, last seen more than 14 years ago before the bridge was unfortunately painted red. The green bridge can also be appreciated in the 1974 film classic, Chinatown.

It is anticipated that a new decorative, artistdesigned and -fabricated gate will replace the steel bars that restrict access to the bridge and that the island might be made accessible for special events or possibly during daylight hours.



A Modern Boyle Heights

■ Hynda Rudd concludes her three-part history of Boyle Heights.

In conclusion of the history of Boyle Heights, this chapter is the most difficult to write, because it deals often with the here and now. Granted that it has been 60 years since World War II, but there has not been enough time to savor all the complexities that have occurred within this topic itself. Therefore, this treatise becomes more like reporting rather than historytelling.

A number of items come from the City's General Plan, produced through the Planning Department. This plan includes 35 individual Community Plans, one being Boyle Heights, mandated Nov. 10, 1998. The purpose of these plans, for Boyle Heights as for the other communities, is to provide a general guide to the development of the community.

Boyle Heights today is surrounded by the unincorporated community of East Los Angeles to the east, Lincoln Heights and El Sereno to the north, Vernon to the south and the Los Angeles River and downtown to the west. The Heights is about six square miles, or 3,807 acres, inhabited mostly by Mexican immigrants and second-generation Mexican-

Within the publication, Los Angeles' Boyle Heights produced by the Japanese American Museum, is a discussion of what happened in that area during World War II.

"Boyle Heights was particularly vulnerable to wartime racial and political scapegoating because it was home to many labor activists, communists, socialists, racial minorities and non-citizen 'aliens." Many young men from the area served in the armed forces, while others were conscientious objectors. As mentioned in the previous article, the Japanese-Americans of Boyle Heights were forced to leave the neighborhood for internment camps. Also, the war changed women's roles in the workplace, while other minority residents were able to advance to previously unavailable positions in the workplace.

Property, Freeways and Government Intervention

The housing in Boyle Heights, according to the Nov. 10, 1998, Community Plan, was very old. Many subdivisions were built back in the 1920s. "During ...this period the physical environment of Boyle Heights evolved as the industries located on the Westside of the Los Angeles River expanded into the northern, western and southern edges of the Boyle Heights Community."

During the 1950s, four public housing proj-

ects were built. Eventually, two were enlarged. But what really changed the infrastructure of the community was the construction of four major freeways within its confines. Two were built in the 1940s, the other two in the 1960s. As a result, Boyle Heights became segmented into four small areas, with one larger neighborhood. This division of land had an impact of poor services to some of these segments. Also, with the building of the freeways, property values dropped considerably, while many local residents moved elsewhere out of Boyle

A number of government agencies worked

to provide assistance to the community. Those mentioned in the 1998 City Plan report are: the Metro Rail Red Line extensions; the Housing Authority redevelopment of the Aliso Village public housing project; the Community Redevelopment Agency, evaluating industrial and commercial issues via a feasibility study; a state-sponsored Enterprise Zone, acknowledging that Boyle Heights be designated a High Density Unemployment Area (HDUA); the Los Angeles Neighborhood Initiative (LANI) project; and the expansion of the Los Angeles County-USC Medical Center. At this time, this author does not know the outcome of these projects. But information could be found within the City Archives.

World War II

Boyle Heights was the center of some difficult racial strife in Los Angeles during World War II. Two incidents stand out: the Sleepy Lagoon murder investigation, and the Zoot Suit Riots

in June 1943. The riots made national news. But the precursor to those riots began a year earlier, when anti-Mexican sentiment escalated during the investigation of the Sleepy Lagoon Murder. homicide, This which involved the death of a teenaged boy near a swimming hole near Atlantic and Slauson Boulevards August 1942, had

great impact on all young Mexican-Americans.

During the investigation, 300 Mexican-American youths were rounded up, of which 23 were arrested on murder charges. It was never proven that the teenager was even murdered. The press featured the incident on the front pages for months. A quotation from the volume Los Angeles A to Z was that a member of the Sheriff's office "testified that

Mexicans committed cruel crimes because they were Indians."

The "Zoot Suit Riots" hit Los Angeles the next year, between June 3 and June 13, 1943. The confrontations were racist in nature, resulting in part from the Sleepy Lagoon case. The riots involved 11 American servicemen stationed in the City, who claimed they had been attacked by a gang of young Mexican Americans. So the servicemen started a series of riots against American - and at times African-American and

Filipino-American - youths who wore the ornate, dazzling, drape-shouldered outfits. Police arrested nine servicemen (eight of whom were released; one had to pay a fine) and more than 600 Mexican-Americans.

The rampage was felt in all neighborhoods of downtown Los Angeles, including Boyle Heights. A Sleepy Lagoon Defense Committee was formed, headed by attorney and author Carey McWilliams. While 17 of the 23 Mexican-American defendants were convicted of murder and assault, the U.S. District Court overturned the convictions in October 1944.

This past confrontation was considered a gang-related offense. The residents today in Boyle Heights continue to struggle with gang infiltration that has many, many roots and just as many needed solutions. This past April, there was a report from Council President Eric Garcetti (14th District), stating that there is a "Gang Reduction Program that incorporates a five-pronged strategy in antigang strategies." This came about from a \$2.5 million grant to the City from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.



POLICE DEPT. — Pedro M. Muñiz, Public Relations Specialist, LAPD, was one of five "Local Heroes" honored at an awards ceremony Sept. 21.

Union Bank of California and KCET select honorees during respective heritage months for Americans, Hispanic Asian/Pacific Americans and African Americans. September marked Hispanic Heritage Month. Award recipients were selected for their commitment and contributions to the arts, business, education, social services, and community activism. Muñiz received the award in the category of social services.

In 2003, the Public Relations Specialist spearheaded a hard-hitting Spanish language media campaign to foster public trust and support. In its third year, Muñiz's groundbreaking approach to community outreach has brought criminals to justice and has strengthened ties between the Spanish-speaking population and the LAPD.

His dynamic leadership and pioneering efforts have achieved maximum exposure for the Department in millions of Spanish-speaking households via such influential organizations as Univision KMEX 34 and Telemundo KVEA 52.

Through his efforts, several suspects have been captured. For instance, a homicide suspect was apprehended after detectives appeared on Spanish-language television, prompting a flood of calls from the public. Similarly, the Department's Fugitive Warrants Section captured three suspects following a public appeal made on television by a Spanish-speaking officer.

To date, Muñiz continues to coordinate weekly television interviews, monthly public service announcements, and television specials. He has also expanded the campaign to include radio broadcasts via Univision Radio Los Angeles, Spanish Broadcasting

System, and others. Among his work is Su Seguro Servidor, or Your Trusted Servant, which showcases Spanish-speaking police officers who are subject-matter experts. These officers deliver culturally relevant messages, including What to do When You Get Pulled Over; How to Start a Neighborhood Watch Program; Misuse of the 911

Emergency Line; Graffiti Prevention and Elimination; Gang Awareness; Gun Fire Reduction Program; Identity Theft; and Hate

In a community often challenged by language barriers and distrust of law enforcement entities, Muñiz's campaign has softened the image of police officers; improved community relations and quality of life; and ultimately reassured residents that police officers are protectors rather than persecutors. Moreover, the campaign has helped officers gain a better understanding and

enhanced appreciation for the diversity of Los Angeles.

Recognizing the impact of his work, the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) invited Muñiz to present the details of his campaign in a workshop at the 2005 IACP conference in Miami, attended by law enforcement personnel from around the globe. The workshop was titled, Improving Your Image in the Latino Community: How the LAPD Created Positive Partnerships with the Hispanic Media. Representatives from at least one other major U.S. city approached Muñiz to ask questions about implementing a similar campaign.

Among Muñiz's other noteworthy contributions is the LAPD Essay Contest, which he began in 2004. The annual writing challenge advances education through literacy, prompting nearly 30,000 middle school students to take an analytical look at youth crime and law enforcement.

In collaboration with Univision KMEX 34 and La Opinión, the largest Spanish-language newspaper in Southern California, the initiative encourages contestants to engage in serious discussions with peers, teachers, and parents about issues such as drug use, gang activity and domestic violence.

The LAPD Essay Contest, open to schools in the Los Angeles Unified School District and the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, promotes language arts, creativity, and proficiency.

Muñiz has gained support for the essay contest from a cross-section of Los Angeles organizations, including arts, business, and educational entities. Today, his campaign enjoys backing from the Los Angeles Philharmonic Association, the California Science Center, Wells Fargo Bank, and Polaroid, among others.

Muñiz has been with the City of Los Angeles at the Police Department for five years.


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

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

Because of that, there is no money left over after our policy premiums to pay any refund back. It's happened three times in our 78-year history. We're fortunate that this has happened only three times in those 78 years."

"Any given year doesn't figure to be a bad year, but there will bad years. And this was one of them."

Club life insurance is still robust and strong.

"Our life insurance group is still very healthy," Trent continued. "The Club has plenty of reserves. Our first and foremost obligation to our members is to be financial secure and protect the lives of City Employees. 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The Height of High Tech, for Youths

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT — It wasn't just a ribbon cutting, it was a celebration of hope as Mayor Villaraigosa, Councilmember Jose Huizar, CDD General Manager Richard Benbow and community residents hailed the opening Sept. 22 of the Boyle Heights Technology Youth Center.

The 19,000 square foot, \$10.9 million facility in the heart of Boyle Heights is a state-of-the-art full time learning center that features computerequipped classrooms to prepare students to compete in the global technology revolution. The facility under construction was featured on the cover of Alive! in May.

"Every one of our children should dream big and reach for the stars with the best technology and resources that money can buy," Mayor Villaraigosa said. "We want to have our children prepared to bridge the digital divide and compete in a global marketplace."

The Los Angeles Community Development Department (CDD) directs the Los Angeles Youth Opportunity Movement (LAYOM), which will operate programs at the tech center. LAYOM programs promote youth achievement through education, employment and personal development goals. The tech center will complement and expand those programs. "The world of technology is ever changing and expanding," said CDD General Manager Richard Benbow. "We must prepare young people in the communities we serve to use technology as a pathway to higher education, job training, and employment oppor-

The Boyle Heights Technology Youth Center houses an alternative high school operated by the Los Angeles County Office of Education. Along with a core curriculum, classes in multi-media and graphic design, computer literacy, advanced computer training; various workshops, enrichment opportunities and a tutorial for the high school exit exam will be offered.

This technology center will give area youths, many considered at-risk, an infusion of hope and the opportunity to develop the skills they need to get and keep a job in an increasingly competitive job market.

Funding for construction of the tech center came from a variety of sources, including \$5,741,236 from an Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG); \$4,738,764 from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG); \$630,000 in Proposition-12 funds; and \$100,000 in federal EDI Special Project Grant



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

INGREDIENTS:

- French bread
- Turkey
- Mayonnaise
- Mustard
- Cranberry sauce
- Candied yams
- Lettuce
- Scallions
- Cheese (I like Muenster)
- · Salt and pepper



DIRECTIONS:



Choose your favorite bread. I have chosen French bread because I like French bread.



Take a few generous slices of cheese.



Place the cheese on the sliced bread and put in the oven until the cheese melts at 350 degrees F.



Place the turkey on the bread.



Add mustard and mayo on the other side of the bread.



Take out that leftover cranberry sauce and candied yams and, if you can find them, you can add some micro greens.

INGREDIENTS:

One-quarter-cup vegetable oil One-quarter-cup finely chopped fresh

cilantro 1-1/2 ounces tequila

1-1/2 tablespoons ground cumin

1 tablespoon chopped garlic

1 teaspoon salt

1-1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1-1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken breast

halves 1-1/2 stick butter

DIRECTIONS:

Fat: 30 grams

Heat oven 400 degrees F. In a large bowl, combine oil, cilantro, tequila, cumin, garlic, salt, pepper and cayenne. Add chicken and toss to coat. Transfer chicken to a baking sheet. 
