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

at the event every night, and powering them down at close.

As such, she was the highest-ranking technical officer at the location. That made her the first woman in charge of the day-to-day electrical operations of the Festival, which closed for the season at the beginning of this month.

"I didn't realize on my first day that [the festival] would be my responsibility," Anita explained from outside her temporary office at the midway point of the annual light festival route in Griffith Park. She was assigned to supervise the geographical area that includes Griffith Park six months ago. "But a few days later, when I met the crew, they told me, 'Guess what, Anita. We do the Light Festival!'

"The crew is really proud that they do it," she continued. "It's something we can bring our families to. Our usual work involves upgrading highvoltage transformers, circuit breakers and bus work in the City's distribution system. The work is not accessible to people outside the department. We can't bring our families to the stations. But we can bring them to the Light Festival. It's one of the few projects where we say, 'Come on down!' Everybody knows about the festival. It's fun."

She explained that producing the Light Festival doesn't require her and her crew to work more, in general, but it requires more preparation. "We have to do it on time, of course. We have to hit critical benchmarks by certain dates.

"It requires about 2,100 man-hours to produce, but three-quarters of those hours are before the event opens."

Anita, an enthusiastic Club Member, started with the City 16 years ago as a Steam Plant Assistant. She then was promoted to Electrical Mechanic, then to her current position as Supervisor.

She started coming to the Light Festival in 1996, when she came four times. She came at least once every year since, and she celebrated the first night of her first year in charge of it by attending the Festival on bike. This was the first

vear the DWP offered a night exclusively for bikers. Anita attended the bike event with her son.

She also credited the many City departments who play a critical role in the success of the Festival: Transportation, Rec and Parks, Building and Safety, the Zoo and the Fire and Police Departments.

How does it feel to be the first woman in charge of all the technical aspects of the Festival?

"Well, pretty much everything I do is a first," she laughed. "There is only one other woman supervisor [in a similar capacity], Lisa White. And I know she didn't have the geographic area, so I would be the first to do the Light Festival.

"I love my work. I love coordinating, planning and scheduling. I talk to hundreds of people every week so that my crew can continue working. We need everything to be in place to be as efficient as possible.

"If there's no power, there's no Festival. We would be out of business. That's why our role is key. "I'm looking forward to doing it every year!"

## Inspecting the Pipe

PUBLIC WORKS —Public Works concluded an important inspection of the Sanitation outfall into the Pacific Ocean Nov. 30. It was the pipeline's first internal inspection in its 50-year history.

Beaches had been closed as a precautionary measure while Hyperion Treatment Plant conducted an internal inspection of its Five-Mile Outfall pipe. Beaches were reopened at the end of November.

The inspection required that the Plant's highly treated secondary effluent (processed wastewater) be diverted from its Five-Mile Outfall to the Plant's One-Mile Outfall starting Nov. 28. Flow returned to the Five-Mile Outfall early Nov. 30. A team of divers entered the pipe to assess its structural condition and evaluate its reliability, and preliminary findings indicate that the pipe is in good shape.

The City executed an extensive plan to monitor water quality at the shoreline and at sea. The Environmental Monitoring Division's laboratory studies found low bacterial levels at and around the end of the One-Mile Outfall.

Hyperion Plant's Five-Mile Outfall is a pipe that runs under the ocean and through which Los

Angeles' processed wastewater, called effluent, is discharged daily. It was built in 1960, and is inspected externally every year. The Five-Mile Outfall has never been inspected internally during its near 50-year existence.

To assess the condition of the pipe and to ensure the safety of divers during the operation, Hyperion's highly treated secondary effluent was diverted from the Five-Mile Outfall to the Plant's One-Mile Outfall over the three-day period. As a precaution, beaches were closed from Ballona Creek to the Manhattan Beach Pier, and an extensive water-monitoring program was implemented throughout the diversion.

The inspection included several scientific and engineering exams, including an internal dive inspection, external remote operated vehicle inspection, field studies, hydraulic analysis, pressure evaluations and floor mapping. A six-month study will follow the inspection, and recommendations may be made for repairs or other work to the ocean pipeline to ensure it meets the highest safety standards.



## Hal Heads to the Happiest Place

 $M^{\mathrm{y}}$  three grandkids had a day off from school, so my daughter decided it was time for their annual trip to Disneyland. I have not been there in about four years, so I decided to tag along. The date was Nov. 15, a Wednesday, and I figured it wouldn't be too

This would be a joint adventure with two other mothers with their four children. We had four adults and seven children, ranging in age from 5 to 11. It seemed that we had enough adults to keep the children under control; my wife, Evelyn, told me that you square the number of adults and that is the number of kids you can manage. By that rule we were fine.

I was in charge of getting tickets, and I checked the Disney Website to find out the regular price and to see if they had any specials, which of course they didn't. The regular price for an adult for a one-day ticket is \$63 and \$53 for children under 10. They are a number of combination tickets that include Californian Adventure and multi-day tickets and yearly passes, which can be a good deal if you like Disneyland. If you are a member of the City Employees Club of Los Angeles, you can get tickets for \$49 for an adult and \$44 for children.

November is a good time to go to Disneyland for a number of reasons: It is less crowded than in the summer, the weather is usually good and the park is decorated for

Christmas. All of which we found to be true. We wanted to be at the park when it opened at 10 a.m. We left Santa Monica at 8:30 a.m. and were at the Disneyland parking lot (\$11 per car) in one hour. California Adventure took most of the old parking lots, and a large parking structure was built. There is direct access to the parking structure from the I-5, and when you exit to go home you can get directly onto the freeway.

We entered the park and waited on Main Street until 10 a.m. when we were allowed to enter the other areas of the park. On this day, the park closed at 8 p.m., and we intended to see it all before then. My daughter had planned out our day with such military precision that, if she had planned the war in Iraq, we would have been finished there a long

My first visit to Disneyland was 18 days after it opened in 1955 and over the years they had made many improvements to help you navigate through the park. One of the best improvements was Fastpass, which provides a set time for popular rides like Splash

Our first stop was Fantasyland and, while we herded the group through Snow White's Castle, someone headed to Space Mountain in Tomorrowland to get a Fastpass. Because of the small (relatively speaking) crowds there, we really didn't need to. In fact the longest we waited for a ride during the day was maybe 15 minutes.

Peter Pan's Flight seems to be the most popular ride in Fantasyland, and the line was long. So we did Mr. Toad's Wild Ride,

Pinocchio's Daring Journey, and Snow White's Scary Adventures without waiting in line. I took the four older kids to the Mad Tea

Party, one of my favorite rides. At first the kids didn't want to let me ride with them, but they let me after I told them that I could make it go fast. The younger kids rode Dumbo the Flying Elephant.

We had the Fastpass for Space Mountain, and we headed over to Tomorrowland. Space Mountain is one of the rides that is closest to a roller coaster, but is not as scary. All of us but Coco, my youngest granddaughter, rode the ride. Buzz Lightyear Astro Blasters is a new ride that had been added since my last visit. You ride two people to a car and shoot at targets with a light gun. After the ride you can see your score and at the end they take your picture, which you can e-mail to anyone.

We walked back to Fantasyland to ride the Storybook Land Canal Boats and then decided to get lunch. They are many fast-food and sit-down restaurants in the park. Prices are high, and for a family of four you can easily spend \$75 for lunch. Drinks are expensive; a bottle of water is \$2.75. You can bring food into the park, and that maybe a good way to go to save money. We ate at the Tomorrowland Terrace, which had sandwiches and burgers. While we were eating the Star Wars characters put on a show for the kids. The performers brought a number of kids on stage and proceeded to teach them how to use a light saber, and then Darth Vader showed up and each kid got to fight him. At the end, they each received a certificate of

participation. It was great lunchtime entertainment.

It was about 1:30 p.m. and we still had a lot of the park to cover. We did Autopia, which, in my opinion, is a waste of time. The cars don't go very fast, and it was very hard for the younger kids to hold the accelerator

pedal down. You can't go to Disneyland without taking the "It's a Small World," ride and that was our next stop. It was decorated for the holidays and we came out singing the song.

From Fantasyland we walked into Frontierland and passed Big Thunder Ranch to ride Big Thunder Mountain Railroad, another fast, fun and bumpy ride.

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### Newsbrief

#### **NEW AIRPORT NAMES**

Dec. 4, the Los Angeles Board of Airport Commissioners approved to rename Ontario International Airport (ONT) and Palmdale Regional Airport (PMD) to LA/Ontario International Airport and LA/Palmdale Regional Airport, respectively.

ONT is in one of the fastest-growing regions in the United States with an air service market comprised of 3.5 million travelers. However, surveys of corporate travel managers and frequent business travelers based outside of Southern California show that ONT is not well known as a destination in Southern California. In addition, the city name and state identifier "Ontario, CA" often confuse travelers since the province name and country identifier of Ontario, Canada, is exactly the same.

Airline and Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) officials determined that the name change to LA/Ontario International Airport and LA/Palmdale Regional Airport will make the airports more marketable to inbound business and leisure travelers as a destination in the greater Los Angeles area.

"I am pleased to see the strong push by LAWA to develop the regional airports by creating an identity in Southern California," said Los Angeles Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa.

ONT is located in Southern California's "Inland Empire" region that includes San Bernardino and Riverside Counties. The medium-hub airport handles 7.2 million passengers and 575,000 tons of cargo

In contrast to ONT, only one airline had scheduled commercial service at PMD since 1998. However, LAWA expects scheduled air service to return to PMD in 2007. On Nov. 20, LAWA approved to solicit Request for Proposals to initiate commercial air service at PMD by a major airline or regional carrier affiliate.

PMD is in the Antelope Valley, in the northeast portion of the City of Palmdale on a 60acre site on U.S. Air Force Plant 42. The airport features a 9,000 square-foot terminal capable of handling up to 300,000 passengers annually. LAWA owns approximately 17,750 acres of land adjacent to Plant 42, most of which is available for development. The airport is approximately 60 miles northeast of downtown Los Angeles, off State Highway 14, commonly known as the Antelope Valley Freeway.

The new names will also reinforce the "We Fly as One" LAWA brand among its system of three commercial airports and clearly identify LAWA as an airport operator for the entire greater Los Angeles region.

Los Angeles World Airports is a self-supporting department in the City of Los Angeles, which owns and operates a system of four airports: LAX, LA/Ontario International (ONT), LA/Palmdale Regional (PMD), and Van Nuys (general aviation). LAWA's combined airports move 67 million passengers and 2.7 million tons of cargo a year; employ, directly and indirectly, more than 470,000 people; and generate nearly U.S. \$67 billion annually into the regional

#### insurance column, Club **Partner Jeff Gelineau talks** about insurance limits

The number one question that we get asked more than any other question is:

"How high of an insurance limit should I

Probably one of the reasons that this is such a common question is because there really is no easy answer. It would be great if we could simply look into a crystal ball and tell you what is going to happen to you in the future. That way you could make sure that you are prepared for whatever comes your way. Unfortunately, life doesn't work that way. Life is uncertain.

When asked by my friends how high of an insurance limit they should buy, I always give them the same answer, "If you rear-end a school bus, then \$10 million won't be enough." While this doesn't really help out, it does help to illustrate the problem. Life is uncertain. You never know what could possibly happen to you. Most people try to live careful, prudent lives, but calamity can strike any of us at any time.

No one would disagree that a 3,000-pound vehicle driving down the road at 60 mph can cause an enormous amount of damage. But, even a "simple" accident backing up in a driveway where children are playing can change the course of someone's life indefinitely.

The important thing is that, as a conscientious person, you will want to be able to take care of any problem that you might accidentally cause. That is why we buy insurance in the first place. To be able to be financially responsible for any damage that we might inadvertently cause. There is a particularly pertinent insurance concept to introduce here: Maximum Possible Loss and Maximum Probable Loss. While it is possible that you could "rear-end a school bus" and require \$15 million or \$20 million worth of insurance, it is probable that you won't. Which do you insure for, the possible or the probable? That really

depends on your personality, and what you feel comfortable with.

One thing to keep in mind is the litigious nature of our society. While the average "Bodily Injury" auto claim is only \$10,000, the average of the same type of claim that goes to jury is \$281,000! You may not think that you have much at risk, but if your claim goes before a jury, you may be unpleasantly surprised.

One "rule of thumb" has always been to buy enough insurance to protect your assets. With the skyrocketing value of homes in California lately, many people are finding that they have \$250,000 to \$500,000 of equity in their home. All of that equity is at risk in the event of one single auto accident. While your bank may only require you to carry "minimum limits" on your auto insurance, you should keep in mind everything that you stand to lose in a potential claim.

Long story short: Buy as high of limits as you can afford. That is always the safest course of action.

## Chief Bratton's Message: Remembering the Fallen

#### **■ LAPD Chief William Bratton** delivers his monthly message

As we near the end of 2006 and begin the holiday season, I'd like to reflect on the past year. While the LAPD has enjoyed many successes that reflect the hard work of our men and women to make the City safer, we have also experienced losses ... those who are not with us because they are serving overseas, those we have lost due to illness and accidents, and the loss of one who paid the ultimate sacrifice in the line of

As of the First of December, 25 Los Angeles Police Department employees, 19 sworn and six civilians, are serving in the U.S. Armed Forces deployed on overseas assignments. Of those 25, nearly half will be spending their second, third, even fourth holiday season away from family and friends. While the Department offers financial and career support to our activated military personnel, our LAPD family also offers emotional support to these employees who are our partners and coworkers.

This has also been a difficult year because for the first time in two and a half years, the LAPD lost an officer in the line of duty. On Sunday, Oct. 22. Northeast Area Officer Landon Dorris and his partner were investigating a minor traffic collision when a car hit Officer Dorris. The 31-yearold officer had been with the Department for just over three years. He served six years with the California Highway Patrol prior to joining the LAPD. Officer Dorris is survived by his mother and two sisters, a fiancé and two young sons, ages three and one-and-a-half.

We were also challenged this year by the deaths of several Department employees due to illness and accidents. This past year we lost 12 sworn officers, including two reservists, and one civilian employee.

This past year presented a different set of challenges for several LAPD officers who suffered serious, life-altering injuries. In August, Hollenbeck Area Officer James Tuck was seriously hurt when he and his partner made a traffic stop in the Montecito Heights area. They had just pulled over a car when the passenger got out and charged the officers. He sprayed their patrol car with high-velocity rounds from an AK-47. Officer Tuck was shot three times, with one bullet nearly severing his left hand at the wrist. The news for this young officer is promising; his physicians believe he will regain about 85 percent of the use of his hand after a year of rehabilitation.

Newton Area Officer Enrique Chavez was seriously wounded when his three-year-old son accidentally shot him in the back as they drove near their Anaheim home. Officer Chavez underwent surgery to have a metal rod placed in his spine and he remains paralyzed from the waist down. Officer Chavez is in rehabilitation and is progressing ahead of schedule.



In mid-June, West Traffic Division Officer Michael Toth was riding his Department motorcycle on his way home when he stopped to help officers from the California Highway Patrol conducting an accident investigation. As he was leaving the scene, a sports utility vehicle hit Officer Toth. He was rushed to a hospital and had extensive surgery on injuries to his face, chest and legs. Officer Toth is going through physical therapy and recently had more surgery to repair damage to his right foot. His goal is to be back at work mid-year 2007.

And finally, this summer Southwest Area Officer Kristina Ripatti was shot and paralyzed from the chest down while trying to arrest an armed man who had robbed a gas station. Now she spends several days a week in rehab and she works out in a gym to increase her upper body strength. As she learns to adjust to life in a wheelchair, Officer Ripatti also fights to stay mentally fit as she challenges conventional medical wisdom that she will never walk again. Kristina, her husband, Southeast Area Officer Tim Pearce, and their young daughter, Jordan, were recently featured on ABC television's Extreme Makeover: Home Edition. Their home was "made over" free by hundreds of volunteers to accommodate Officer Ripatti's new disabilities.

This will certainly be an emotional holiday season for her and the others I have mentioned. As you celebrate with your own loved ones, take the time to remember those men and women of the LAPD who are facing extraordinary physical and emotional challenges, those who will not be home with their loved ones, and those that have gone before us. In this city noted for its angels, these are the LAPD's angels. Let me offer you and your families my best wishes for a safe, healthy and happy holiday season.

## A Foundation of Social Activism

■ John and Dora Haynes translate their passion for social activism into their foundation. Part 2 of 2.

Last month, guest columnist Dr. Tom Sitton wrote part one about Dr. John Randolph Haynes and his importance to Los Angeles. Tom continues with part two here, further introducing the public to the vast impact of Haynes' "Progressive" activities. The Haynes imprint on

Los Angeles history continues to be felt to this day. I am eternally grateful to Tom Sitton for enlightening the readership through his professionalism and his historical insights that have broadened all of us. — Hynda Rudd

Early in the 1900s, John Randolph Haynes also became a crusader for public ownership of natural resources required by citizens for everyday living. For this reason he supported municipal ownership and operation of utilities including water and electricity systems (and City regulation of gas, telephone and public transportation services). He began speaking out on the subject by 1905 and advocated the Owens Valley Aqueduct project to supply water and electricity for the City. He served on several committees to politically protect and advance the program in the 1910s, and was appointed to Public Service Commission soon to become the Board of Water and Power Commissioners - in 1921. On this board, he defended the principle and the department in major political battles over public ownership in the 1920s, and with a mayor who tried to give the City's program to private power interests in the early 1930s. Haynes was also instrumental in bringing Hoover Dam hydroelectricity to Southern California just before he died in 1937.

In the area of regulating private utilities in the interests of Los Angeles residents, Dr. Haynes was instrumental in requiring safety equipment for streetcars that saved lives and reduced injuries to many on streets in the City. Alarmed by the increasing number of accidents involving streetcars and pedestrians in the busy downtown district, Haynes worked with Mayor Owen McAleer in 1905 to conduct his own survey of trolley accidents across the nation in which pedestrians were needlessly run over and seriously maimed or killed. He determined that the solution was the addition of a fender which. when operated properly, could safely catch and hold the victim in front of the trolley until the vehicle came to a stop. Haynes began a political crusade to require such fenders within the City limits, a campaign in which he was assisted by the Voters League and the local branch of the Municipal League. After many bouts with representatives of the street railway companies and lobbying of City Council members, he convinced the City Council to pass such an ordinance in 1906. For the next three decades he countered the arguments of opponents to have the fender law nullified and arranged public demonstrations of the effectiveness of

the fenders. With changes to the design of streetcars in the 1930s intended, in part, to halt the decline of this mode of transportation in Los Angeles, the law was finally cast aside in 1937, just before a very sick Dr. Haynes passed away. By that time the fenders had saved countless lives and prevented many serious injuries, a claim made by the street railway companies themselves.

In these situations Haynes was a fierce competitor in defending and advancing the City's best interests as he interpreted them. Early in the century he emerged as a political force who tried to forge an alliance against the leadership of the region's large corporations and the wealthy city elite (of which he was a member). As a social reform progressive who worked for much more than just

reform activism - by his spouse. Dora Haynes embraced the reform movement at first through her participation in women's clubs in the late 19th century. She was active in various civic and social welfare issues that husband John advanced, and helped to organize political groups, meetings and progressive election campaigns. But she was especially interested in the crusade for women suffrage in Los Angeles and California, and an important role in the local and state victory in 1910. She continued to work for the success of this goal at the national level. When it was achieved in 1920, Dora Haynes became a founding member and the first president of the League of Women Voters of Los Angeles, the local branch of the national organization created electricity in an ever-changing energy market. (The physical reminder of Dr. Haynes's role in water and power is the DWP's Haynes Steam Plant near Seal Beach, which was named in his honor in 1963.)

John Randolph Haynes's legacy of political and social reform activism is apparent today as Los Angeles city government grapples with some of the same challenges addressed by Dr. Haynes. In many ways the City functions within administrative systems and democratic processes that were modernized in the era of his reform activity. And through the Haynes Foundation, as well as in Los Angeles municipal government, the ideals for which John and Dora Haynes worked so hard for so many years are still being pursued.

structural changes to government, elections and representation, he was willing to cooperate with everyone - from staunch conservatives to socialists at times - to win the political battle. In the early years he fought the Southern Pacific Railroad "machine" of corporations, saloon interests, and archconservative partisans who controlled City and state politics. In the 1920s Haynes was aligned with "Boss" Kent Parrot's political organization in Los Angeles, which defended municipal ownership and City employees while protecting less respectable groups. (The Los Angeles Times even called Haynes the "Boss of the Boss" in referring to his influence over Parrot.) And in the 1930s Haynes was the leading light of the municipal ownership progressives who had to contest every municipal election to prevent opponents from dismantling the program with antagonistic candidates, restrictive charter amendments, and defeated bond measures. Overall, Haynes was remarkably successful in these wars, adding to his amazing record as a civic

In all of these endeavors Dr. Haynes was supported - and sometimes surpassed in



to examine political issues, educate all citizens, and encourage participation in the political process. From the inception of the Haynes Foundation in 1926 until her death in 1934, she and John Haynes, as founders and leaders, together shaped the direction of this organization designed to continue the advancement of the ideals shared by these two progressives.

Since Dr. Haynes's passing in 1937, Los Angeles government has continued to develop within the parameters of his reform agenda. Further City Charter reform has been almost constant, culminating in the new compact approved by the City's voters in 1999. Direct legislation measures have been used less frequently, but are always reminders that citizens have another alternative available in the event that municipal representatives go astray. Civil service procedures protect City employees from political pressure and assure the City a competent workforce. The DWP, faced with many new political, environmental and economic issues since Dr. Haynes was a commissioner, continues to provide the City's residents and businesses with a stable source of water and



# Is 2007 the Year You're Promoted?

#### ■ Club Member offers 10 tips to assist you in getting that promotion.

FINANCE — Is getting a promotion one of your New Year resolutions?

The offers many opportunities for pay-grade advancements and promotions. It is never too early to start preparing for your next promotion. Your preparation is key for a growing career in Los Angeles, no matter in which department you work. Even if you are a new hire to the City, you can start learning about your classification and your career ladder for future Civil Service exam opportunities. The following is a list of ideas to get you started and it is intended as a complementary component to your studying and learning about the Employee Handbook, the Civil Service Rules, and Personnel Policies (all available at Personnel Department's Intranet: http://per.ci.la.ca.us/ under Documents), and the City Charter (available at City Clerk's website: http://lacodes.lacity.org/NXT/gateway.dll?f=templates&fn=default.htm) and Your Government at a Glance (also City Clerk's website: http://cityclerk.lacity.org/cps/pdf/govtglnc.pdf).

- 1. Review your classification specification. If you don't know what that is, enter your classification code or classification title at: http://www.lacity.org/per/perspec.htm See how much of your class specification you can perform and look for opportunities to learn those skills you have not mastered.
- 2. Check out your Career Ladder at Personnel Department's Intranet: http://www.lacity.org/per/eeo/career/ CareerLadder.htm Although the career ladder is not an exhaustive list of your career possibilities in the City, it gives you the basic steps of the next qualifying exam where you may focus your promotional exam preparation.
- Monitor your attendance. Be sure that you are not frequently using emergency vacation or excessive sick time. If you are taking a longer family or medical leave, apply for FMLA with your supervisor so that your sick time will not be counted against you.
- Update your resume. To catch grammatical or format errors, have someone else review it. Make sure that your resume answers mainly the same questions as Page 2 of the Departmental Application. Need a Departmental Application? Go to http://per.ci.la.ca.us/Forms/DeptApp.pdf

- 5. Brush up on your computer skills. Advance your skills in Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Access and even Groupwise usage. These tools are used to improve communication and produce reports in every City department. Practice computer programs for projects in your community involvement, PTA projects or for your home business. Take weekend or night classes if necessary.
- Submit copies of your certificates, awards, diplomas and proofs of training for filing in your personnel folder.
- Make sure that your personnel folder includes all evaluations. Call your Personnel Services Section to schedule a time to review your own folder.
- Attend Personnel Department trainings and intradepartmental trainings. For a list of courses at the Personnel Department, go to http://www.lacity.org/per/Training.htm. Sign up with your supervisor for a class that will enhance your skills.
- Improve your public speaking and interview skills. Join a Toastmasters Club near your work or your home. This is the best way you can incrementally improve a skill. A Toastmasters membership will help you organize your thoughts, practice leadership skills, and overcome the fear of public speaking.

Nominations for Board vacancies are made by a Nominating Committee, or by petition. This year. the three incumbents were nominated by the

Nominating Committee, and each nomination was accompanied by a signed statement from the nominee stating that he/she was agreeable to the nomination and would serve if elected.

Appointment(s) will be made by the Board of Directors to two Board committees for the terms scheduled to expire, and each term is three years: the Supervisory Committee is responsible for the internal auditing of LAFCU, and the Credit Committee is responsible for meeting at least weekly to evaluate member loan requests. Members interested in serving on either Committee must send a letter of application and information concerning any related experience to LAFCU, Attention: President/CEO, by Feb. 23. Letters of application or resumes of applicants not selected will remain on file for two

years for consideration in the event of a vacancy.

An important consideration and qualification for Board positions is the willingness to volunteer time for service to LAFCU and its members.

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# In Event of Disaster

**■ Housing and Public Works** train their staffs to be ready for disasters.

> HOUSING, PUBLIC WORKS — The Housing Department Enforcement Unit and the Public Works Contract Administration training sections completed five days of Post Disaster Safety Assessment Evaluator Training in late November.

The departments are pleased with what they are accomplished in a collaborative effort, and are the first to have a fully trained

staff of evaluators recognized by the State of California Governor's Office of Emergency Services.

The Post-Disaster Safety Assessment Program is an all-hazard program, not just earthquake-specific. The program is designed to assist disaster victims to move more quickly into recovery by rapidly determining which buildings are safe enough for immediate re-occupancy. The process of evaluating structures is based on the process and procedures described in the Applied Technology Council publication ATC-20 Procedures for Post-earthquake Safety Evaluation of Buildings.

The Post Disaster Assessment training took place at the Marvin Braude Building in Van Nuys.





# It's Avocado Season


#### **DIRECTIONS:**

Remove the seed and use a spoon to carve out the avocado flesh from the skin.




Place the avocado fruit in a mixing

The red pepper stuffed avocado and goat cheese recipe is a quick and delicious dish that is a perfect appetizer or side dish but can be used





- 2 to 3 roasted red peppers
- Goat cheese: about 11 ounces
- Salt and pepper, to taste.
- 1 tablespoon parsley
- 1 tablespoon dill weed
- 1 lime





Add half a lime or all of it, depending on your tart flavor preference. The lime also serves as a preservative if you have any leftover mixture.



Spoon the avocado and goat cheese mixture into the cavities of the red peppers.



Plate and garnish with some extra parsley. It's time to eat!




