The Club appreciates the beautiful plaque and says, "You're welcome! And good going!"





FIRE DEPT. — What do a firefighter, an author and a missionary have in common? In this particular case, they happen to be the same person: John Hicks.

A 22-year veteran Firefighter/Paramedic of the LAFD and Club Member, John is also an accomplished author of five books.

You might think this married father of three would have his hands full just being a firefighter and an author, but lately, John has also added the title of missionary to his lineup. He has just recently returned from an 11-day trip to Thailand, where he was accompanied by 15 fellow teammates from his church. Under the guidance of ZOE International (www.gozoe.org), a nonprofit organization based out of Santa Clarita, John and his fellow missionaries visited many local children's homes and even a leper colony, ministering to hundreds of children and adults throughout Thailand and

John also brought his skills as a paramedic with him, teaching first aid and CPR to staff and children at the ZOE Children's Home. This large, plantation-style home, with more than 60 children living in it at one time, is where Mike and Carol Hart, the founders of ZOE International, decided to start their crusade to help the many children of Thailand who are at risk of being enslaved into the world of prostitution. Besides being a sanctuary for the children, it is also a place of love and learning where the children are brought up in a safe environment, being ministered in the faith of God, and also in the lessons of school work so that one day they to can be productive members of society. ZOE also runs a school for young adults teaching Bible studies and preparing select individuals for the world of ministry. It is ZOE's hope that one day they will have the resources to house up to a thousand children, meeting the growing needs of at risk children throughout the world.

He is active within the department, attending school the past few years in the pursuit of his State Fire Officer Certification, and he is on the Captain's promotional list. ### Children's Author

John's second passion in life, his writing career, started in 2000. What was supposed to be a 10- or 15-page treatment for a movie soon became 200 pages, and his first book for children was born. He has since written four other titles and has done nearly a hundred book signings throughout California. Most recently, he completed a number of events at Downtown Disney.

He is in the progress of releasing his newest title, The Day Charlie Lost His Weirdness, a young reader's title for children ages 7 to 11. Look for it at your local bookstore or online at all major retailers. You can also get a peak at his work at John's website, WWW.QuietManPublishing.com.

John's love for writing lead him down another path. Besides writing the books, John travels throughout Southern California talking to children of all ages on the importance of reading. His 30- to 40minute presentation, "The Magic of Reading," combines an inspirational message on the importance of reading combined with magic tricks to reemphasize his words. "If you don't have the time to read, you don't have time or the tools to write," he says. These words of wisdom, which he credits to Stephen King, are only part of his words of encouragement to the future leaders of our community. If you are interested in him doing a presentation for your school or organization, contact him through his Website, although his dates book up fast.

Lastly, his love for working with children has brought him to his true passion — helping those who can't help themselves. John's recent trip to Thailand has given him a whole new perspective on life. The sites that he saw and more importantly, the people that he met, have made him realize what is truly important in life — helping out those in need. Besides planning on returning to Thailand in the near future, itted himself in working with ZOE locally doing whatever he can to spread the message of its existence.

"You hear about a lot of charitable organization nowadays, but I have worked first-hand with this wonderful group of people. I have seen the tireless work they have already done, and have glimpsed their hope for the future. It is my hope that many others will have the chance to see it too!"

## 2 Commissioners Join Public Works

### ■ Julie B. Gutman and Ernesto **Cárdenas join the Public Works** governing body.

PUBLIC WORKS — Two Commissioners have joined the Board of Public Works. They are Ernesto Cárdenas, who was appointed by Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa May 11 and began his tenure July 2, and Julie B. Gutman, appointed June 25. Cárdenas filled the seat vacated by Yolanda Fuentes, who left to become the Mayor's Associate Director of Neighborhood and Community Services. Gutman's appointment is subject to confirmation by the City Council.

Ernesto Cárdenas is not a newcomer to City Commissions, having served on the Planning, Transportation and Planning Commissions under former Mayors Richard Riordan and James K. Hahn. He worked on land use, conservation and zoning regulation issues while on the North Valley Area Planning Commission. He advocated for balance between community preservation and economic development while serving on the Planning Commission.

Commissioner Cárdenas is also an accom-

plished mechanical engineer whose 21-year career with AT&T (formerly SBC) brings extensive experience in project management, building infrastructure programs, contractor relations and government affairs. In his tenure as senior project manager at AT&T, Cárdenas enforced best management practices and applied his engineering and real estate expertise to handle a \$50 million annual project budget.

As a member of the Board of Public Works. Cárdenas will serve as Board liaison to the Bureau of Street Services and backup liaison to the Bureau of Contract Administration. He will also represent the Board on activities and issues concerning Council Districts 3, 7 and 12. His special assignments include the 50-50 sidewalk repair program, the design-built task force, Spanish outreach task force, and youth programs including Junior Commissioners and the department's high school internship program.

Commissioner Cárdenas is a 15-year veteran volunteer for the Pasadena Tournament of Roses. He is also active co-founder of the Andres y Maria Cárdenas Family Foundation – a nonprofit organization that provides college scholarships to deserving students from eight high schools in the east San Fernando Valley. So far, his efforts



have benefited 330 students who received \$520,000 in scholarships.

Commissioner Cárdenas earned his Master's degree in business administration from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona, and his undergraduate degree in mechanical engineering from University of California, Santa Barbara.

Since 1996, Julie B. Gutman has been a senior trial attorney for the National Labor Relations Board in Los Angeles. She investigates, analyzes and recommends fair disposition of unfair labor



prac-Julie B. Gutman tice charges and has won 100 percent of her litigation cases, including injunctions against the mass discharge of manufacturing workers. Gutman has been selected as a model National Labor Relations Board Attorney to conduct training to attorneys nationwide and has won annual "Outstanding Performance" awards.

Prior to her work for the National Labor Relations Board, Gutman worked as the community economic development director and supervising attorney at the East Palo Alto Community Law Project, a community-based law office serving low-income, multicultural communities. While there, she was appointed to the city's Economic Development Task Force to analyze redevelopment projects and engage in master planning to leverage local, state and federal resources for housing and economic develop-

In addition, Gutman has also served as an adjunct faculty member at Stanford Law School, clerked for U.S. District Court Judge Stanley Weigel, and has been awarded an American Bar Association Fellowship.

Gutman earned Bachelor's degrees in history and law and society from Brown University. She received her law degree from Stanford Law School.

The Board of Public Works Commissioners oversees the five City bureaus responsible for design, construction, renovation and operation of public projects, including graffiti removal, wastewater treatment facilities, libraries, bridges and maintenance of streets, sidewalks, sewers, streetlights and street trees.



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### **SANITATION LOOKS INTO HYBRIDS**

Public Works/Sanitation announced Aug. 28 that it is working with German Company Bosch Rexroth to explore the benefits of utilizing hydraulic hybrid technology in its collection fleet.

Sanitation currently has approximately 316 clean fuel natural gas heavy-duty Solid Resources Collection vehicles in operation and continues to add even more clean vehicles to its fleet as it replaces its retired diesel-powered collection trucks. Clean burning natural gas engines produce significantly fewer oxides of nitrogen, particulate matter and other air pollutants than traditional diesel engines. In addition, because natural gas is a domestically available resource, it reduces dependence on foreign oil while improving local air quality.

This new added technology has been identified as having high potential for successfully reducing fuel consumption and emissions, improving performance and reducing operating and maintenance costs. The proprietary Rexroth Hydrostatic Regenerative Brake system uses a hydraulic pump/motor to capture kinetic energy during vehicle breaking. This energy, which would otherwise be lost in the vehicle's friction brakes, is absorbed and re-used to help the engine launch the vehicle, thereby reducing the engine's need for fuel to accomplish the same. The overall process is called regenerative braking.

The program is part of Sanitation's comprehensive plan to reduce emission from Solid Resources Collection fleet.

The City Controller wants to commingle the Los Angeles Fire and Police

Pension System (LAFP) and the Los Angeles City Employees Retirement System (LACERS) Pension Fund create a new commission and staff to do all of the investing for both funds.

On Oct.1, the City Controller and Mayor are to meet with LACERS at 9 a.m. and with LAFPP at 3 p.m. to discuss this proposal. Director Lee Kebler of LAFPP stated that all Fire and Police Associations, and active employees, are against this proposal.

The plan is to eliminate both commissions and create a new nine-member commission. Five members would be appointed by the Mayor, and two members from each pension system.

The auditor, Independent Fiduciary Services (IFS), a prestigious actuarial firm based in Washington, D.C., claims

it could save the City about \$7.8 million a year, with most of the savings from investment fees. IFS is also recommending an increase in salaries for the new board members. The current board members receive a fee only when they attend commission meetings.

Lee Kebler said that the County just hired a new investment officer for more than \$300,000 a year and hoped that the salaries of the new board would not be as high. He didn't know why anyone would take two of the most successful pension funds in the state, and try to tinker with them: Ken Spiker and I are both in agreement with Kebler and all of the Fire

Aguallo Jr., LAC-Manager, has notified the Board of Administration he is going to leave his iob on Dec. 31.

Robert has been General Manager for the last five years and plans to seek employment in the private sector.

The LACERS Board has unanimously approved an increase in the monthly subsidy maximum health care allowance by \$39. Current subsidy is set at \$983 per month and will be set at \$1,022 per month for 2008.

The average deduction for those retirees who have deductions will increase \$3.18 per month. My attempts to increase the subsidy to a higher legal amount were unsuccessful.

LACERS Health Plan Open Enrollment is planned for Oct. 15 through Nov. 15. This year, LACERS will not be holding a fair in order to create other events throughout the year that will give you more opportunities to meet with LACERS health carriers, staff and friends.

## Truly a Grand Canyon

### ■ Hal and his family drive and take a railroad to visit one of America's most magnificent sights.

S outhern California is a great place to live. S We have great weather most of the time, and if you draw a 300-mile circle from the Los Angeles City Hall, the area would contain more activities that you could do in a lifetime. While everyone knows about Disneyland, Universal City and Magic Mountain, there are a number of smaller attractions that are well worth visiting.

Over the past six months, I have had a chance to visit two of them: Legoland in Carlsbad and the USS Midway in San Diego.

In May I visited Legoland with my grandchildren, Maddie, 10; Isabelle, 8; and Coco, 6. Legoland is on One Legoland Drive, just off Interstate 5, in Carlsbad. It is about 30 minutes north of San Diego and about one and half hours form Los Angeles. The park Website www.legoland.com has information on park hours and ticket prices. Currently, the one-day admission is \$57 for an adult (13-59) and \$44 for child/senior (3-12)/ (60plus). Check with the Ticket Guy at the City Employees Club for current discounts. The park does sell multi-day tickets, but in most cases you can see the park in one day.

Like most theme parks, Legoland is laid out by grouping like attractions together. Starting from the entrance, we walked to the right in the Imagination Zone and then on to Castle Hill. The Imagination Zone has two very good rides: the Aqua Zone wave rider and Lego Technic Coaster. Castle Hill had two good rides: the Dragon coaster and the Royal Joust. The kids also enjoyed the come if it weren't for my grandkids. This park

Hideaway, which was like a big tree house and slide area for kids. It took us about two hours to see the two areas, and it was time for lunch and we ate at the Garden Restaurant, which offered a nice selection of sandwiches and pizza. The prices were on par with other theme parks, but I felt the service inside the park was not up to the standards of Disneyland.

After lunch was Pirate Shores, the park's newest attraction. Be prepared to get wet. "Splash Battle" is a boat ride with water guns with which you can squirt the other boats. There is also Treasure Falls, a large water slide area where you get really wet. I passed on these rides, but the kids liked them. Next on the agenda was Fun Town. We saw the show at the Fun Town Fire Academy, which was also another chance to get wet and fun for the kids. The kids really enjoyed the Volvo Driving School, which let them drive cars around a city layout. This area has the Lego clubhouse, showing how Legos are made, and there was a large Lego play area and a retail store.

One of the more interesting areas is Miniland USA, which has large Lego displays of American cities, which included Las Vegas, Washington, D.C., and New Orleans (pre-Katrina), to name a few. Very impres-

Our last stop was Explore Village, where we took the Safari Trek.

I did enjoy my visit, but I would not have

is basically for children 4 to 12 years old, with a few attractions adults. For me it was a one-time event.

A couple of weeks later, I went to San Diego for a day with Evelyn. While she attended a meeting, I decided to visit the USS Midway, an aircraft carrier that opened as a museum in 2004.

Over the years I have visited a number of decommissioned navel ships, both in this country and overseas. Some are presented better then others, and I was very impressed with the USS Midway.

The USS Midway was commissioned in 1945 and was the largest ship in the world for the next 10 years. It served 47 years from the end of World War II until the liberation of Kuwait in 1991. No other aircraft carrier served America as IoIn the summer of 1960, I drove from Toledo, Ohio, to Los Angeles to spend the summer with my mother, who had moved to Los Angles the previous year. I drove with a friend, and we stopped to see the Grand Canyon. Somewhere I had read that that the floor of the canyon was one mile below the rim, so I suggested that we walk down. So two not-too-bright college students started down the Bright Angel trail, only to discover that the trail is 10 miles long. Of course we had no water or decent walking shoes, and we made it to about the first rest stop before we turned around and headed back to the rim.

That was 47 years ago, and when I was thinking about where to take my three grandchildren this summer, my son-in-law, J.P., suggested that we visit the Grand Canyon. He had seen an ad for the Grand Canyon Railroad and thought that it would be a good experience for the kids.

There were a number of different packages available, and I choose the three-night package, which included two rooms for two nights in Williams, Ariz., and one night at the Grand Canyon; a round-trip train ride; and a twoand-a-half hour rim tour with a hot lunch and two dinners and two breakfasts. The cost was just more than \$300 per person for three adults and three children. Accommodations were basically three to a room.

We left Los Angles early Sunday morning for the 450-mile drive to Williams. Traveling along the I-15, our first stop was for breakfast in Barstow. While I was planning the trip I looked for something we could do along the way, but was unable to find anything to see between L.A. and Williams. At Barstow we switched to I-40 and followed that to Williams. The route is the same as the old US 66, and there are lots of old historic Route 66 markers and historic buildings that you pass.

We arrived in Williams at approximately 3 p.m. and checked in to the Grand Canyon Railway Hotel. We had two adjoining rooms,



which were nicely furnished. There was an swimming indoor pool and the kids couldn't wait to get in for a swim. The

train station is across from the hotel and I went over to pick up our tickets and meal vouchers.

That evening we had dinner in the hotel restaurant. Our meal vouchers were valued at \$16 for adults and \$8 for children. That was the price of the buffet, or we could apply the voucher to the regular menu. All of us except for my daughter, Michelle, had the buffet. It wasn't gourmet food, but it was well prepared and there was a good selection of items.

After dinner we walked the few blocks to the main street of Williams, which happens to be Route 66, for a "Wild West" shootout. This shootout is conducted each evening along Route 66. The kids enjoyed the show and posed for pictures with the cowboys afterward.

During the night a thunderstorm through the area, but by the time we were ready for breakfast it had passed. Breakfast was the buffet in the hotel restaurant. We dropped our luggage off in the hotel lobby and it would be trucked to the canyon and

be in our rooms at the hotel when we arrived.

The train was to leave at 10 a.m., and at 9:30 a.m. there was another "Wild West" show near the train. The cowboys looked very familiar, as if we had seen them before.

The train had a number of different classes, and I had booked first class because it was air-conditioned. It was also the best car that allowed children. The domed car and the club car didn't allow chil-

dren. We had reserved seats and the car was very comfortable. There were complementary snacks and soft drinks and adult beverages for purchase. The ride was about two hours and very enjoyable. Just before we arrived at the rim we were given a bottle of water.

The Grand Canyon National Park is 277 river-miles long, an average of ten miles wide and nearly one mile deep. It is considered one of the natural wonders of the world. The fee to enter the park is \$25 per vehicle. If you're a senior over 62 you can get a senior National Parks pass for \$10, good forever at all National Parks. The south rim is 7,000 feet in altitude, and this makes the climate very good. The days we were there, the temperature during the day was in the mid-70s and very comfortable.

A tour bus was waiting at the station, and our first stop was the Maswik Lodge for a buffet lunch. It was raining when we arrived at the station, but by the time we finished lunch, the skies had cleared. While you can drive to the Grand Canyon, private cars are not allowed outside the village area. To move around, there are three shuttle bus routes to get to the points of interest. Our tour bus took the Hermits Rest Route, and we stopped at three different viewpoints along the canyon rim. It is hard to put into words what the canyon looks like so I won't, but I found it very

majestic.

The tour bus dropped us back at the Maswik Lodge, where we were to spend the night. Again we had two adjoining

rooms and our luggage was there as planned. I was a little concerned about the lodge, but the rooms were very nice and we were very comfortable.

The kids found a dead butterfly and decided that it needed a decent burial, which took about an hour, so I watched the kids while JP and Michelle took a walk.

We had dinner in the Arizona Room at the Bright Angel Lodge, where the food was good and very reasonably priced. We wanted to see the sunset, so we hurried to catch the shuttle way.org) is located alongside the Navy Pier on the Embarcadero in downtown San Diego. The ship is open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., with the exception of Thanksgiving and Christmas Day. Tickets are \$15 for adults, \$10 for seniors (62-plus) and \$8 for children (6-17). Children five and under and active-duty in uniform are free.

The price of admission includes an audio tour, which, if you follow, will take abut threeand-a-half to four hours to see the complete

The tour starts on the hangar deck and forecastle and then proceeds to the lower decks of the ship, and you complete the tour on the flight deck.

The first part of the tour provides a history

of the ship and has a number of exhibits about the operation of the aircraft. There are a number of aircraft stationed on the hangar deck. Not included in the tour are flight simulators, which you can test your flight skills for a fee.

On the lower decks you see the operation of the ship, including crew quarters, dining halls, kitchen, laundry and all the areas that help support the ship's activities.

The flight deck had about 25 aircraft, which, at one time or

to the viewpoint. We arrived about five minutes before sunset and were very well rewarded with a great sunset.

The next day, Michelle and J.P. awoke at 4:30 a.m. to see the sunrise. The kids and I slept in. After breakfast at the hotel, I.P., Michelle, Maddie and Isabelle hiked down the Bright Angel trail to the first rest stop about 1.5 miles. It took them about two hours to complete the round trip. While they were hiking. I took Caroline for a walk around the rim. She was more interested in the gift shop then walking, but we had a good time.

After lunch at the Bright Angel Restaurant, we took the shuttle to the Park Headquarters and listened to a very interesting talk by a Park Ranger on traveling down the Colorado River.

By then it was time to board the train for our return trip to Williams. The train ride was uneventful, even though we were "robbed" by outlaws who again looked very familiar.

We used our meal vouchers to eat in the hotel's bar, where we had pizza.

In the morning after breakfast, the kids got to spend the \$60 in vouchers that came as part of the package. I think it was one of their best times. We left mid-morning for Las Vegas, which I'll tell you about next month. The Grand Canyon is a wonderful family adventure.ng as the USS Midway.

The only other aircraft carrier that I have visited is the USS Intrepid in New York City (currently undergoing a renovation). The tour of the USS Midway was far better, and I think it gave a very good view of how life was aboard one of our premier warships.

I highly recommend a visit the next time you're in the San Diego area.





GENERAL SERVICES — On Wednesday, Sept. 12, Alive! spent an afternoon with Paul Mahony, Automotive Supervisor, Fleet Services, and his crew to take a peak inside this rare and magnificent piece of City history.

Alive! thanks the crew for their time and efforts.

Alive!: Thanks for welcoming us, Paul. How long have you been with the City?

**Paul:** It will be seven years next April.

Where did you come from?

**Paul:** The private sector. I have worked all over the Westside, in various car dealerships and restoration shops. I have been involved with automotive repair since I was 19 or 20.

What's your official responsibility for the car? Are you the supervisor of it?

> Paul: The car is assigned to Piper Tech for maintenance. We take care of it here. I transferred here from North Hollywood. I was the supervisor out there. I inherited it when I came here. It had all sorts of

> > I'm sure. Your responsibility with the car is to maintain it?

Paul: Yeah.

Prepare it and have it ready for the parades and other official functions?

Paul: Right. We check it between parades.

### **Repairs and Responsibilities**

Let's go through the guys on the crew, and tell me what their responsibilities are with the vehicle.

Paul: Well, the guy driving the car in your photos – the guy sitting at the wheel – is Robert Keen. He is one of our mechanics here at the shop. He does the inspections between parades, and he is the primary mechanic now, assigned to keeping the car running right, and also making various upgrades. Joe Lonigro, a mechanic here also, helps Bob as an assistant. Bob is the senior guy working on the car.

[General Services General Manager] Alvin Blaine's instructions to us are to make the car look exactly original as much as we can, but to perform safety upgrades and reliability upgrades. We have added a bigger radiator and a electric fan for parades - it will drive for an hour and a half sometimes at idle speed and, that's asking us to do what a CHP cruiser might have to do.

And we have gone to a 12-volt system on it because of all the accessories, including the sound system, and so on. They just didn't have that stuff back in 1952 when the car was new. And so we have an alternator on there.

And then we have air shocks in the back, so when they load it to capacity with people, they can level the car out with a little switch on the dashboard. And then Alvin wanted a dual brake system, so you would not lose your brakes completely; they did not have that in '52. We put a dual brake system on the car, and that fell on Chuck's shoulders, Chuck Gage. He is like a

hot-rodder to the Nth degree. He surveyed the original brakes on the car and designed a system for the car.

Alvin's instructions were that, whatever we did to the car, we were to keep the old part and everything had to be bolted on. We could not cut or weld on the car. It all had to be the capability to be brought back to the original anytime we wanted.

#### You are keeping all the parts.

Paul: We keep everything, yeah.

Chuck put Dodge truck disc brakes on the front, and big, modern drum brakes on the rear. And to make the original wire wheels still fit, we had to have adapters made. And to make these brakes fit the car, we had those special brackets with the calipers, and that was Cecil Faircloth. He was a machinist at the time with the North Hollywood Machine Shop, the North Hollywood Consolidated Shop out there. They have got a big welding and machine shop, and he was working out there as a machinist. Chuck gave him all his drawings. Neither of these guys is an engineer, but they are just terrific fabricators, so Chuck gave them all the dimensions and Cecil machined everything up, and put it into computer operated mills. We can make a 100 of these parts now if we ever needed them.

### Right.

**Paul:** And so then we had to come up with a power brake master cylinder that would fit underneath the floor like the original one, and still have power brakes. Chuck is like an encyclopedia on hot rod accessories, and he knew which one would work and still be able to connect to the original pedal on the floor. This stuff sounds simple until you start trying to do it, you know. And then he had to come with the correct metering belt so that when you step on the brakes, the rear brakes would not apply too hard and skid while the front stopped correctly. And then we put a whole different rear end in the car so that we could have the right brakes and still have the correct wheels on it, because you could not do that with the old rear end. So it is a whole new rear end that sits on the old springs. It is all bolted in, and we kept the old one, course.

### Right.

Paul: And that required a different drive shaft, so we had that custom-made.

And then after we got the brakes working, we noticed that the car would stall sometimes. The previous mayor would use it once or twice a year. And Mayor Villaraigosa likes to use it

frequently. We started giving attention to these little things that had been forgiven in the past. And one of them was the stalling: It would stall sometimes during a parade, and that is just the worst thing that can happen in a parade,

So Bob Keen and I started down this path of making the car reliable. He came up with the carburetor for the car that would work. He found a brand new replacement carburetor, and it is more modern, but it fits right on, the same brand and everything. I put electronic ignition on it, because it had the old points and condensers.

### And a distributor?

### Paul: Yeah. We upgraded all that.

And then Tom Wellnitz rewired the car because the old wiring wa<mark>s</mark> fabric-covered <mark>a</mark>nd wou<mark>l</mark>d cryst<mark>a</mark>llize an<mark>d</mark> fall off. So he rewired the whole car, and I worked with him to put the right alternator on there. And we had the starter converted to 12 volts. He oversaw all that.

I took the dashboard apart, because, besides management, I have been a mechanic all my life.

The interior had this terrible look. White vinyl had been put in there over the storyboard together. I got pictures of what the interior should look like. We took a tour with our Assistant General Manager to the Petersen Museum, and showed him the other Chrysler parade car in the collection down there. We made a business case for doing the interior in a certain way. Management bought off on it. So we had the car reupholstered. That is a major job on a car this big to get it correct. We took a lot of pictures of the car at the

Petersen because it was original. And then we had our car reupholstered. An outside vendor did that, but we had them do it here because the car is so valuable that we did not want it out of our hands.

#### And it is close to its original color, maybe not exactly, but pretty close.

Paul: Yeah. We wanted the contrast. My experience on the outside has been working in several big restoration shops, and you always want to get a nice contrast. Light-colored cars always have a dark interior, typically a burgundy or a dark red. So we got that done.

And then the last mayor, Mayor Hahn, used to take sort of a karaoke system and a microphone to these parades. But Mayor Villaraigosa wanted really good sound. We were not experts at sound, so we got ITA involved. Peter Benjamins got his crew involved to come up with a sound system. He got the Council audio guys who do all the City Council chamber audio.

#### Makes sense.

Paul: They kept trying different speaker configurations. The ones we have hanging in the car now are large, but they really get the job done. We had a couple of glitches the first couple of times out, while they get it all dialed in. But now it is pretty much right on.

The latest concern that the mayor keeps mingling with the crowd and wants to go cordless on the microphones. So Peter is going to come up with something.

So the sound system is working well. And the car runs cool. And it is dependable. It is smooth, and it is pretty quick, really, for what it is.

### When you put the sound system on, did you drill any holes?

Paul: No. The speakers clamp onto the rear bumper or they slide over the flagstaffs in the front. And the wiring is tie-wrapped all the way back to the trunk. They made a false panel in the trunk to mount their amplifiers. And then they rigged up a cooling fan to blow air into the stuff, to keep it all cool. When you get out on the parade routes, the temperature in the trunk is horrific.

One time it cut off in the middle of a parade temporarily because of the thermal overload. You find out some of this stuff by trial and error.

### Does it have air conditioning?

Paul: No. We do not have that. We could put it on there,

### How new is the paint job?

Paul: I do not really know. I have been with the City for only a short time, six and a half years. It has never been painted since I have been here.

### If it looks like rain, what do you do?


Paul: They usually cancel the parade, but it has been caught in the rain before. We have umbrellas in the trunk for the people in the car. The rain really would not hurt the car, but

I don't think they would allow it to get caught in a downpour.

#### Right. Does it have a top?

Paul: It has a top, but it is what they call a surrey top, and it just covers the backseat. It's a funny, strange-looking thing. It's like a surrey buggy from the horse and carriage days. It really does not suit the car. They do not use it much.

#### Metal or canvas?

**Paul:** Convertible top is fabric with a metal frame.

Hemi-Powered

### How is the engine? Is it the original block?

Paul: The original engine and transmission with 46,000 miles on it, very low mileage. It just purrs. It runs super.

### The same engine?

Paul: It is a Hemi.

### One of the original Hemi's?

**Paul:** Yes. The second year they came out. It is a big motor.

### How many cubic inches?

Paul: Well, small cubic inches, 331. But it is physically a big motor. The valve covers are just a Hemi like you see today.

### Are they chrome?

Paul: Yeah, they are chrome.

Paul: It is a nice car.

How many speeds in the transmission? Is it an automatic three speed?

Paul: Two speeds.

Just two speeds?

Paul: Yes. With a passing gear, though.

### **A Pretty Penny**

How much is that car worth?

Paul: I do not really know. I do not think anybody does. Chuck Gage says that he had heard that the [Parade Phaeton] at the Imperial Palace was valued at \$750,000. And ours has more history than that car.

#### Because Richard Nixon rode in this car.

Paul: I think Khrushchev, Robert Kennedy and Eisenhower, too. Nixon was the first one. He was in the very first parade it was in, the Rose Parade, the Grand Marshal.

That was the first time.

Paul: First time it went out.

### **Fun, and Work**

It must be fun working on this car. I cannot imagine too many in the world have this kind of responsibility for a car, where there are only three of them in the world.

Paul: It is kind of fun working on the car, but it is very touchy when it goes out on a parade if anything goes wrong. They follow us pretty good. When we have little problems with the car running warm or stalling, or the sound system acting up, we had all the best brains in Fleet Services putting it under a microscope figuring out why it stalled. We could never duplicate the problem here. It is very hard to duplicate a parade situation here, even if you let it idle for half a day. And we had pressure from the Mayor's office to make it perform right. It is a nice challenge to rise to.

## **Office of Finance:** Generating Revenue

FINANCE — As a result of City Charter Reform, the Office of Finance (Finance) was created in 2000 to centralize much of the City's revenue collection efforts under one manager, the Director of Finance.

The City's tax and permit collections were transferred to Finance from the City Clerk's Office in 2000, and the Citywide Collection Unit was transferred from the City Attorney's Office in 2002. The current staffing level of 342 employees is tasked with collecting more than \$2 billion in revenue from various sources including taxes, fees and permits annually.

Below is a partial list of the many types of revenue collected by Finance along with examples of what the tax or permit is for and who enforces, if not the Office of Finance:

- Business tax
- Parking occupancy tax (parking lots)
- Utility users tax (electricity, telephone, gas)
- Transient occupancy tax (hotel rooms)
- Real property transfer tax (remitted by the County for prop-
- Police alarm permits (burglar alarms enforced by LAPD)
- Police permits (for example, massage therapists enforced by
- Fire permits (for example, assemblage occupancy enforced by LAFD)
- Tobacco retailer's permit (enforced by the City Attorney's

This revenue supports numerous essential City services; for example, paying the salaries for Police Officers and Fire Fighters, filling potholes, maintaining City parks, expanding library collections, etc. As you can see, much of the City's funding for core services is dependent on Finance's extensive revenue collection efforts.

Mission Statement

Finance has eight public counter locations throughout the City to serve the public. Additionally, there is a Call Center staffed by 20 employees, open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and round the clock access to their Customer Service email option for incoming inquiries. The comprehensive Website at www.lacity.org/finance provides a multitude of information along with the option to file annual business tax

renewals on-line (upwards of 400,000 renewal forms are mailed out annually). Staff works in the field directly with the City's taxpayers through audit and enforcement activities. Specialized job classifications in Finance include those in the Tax Compliance Officer series, the Tax Auditor series, and Collection

The majority of activity within the Office revolves around enforcing compliance with the City's Business Ordinance. This ordinance imposes a privilege tax for revenue purposes only - no attempt is made through this tax to regulate the conduct of

businesses; this tax is not a business license as many have misinterpreted. It is merely a tax required of businesses that are subject to the ordinance by engaging in business within the City of Los Angeles. Registering a business with the Office of Finance and maintaining a Business Tax Registration Certificate (BTRC) via annual renewal accomplishes compliance with the ordinance. In fiscal year 2006-07, Finance collected \$465.8 million in business tax revenue – an all-time high!

In recent years, there have been many changes in the ways the City historically approached tax collection. Through the multi-year efforts of the Business Tax Advisory Committee, Mayor and City Council, tax reform measures were developed and implemented. One example is the increased Small Business Exemption threshold from \$5,000 to

\$50,000 to the current \$100,000 minimum to take advantage of this incentive. Another example is the consolidation of the numerous Funds and Classifications from 42 down to nine, with only six applicable rates. Work continues on simplifying the business tax ordinance and compliance procedures through the Mayor and City Council's current Ad Hoc Business Tax Reform Committee.

Finance has also implemented a number of pro-

grams to discover non-compliant businesses that are not paying their fair share of business taxes. Through state legislation (Assembly Bill 63), California municipalities gained access to the State's Franchise Tax Board records for data matching purposes. Through this program, the City has added more than 85,000 new accounts to the tax rolls and generated more than \$73 million in revenue since its 2002 inception. Other discovery efforts include utilizing databases from other City departments including utility records, hous-

ing records, and property records for data matching purposes.

Tax collection is not glamorous, but the efforts of the fine employees of the Office of Finance have afforded the City an annual contribution to the General Fund that pays for many City services. These funds pay for department salaries, community programs and public safety services, to name a few. City employees should recognize the lessthan-glamorous role of tax collection their fellow Finance employees perform to fund so much for the City of Los Angeles. Through aggressive discovery programs and dedication to service, the tax rolls have increased each year since the inception of the Office of Finance - a job well done by anyone's standards.

### **Office of Finance:**

## New and Vital

'd like to take this opportunity to welcome you into our little corner of the City, the Office of Finance. We're not La large department (just 342 employees) or long established (created in 2000), but we play a vital role in providing economic stability for the City. Finance staff enforces the City's tax laws and collects a wide variety of taxes, fees, and permits on behalf of several City departments, including the Police and Fire departments. We also perform final collection activities on aged debt referred to our Citywide Collection Unit as a last effort prior to write-off.



gender disparity in senior positions in certain denominations; how faith empowers them to cope with pain and suffering; and how we should take heed that "without women faith would not be advancing.'


### Your Police Commission

### **VICTORIAN GAMES AT BANNING**

Banning Residence Museum, a Rec and Parks facility, has begun its fall 2007 exhibition, which focuses on Victorian era board, card, and word games.

The exhibition, "Educational Amusements: American Games of the Victorian and Edwardian Era," explores how different cultures have used games to entertain and educate players about social rules and values, including honesty, responsibility, and perseverance. Among the beautifully crafted, colorful artifacts on display will be "Mansion of Happiness," which dates from 1843 and is believed to be one of the first Americanmade board games.

The exhibition will run until through Jan. 6 and will be offered in conjunction with regular museum tours, which are given on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday at 12:30 p.m., 1:30 p.m., and 2:30 p.m., with a 3:30 p.m. tour added on weekends; the cost is \$5 for adults and \$1 for children age 12 or younger. The facility is operated in conjunction with Friends of Banning Museum and is at 401 E. M Street in Wilmington. Phone: (310) 548-7777.

### **AVENUE 19 PARTIALLY REOPENS**

Public Works/Engineering announced the recent completion of construction on the western side of the Avenue 19 Replacement Bridge. With the partial opening of the new structure in Lincoln Heights, the temporary two-way traffic lanes on Avenue 19 East were moved to the newly constructed side of the bridge Sept. 7. The traffic flow switch will allow construction on the remaining half of the bridge to begin immediately.

The \$10 million project addresses the seismically challenged structures that are badly in need of repairs. The new, two-span, pre-stressed concrete box girder structure will meet current earthquake performance criteria and will exceed national rating requirements. The Avenue 19 Bridge was expected to be built two years after groundbreaking but experienced

a few unexpected delays. "One major hold-up was a temporary project shut down when crews encountered petroleum materials while drilling," said project manager Wenn Chyn. "With some minor modifications in construction methods, and an enforcement of emergency safety measures for workers and the public, our crews were able to handle the petroleum material safely and prevent contamination of the Los Angeles River."

Board of Public Works president Cynthia M. Ruiz says, "The Department of Public Works is committed to the safety of our residents by providing sound infrastructure and protecting the environment. The delays on the Avenue 19 bridge project were necessary to address these issues effectively."

Motorists will continue to have access to one traffic lane in each direction. However, due to the lack of sufficient space for a temporary sidewalk, pedestrian traffic will not be allowed on the stretch of Avenue 19 from San Fernando Road to Humboldt Street.

The Avenue 19 bridge project is located where the Arroyo Seco and the Los Angeles River meet and is an important element to the planned improvements in Council District 1 that include parks and recreational areas. The community of Lincoln Heights is very involved in this project, participating during the project design stage to select a traditional yet aesthetically appealing look that reflects the neighborhood's character.

The bridge project is one of 80 projects managed by the Bureau of Engineering's bridge improvement program. Its construction is funded by the City of Los Angeles' seismic bond and a federal highway bridge replacement and rehabilitation grant.



# 19 Honored for Bravery

### **LAPD** hosts its 46th Medal of Valor ceremony.

LAPD — On May 10, 18 police officers and one former officer received the LAPD's highest honor, the Medal of Valor. The award celebrates bravery and heroism beyond the call of duty. The 46th Medal of Valor Ceremony. which was expected to draw more than 500 guests, was held at the Kodak Theatre in Hollywood.

The 46th Medal of Valor Ceremony was sponsored by the Los Angeles Police Foundation.

The Medal of Valor is the Los Angeles Police Department's highest honor and is awarded to officers who distinguish themselves by conspicuous bravery or heroism above and beyond the normal demands of police service. To be awarded the Medal of Valor, an officer would have performed an act displaying extreme courage while consciously facing imminent peril.

The medal was awarded by the Board of Police Commissioners and was presented by the Chief of Police in the name of the Department at the annual Medal of Valor awards ceremony. The award consists of a medal, ribbon and citation. The Medal of Valor was first presented in 1925. Medals of Valor were not awarded in 2004 and 2005.

The Club sincerely congratulates those honored at the ceremony for their true dedication to service. Their individual stories follow.

### AT LONG LAST



Walter Kesterson Policeman KILLED IN THE LINE OF DUTY FEB. 4, 1946

While conducting crime-suppression duties near 43rd Place and Avalon Boulevard, Metropolitan Division Officers Walter H. Kesterson and E.W. Patrick observed two robbery suspects. The suspects, Nathaniel Cooper and Gus Boyd, had just committed an armed robbery at a local movie theater. Kesterson, the passenger officer, exited the police vehicle and attempted to detain the two suspects. However, Cooper reached into his jacket pocket and a scuffle ensued between Cooper and Kesterson. Cooper then removed a .38-caliber revolver from his jacket and fired at Kesterson, striking him in the upper torso. Kesterson simultaneously returned fire, which resulted in the death of Cooper.

Concurrently, Kesterson observed Boyd in the process of removing a handgun from his pocket. Officer Kesterson was able to fire at Boyd, thus neutralizing his deadly threat. Both suspects were pronounced dead

Kesterson was taken to the George Street Receiving Hospital and died upon arrival. Subsequent investigation revealed the suspects had committed at least 25 armed robberies in the Los Angeles area. Two weeks prior to Kesterson's shooting, Vernon Police Officer Richard Pennington had stopped both suspects for driving under the influence just one block from the Vernon Police Headquarters. After arriving at Police Headquarters for processing, Boyd exited his vehicle with a handgun and shot Pennington in the upper torso and head, killing him instantly.

Kesterson's partner, E.W. Patrick, was not involved in the officer-involved shooting. He was in the process of parking the police vehicle and by the time he exited the vehicle, the gun battle was over.

Officer Kesterson had not been recognized by the Department for this incident until this 2007 Medal of Valor honor.

### **SAVING ANOTHER OFFICER**



Joseph Meyer POLICE OFFICER, 77TH STREET AREA

On June 3, 2006, Southwest Area Officers Joseph Meyer and Kristina Ripatti were patrolling the area of Leighton and Denker Avenues. Suddenly, a male, later identified as James McNeal, ran in front of their police vehicle, causing Meyer to brake to avoid hitting him. With the intent to issue a citation, Ripatti ordered McNeal to stop. McNeal looked in their direction then increased his speed. McNeal's desperate attempt to avoid contact with the police led the officers to believe he was running for some other reason. Unknown to the officers at the time, McNeal was running from the scene of an armed robbery he had just committed.

As Ripatti initiated a foot pursuit, Meyer broadcast their location and joined pursuit. Ripatti caught up to McNeal on the front porch of an apartment building. As Ripatti attempted to grab McNeal's arm, McNeal armed himself with a handgun and fired four shots at point blank range, hitting Ripatti. Meyer was approximately 20 feet behind Ripatti when she was shot. Meyer immediately requested assistance and rushed over to aid Ripatti, who was gasping for air. Meyer remained calm, cradled Ripatti and assured her that she would be

Sgt. Robin Brown, assigned to Southwest Area, was the first to respond and joined Meyer in his attempt to locate the wound and stabilize Ripatti. Meyer removed Ripatti's bulletproof vest, tracked the flow of blood under her left arm and plugged the wound with his finger. Brown then used his open palm to cup Meyer's hand to form an airtight seal over the wound and applied pressure. In an attempt to keep Ripatti alert, both Brown and Meyer kept talking to her. Meyer then noted Ripatti had released her hold on his hands and her head collapsed into a lifeless limp.

Simultaneously, Officers Keith Bertonneau, Ralph Ward, Gary Koba and Gilbert Pinel, assigned to Metropolitan Division, Special Weapon and Tactics (SWAT), arrived on the scene and relieved Brown and Meyer. All four officers from the Metropolitan Division are Emergency Medical Technicians and began administering first aid to Ripatti. Pinel used a sterile bandage to apply direct pressure to Ripatti's wound. Bertonneau assisted in applying pressure using the heel of his palm. Ward retrieved a bag valve mask and an oxygen bottle from his kit and Koba positioned himself to conduct chest compression and to monitor Ripatti's pulse. While monitoring Ripatti, Pinel noted she was limp, had no pulse and was unresponsive. All four SWAT Officers immediately initiated CPR.

Pinel elevated Ripatti's head to keep her airway open and placed the oxygen mask over her mouth. Koba initiated chest compressions in cycles of four while Ward pumped the oxygen bag and Bertonneau kept pressure on the wound. After administering CPR for approximately one minute, a pulse was detected on Ripatti's wrist and her heart began beating again. Ripatti's eyes moved upward and she responded to instructions. With guarded optimism, the officers maintained their positions, ensuring Ripatti could breathe on her own until the paramedics arrived.

A trauma doctor at the hospital stated that if the responding officers had not acted in a timely and appropriate manner, Ripatti would not have survived her injuries.

### **SAVING A DRIVER**

n May 1, 2006, Newton Area's Special Problems Unit (SPU) Police Officers Rudy Barragan and Marco Briones were stopped at a traffic light when they observed a gray Buick crash into a power pole. The officers immediately went to the crash site to render aid.

As they approached, they noted the driver was semi-conscious and trapped behind the steering wheel, bleeding heavily from an eight-inch laceration on the top of his head. Moments later, additional SPU Officers Brain Cooney, Rudy Avelar and Bruce Coss arrived on the scene. While Avelar conducted traffic control, Cooney and Coss grabbed a fire extinguisher from their police vehicle and attempted to suppress the flames in the vehicle.

As the dashboard ignited into flames, Barragan and Briones attempted to open the driver's door with negative results. Then they tried to pull the more than six-foot male driver, who weighed more than 250 pounds, out of the window, but were unable to do so because of the heat from the flames. Utilizing the fire extinguisher, Cooney and Coss then focused their attention on trying to keep the fire from the driver. As the rescue continued, Briones broke out the rear passenger window with his baton. Barragan and Briones then

attempted to pull the driver out from the rear door with negative results.


As the fire and heat intensified, Barragan and Briones re-deployed to the front passenger's door as they continued their efforts to rescue the driver by utilizing tremendous strength. They eventually managed to pull the driver from the burning vehicle. Just as they cleared the vehicle and were dragging the driver to safety, the vehicle exploded and was completely engulfed in flames.

Newton Area Sergeant Chris Gomez arrived just as Barragan and Briones pulled the driver from the vehicle. Sergeant Gomez observed the vehicle burst into flames just seconds after the rescue. Sergeant Gomez stated that the driver would not have survived if the officers had not extracted him from the burning vehicle. Two witnesses were interviewed and shared the same opinion. The driver was rushed into surgery and survived the incident.







## **SAVING LIVES IN A BUILDING ON FIRE**

n June 21, 1996, Wilshire Area Police Officers Jeffrey Wenninger and Jose Castellanos were on patrol when they heard an explosion. They then observed smoke and flames billowing from a window of a retirement home. The officers knew the retirement home was occupied by numerous elderly and physically handicapped citizens, and without hesitation, exited their vehicle to render aid. As they approached the retirement home, the window exploded from the intense heat generated by the flames. Fearing that an elderly person was trapped inside the bedroom, they requested the Fire Department and quickly formulated a plan for a rescue.

Wenninger and Castellanos entered the retirement home via the front door. They were unable to see due to the thick smoke in the hallway and crawled down the hallway to the bedroom door. Wenninger informed Castellanos that he (Wenninger) would enter the bedroom and "run the walls" to locate potential victims. Wenninger instructed Castellanos to remain at the door in the event he (Wenninger) became disoriented and could not find his way out of the room. However, due to the thick smoke in the bedroom and the hallway, both officers were forced to exit

Upon exiting the retirement home, Wenninger and Castellanos met Albert Gavin and Sandy Kim, Miguel Lopez, Alberto Junco, Stephen Diaz, Arturo Perez, Mark Pursel, Kenyard Bilal, Gerald Jackson, Guy Dobine and Jude Washington near the front door. Believing an elderly citizen was still in the burning bedroom, Wenninger, Castellanos, Diaz and Junco formed a human chain and

Jude Washington reentered the room. They were unable to see due to the thick smoke, had difficulty breathing and had to feel around on their hands and knees. After locating no one, the officers exited the bedroom, separated into rescue teams and initiated an evacuation of the entire two-story structure.

As the flames and dark smoke engulfed the second floor, the officers and the supervisor began a door-to-door search and evacuated approximately 80 senior citizens to safety. Some officers heard cries from inside locked bedrooms and were forced to kick open numerous doors to conduct their rescue. The rescued senior citizens were physically carried down the stairs to safety.

Each officer reentered the burning and smoke-filled retirement home between five to ten times to rescue the elderly residents of the facility. The rescue continued even after the Fire Department arrived and after the fire sprinkler system was activated.

While other officers were treated at the scene, Wenninger, Lopez, Junco and Castellanos suffered smoke inhalation, headaches and other breathing-related problems and were taken to Westside Hospital. Lopez, Junco and Castellanos were treated and released at the hospital. However, due to the amount of carbon-monoxide exposure, Wenninger was admitted into the intensive care unit. He was discharged the following day.

All of the elderly citizens were rescued from the retirement home. Those who required medical treatment were treated and released at the scene.



## SAVING ANOTHER OFFICER


On Aug. 12, 2006, Hollenbeck Area Officers John Porras and James Tuck were patrolling the area of Lincoln Park in their marked police vehicle. Porras and Tuck observed a black Honda Accord traveling northbound with only one headlight working. Porras made a U-turn and initiated a traffic stop. The driver of the Accord failed to yield, made several turns and then pulled over.

As Porras was coming to a stop behind the Accord, the front passenger, Jose Perez, exited the Accord armed with an assault rifle. Perez then fired the rifle numerous times at Porras and Tuck, striking the hood and the windshield of the police vehicle. Both officers returned fire. However, Tuck was struck multiple times in the left arm. Perez continued firing his weapon as he approached the passenger side of the police vehicle. Porras exited the police vehicle, returned fire, hitting Perez in the upper leg. Perez subsequently dropped his weapon and fled southbound from the location. The driver of the Accord, Rogelio Espinosa, drove away during the gunfight.

Hollenbeck Area Officer Jason Smith, a Certified Medical Technician, was the first to respond. Smith wrapped Tuck's hand and applied a tourniquet to his left bicept to control the bleeding. Smith also checked for additional wounds and located a gunshot wound on Tuck's back. Smith cared for Tuck's wounds and kept him stabilized until paramedics arrived.

Rescue Ambulance personnel at the scene stated that Tuck could have lost his hand, or his life, from loss of blood, if not for the

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


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recent U.S. Fire Administration's official report highlights the fact that nationwide on an Aannual basis, candles are responsible for an estimated 23,600 residential structure fires, cause 1,525 civilian injuries, 165 fatalities and \$390 million in direct property loss. More than onethird of these fires start in the bedroom.

#### Here are some tips to be safe this fall:

- Clean your rain gutter and make sure it is properly attached to the eaves.
- Check and clean your chimney and install a spark arrestor.
- Rake dead leaves and trees branches. Put them in an approved recyclable container.
- Check all your security bar release latches to make sure they work.
- Check window screens to make sure they work properly.
- Keep candles away from combustible materials .
- Place candles on a stable, heat-resistant surface.

#### In case of power outages:

- Never use candles as a night-light.
- Flashlights are safer sources of light than candles.
- Have a portable radio with extra batteries.
- Make sure your furnace/wall heater is working properly
- Check the pilot light and change the filter regularly. Repairs should be done by a qualified/licensed technician. If you smell gas, call 9-1-1.
- Keep space heaters at least 3 feet from combustibles. (In many cities, kerosene heaters are illegal to use).
- Check and replace electrical cords if they are frayed or worn out. Make sure the cord is UL-approved.
- Check dryer vents and clean out the lint trap.

#### **Halloween Safety**


Here are some tips for escaping from a fast-moving brush fire.

- Always trick or treat with an adult.
- Only flame-retardant materials should be used for costumes.
- A mask can obstruct your view. Use facial make-up instead.
- Never stand next to a lighted pumpkin.
- Know stop, drop and roll (if you catch on fire)
- Make sure you only go to homes that are well lit.
- Do not put any decorations near flammable materials.
- Never allow children to light candles.

#### Change Clock, Change Battery

Daylight saving time ends later this year: Sunday, Nov. 4. So remember:

- When you change your clock, change your smoke alarm battery
- Test your smoke alarm monthly to make sure it works
- Make sure everyone knows what the smoke alarm sounds like.
- If you have a vision or hearing problem, you should get a special alarm.
- Have a fire drill. As part of the drill, test your smoke alarm.
- Have a meeting place outside your house.
- Do not forget to include your pets in your fire drills.

t's a good thing that the government solved I that earthquake problem that California used to have!

Earthquakes and California are a given. It's the price we have to pay to live in such a beautiful place. We don't get freezing cold winters, but we do have to put up with a little shaking once in a while. It's not a matter of "if," but more a matter of "when." Another large earthquake is going to strike us, but we just don't know when.

There are many things that you can do to prepare for the inevitable. The Red Cross recommends that the first thing that you should do is prepare an earthquake kit of nonperishable foods, water, blankets and first aid supplies. It's also vitally important for your family to have an emergency plan of where you are going to meet, and who is going to be responsible for what.

In addition, there are several things you can do around your house to help mitigate any damages:

- Secure heavy items of furniture to the studs in the walls using flexible nylon straps.
- Secure TVs and other electronics using flexible nylon straps.
- Secure breakables and collectibles with quake putty, wax or museum gel.
- Store emergency tools, including a gas shut-off wrench and safety light sticks, in a place you can easily access.
- Learn how to turn off gas, water and electricity in case the lines are damaged.
- Know the safe spots in every room under sturdy tables, desks or against inside walls — and know the danger spots, including windows, mirrors, hanging objects, fireplaces, tall furniture.
- Secure water heaters with two-strap kits. Another important item to consider when contemplating earthquake preparedness is reviewing your insurance.

Because earthquake insurance has traditionally been expensive, many homeowners have opted not to purchase the coverage. This may not be the smartest idea. The price of earthquake coverage continues to fluctuate based on the date since the most recent large quake. What was once very expensive, you might find to be quite affordable now.

While this is a huge amount, if your house is totally destroyed, it would be a blessing to have to pay only \$100,000 to get your entire life back.

# Patty's Shrimp Kabobs

## Serves about 2 to 4

- Salt and pepper, to desired
  - amount
  - 1 large zucchini
  - 1 onion
  - 2 green peppers
  - 1/4 cup of dried parsley







Step 2: Cut the limes in halves and squeeze the juice onto the shrimp.


Step 5: Add salt and pepper as well as the hot sauce.

Step 7: Mix ingredients and let marinate in the fridge for several hours - two hours is good enough.




Step 8: Slide in the veggies and shrimp in any order or quantity, just make sure the end pieces are not the shrimp because they will burn on the grill.



Step 9: Place on a baking sheet, and construct as many kabobs as the ingredients allow. The kabobs should look something



Step 10: Place the kabobs on the grill and turn every so often to balance the cooking on all sides of the kabob.



In honor of my youngest sister, Patty, **I**I'm sharing one of her favorite shrimp recipes - shrimp kabobs.

The success of this dish is all in the preparation. Dice your favorite vegetables such as onions, zucchini and peppers. It's a good idea to marinate the shrimp for a few hours as well. I went with the basics and used just olive oil, salt, pepper, garlic and limes. I did add some hot sauce to spice it up a bit, but that's entirely up to you since I consider it to be optional.

Although you could use frozen cooked shrimp, fresh or fresh frozen shrimp is best for the greatest flavor. When you use frozen shrimp, however, defrost them in the fridge - this may take up to 24 hours, so be patient. The size of the shrimp doesn't matter to me as long as they are bigger than 50 to 70per pound -- if they're too small, they may tear when you pierce them with the skewer.

As for the skewer, I used a metal version, but I do prefer the bamboo skewer variety. If you use bamboo, remember to soak them in water before you place them on the barbecue grill. Otherwise, they will burn and will leave your food with an undesirable taste.

Many different ingredients can be used for kabobs, so experiment and
