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

Fun Was the Order of the Day For *Alive!'s* City Parties! Section





limbing atop and then through the rough, ragged and loose wood, Ranger searches confidently and thoroughly. Ranger, a border collie and part of the LAFD's Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) K9 Team, is both agile and deft over the rough terrain.

So is the team. It's designed to be highly portable to get to the City's - and the world's - disasters as quickly as possible. And they do.

Keeping the team ready is the job of the LAFD's Deresa Teller, Inspector/ Paramedic, with 30 years of City service. High atop the pile of rubble during a recent training day, she followed her livescent search dog Ranger, as he sniffed and looked intently for a "victim," in this case, an LAFD firefighter "buried" in the rubble for training purposes.

Three "victims" were buried in the rubble, and on this training day, every single LAFD search dog found every single victim, every single time.

How the Squad Works

The members of the team are Deresa Teller, Inspector/Paramedic and Canine Coordinator; Margaret Firefighter; Scott Zins, Firefighter/ Paramedic; Jason Chapman, Firefighter/ Paramedic; Tommy Haus, Capt. 1; and Marcues Toledo, Capt. Most have regular fire department duties, although some are permanently assigned to the USAR K9 Team. The rest volunteered for K9 duty and train with their dogs at least monthly, officially; all have additional training sessions on their own, at their own expense. (Others members: Athena Robbins-Haus, wife of Capt. Tommy Haus, is a lieutenant with the Bellbrook Fire Dept. in Ohio; and Gary Smith, who was a member of the team for years, is now semi-retired but takes part in some operations.)

Most of the team members bring their dogs to work with them.

At any one time, three California USAR Search and Rescue squads are on rotation, meaning, if there is a local, national or international crisis, three California teams keep themselves ready for instant deployment. Readiness lasts for 10 days, after which three more teams rotate into the ready position. For example, the LAFD USAR CATF 1 and K9 Team were on active readiness when 9/11 hit. When the Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City was bombed,

Rubble

Deresa Teller and her then-search dog Bella deployed with the Orange County USAR Team; the team also saw duty in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina in Mississippi (see *Alive!*, November 2005). The LAFD's USAR K9 Team was not in the rotation position for the earthquake in Haiti, so they did not deploy. But they were told to be ready, so they were. (See sidebar, "Disasters.")

The City provides some funding, and, despite tight budgets, "they're making an effort to be more supportive," Deresa says. The dogs are owned either by their handler or by the Search Dog Foundation (see below). Typically, the team deploys for between two weeks and a month.

The LAFD's USAR K9 Team volunteers for the K9 service and registers with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Half of the team pays for their dogs out of their own pockets, and the team pays for 95 percent of their equipment, veterinary care, dog food, vehicles, gas, deployment gear and kennel expenses, according to Deresa Teller.

History

Deresa, a 30-year LAFD veteran, became interested in search dogs after seeing search dogs being used in the aftermath of the Mexico City earthquake in the mid-1980s. She already had a history of training dogs (not for search and rescue). In the late 1990s, she joined with three others – Howard Orr, of the Santa Barbara Fire Dept.; Ron Weckbacher, at press time in Haiti as part of the L.A. County USAR K9 Team; and Deborah Tosch, now the Director of the Search Dog Foundation – to form the first Southern California USAR K9 Team.

That team, which was mostly self-funded, disbanded, and the City put out a recruiting call to form a new one two-anda-half years ago. "We received 60 to 70 replies, everyone from firefighters to chiefs," Deresa remembers. "But when they saw how much work it was, the numbers went down."

From those applicants, the current team was formed.

Typical Situations

The LAFD's USAR K9 Team specializes in live search, meaning, it's used in situations where victims might still be alive. Only one of the squad's dogs – Charlotte, trained and owned by Deresa – is trained to search for cadavers and/or body parts, a more difficult challenge.

A partial list of the kind of situations in which the team excels includes:

- Earthquakes
- Tsunamis
- Floods
- Train/automobile/trucking/ airline accidents
- Building collapses
- Fires
- Runaways
- Bodies thought to be abandoned in the wilderness
- Etc.

The Search Dog Foundation

A big part of the story of the LAFD's USAR K9 Team is the Search Dog Foundation, which supplies animals, fundraising and organizational support for the squad.

A Special Thank You

In this type of search, the handler commands Ithe dog into or onto the rubble with the word "search" or "seek." Usually a team of handlers monitors the K9 as it makes its way through the rubble, sniffing for the telltale signs of a live body. Since a handler must watch (carefully) where they're going, they cannot keep their eyes trained on the dog 100 percent of the time. That's why usually there are extra handlers following the dog and main handler, to make sure no K9 signal is missed.

When a K9 smells something of interest, the dog will bark a "excited bark," according to Deresa Teller. Some might use their paws, too, although the dogs are not supposed to enter the hole with the victim.

In a real search situation, there would be a confirmation K9 brought in after the first search dog signaled a scent, to confirm a scent has been detected before serious manpower is dedicated to the location.

In both training and real situations, the K9 is rewarded with a toy, usually a tug-of-war toy. In training, the "victim" usually rewards the dog, to keep the dog loyal to the victim.

"In real searches, sometimes we hide our own people as 'victims,' just to keep the dogs interested," Deresa explains. "The dogs are used to finding people during their training. When they don't find anything in a real situation, it can be confusing and disappointing."

adaver searches are not that different than a live search, except that the scent would be different; body parts might be much smaller and therefore harder to locate; and the lack of a live victim can be a deterrent to keeping the dog motivated – it's just not as much fun for them. So, fewer dogs can maintain sufficient interest. Also, in these cases, the handler would provide the reward instead of the live victim.

LAFD K9 Team in Action

The LAFD's USAR K9 team performs two kinds of searches:

- LIVE SEARCH, in which victims are still expected to be found alive; and
- CADAVER SEARCH, in which victims are expected to be dead, and sometimes for a long period of time.

All but one of the unit's K9s are trained as live subject search dogs; only one (Charlotte, one of Deresa Teller's dogs) is trained to search out cadavers.

On pages 10 and 11 are photos of both types of searches. These were part of a training day Dec. 4, held at the Waste Management facility in Sunland.

The "Victim"

Victims," in this case, fellow Fire Dept. employees, act as the test during training exercises. Before the training begins, tubes were buried underneath the rubble. Once a tube was stabilized, a "victim" slid inside. Three "victims" were used during this training exercise; each spot was marked by a flag for safety, and each "victim" remained in the hole for several hours.

After the exercises were completed, they surfaced safely.

On Duty

Deresa Teller and her previous and legendary live scent and cadaver search dog Bella, were called to duty in some of our nation's worst disasters.

At any given time, there are always three California USAR teams at the ready – one is in first rotation, one in second, and one in third. The rotations change every month.

The LAFD team was number one on the readiness rotation for two of our nation's most recent emergencies happened: the massive loss of life in the World Trade Center in New York City, and Hurricane Katrina in Florida, Mississippi and Louisiana. In addition, Deresa and Bella searched in the aftermath of the bombing of the Murrah Building in Oklahoma City, and they were sent to Salt Lake City as a preventative measure during the 2002 Winter Olympics, but that incident went without incident.

2001

9/11, New York City

Nearly 3,000 people were killed when terrorists flew fully fueled airplanes into New York City's World Trade Center. The total includes those who died in related attacks in Virginia and Pennsylvania.

"We got the call and left that night," Deresa remembers. "We landed [in New York] the next morning, and it took us about half a day before getting to Ground Zero.

"I thought we were in a Terminator movie," she says, not trying to sound trivial. "I had never seen anything like it. After my experiences in Oklahoma City, I thought that the chances that anyone had survived this were zilch. In Oklahoma City, I had seen things intact. But [at Ground Zero] I didn't see a single filing cabinet, not a computer, not a telephone. If those didn't survive, how could a human? It's just amazing that someone survived in a stairway, because several did."

"On Wednesday, we were on the second shift, 5 p.m. until it started raining. I can't recall the exact area where we were searching."

She and Bella were on some dangerous ground. Authorities were wary for a secondary event – sometimes terrorists/criminals wait for the safety personnel to appear before detonating a second device or killing action. That didn't happen at the World Trade Center, but there were other fears.

"We had to evacuate twice, once when someone

thought they saw a building move [other buildings near Ground Zero were seriously damaged, and some ended up collapsing – Ed.], and once when a fire shot up about 30 feet. Fires were burning down there for six months."

The loss of human life was massive.

In an area of about 12 feet of rubble, Bella alerted to a scent. When that area was cleared and searched again, a crushed car was found. Bella searched and alerted again, and a body was found crushed in that car.

But that was minor compared to another day. Authorities had asked her to search a certain area where they thought some firefighters had perished. "One night, we went looking for firefighters," she said. "Bella just kept alerting and alerting, over and over. Later, I found out that nearly every place she alerted was a find. She alerted at least 25 times.

2005

Katrina, Gulf Shore

By the time of Hurricane Katrina, Deresa was now paired with Ranger (seen on the cover of this month's *Alive!*). While Bella was a live scent and cadaver dog, Ranger is a live-search dog. So, Deresa and Ranger – and the entire LAFD USAR K9 Team – went to Mississippi searching for live victims.

Deresa's experiences were detailed in a special section of the November 2005 issue of *Alive!*

In that interview, she says: "I have been to several disasters, and I have seen the Oklahoma City bombing and the New York World Trade Center ... I thought the New York World Trade Center was huge, but his was even larger. It just went on for

miles and miles. And, of course, it was a different kind of rubble, more survivable rubble for people as opposed to New York. What really amazed me were those humongous floating casinos that were on those big barges that were just brought up on shore by the big wave, or whatever. I mean, those things must weigh hundreds of tons. I cannot imagine what it was like first looking out there, because when we were there at least the streets we cleared so that we could walk down the street. But, you know, there is no way that was like that when the rescuers first got there."

1995

Murrah Building, Oklahoma City

n April 19, 1995, Timothy McVeigh, an American who has since been convicted and executed for his crime, blew up the federal Murrah Building in Oklahoma City, killing 168 people and injuring more than 650.

Deresa and Bella were flown to Oklahoma City about ten days after the event and began searching for victims.

Bella found four victims in the rubble, and became a hero of the children of the families who had lost loved ones.



A Dog's Life:



They truly are "man's best friend," but a dog can be a big liability as well. Thankfully, with the proper insurance, you can protect yourself against some of the exposures of owning a pet.

The risk is great. Dog bites account for 32 percent of all homeowners insurance liability claims, and cost more than \$387 million in 2008. There were nearly 16,000 claims in 2008, and the average claim cost more than \$24,000. According to the Centers for Disease Control, more than 4.7 million people are bitten by dogs every year. Of these, more than 800,000 people require medical attention.

Over the years, many states have passed laws with stiff penalties for owners of dogs that cause serious injuries or deaths. In about one-third of states, owners are "strictly liable" for their dog's behavior, while in the rest of the country they are liable only if they knew or should have known their dogs had a propensity to bite (known as the "one free bite" principle).

Based on the dog-bite claims they see, insurance companies feel that some breeds are a poor risk. It's a trend that began about 10 years ago, at around the same time as statistics were released showing that pit bulls, Rottweilers and German shepherds were responsible for more than half the dog bite fatalities in the United States over a 19-year period. 



Found throughout the forests of central Africa, the colobus is one of the most striking primates in the animal kingdom. Adult Kikuyu colobus monkeys have black bodies trimmed with long white mantles.

Infant colobus monkeys are born all white and do not start to get their black trim until about three and one half months of age.


Colobus monkeys live in highly cohesive social groups. Thus, the infant is enjoying attention from its father, mother and another adult female. Check out their interactions with their newly named troop member at the colobus exhibit located just past the Zoo's Mahale Café toward the perimeter road.

In addition to colobus, the Los Angeles Zoo houses a diverse collection of primates. Highlights include mandrills, sifakas, lemurs and tamarins. Within the past decade, vibrant habitats have been completed for gorillas, orangutans, chimpanzees and Francois's langurs. Many primates are threatened by habitat loss and hunting. The Los Angeles Zoo supports primate conservation projects throughout Asia, Africa and South America. The Zoo also actively participates in the Association of Zoo and Aquariums (AZA) Species Survival Program (SSP) to manage primate populations in zoos.

Italy, Land of Romance

■ Hal and Co. cruise their way through Europe. Part 3.

Evelyn and I took a 35-day trip, which included a self-guided week in Italy before a 28-day cruise that included Italy, Croatia, Greece, Spain, Morocco, Portugal and then an ocean crossing to Fort Lauderdale, Fla. This month, we pick-up our travels in Rome.

Our last night in Rome, we had dinner at a local place just a short walk from the hotel; the restaurant had a good mix of tourists and locals. The food was good, and we met a couple from South Africa (the second family we have met from there) and had a nice conversation. Evelyn had a small gelato on the way back to the hotel; she had coffee flavor this time. We were still looking for roasted banana. It sure was fun looking!

One last word about Rome: In Italian, Rome is spelled "Roma." Roma spelled backwards is amor! Bet you didn't know that. [Inquiring minds want to know, Hal! - Ed.]

We drove an Alpha Romeo, with a sixspeed manual and diesel engine. It was very nice, roomy and comfortable. We left Rome on our way to Florence (175 miles) about 10:30 a.m. and, with our GPS, we had no problems leaving the city and getting to the A1 highway. We decided to stop at Orvieto, which friends had told us about. Orviet a city in southwestern Umbria, situated on the flat summit of a large butte of consolidated volcanic ash (called tuff in Italian). The site of the city is very dramatic, rising above the almost-vertical faces of tuff cliffs that are completed by defensive walls built of the same stone. Umbria is the area that borders Tuscany and, although it produces wine, too, is less known.

We parked in a lot just at the entrance of the town and walked up the narrow street to the top. We bought a couple of bottles of wine to take on the ship and a ceramic jug as a souvenir. Orvieto is known for its ceramics and they range in price from a couple of Euros to museum quality.

We stayed about two hours and then drove the rest of the way to Florence. We got there about 3:15 p.m. and checked into the hotel (Grand Hotel Mediterraneo). It was on the Arno River just a short walk to the historic areas of Florence. It was not as fancy as the one in Rome, but nice just the

same and the parking garage was only 20 Euros per night. Hal picked the hotel first based on the availability of parking.

Florence is the capital city of the Italian region of Tuscany and of the province of Florence. It is the most populous city in Tuscany with a population of approximately 367,000. The city lies on the River Arno and is known for its history and its importance in the Middle Ages and in the Renaissance, especially for its art and architecture. From 1865 to 1870, the city

was also the capital of the Kingdom of Italy. Prior to the unification of Italy in 1861, cities like Florence, Pisa and Venice were independent city-states and didn't hold much love for each other. There is a saying in Florence that "it is better to have a dead Florentian on your doorstep then a live Pisan in your home," and it's said that they still think that way today.

My feet were about to go on strike or at least join a union. We left the hotel at 8:30 a.m. and did not return until 6:30 p.m. We walked every place. Our first tour was a three-hour walking excursion of Florence. We saw all of the important sites about the history of the city. It gave us a very good overview - the company was called the Walking Tours of Florence.

After breaking for lunch, we left for a two-hour highlight of the Uffizi Gallery. Our guide was very knowledgeable, and we learned a lot that we would not have known if we did not have a guide. Between our tours, Evelyn managed to get in some quick shopping. We also saw the home office of Ferragamo, where they even had a shoe museum! Our last assignment of the day was a one-hour tour of the Academia to see The David," or Michelangelo's David. Again it was good to see it with a guide.

All three tours were great. The guides were experienced and spoke fluent English. Our guides were either American or American-educated. I would not recommend self-guided tours in any of the museums unless you have an advanced degree in Italian art; it is the guide who brings the art

As for lunch, Evelyn did have banana gelato. Not the roasted variety, but we still had time in Italy to continue that pursuit.

Evelyn: Between the second and third walking tour, we stopped, and Hal had a beer and I had a cappuccino. In a café, indoors or out, a cappuccino is about 4.40 Euros; at a coffee bar it is 1.40. We learned something very important - order your drinks at the bar and not sitting down at a table. The prices were much less. If you want to sit and people watch or just need a place to rest, the additional cost can be worth it, but not for a quick pick-me-up.

Evelyn did have another observation.

In the States, there are few public drinking fountains and none that runs continually. We have a water shortage, remember. When you go to a restaurant and ask for water, it's usually from the tap unless you specify bottled. In Italy, it's completely different. There are water fountains for drinking everywhere, and water is plentiful. But when you go to a restaurant, the only water served is bottled. As a footnote, we did drink the tap water in both Rome and Florence, but not in a restaurant.

The next day, we were off to drive to Venice to meet Don and Myrna and then board our ship on Oct. 5.

In the morning, we drove from Florence to Venice (172 miles). It was a beautiful drive through the Italian countryside. We got lost only once. Just outside of Venice, I stopped for fuel (diesel), where a kind Italian driver helped me pump and pay for it. When we got back on the road I missed the ramp to Venice and had to go about 15 miles out of the way. A footnote about driving in Italy: With an English-speaking GPS, it is really a snap. The toll roads are very well maintained and easy to drive, but

the tolls are high compared to the United States, and the speed limit didn't seem to be enforced.

When we got to the Venice bus terminal where the Hertz office was, I managed to drive into the bus-only lot and sweet-talked a cop into not stopping us. I dropped off Evelyn with the luggage while I returned the car to Hertz. It took about 20 minutes; Evelyn found the porters, and we paid 30 Euros for them to haul our luggage to the hotel about 50 yards away, up and over two bridges.

Venice is in northern Italy. It's the capital of the Veneto region, with a population of around 270,000. The city historically was the capital of an independent nation. It has been described as "undoubtedly the most beautiful city built by man," and as being one of Europe's most romantic cities.

The city stretches across 118 small islands in the marshy Venetian Lagoon and the Adriatic Sea. The Republic of Venice was a major maritime power during the Middle Ages and Renaissance and a staging area for the Crusades, as well as a very important center of commerce and art in the 13th century up to the end of the 17th century.

Our hotel, Hotel Arlechino, was nice, with three stars; we had a room overlooking a canal. Don and Myrna were about a half hour ahead of us. After they had a short rest, we walked to Piazza San Marco (St. Mark Square), about 40 minutes away. The square seemed rundown and not at all as I remembered. Evelyn was

very disappointed with the square also. The buildings on one entire side of the square were under renovation. That's fine, but hanging a banner the size of a football field over the scaffolding advertising jeans was depressing. We hung out for a while and took the Vaporetto (waterbus) back to the bus terminal. The waterbus was very busy and slow, but cheap it didn't cost anything (the price was 6.5 Euros, but we didn't know, and no one asked for a ticket). We had dinner close to the hotel and then took a walk around the area. The weather was a little cooler, and we needed light jackets after the sun set. So far we had had excellent weather, and the forecast looked good for the near future.

We left the hotel late morning and had a porter take our bags to the bus terminal. It

Once we checked our bags at the baggage building, we walked a good 200 yards to the check-in area. We were given a number, and groups were called by number to get in line to check it. There was water available, and I thought the check-in process was very efficient.

preparation of a Financial Power of Attorney, a simple will, and a living will, all at nominal cost.

"In addition, Evercare provides resources to community caregiving services and arrangement of geriatric case management (which includes onsite assessment, care plan development and consultation). If you are providing care to a loved one, or you are being cared for, Evercare can help. Services are available nearby or across the country. For more information, contact LACERS or call Evercare directly at (866) 896-1895/TDHI (800) 647-6038 TTY. You can also visit their Website at www.evercarehealthplans.com/caregiver.

"For Anthem Subscribers: Beginning this year, LACERS Anthem Blue Cross plan will offer its members the MyHealth Advantage Gold Program. Through this program, if a gap in care is noted, Anthem will send you important information via MyHealth Note. My HealthNote summarizes office visits, prescription medication and medical services you received over a specified period and provides recommendations to help you manage your care and save you money. "Early Retirees Update: Last Nov. 2, the enrollment period for the City's Early Retirement Incentive Program opened. The goal of the program was to retire 2,400 employees by the end of the fiscal year. To assist the City in reaching this goal, LACERS made a commitment to retire at least 350 members a month until the target goal of 2,400 members is achieved. Prior to LACERS making this commitment, it

had never retired more than 116 members in a single month, and 350 retirements represented approximately 70 percent of the service retirements it was staffed to process each year! Through the hard work and diligence of staff, 363 members were retired Jan. 2.

In each of the coming months, LACERS will continue to retire at least 350 members until all eligible ERIP applicants have been retired.

LACERS Update: Michael Karsch reports: "Beginning Jan. 1, 2010, Sacramento County is reducing its subsidy for retiree health benefits from a maximum of \$244 per month per person to \$144 per month. This comes on top of an attempt by the same county to eliminate the health care subsidy altogether for anyone retiring after June 1, 2007 (this elimination is being challenged in court). It is likely that the subsidy reduction will also be challenged. Either move by Sacramento County will be watched by other public entities as they confront deteriorating budgets.

"While the public pension is generally protected by a city charter (as is the case with Los Angeles City) as an inviolable contractual right, the health care program in retirement is up to the lawmaking body to continue; that is, the City Council can choose to eliminate or modify the subsidy by ordinance. The City Administrative Officer for the City has listed the subsidy reduction as among a series of cost-saving steps that the City could do. So far, the mayor and the Council have not considered such a move for the current fiscal year (2009-10) nor for the next (2010-11)."



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BIKE THEFT RING BUSTED: LAPD detectives arrested two men over the Jan. 23-24 weekend, which broke up a downtown Los Angeles bicycle-theft ring and netted

Newsbriefs

Jan. 23-24 weekend, which broke up a downtown Los Angeles bicycle-theft ring and netted several stolen bicycles and parts, drug paraphernalia, and counterfeit money.

"This is a significant break for us," said Lt. Paul Vernon, who heads up the Central Detective Division. "There were 123 bicycles stolen downtown in 2009. That's 45 more than the year before, and we know there is more than one ring of thieves who are preying on bicyclists."

Police point to the increasing popularity of bicycling for sport and transportation among downtown residents and have attributed the increase in thefts to the proliferation of bicycles, many costing in the thousands of dollars.

On Jan. 22, undercover detectives met a man in Santa Monica to buy a bicycle that he had posted on *Craigslist*. The bike's real owner had

reported the bike stolen on the same day, taken from the 500 block of Olympic Boulevard. Konstantin Rostovtsev, 51, listed the \$600 Sirrus bicycle for \$300, and included the after-market on-board computer in the asking price. After agreeing on the sale, detectives arrested the Ukranian native for receiving stolen property.

Detectives used information from Rostovtsev's arrest to identify Edward Rene Arciga, 43, as another source of stolen bicycles. "We called Arciga and asked him if he had bikes for sale," Vernon said. Saturday, undercover detectives met Arciga at the Olive Motel on Sunset Boulevard. Arciga pulled a bicycle out of his Mercedes Benz's trunk and showed it to the detectives. When the detectives arrested Arciga, an accomplice opened the motel room's door. "The detectives called the man out and could immediately see bolt cutters and more bikes," Vernon added.

"This latter arrest was a gold mine," said Lt. Vernon. "We found the two men were also bleaching money to counterfeit \$100 bills," he alleged. Detectives found several counterfeit bills, a computer and a printer for making money, and evidence of heroin use, according to police. Secret Service agents seized a laptop computer, the counterfeit bills and manufacturing materials,

police said. Detectives booked Arciga for receiving stolen property, but he may face additional federal charges for counterfeiting.

"We think Arciga and Rostovtsev are just one of several rings working downtown," Lt. Vernon warned. "All bicyclists need to protect themselves with good locks, record their bike's serial number, and keep a receipt of the bike's purchase price to prove its value; and remember, don't leave a bike in a public place, even locked up, for longer than is necessary."

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY:

The LAPD's South Traffic Division held a pedestrian safety enforcement operation Jan. 14 along Western Avenue, from Martin Luther King Boulevard to Figueroa Street.

This operation was conducted to promote safety through the enforcement of vehicle verses pedestrian enforcement details in an effort to improve pedestrian safety, to change dangerous pedestrian behaviors, to change dangerous driver behavior, to change dangerous behaviors near school(s) and to reduce injury(s), death, and property damage associated with pedestrian verses vehicle traffic collisions.

The Officer-in-Charge was Sgt. Arturo R. Gomez, South Traffic Division, Community Traffic Services Unit. Approximately 10 traffic enforcement officers, three collision investigation officers, two traffic enforcement supervisors from the LAPD, South Traffic Division, along with five plain clothes officers and one plain clothes supervisor from Southwest Division were involved in the Pedestrian Crosswalk Safety Enforcement operation.

WESTCHESTER TRAFFIC:

Public Works, Transportation and the Westchester Business Improvement District joined Councilman Bill Rosendahl at a news conference Jan. 7 to announce the completion of the wider, greener and improved Sepulveda Boulevard from Lincoln Boulevard to Howard Hughes Parkway.


The Sepulveda Boulevard Improvement project that stretched from Howard Hughes Parkway to Lincoln Boulevard was an \$8.9-million project that began in the summer of 2007. It widened the street, allowing for three traffic lanes and street parking at the business area. The project also installed and landscaped medians; constructed right turn lanes at strategic locations; installed a storm drain and catch basins to relieve flooding during the rainy season; and added 193 trees to beautify and green the major Westchester thoroughfare.

The street improvement work was performed by Public Works. Partial funding was provided by Metro.


The Moon in the **Gutter (1983)** Not Rated

This subtitled film is about a working-class Frenchman who tries to avenge his sister's death. The film follows the protagonist as he searches for her rapist. He encounters

Each of them is interesting and compelling, and they assist the main character's quest. Together, it doesn't add up to a great film. The cinematography and Gerard Depardieu's acting are the highlights here, and they barely warrant a recommendation.

This character study of two former best friends, Andy and Ben, as they reunite and bond, has an excellent, thoughtful script, and is very well acted. Most of all, it's a serious explo-

Andy and Ben grew up together, but as adults have led contrasting lives—one is successful and married, the other is free-spirited, aloof and uncommitted. When they reunite, Andy and Ben rekindle their friendship in ways not many other films have explored, and certainly not in this way before. The film uses long takes of close-ups of the actors' faces to allow them to convey their feelings. It's a unique, engaging film that I strongly recommend.


The Limits of **Control (2009)** Rated R

Jim Jarmusch has created an action film without any action. Ostensibly about a hit man on a mission to kill an important person, this film explores and

exploits the viewer's limits of what they have come to expect to see in contemporary action films. We are shown a brooding, well-dressed hit man who practices tai chi and does not use cell phones. Instead, he communicates on small pieces of paper with codes written on them, hidden inside matchbooks. The absence of action throughout this film withholds the gratification we are used to feeling when we see hit-man-type films. Here, the hit man's contacts espouse monologues (the hit man himself does not talk much) on topics such as the intersection between film and dreams, musical instruments, and the origin of the word "Bohemian." If you are patient, this film is worth seeing, just don't go in expecting a lot of action.

PARK NAMED:

Rec and Parks, in partnership with Councilmember Dennis Zine, renamed West Valley Park as "LAPD SWAT Officer Randal D. Simmons Park" in memory of the fallen LAPD SWAT officer Jan. 28.

Officer Randal D. Simmons, a 27-year veteran of the LAPD, was shot during a standoff that injured another officer and claimed the lives of five civilians Feb. 7, 2008. Officer Simmons was the first SWAT officer to die in the line of duty.

Officer Simmons committed much of his time to helping and comforting people in urban neighborhoods including Watts, Hacienda Village, Compton and Carson. He was an ordained minister at Glory Christian Fellowship International in Carson. He was instrumental in developing programs and Christian events for at-risk youth such as the annual "Greatest Toy Giveaway," which provided toys and gifts to more than 1,000 children during the holiday season. He is survived by his wife, Lisa; son, Matthew; and daughter, Gabrielle.

Officer Randal David Simmons Park will serve as a tribute to his personal sacrifice and his dedication to the community. West Valley Park is at 6731 Wilbur Ave. in the Reseda community. The 8.38-acre park includes a children's play area, walking paths, picnic tables and landscaping.

NEW TIDE GATES:

Public Works/Contract Administration and Engineering joined Councilman Bill Rosendahl Jan. 14 for a ribbon-cutting ceremony to mark the completion of the project that removed five severely corroded tide gates and electric gate controls. Fun on Two Wheels



While our four-wheeled cars can be a means of escape, there is no comparison to being on two wheels. You can expect the wind in your hair, the sun on your face and bugs in your teeth while on the ultimate freedom ride; there are no air bags, center console, cup holder, heater, lumbar back support or air fresheners. Some people call them a death trap, but others call them fun. Welcome to the world of two wheels!

Louie Fee is a **Street Services Investigator, Public Works**, and grew up around bikes. His uncle is a former road racer from the early 1970s who really got him hooked.

Louie had his share of street bikes, but in 1991 he took a bad spill leaving Neptune's Net on the Pacific Coast Highway that threw him and his then-girl-friend all over the road. Once he was released from the hospital, he decided to hang his helmet up next to his crutches and go back to four wheels. After owning a few hot rods, though, the bike bug was itching, and Louie decided it was time to scratch it. His uncle was on board to help him build a

1970s-style Harley, and so they began spending every Sunday at swap meets rummaging through piles of parts. On one of those excursions, Louie found a 1999 Fatboy with a low mileage Evo engine for a good price. He opted to use an Evo engine since they are reliable and parts seem to be endless. He pulled the motor out of the bike and sold the rest of the parts. A rigid Paughco frame was then ordered to house the Evo motor, and Louie decided to leave it in bare metal rather than painting or powder-coating it. More trips to the Long Beach swap meet got him a Sportster gas tank, Z Bars (handlebars) and a 1945 Springer fork. The Springer fork is bolted to a 21-inch Speedmaster tire with no front brake.

The sissy bar was also found at the swap meet, and it came with a little history. "When I was looking at the bar, there was this braided thing that was hanging off of it, and I asked what it was. The guy said he hung out with this woman who made it. I figured it had seen some pretty cool things, so I decided to keep it on there." A 16-inch tire finishes off the rear. The rear tire does have a brake.

The paint scheme definitely helps Louie's bike stand out. He mimicked the paint style that was popular in the 1960s and '70s, with a combination of bright colors with metal flake and patterns. The tank has a gold color basecoat with gold metal flake, and lace patterns and fish scale patterns on top of that. Painting with just one color and metal flake is a task that you ask yourself, about halfway through, why you're attempting it. Mixing in patterns and other stuff separates the boys from the men, or girls from the women.

Louie's bike does not get lost in a parking lot flooded with stock bikes right out of the showroom. He put his personal touches and vision into a rolling piece of art that pays homage to bike builders and visionaries of yesteryear.

"The bike came out exactly the way I envisioned it. It is super-sketchy and a blast to ride at five miles per hour or 100. I would like to thank my uncle for the inspiration and help and all the people who sold me their parts."









Hearst Castle is a palatial estate on the central California coast and a National Historic Landmark. It was designed by architect Julia Morgan for William Randolph Hearst, a newspaper magnate from 1919 until 1947. In 1957, the Hearst Corporation donated the property to the state of California.

Since that time it has been maintained as state historic park, where the estate and its considerable collection of art and antiques are open for public tours. Despite its location far from any urban center, the site attracts roughly 1 million visitors per year. Hearst sometimes called it "the Ranch," and it's also sometimes referred to as "San Simeon," without distinguishing between the Hearst property and the unincorporated town of the same name.

In its Heydey

Invitations to Hearst Castle were highly coveted during its heyday in the 1920s and '30s. The Hollywood and political elite often visited, usually flying into the estate's airfield or taking a private Hearstowned train car from Los Angeles. Charlie Chaplin, Cary Grant, the Marx Brothers, Charles Lindbergh, Joan Crawford, Clark Gable, James Stewart, Bob Hope, Calvin Coolidge, Franklin Roosevelt, and Winston Churchill were among Hearst's A-list guests. While guests were expected to attend the formal dinners each evening, they were normally left to their own devices during the day while Hearst directed his business affairs.

Hearst Castle was the inspiration for, but not the shooting location of, the "Xanadu" mansion of the 1941 Orson Welles film Citizen Kane, which was itself a fictionalization of William Randolph Hearst's career.

Hearst Castle featured 56 bedrooms, 61 bathrooms, 19 sitting rooms, 127 acres of gardens, indoor and outdoor swimming pools, tennis courts, a movie theater, an airfield, and the world's largest private zoo. Zebras and other exotic animals still roam the grounds. There's a gravity-based water delivery system from a nearby mountain.

The total square footage of the castles on the estate exceeds 90,000 square feet. The area of Casa

Grande, the "castle," is 60,645 square feet.

One highlight of the estate is the outdoor Neptune Pool, located near the edge of the hilltop, which offers an expansive vista of the mountains, ocean and the main house.

The Neptune Pool patio features an ancient Roman temple front transported wholesale from Europe and reconstructed at the site.

Time sure flies by when you are having fun; this trip was awesome! I recommend everyone take a weekend trip up north and enjoy all there is to see.

For a Rainy Day

Kay's Red Pepper Tomato Basil Soup and Grilled Cheese Sandwich

cial comfort food recipe.

One of the most memorable days for me growing up as a very

young boy was a rainy Saturday morning. My mom was in the kitchen making breakfast for me, and while I waited for Mom to make pancakes, eggs and bacon, I remember enjoying the sounds of rain while watching morning 'toons on the television. That was comfort. And today I bring out a little bit of my feelings of comfort with this spe-

DIRECTIONS:



As always, gather your ingredients.



Mince the garlic and dice the red onion. Slice the sharp cheddar and havarti cheeses as you



Place a saucepan on medium heat, and add extra virgin olive oil. Then add minced garlic and diced red onion to hot pan. Add sea salt and pepper. Stir for about five minutes. Then add the tomato and roasted red pepper soup to pan. Add the dried basil, dill and parsley. Stir occasionally.



Take a cast iron skillet and coat it with nonstick spray. Spread butter on one side of the bread slices and place on the hot iron skillet. Medium will be sufficient. Let grill until golden brown as shown.



Red Pepper Tomato Basil Soup & Grilled Cheese Sandwich

Comfort foods should be quick to make but leave you wanting more. And this one does just that and more. Try it on a rainy day – as I write this, we're in the middle of a deluge! - and you will know what I mean. If you

don't like sharp cheddar or can't find havarti, you are free to use any favorite cheese that is easy to melt. You don't have to use both cheeses, either; one or the other will work, too. You don't even have to use tomato

and roasted red pepper soup, it can just be regular tomato soup; of course,

nothing store bought can compare to homemade. I prefer soup from the carton, instead of the can, and I prefer tomato soup that is low in sodium

INGREDIENTS:

with roasted red peppers.

- 2 slices bread
- 2 tablespoons dry parsley
- 1 tablespoon dry basil • Dash of dill
- 1 clove garlic
- 1/4 cup red onion
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil • Sea salt and pepper to taste

SERVES 1 TO 2

- 2 slices sharp cheddar cheese
- 2 slices havarti cheese
- 2 to 4 ounces butter • 1 cup of tomato
- and roasted red pepper soup



Cooking Dry herbs like dry basil and parsley should be used plentifully and make sure to rub and break them up to release the flavors. When using fresh herbs, use less of it because the flavors are strong.



Then place sharp cheddar and havarti cheeses on bread and place the other bread on top with buttered sides touching the cheese. That means that the unbuttered sides are on the outside. Turn cheese sandwich over after about three minutes.

[A Cook's Dictionary]

Havarti cheese:

Named after the Danish experimental farm where it was developed, Havarti is often referred to as the Danish Tilsit because of its similarity to that cheese. It's semisoft and pale yellow with small irregular holes. The flavor of young havarti is mild yet tangy. As the cheese ages, its flavor intensifies and sharpens. Havarti comes in loaves or blocks and is often wrapped in foil.






