





Police, Fire Dept. take part in annual event to raise funds to fight childhood cancer.

LAFD, LAPD — On March 3, brave participants from the LAFD and LAPD gathered at Fire Station 89 in North Hollywood and Fire Station 112 in San Pedro for their eighth annual combined St. Baldrick's event. Participants, or "shavees" as they are known, collect pledges from friends and family in exchange for shaving their heads. The bald heads signify solidarity with child victims of cancer, who often lose their hair while undergoing treatment. All money raised goes to the St. Baldrick's Foundation and is distributed to doctors and other researchers on the front lines of the war on childhood cancer.

This year, more than 300 participants were shorn of an estimated 50 pounds of freshly cut hair.

Fire Station 89 in North Hollywood raised more than \$15,000 for childhood cancer research.





Legislative Report by Michael Karsh:

"California State Pension Reform: The California state budget crisis will probably lead to some kind of public pension reform. This is being demanded by Assembly Republicans as the price of their supporting a June ballot measure asking the electorate to continue the 2009 tax increases that are set to expire June 30. What will the governor propose? Will it impact our City of Los Angeles retirees? The governor has at this writing not released what he will propose, but in his campaign last year he called for (according to a recent article in the Sacramento Bee) calculating pension pay based on the final three years of a civil servant's salary; lowering pension formulas for new hires; stopping increased

pension benefits retroactively; increasing retirement contributions by all government employees; requiring vesting mandates for OPEB obligations; and prohibiting pension holidays by requiring contributions even in good investment years.

"None of what the Governor talked about last year would impact the City's pension systems. But what the state does could set the model for local systems like Los Angeles.


"Also of recent note is the bipartisan Little Hoover Commission's report on Public Pensions for Retirement Security. This commission makes recommendations only, but what it recommends becomes part of the mix of serious studies on ways to

reform the pension systems. Their recommendation includes a hybrid model of a lower defined benefit pension (which is what most government programs provide but at a high level) with an employer-matched, defined-contribution plan [like the 401(k) plans in the private sector]. Also recommended is a pension cap of between \$80,000 and \$90,000 to be used in calculating a pension allowance, or the same cap in actual pension amount. A higher amount could be bought through a 402(k) type of defined-contribution plan. Pension eligibility ages should be increased. Final compensation should be based on a five-year average, not three years, nor one year."

Paradise, but Skip the Buffet

■ Part 3: Hal and Co. continue their cruise to, and in, Hawaii.

Evelyn and I are aboard the Golden Princess sailing to Hawaii on a 14-day cruise from San Pedro. Don and Myrna, our cousins, are with us. We have been sailing west toward Hawaii for the last four days, and we pick up the story as we dock in Hilo, on the Big Island, at 8 a.m. There is a three-hour time difference from Los Angeles, where it is 11 a.m.

With a population of approximately 48,000, Hilo is the second-largest city in the state of Hawaii and the largest settlement on the island of Hawaii.

Hilo features a tropical rainforest climate, with substantial rainfall throughout the year. Hilo's location on the eastern side of the island of Hawaii (windward relative to the trade winds) makes it the wettest city in the United States and one of the wettest cities in the world. An average of around 126 inches of rain fell at Hilo International Airport annually between 1971 and 2000, with 275 days of the year receiving some rain. The temperatures average around the mid-70s during the year.

We had breakfast in the ship's dining room, and the service and food were excellent.

We left the ship around 9:30 a.m., and after we left the security area, we wondered how to get into Hilo, which is about 2 miles from the harbor. The were free shuttles to Hilo Hattie's and Wal-Mart, which are not downtown, and a free shuttle to the Farmer's Market, which is near downtown. There was no one from Princess to provide information; they seemed only to want us to take a tour. There was informational staff from Hilo, though, and they were very helpful. We ended up taking a taxi for \$14, including tip.

We walked through the historic downtown area, which has some interesting midcentury and earlier buildings. Some were almost art deco. We could see the economy has had an effect on the retail businesses we passed, although I'm sure that Hilo Hattie's and Wal-Mart are doing fine.

We stopped in Starbucks, where I used their free wireless to check my e-mail. We could now use our cell phones, so we all called home. We decided to walk back to the ship for the excise and stopped to pick up a few bottles of water. It took us about 50 minutes to walk back. The weather was overcast with a little drizzle.

Why the ship stops at Hilo is a lost on me; except for the volcano, there is nothing to see or do. I would think that the Kona side of the island would be much better for tourists, but I guess the ship would have to tender guests ashore.

We had lunch and then played party bridge for a couple of hours.

We had cocktails on the balcony; the weather got nicer the further we got from land. Each island creates its own weather. We ate in the dining room and then sat in the piano bar until it was time for the 10:15 p.m. show with Steve Moris, a singer and comedian. Over his career, he had backed up the Beach Boys and other top acts. This was his last performance with Princess, and he was to be open soon in Las Vegas at the Palace Station. He put on a good show, with lots of audience participation. I managed to


Honolulu is in a tropical wet and dry climate zone, with a dry summer season. Annual average precipitation is 18.3 inches, which mainly occurs during October through March, with very little rainfall during the summer. Honolulu has an average of 270 sunny days and 98 wet days a year.

Temperatures vary little throughout the months, with average high temperatures of 80 to 89 degrees, and lows of 65 to 75 degrees.

We had breakfast in the dining room

again. The service and food were much better than the buffet.


The ship's information about the ports is unusable. Except for selling you a tour, Princess provides zero info on each port. We all know Honolulu very well; Evelyn and I have been there more than 10 times, so we know our way around. I knew that to get to Waikiki you could take a taxi or the bus, or walk the 2.5 miles from the ship. What we didn't know was that there was a free shuttle to Wal-Mart, from which you can walk the one block to the Ala Moana Shopping Center, where you could either walk the halfmile to Waikiki or take one of the trolleys for \$2, which stops at many locations in Waikiki. That's what we did. The ship was not to sail until 11 p.m. that night, so there was a lot of time for sightseeing.

The trolley dropped us off near Fort DeRussy, and we walked to the International Market Place so we could get something for our two youngest granddaughters. Evelyn was successful and got earrings for each of the girls. We stopped at Starbucks for an ice coffee and to use the free internet. As bad as the weather was in Hilo, it was great here, with sunny skies and a temperature in the low 80s. That made it pleasant for walking. We left Starbucks and walked toward the zoo to go to the Outrigger Canoe Club, where we had lunch. It was great sitting by the water having a beer and just watching the waves. That's what I like about Hawaii.

We caught the trolley back to Ala Moana and walked back to Wal-Mart, where we brought macadamia nuts to bring back as gifts. Wal-Mart had the best price, even better then the ABC Store. The free shuttle from Wal-Mart took us back to the ship.

There is a lot to see and do in Waikiki, with the aquarium, zoo, beach, Bishop Museum, a lot of shopping and great restaurants. Or you can just sit back and relax.

After my nap, we had cocktails in the Skywalker Bar, where they had the worst sushi I have ever eaten. Because we all had eaten a late lunch, we decided to eat in the

buffet. Evelyn said it was the worst dinner she had had on the ship, and I'm afraid she was right. We should have eaten in the International Café; it looked a lot better. We did go there for dessert and coffee and sat there and enjoyed the music.

We docked in Nawiliwili Harbor on Kauai at 8 a.m.

Kauai is geologically the oldest of the main Hawaiian Islands. With an area of 562.3 square miles, it is the fourth largest of the main islands in the Hawaiian archipelago. Known also as the Garden Isle, it is 105 miles northwest of Oahu. The population of Kauai is about 60,000.

Evelyn and I decided to rent a car and drive to Poipu, which has great beaches and snorkeling. I called Hertz and was able to get a car, and Hertz had a shuttle from the dock to their location at the airport. None of this information was provided by Princess. We got the car before 10 a.m. and drove the 14 miles to Poipu (30 minutes). We had not been here since before Hurricane Iniki almost 20 years ago. We did not recognize much of the landscape.

We parked by the Poipu public beach and rented snorkel gear from a surf shop. We stayed about two hours, and I had my snorkel fix. The weather was beautiful, with the temperature in the low 80s with sun and a little breeze. For lunch, we had gelato, and then drove to the blowhole. There we saw the famous Kauai chickens. Kauai is home to thousands of wild chickens, which have few natural predators. The chickens originated from the original settlers, who brought them as a food source. 1992s Hurricane Iniki may have caused an indirect change in Kauai's ecosystem, increasing the chicken population.

After we dropped the car off, we got back to the ship by 3 p.m.

We planned to eat early and see the early show, which was the Unexpected Boys, who we saw on last year's Holland America cruise. The band covers Frankie Valli and the Four Seasons songs. We really enjoyed them the last time.

We had drinks and appetizers in the Skywalker Bar. It was the best of the cruise – shrimp, a number of cheeses and meats. Later, we ate in the dining room and had our first bad meal, a rib-eye steak, which had no taste. The service was not great, either, because we were eating early. We skipped dessert and went to the showroom to see the Unexpected Boys. We barely found a seat. The show was as good as we remembered.

We had dessert and coffee in the Piazza. The service and quality of the food were not yet memorable. Next month, you will read about a culinary experience we both really enjoyed.



Getting the Gold

U.S. Green Building Council awards the Convention Center highly coveted LEED-EB gold level certification

The Los Angeles Convention Center has achieved the prestigious gold level certification in Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design for Existing Buildings (LEED-EB) awarded by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC).

LEED is an internationally recognized green building certification system, providing third-party verification that a building or community was designed and built using strategies aimed at improving performance across all the metrics that matter most. "When comparing new construction projects to existing buildings (EB), EB facilities don't have the luxury of incorporating preplanned green measures. This makes it all the more challenging and costly to achieve LEED-EB status at any level for any facility," commented Rey Castro, Chief Building Engineer of LACC.

The Convention Center's LEED-EB re-certification application process began last year.

"While our primary goal, albeit challenging, was to achieve the LEED-EB Silver level, surpassing that goal by achieving LEED-EB Re-Certification at the Gold level defines the culture of excellence at LACC. We LEED by example," stated Pouria Abbassi, P.E., CEO and General Manager of LACC.

LACC was the only and largest existing building in the City of Los Angeles building/facility portfolio to become LEED-EB certified back in September 2008. Today, LACC attains the LEED-EB Gold level for 4.1 million square feet of built space on a 54-acre property that was opened back in 1971 with the newest portion completed 17 years ago in 1993. LACC now becomes the largest convention center in the nation to achieve this milestone.

"We look forward to working with our green partners to explore and incorporate even more energy efficient systems, state-of-the-art technologies, and environmental processes in the construct of our business, in supporting our community and in reflecting the best of Los Angeles," Abbassi added.







Laguna Coast Wilderness Park

his month, we will be hiking in the Laguna Coast Wilderness Park. This is a well-known park in the area with lots of history, and was actually all under water millions of years ago. That is pretty cool trivia. There are many things to see on the trail, with lots of beautiful hills and gorgeous views.

We started a little late, about 10:30 a.m. Although the trail and temperature were fine, I think you always get the best shots before 11 a.m. However, we always make lemons into lemonade.

History

The history here is very interesting. Lying to the north of Aliso Canyon, the Laguna Canyon area lay within the tribal boundary of the Tongva, a Native American group whose territory expanded from northcentral Orange County well past the San Gabriel River and into the Los Angeles Basin. Aliso Creek, whose watershed borders Laguna Canyon to the east, formed the tribal boundary between the Tongva and Acjachemen.

Laguna Canyon Creek was a seasonal stream, but the Laguna Lakes, formed by springs arising from a minor fault zone, stayed year round. A Native American path ran through the canyon to the presentday Laguna Beach area, where they collected abalone and limpets, and fished. The Tongva lived in villages of 50 to 100 members, in huts made of brushes and tules on a wooden framework. When the Spanish conquistadors arrived in the mid-18th century, they named the canyon "Cañada de las Lagunas," referring to the Laguna Lakes. A land grant, called La Bolsa de San Joaquín, occupied the canyon area up to the 19th century. By 1905, springs in the Laguna Canyon area

began to supply water to Laguna Beach.

Before Laguna Canyon became a wilderness park, a housing development was proposed to be built in and around the canyon, tentatively called "Laguna Laurel." The 2,150acre community, which was proposed to contain 3,200 housing units as well as a num-

ber of businesses, was canceled in the 1990s after the City of Laguna Beach purchased four of its parcels to provide space for a wilderness park, while the City of Irvine purchased one, and Laguna Coast Wilderness Park was opened and dedicated in 1993. Occasionally, the park system (which adjoins Aliso/Wood Canyons Regional Park) is augmented by donations of vacant

land. The proposal to stop the development was supported by a crowd of 8,000 in 1989, which gathered in Laguna Canyon in a protest known as the "Walk-In." Several years later, 2,000 to 3,000 gathered to protest the construction of California State Route 73 (which would cross the canyon), but the highway was built

eventually.

In 1993, a massive wildfire burned more than 16,000 acres in Laguna Canyon and Laguna Beach, and ranked behind the 1948 Santa Ana Canyon fire as one of the worst fires in Orange County history. The fire was in part caused by strong Santa Ana winds, which caused flames that rose up to 200 feet high.


The Hike


After reading a few reviews, I now understand why some people


said to start walking the trail counter-clockwise. We did the opposite and found ourselves climbing uphill for most of the beginning leg of the hike.

will pass a table and bulletin board with all the posted warning signs. There is also a check in sheet for safety. You are also given an area map, which is very helpful. At the beginning of the trail, you will see lots of big boulders with hollow spots. Going up the trail, you will also see markers along the hike. Try this! Use the telephone number on the markers and call; there is a recorded message about the area. It's pretty cool.

While we were enjoying the exercise, we saw all types of animals – bunnies, lizards, hummingbirds and also high-flying hawks.

Angel (my son) was not feeling his best, so Aden picked up the slack and started working his pointing skills. Be careful and look at every marker. We actually went off the trail and started our way on Emerald Canyon. We realized and turned around and made another mistake and found ourselves going down the same way we came up the trail. So, I did not go down Laurel Canyon Trail; I'll save that for next time.

Special note: Warnings about bobcats, rattlesnakes and mountain lions are posted all around the trail area. We were having a great time until someone told my wife that they had just seen a bobcat in the direction we were heading, and then she went into high alert mode (as any protective mother would). I love her for being so protective. However, my boys loved the trail and were having lots of fun along the way.

The trails are very well kept and wide enough for a



LAX Airfield Bus Operations plays a critical role in passenger transport, official welcomes, emergencies, training and Homeland Security.

When you've just landed on an international flight, but your gate doesn't have access to U.S. Customs... or you're taking off from one of LAX's remote terminals at the western edge of the airport... or there's an emergency: You're one of the nearly 10 million passengers at LAX over four years or so who can thank LAX Airfield Bus Operations for getting you to and from your flight.

LAX's Airfield Bus Operations Unit is a 24-hour operation, served by 33 Airfield Bus Operators, who are specially trained, licensed and certified to operate a variety of buses and specialized vehicles on airport service roads and taxiways in a customer service-oriented environment. Obtaining the position of Bus Operator is a highly competitive process, as this is no ordinary bus driver job. One past selection period included written testing of more than 2,500 applicants in which only 38 passed, with eight positions being filled.

On most occasions, the first people who travelers encounter when entering the United States after exiting a plane is an Airfield Bus Operator. Airfield Bus Operators

transport international travelers to and from aircraft, in a "sterile" (secure) environment between remote terminals and U.S. Customs for first entry into or final departure inspections from the United States, driving in restricted airport driving areas, in and around taxiing and parked aircraft and emergency rescue vehicles, while monitoring separate radio frequencies for dispatchers and the FAA Control Towers.

From 2004 to 2008, Airfield Bus Operators transported more than nine million passengers between aircraft and terminals, using the various vehicles in its complete fleet, numbering around 40.

In addition to operating the Airfield Buses, Bus Operators operate a fleet of specialized vehicles, including tour buses used to carry City officials and dignitaries, both domestic and foreign, to various points of interest both inside and outside the airport, often explaining history or significance of sites viewed. Tour buses are also used by Airport Police and Fire personnel throughout the year in their training operations.

Another of the specialized vehicles used by Airfield Bus Operators is the ADA Truck. The ADA Trucks consist of a complex set of hydraulic lift systems used to raise

the body of the truck up to the doors of planes to retrieve passengers needing assistance.

Airfield Bus Operators are LAWA's most qualified experts in the operation of the ADA trucks and help passengers, as well as first responders on numerous occasions throughout each year, including removing passengers from planes in wheelchairs, on stretchers and assisting in Medevacs, in which patients are transported to and by helicopter. Some of the more memorable occasions in which Airfield Bus Operators used their expertise in operating the ADA trucks were transporting actor Christopher Reeve from the aircraft in his custom motorized wheelchair; serving the Saudi royal

families and the round-the-clock support they gave during and after the events surrounding 9/11 and the Northridge earthquake of 1994.

ADA trucks are also used during emergency situations, assisting police and fire departments during bomb threats, emergency aircraft landings and criminal transport to and from planes. Assistance is also given for criminal transport as well deportees. Operating the ADA trucks, Airfield Bus Operators are also instrumental in assisting the coroner with removal of deceased passengers.

Airfield Bus Operations in Action

Approximately 90 percent of the actions by LAX Airfield Bus Operations is the basic, but demanding and constant, transportation of passengers from international flights to U.S. Customs facilities. Here, *Alive!* chronicles this function, plus other functions, too.




International Passengers to U.S. Customs

Remote Gates

At the western edge of LAX are remote gates for many international flights. Since these gates are not connected to any terminal, all passengers both embarking and disembarking must use an LAX Airfield Bus to get to and from the Tom Bradley International Terminal. A fully loaded Boeing 747 can fill five LAX Airfield Buses.

The LAX Airfield Bus Operations Unit was created to serve these terminals.

Private Terminals

The Alive! Interview

Marie O'Kelly-Green, Manager of LAX Airfield Bus Operations.



World Ambassadors

Among their many other functions, Airfield Bus Operators are sometimes the first Americans their passengers ever meet. That's among their major responsibilities.

On March 10, Club CEO John Hawkins and Alive! editor John Burnes talked to Marie O'Kelly-Green, Manager of the LAX Airfield Bus Operations. The interview took place in the Bus Operations Facility on the north side of Los Angeles International Airport. —Ed.

ALIVE!: Thanks for sitting down with us today, Marie. How many years have you worked for the City?

MARIE O'KELLY-GREEN: 21.

Where did you start?

MARIE: I started in Public Works, the Board Office, in a Graffiti Abatement Program.

And how long have you been in your current position, then?

MARIE: A little over a year.

And you came from?

MARIE: I came from another section here at the airport. I was in human resources here at LAWA [Los Angeles World Airports] for about five years.

What do you like about supervising the Airfield Bus Operations?

MARIE: I like it because you have more direct contact with the constituency. When you're in the HR personnel area, your customers are the employees. But now I get to meet the customer, the people, the citizens. That's very good.

MARIE: Very busy.

Is there a typical day?

MARIE: There isn't a typical day. We have expected flights, but there is nothing that is absolutely normal about what these folks do. They pick up passengers, generally for international flights. But they can respond to emergencies, they can provide airfield tours, they can provide tours off of the airfield for community groups.

Right.

MARIE: So there is no 9 to 5 about this. Which is very exciting.

And you're staffed 24/7 here?

MARIE: Yes, we are. We have a staff member that is always here that can drive, that can move an airfield bus... plus one supervisor at all times.

A Coveted Job

It sounds like this job is coveted. What makes it popular?

MARIE: I think a number of things make it popular. You have access to both the tenants – the airlines, and the passengers, as well as community groups.

I think it's popular because it is a 24/7 operation, so it allows folks to do things during traditional hours that they wouldn't be able to do in a 9 to 5 job. So we have employees that have gone to school, earning their degrees. We have employees that consider this a second job. So they're able to hold two jobs because it is a 24/7 operation.



You have access to so many unique and fun things, especially if you like aviation.

You meet people from all over the world. Whenever there is a big event in Los Angeles, the airport gets the residual. So if the Lakers are having a good year, [more vacationers] are going to come through here. For the Academy Awards, you'll see an uptick of the celebrities. They all have to come through here. And many times they're international arrivals, and they have to hop onboard one of our buses just like anybody else. So it's great. It's fun.

It's coveted because, for a driver, you have a very specific area in which you have to operate. You have a very finite group of passengers. So you're not a metro bus operator that may be picking up any number of folks on any city street. You're not working with children as a school bus operator, which has its own set of difficulties.

So it is a highly coveted position, which is good because it gives us great candidates to choose from when we fill a position. When folks get here, they don't leave.

Challenges

What are the unique challenges to doing what you do?

MARIE: My most difficult task right now in this economy is, how do you continue to support the infrastructure? This is an infrastructure piece of the airport. How do you support that when your revenues are down, when we are trying to build the new Tom Bradley International Terminal, which is a huge capital outlay for this department? How do you balance fewer staff members because of the [early retirement program]? All of the bus operator positions weren't filled, but the work still needs to be done, so our drivers are working harder. From a management stand-







ality and personnel issues, and still getting the job done effectively and efficiently. So that's my charge, that's my task.

Ambassadors

When people are flying to America, and this is their first visit here, that bus driver could very well be the first American they ever see.

MARIE: That's correct.

That's pretty powerful stuff. Do you think about that?

MARIE: Absolutely.

And do you train people to think about that as well?

MARIE: Absolutely. We remind our managers constantly that bus operators are oftentimes the first face or the last face that travelers will see. The first impression and the last impression can make or break an experience here at the airport.

When we discuss training, we talk about - how do you manage 85 people that don't speak the language, and you need to give them an instruction? How do you manage security here at the airport? Because this is, for many

travelers, a first time they're on American soil, and so they want to go and take pictures. So how do you maintain a secure, sterile environment on your bus? Our bus drivers have the responsibility of transporting international passengers that haven't cleared customs. So when they are on the bus, the driver and an agent are responsible to see that these folks do actually clear through customs. To do that, we want to make sure, since they're the first face or the last face, that our equipment is top-notch. Our buses run anywhere between \$600,000 and \$800,000 for each vehicle. It's a big capital outlay for the department, but they are high-end pieces of equipment. The equipment has to be right, the drivers are in uniform to present an image to the passenger that they are in good hands, and that this is a well-oiled machine. Last year we transported 1.6 million passengers in this operation. The airport handles 57 to 59 million folks each year. So no less than three percent came in contact with one of our airfield bus operators.

That's a lot.

MARIE: So yes, we have a huge impact on the face of the department. And I think the department recognizes that. They're very appreciative of that.

Emergencies and Other Challenges

So, taking those international passengers from terminals that don't have customs, to a customs facility, is about 90 percent of what you do?

MARIE: I would say 90 percent is a good number.

But then you have the other things that you train for and hope never happen, in supporting the first responders in a crisis.

MARIE: Yes.

What kind of a challenge is that to kind of stay on your toes for something that you hope might not happen?

MARIE: Well, even though our offices are here on the north side of the airport, this operation is actually controlled through the Airport Response Coordination Center.

The new one that just opened?

MARIE: Correct. So they're the eyes. Bus operations has supervisors there 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. So in the event of an emergency, or an abnormal event - meaning that there's a line at TSA, there's a plane that's disabled any number of things that they may be called out on, we have standard operating procedures. When an aircraft has mechanical difficulty, our drivers know exactly where they need to go to await that plane. And if the passengers have to disembark, then they know exactly what to do. Because our drivers aren't new, they know this airport probably better than I do.

Right.

MARIE: So they are well prepared. They think on their feet all the time. If you review the emergencies that we've had at the airport, two years ago there was a flight out of Hawaii that became disabled, and the buses were there and waiting to scoop up the passengers.

Generally, our challenge is staffing, because there are so many demands on us. There are so many flights that are coming in that need our services, especially during construction. They are building this huge terminal without closing the airport. This is the largest capital project ever in the City of Los Angeles. The service road, which is what they drive on, may be open today, and then construction closes it tomorrow.

There are a lot of construction vehicles that [are driven onto] the airport. And many times their drivers are not familiar with an airport. That is one of our bigger challenges right now. Even though it's not an emergency, that's a big challenge for us. And then anytime we have a media event [is also a challenge].

Skills on Display

MARIE: One other thing I wanted to mention is that it's the department's goal to have a bus rodeo sometime in September. We'll invite you out.

Oh, absolutely! We know the concept, but maybe not the specifics. Tell us about that. It's all about skills, and

MARIE: Which would probably be easier than parallel parking a 60-foot articulated bus.

Well, sure. Where will it be?

MARIE: Ours will be in the parking lot that is immediately southwest of here.

Will they compete amongst each other, or with other agencies?

MARIE: They'll be competing amongst each other here, and then if we are so approved, then we will be able to send our winner, because they do these nationally and interna-

For us, this'll be a first. Because generally, the municipal bus, the MTA's, those are the folks that are competing.

Will it be open to the public?

MARIE: It should be open to the public. We'll hold it in an area that's not sterile, so that folks can come.

Well, this was great. Thank you!

MARIE: I'm glad that you came out today!

PORT PLUG-INS:

In February, the Port of Los Angeles became the first port worldwide to provide Alternative Maritime Power (AMP) to three separate cruise lines. In



recent weeks, ships from Disney Cruise Line, Princess Cruises and Norwegian Cruise Line have all taken advantage of unique "AMP Mobile" technology developed specifically for the World Cruise Center.

"I'm particularly pleased that Port engineers were the first worldwide who came up with a way to handle the challenges of adapting to the unique needs of multiple cruise lines with different power requirements at one cruise terminal," said Executive Director Geraldine Knatz, Ph.D., Club Member. "This is another important tool we are using to grow in a diverse and environmentally responsible manner."

"The use of AMP at our World Cruise Center reduces emissions not just at the Port but improves the quality of air throughout the Los Angeles region," said Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa. "The ability to adapt this technology to multiple cruise lines eliminates significant ship exhaust when cruise ships are at berth, and the AMP Mobile is another innovation that demonstrates our commitment to developing cutting-edge technology that can benefit port communities everywhere."

The Port of Los Angeles has three AMP obiles, which were designed for the World Cruise Center by Port engineers and Cavotec, a global engineering firm. With 100 feet of lateral movement capability and a remote-controlled arm to adjust the cable crane arm to changing tides and the location of power connections on cruise ships, the AMP Mobile versatility allows for a variety of cruise ship configurations.

The World Cruise Center is also the only port where two cruise ships can be connected simultaneously. Cruise ships utilize either 6.6 kilovolts (kV) or 11 kV electrical power distribution systems to plug into shore side power; the Port of Los Angeles can now accommodate either. Currently the power demand of the cruise ships calling the Port of Los Angeles is anywhere between 8 to 13 megawatts of power. A sevenmegawatt load is equivalent to producing enough electricity for approximately 1.000 homes.


The Port's AMP system installed at the World Cruise Center is capable of delivering up to 40 megawatts of power, with 20 megawatts of power delivery capacity to each of the two different ships.

In 2004, the Port of Los Angeles was the first in the world to use AMP technology for in-service container ships. Three major container terminals currently have AMP capabilities and more are coming on line later this year.


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


Unknown Rated PG-13 My Score: 3 (out of 5)

Stage adaptation by Christopher Sergel, based on the novel by Harper Lee Glendale Centre Theater (production has closed) My Score: 4 (out of 5)


This is a super stage version of the Pulitzer

Was Fred Eaton the 'Real' Father of LA's Aqueduct?

■ Who was more responsible for the L.A. Aqueduct, Fred Eaton or William Mulholland?

While writing last month's issue on the past Mayors of Los Angeles, I kept finding more and more interesting information about Mayor Frederick S. Eaton. It became obvious that this man impacted Los Angeles in so many ways, that he deserved an article for himself. So here is Mr. Eaton's

Fred Eaton was born in Los Angeles in September 1855. He was the sixth American child born in the City. His father was Judge Benjamin S. Eaton, who migrated with his wife, Helena Hayes Eaton, in 1849 from New England. Young Eaton was born in an adobe building, on what is now the intersection of First and Spring Streets. Later, this building became the first City jail. Conflicting stories note that the Eatons, who were considered high society at that time, lived on what was then known as "up on the hill," on Fort Moore, that now houses the current Board of Education.

The future Mayor was educated in Los Angeles area public schools. Later, he attended Santa Clara College. From the

time Eaton was young, he had been interested in civil engineering, where he focused on the discipline toward gaining his higher education degree. During that time period, Fred Eaton also worked for the City as a surveyor and engineer. This time period for the City was a transitional era between Spanish and American traditions.

At the ripe old age of 14, in 1869, youthful Frederick entered a citywide competition to assist in reconstructing the Old Plaza, formerly

the town square, near Olvera Street. He won always the main topic of concern since incorthe \$100 prize for his drawings of original designs. These drawings were later generally adapted in the Old Plaza area when the City was reconstructed. Remnants of the past

designs can still be seen today.

Fred Eaton persisted through his entire life to be dedicated to the City, as well as contributing to the development of this future megalopolis. In 1885, he was appointed City Surveyor and Engineer, where he was partially responsible for mapping and establishing City property. This was a one-year term; eventually the term City Surveyor was abolished. During the years 1889-90 he was appointed City Engineer. During this active period, Eaton designed a sewer system, the precursor and core of today's contemporary system. He was also the chief engineer for the Los Angeles Railway Company. He built the first electric railway in the City, which was one of the first attempts for this new type of transportation in the

In time Fred Eaton became the superintendent of a privately owned Los Angeles Water

Company. This company often doubled as the first volunteer fire department back in the 1870s. Fred Eaton

was one of the robust firefighter enthusiasts. This company was an evolvement that grew out of dire needs of constant and consistent water for the citizens of Los Angeles. A largerthan-life relationship developed out of this company that would eventually change the far-reaching literal, political and economic landscape for the City of Los Angeles. The names of the two "Giants" were Fred Eaton and William Mulholland.

Water, or lack of it, in Los Angeles was

poration of the City in 1850. Such was the case when Frederick S. Eaton ran for mayor in 1898. His platform revolved around bringing water to Los Angeles from sources

beyond the currently used water of the Los Angeles river. In 1892, Eaton traveled north more than 200 miles to Inyo County, specifically the Owens Valley, where the limitless snow water would flow into the Owens River. With the eye of an engineer, the future Mayor brought to the citizenry the idea, the vision of transporting water from the Owens River to Los Angeles. He won the ticket because of these incredible concepts.

For years Eaton and Mulholland disagreed about the L.A. River's capability to provide water to the ever-growing

Los Angeles population. Mulholland, who had been a relative newcomer to the City, claimed that the river would provide water for another 50 years. Eaton, a native, explained what would happen with the event of a drought. After a decade of water deprivation, Mulholland finally understood Eaton's point of view.

Mayor Eaton was in office from 1898 to 1900. The new century in Los Angeles saw an increase of the population to 100,000. Water, once again, was the

focus of the mindset of the local populace. San Pedro, after much heated discussion and debate, became a modern Los Angeles harbor. The Los Angeles City Water Company had been privately owned since 1868. With the expiration of the lease in 1898, City officials fought to return the water to a publicly run system. The proprietors argued to preserve their position as owners of the Citv's water. But, after much negotiations and a heated and contested bond election, the water rights were, once again, returned to the City for \$2 million in 1902.

Upon retiring from formal civic duty

after 1900, Fred Eaton continued his dedication to bringing water from the north to Los Angeles. In 1902 he worked in association with William Mulholland, who was then the chief engineer for the Los Angeles City Water Works, a precursor to Public Works Bureau of Aqueduct, a precursor to the DWP. Sadly, Eaton and Mulholland had a number of disagreements that continued for years. But that is a story that deserves its own article.

At the same time, Fred Eaton moved from Los Angeles to Long Valley in Mono

County, where he had a ranch. In 1906 he incorporated 12,000 acres in what would eventually be called the Eaton Land and Cattle Company. In time, the City acquired the Eaton ranch properties to use as extension for water development. All the while, he continued to work with the most important federal, state, county and City individuals relating to water reclamation.

Frederick S. Eaton passed away in 1934 at the age of 78 at the home of one of his children. He supposedly

died bankrupt from many issues relating to the Owens Valley project. That, too, is worthy of another article.

Finally, it has been known for years that the Public Works regarded Fred Eaton as the "Father of the Los Angeles Aqueduct," while William Mulholland was given that reverential title by the DWP. Either way, we Los Angelenos owe a great debt of gratitude to these two giants. For as historians have noted over the years, "Los Angeles was the most improbable city without water," or, "Los Angeles is a city in spite of itself without water..."

Cabrillo Marine Aquarium (CMA) will sponsor a scientific observation and collecting expedition to Catalina Island June 11. The 93-foot fishing vessel, *First String*, will depart Los Angeles Harbor Sportsfishing Landing in Ports O' Call Village in San Pedro at 6 a.m., and return at approximately 6 p.m.

"Catalina Above And Below" is one of the Aquarium's most popular boat trips. Not only will you have a first-hand experience to see many of the methods used by our staff to capture our marine specimens, but also to learn about these wonderful and fascinating creatures.

During the crossing and throughout the trip, staff will be on the lookout for marine birds, dolphins, whales, sea lions, seals and a wide variety of other marine animals commonly found in the San Pedro Channel.

Prior to arrival to the island, everyone will assist in pulling up special traps in effort to capture the rarely seen hagfish for close-up inspection. After reaching the island, fish traps will be retrieved and the aquarium divers will hand collect an assortment of reef specimen which all will be displayed, interpreted and discussed.

Later all participants will go ashore at the Isthmus to explore that part of the island, seldom visited by tourists.

After the island visit there will be a controlled shark baiting to lure these majestic and misunderstood animals to the surface for close-up observation.

Throughout the trip, Cabrillo Marine Aquarium marine biologists, aquarists, naturalists and other staff will be on board giving talks and assisting with identification of all sea life collected or observed.

Space is limited. Cost for the trip is \$95 per person (\$85 Friends member). The *First String* has a fully equipped galley, where food and beverages may be purchased. Passengers are advised to bring warm clothing and non-skid shoes.

Beef Pot Roast and Gumbo



T's time to use the slow cooker! Take it out of the kitchen A cabinet and plug it into the wall outlet because the pot roast is ready to be cooked for 10 hours. That's correct -10 hours of cooking makes this recipe fun and delicious (not to mention the fabulous sautéed mushrooms as a side dish).

Since this recipe calls for 10 hours of slow cooking, you might want to start the cooking process about 8 a.m. so that it is ready by 6 p.m., which is dinnertime for most of us. If you feel uncomfortable using red wine with the beef broth, just use beef broth and let the pot roast cook in that - just remember to make sure the pot roast is covered at the start of the cooking process. Feel free to add other spices while the

pot roast cooks; the flavors will magically magnetize to the pot roast.

Tere's a great recipe for Louisiana gumbo, sent in by cook and Club Member Terry Gray. Thanks, Terry, for another winner!

Terry's Gumbo

INGREDIENTS:

- 6 spicy chicken sausages
- 6 Louisiana hot sausages
- 20 frozen crab claws
- 3 cans lump crabmeat
- 3 boneless skinless chicken breasts
- 20 tiger shrimp
- 20 white shrimp
- 1/2 large brown onion 1/2 whole garlic
- 2 habanero peppers
- 4 celery stalks
- 1/2 green bell pepper
- 1/2 red bell pepper
- Seasoned salt
- Onion and garlic powder
- Cayenne pepper
- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup vegetable oil

- Pour this mix into the large pot, stirring constantly. Add crab claws, sausages, chicken, raw shrimp (the shrimp will cook in gumbo) and lump crabmeat. Bring to a boil. Add cayenne pepper, garlic powder, onion powder and seasoned salt to taste. Turn down to very low heat
- Serve over rice, and top with a sprinkle of gumbo filé powder. Enjoy!


