So thanks, Rose, for the tip, and Club Members, keep your ideas coming in!



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
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

Goodbye, Jan

Jan Perry retires from a 28-year City career.

Economic and Workforce Development staff gathered for a Workforce Parisian-themed celebration Dec. 18 to bid au revoir to General Manager Jan Perry, who completed her tenure at the end of the year. Jan Perry, longtime Councilwoman, General Manager and Club Member, retired from the City after 28 years of City service. She began her new position as the Executive Director of the Infrastructure Funding Alliance, a statewide group dedicated to developing and advocating approaches and strategies that motivate government at all levels to implement environmentally and fiscally sustainable infrastructure

At the Dec. 18 retirement party, Mayor Eric Garcetti's Chief of Staff Ana Guerrero presented a certificate to Jan on behalf of the mayor and thanked her for her five years and six months of leadership of Economic and Workforce Development. Longtime colleagues including General Managers from other departments and EWDD Retirees also attended the party.

In her farewell speech, Jan thanked the EWDD staff for their hard work and issued one last request - for EWDD to stand together and move EWDD forward. "Work with integrity," she said. "You are doing the people's work. You are taking federal money, you are making people's lives better and you need to fight for that. When you come to work every day, you are not here to be liked. You are here to do the right thing, and that is to be honest and to protect the people's interests above all else. If you do that, you will never have to look over your shoulder, you'll never have to remember what you said, and you will always be on the right side of history.

"It's been the privilege of my life to serve the people of the City of Los Angeles," Perry said. "I look forward to this next phase in my journey where I will continue to serve the people of California by promoting infrastructure projects that will stimulate economic development and create good paying

Mayor Eric Garcetti appointed Ms. Perry to the General Manager post after she successfully served three terms on the Los Angeles City Council, serving the 9th District communities of Little Tokyo, Downtown and South Los Angeles. The impact she made during her 12 years in office brought visibility to the newly formed EWDD, because of her work on economic development projects that revitalized neglected neighborhoods.

Ms. Perry successfully led the transition as the former Community Development Dept. was dismantled to form EWDD, which also included the creation and integration of a new Economic Development Division (EDD) designed to stimulate LA's economy by leveraging the City's real estate assets into development projects that could create jobs and revitalize struggling communities.

During her five-year tenure as General Manager, Ms. Perry led an interconnected system of 14 YouthSource Centers, 16 WorkSource Centers and nine BusinessSource Centers. These resource and training centers are strategically located in LA's underserved neighborhoods and provide Angelenos at key stages of life – youth, job seekers and entrepreneurs - an opportunity for success. EWDD and these centers also provide the platform to implement and execute many of Mayor Eric Garcetti's Executive Orders and key initiatives by administering programs that invest in LA's most valuable resource – its people.

Ms. Perry provided strength and stability to EWDD, and as the voice of the department she often provided inspirational messages to graduates of job training programs, including youth, job seekers recently released from prison, homeless, older adults, and other vulnerable and underrepresented populations. She emphasized success stories featuring people of color, especially female entrepreneurs, to show real life examples to people from the City of LA's underrepresented neighborhoods that success is achievable and possible.

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



The Alive! Interview

'The Dream Is Coming True'

On Feb. 13, Alive! editor John Burnes interviewed Reneshia White, currently the Recreation Coordinator at Jackie Tatum Harvard Recreation Center, 18 years of City service, and Yessica Famoso, Facility Director at Trinity Recreation Center, 13 years. Reneshia began the Pretty in Pink as a girls club party. Once Yessica arrived to South Park, they joined forces to expand it and make it into a conference. Both women are Club Members.

The interview took place at Jackie Tatum Harvard Recreation Center.

Reneshia and Yessica, thanks for talking to us about Pretty in Pink today. Is the program centered here at the Jackie Tatum Harvard Rec Center?

Yessica Famoso: Well, now that the program has gotten bigger, this isn't so much the center.



Got it! But before we get into all of that, tell us about your City careers how you got to where you are now.

Reneshia White: The program is us, basically. Wherever we go,

the program goes! [laughs]

Reneshia: Sure. For me, I was a park kid, so I participated in all the programs growing up. My mom worked for Rec and Parks.

Who's your mom?

Reneshia: Bernice Young. She's no longer with the City anymore, but she worked as a Rec Assistant. She would bring us to work with her and turn us into participating in the programs after school - sports like baseball, softball and basketball. We were in childcare. And then from there, by the time I turned 13 or 14, it was like, "Okay, time for you to volunteer, and time for you to get a job." So at 14 I started working as a Rec Aide, and I've been in the department ever since as I continued my education to get my Bachelor's and Master's degrees.

Yessica, how did you get here?

Yessica: I wasn't a City park kid, but I was into different sports. I actually didn't know that this was a major or a career until I nearly graduated from UC Santa Barbara. I was actually a psych but I didn't want to get a Master's. I saw that coordinator position, so I applied.

Yessica: It started like a teen program. It was just for that park itself, just for those girls.

Reneshia: And we talked about maybe just one topic. I think it was peer pressure, and we had food, crafts and

Yessica: They did their nails. They did a lot of girlie stuff.

So let's step back for a second. What does it do? What's it all about?

Reneshia: It's a day full of girls and young women participating in different activities. We always start off with some type of entertainment. We've had dancers; we had cheer. We also have guest speakers, and these are women that are influential in the community. They come out; they talk to the girls. Maybe they're lawyers or judges or police chiefs. We want the girls to see that people who look like them can achieve these things. Then after that, we break them out into sections like self-esteem.

Yessica: Hygiene.

Reneshia: Right. What else have we done?

Yessica: We do active sessions. Self-defense.

Reneshia: Yes. We've done soccer, so we'll have the girls do some drills, but then they'll play human foosball, so we add some fun components in there.

Pretty in Pink empowerment conference for teen girls, started by two employees making a difference, is one of the department's fastest growing programs.

What began seven years ago with one Recreation Assistant and ten young girls has now blossomed into two major events and more than 600 participants. And growing.

That's Pretty in Pink: Girls Empowerment Conference, expanding to daylong events at two locations (for the first time) April 6 and 13. It's become one of the fastest growing programs at Rec and Parks.

Reneshia White, Recreation Coordinator, Club Member, who grew up hanging out at LA Parks facilities, started the program at South Park Rec Center in 2009 under the department's CLASS Parks program. The 10 girls from the club wanted to have a party. They decide to have party, which

numbers have expanded from 10 to 30 to 100 to 200 and now more than 600 (300 at two separate events). Not only have the numbers expanded, but they also receive support from the Department, the Neighborhood Council, Council

offices, the LAPD, and other outside agencies.

Pretty in Pink is a youth conference created with a goal of empowering young girls in the urban community. Pretty in Pink provides a safe space for them to be open and discuss daily life challenges among women who truly care for them. The girls get opportunities to socialize with young girls from other parks/communities. The conference is designed to encourage and empower the girls to achieve their goals and aspirations. They leave the conference knowing that they are not alone with issues that may be occurring in their

lives and that they have people that care about

One of Pretty in Pinks major event components is the "girl talk" sessions that cover hot topics including healthy relationships, peer pressure, education, hygiene, self-esteem, self-image, anti-bullying, and suicide prevention. In addition, they participate in a rotation of five sessions that include dance, sports, creative art, self-defense sessions, and yoga. The event is free for girls 8-17.

Many of the participants have grown up, gone off to college, or have moved away. Through social media, Yessica and Reneshia have managed to keep in contact with them.

The daylong conference has featured speakers and supporters throughout its seven years, including:

- Alexis Las from the Harvard park community. She went to USC for her doctorate. She spoke to the girls and donated craft items.
- Jasmine Johnson, another Harvard Park community member with a degree in child development, spoke to the girls.
- Sgt. Emada Tingirides, born and raised in Los Angeles, came and spoke to the girls about how she overcame her barriers in life and shared her success.
- **Joe Marrone** of the LAPD helped raise funds for the 2017 event shirts. He also has LAPD cadets come to each event to help volunteer.
- **Tyesha Amy** from Have a Heart Foundation has hosted two of our girl talk sessions. She makes the girls feel comfortable about open-
- **Lisa Flenoury** from the LAPD 77th Division has donated resources and has held two girl talk sessions
- Commissioner Pilar Diaz, Recreation and Parks Board of Commissioners, and Det. Il Supervisor Shondie Jackson LAPD, have also supported the day. ■

LACERS Board Approves Cost of Living Increase



LACERS Board Update By Michael R. Wilkinson

It is that time of year again. No, I don't Imean spring training and one more chance that the Dodgers will not break our hearts again. No, it is COLA time. The time when the LACERS Board considers granting a Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA)

based on changes to the federal Consumer Price Index (CPI) for all urban consumers in the Los Angeles-Long Beach-Anaheim area. This is an average increase for the year-to-year change from the 2017 to 2018 calendar year.

The increases, taking effect in the paychecks this July, will be 3 percent for Tier 1 and Tier 1 Enhanced Members, and 2 percent for Tier 3 members. This represents the maximum COLA amount for each tier based on a CPI of 3.8 percent. Tier 1 members will have 0.8 percent banked for future years, and Tier 3 members are not entitled to banking. Banking means than any CPI above the 3.0 percent maximum allowed is put in a bank that can be reclaimed when the CPI is less than 3 percent. So if there is a 2 percent CPI in a future year, then Tier 1 members would get the 2.0 percent plus 0.8 percent from the COLA bank for a total COLA of 2.8 percent. The COLA bank would then be reset to zero.

I often get questions when someone finds out that another pension plan or Social Security got a higher increase and asks why. The COLA is set by statute, and we follow that CPI that is set in the Administrative Code. Other plans follow other groups, some follow a national standard, and some plans use different regions or different time periods. So, as they say, your mileage may vary, but over time things tend to even out.

Correction: In last month's LACERS Financial Report, I wrote incorrectly that the LACERS health plan is 70.1 percent funded. The correct figure is 80.1 percent funded. ■

State Supreme Court Upholds California Rule



LEGISLATIVE REPORT: **Pension Law** and Policy, **By Michael** Karsch

The California Supreme Court Michael Karsch finally decided on the first of the public pension cases attacking various aspects of how pensions for government workers in this state are determined, as the hiring government agencies react to mounting costs of such pensions and exploding unfunded pension liabilities. The Los Angeles Times described this as a matter about whether government pensions "can be cut." From the conservative side. Joel Fox of Fox & Hounds. a Website focusing on California business and politics, said the court "focused on the issue immediately before it, dealing with whether particular benefits such as buying years to inflate work time on which pension benefits are calculated are vested rights and prohibiting them is a violation of the state constitution. The court said no." The focus on the benefit of buying additional work time (air time) was deemed not to be a constitutionally protected pension benefit. The California Rule, which developed over several decades last century, generally protected pensions as of the day a person started working for a government agency (city, county, state, school district, etc.). And this rule came to be understood as protecting deferred compensation to a worker for his or her years of work for the government.

The California Rule is now viewed as generally unchanged, which is good for us retirees, but still subject to some changes that touch on some add-ons to a pension package that do not measure up to the idea

of a pension being payment to a worker for his or her work performed. As summed up by the LA Times: "safeguard the reasonable pension benefits without making the excesses untouchable as well." Those on the other side of the issue believe that not enough discretion is given to employing agencies that see rapidly escalating unfunded liabilities eating up ever-greater portions of their budgets. Mr. Fox commented that resorting to an initiative is the only way to really reform the pension issue.

Warren Buffett has warned businesses to avoid states with unfunded pension liabilities when deciding where to relocate. He added that moving to such states could mean corporate income tax boosts on the business, or personal income tax hikes on the managers and workers (Lane Report, Kentucky's Business News).

Bloomberg reported that three new governors face three old pension disasters: Connecticut (Gov. Ned Lamont). Illinois (Gov. J.B. Pritzker) and New Jersey (Gov. Philip Murphy). Each state has less than 50 percent of assets needed to meet future liabilities, and are the only states with GO Bond grades below AA from the three biggest credit rating companies.

Armstrong Economics had this headline: "The Pension Crisis Is Starting to Explode." Nevada Policy Research Institute says that Gov. Steve Sisolak is the latest to be enveloped by Nevada's pension fog. Ai-cio.com (Chief Investment Officer magazine) investment research announced in late February that U.S. public pension assets tumbled in the fourth quarter. In South Carolina the Post and Courier headlined an article on Feb. 24, 2019, titled "State Pensions Still Unsustainable.'

That's just a sampling of news around the country on pensions. California looks rather good right now. ■

Zoo bids farewell to longtime **Zoo Director John Lewis.**

Lewis also introduced innovative and popular programs — like Zoo Lights, a dazzling holiday display; and Brew at the Zoo, which brings local craft and microbreweries to the Zoo for a night of music, talks by animal keepers, and up-close animal encounters.

The Club worked with John Lewis on many projects, including

our December 2014 cover story on LA Zoo Lights. The Zoo asked us to help them celebrate its 50th anniversary, which we did in Alive! in November 2016.




