Geno Gandara, who's played in every Club Softball League since the start. His children





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
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

Back in 2011 and 2012, as Alive! chronicled, Project Restore, Public Works, General Services, Rec and Parks and other departments restored the City's Hollyhock House, a masterpiece by architect and designer Frank Lloyd Wright.

And now that hard, painstaking work has paid off in a big way.

The fully restored Hollyhock House, situated in Barnsdall Art Park in East Hollywood, has been awarded with one of the world's most prestigious honors - it's now a **UNESCO World** Heritage Site - the only one in the City. The house is considered a precursor to the style now

called California modernism and was one of eight Frank Lloyd Wright designs so designated in the U.S.

Nearly a decade ago, the City put together a team, lead at the time by Kevin Jew, Project Manager, Public Works/Project Restore, and Hsiao-Ling Ting, Architect, Public Works/Engineering, to execute the decade-long restoration. Alive! featured the restoration during the renovation's 2011-12 second phase.

The Aline Barnsdall Hollyhock House was designed by Frank Lloyd Wright as a residence for oil heiress Aline Barnsdall, built from 1919-21. The building is now the centerpiece of the City's Barnsdall Art Park.

This was Wright's second project in California, but he was not able to supervise much of the construction due to his commission to design the Imperial Hotel in Japan at the time. He delegated many of the responsibilities involved in designing the house to his assistant, Rudolph Schindler, and his son, Lloyd Wright.

Barnsdall donated the house to the City in 1927. Beginning in 1974, the City sponsored a series of restorations, but the structure was damaged in the 1994 Northridge earthquake. It was again restored, and is currently open to the public. The current restoration is phase two of the long-term restoration project; it's both repairing damage and undoing earlier restorations that were not done correctly.

The U.S. Department of the Interior designated Hollyhock House a National Historic Landmark in







## Ready Your Neighborhood

#### **September is National Preparedness** Month. Is your neighborhood ready?

he City's Emergency Management Dept. (EMD) has developed The City's Emergency Management Dept. (2007) a program called Ready Your LA Neighborhood (RYLAN) to help your family and neighbors prepare for disasters.

RYLAN gives LA residents the steps to take immediately after a disaster, keeping you and your family safe. It provides the tools necessary to organize the neighborhood's response plan within that first critical hour, reducing injuries, protecting property and saving lives.

EMD offers walkthroughs, orientations, workshops and drills. A walkthrough enables the Emergency Management Coordinator to assess the area and develop a comprehensive plan taking approximately one hour. Orientations are generally 15 to 20 minutes long and give the viewer a summarized version of what RYLAN offers. Workshops take a minimum of 90 minutes and go over the nine steps immediately after a disaster. They also identify a gathering site and care center, cover neighborhood skills and equipment inventory, roles and response teams, and complete a map/contact list.

Finally, EMD offers drills for those who have completed a workshop. Neighbors can practice what they learned by responding to lifelike scenarios. Those interested can register on our website (www.emergency.lacity.org), or call (213) 484-4800.

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

Canitation is no longer about getting rid of materials and Owastewater. It's now increasingly about reclaiming waste materials, and making them usable again.

Those are the main responsibilities of Traci Minamide, Chief Operating Officer of LA Sanitation and Environment (LASAN), 31 years of City service. She's one of the most important Sanitation executives in the country.

#### **About Reclamation in LA**

Sanitation operates four water reclamation plants that serve more than four million people within two service areas covering 600 square miles. These plants effectively remove pollutants from the sewage to produce recycled water, protecting our river and marine environments as well as public health. Together, they have a combined capacity of 580 million gallons of recycled water per day. The water can be used in place of potable water for industrial, landscape

and recreational purposes in addition to other beneficial uses.

Biosolids, a byproduct of wastewater treatment, can be used as a fertilizer and soil amendment for agricultural and landscape applications. Another byproduct of the plant operation is energy.

Biogas from Hyperion is converted into electricity and used to run the plant.

As is true in everything else, data and technology are fueling new innovations, and the Bureau of Sanitation is at the forefront of these new innovations. In this feature, read an interview with Traci Minamide (pronounced Minna-meedee) for more insight into what

Sanitation operates four water reclamation plants that serve more than four million people within two service areas covering 600 square miles. These plants effectively remove pollutants from the sewage to produce recycled water, protecting our river and marine environments as well as public health. Together, they have a combined capacity of 580 million gallons

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#### Donald C. Tillman Water Reclamation Plant



Donald C. Tillman Water Reclamation Plant began continuous operation in 1985. The plant combines advanced wastewater treatment technology with the beauty and tranquility of its landscaped Japanese Garden.

Donald C. Tillman Water Reclamation Plant combines advanced wastewater treatment technology with the beauty and tranquility of its landscaped garden. The Japanese Garden is irrigated with recycled water from the plant and is open to the public year round. The plant provides recycled water to many users in the San Fernando Valley, and Public Works is collaborating with other City departments to expand this program.

The Donald C. Tillman Water Reclamation Plant began continuous operation in 1985. Its facilities were designed to treat 40 million gallons of wastewater per day and serve the area between Chatsworth and Van Nuys in the San Fernando Valley. The plant was named after Mr. Tillman, who was the City Engineer from 1972 to 1980.

A major construction project that doubled the capacity of DCTWRP was completed in 1991, expanding the plant from 40 million gallons of water per day (MGD) to 80 MGD. The Donald C. Tillman Water Reclamation Plant and the Los Angeles-Glendale Water Reclamation Plant (LAG) are the leading producers of reclaimed water in the San Fernando Valley.

#### **Terminal Island Water Reclamation Plant**



Built in 1935, Terminal Island Water Reclamation Plant has undergone numerous upgrades over the years - including an upgrade to full tertiary treatment, which allows for advanced water purification using microfiltration and reverse osmosis.

The Terminal Island Water Reclamation Plant treats approximately 15 million gallons of wastewater every day on its 21-acre facility. Seventy-one employees work in all different capacities at the plant. running the everyday operations at TIWRP, conducting preventative maintenance and planning projects for the future. The three branches at TIWRP-operations, maintenance, and engineering-work together to ensure the success of the plant.

### Los Angeles-Glendale Water Reclamation Plant



Los Angeles-Glendale Water Reclamation Plant (LAG) is in the eastern San Fernando Valley. The plant has a capacity of 80 million gallons

Los Angeles-Glendale Water Reclamation Plant (LAG) is strategically located to serve east San Fernando Valley communities that are both within and outside of the Los Angeles City limits. The plant's highly treated wastewater meets and exceeds the water quality standards for recycle water for irrigation and industrial processes. This water reuse conserves over one billion gallons of potable water per year. The plant is highly automated, and staff can control processes from the onsite control room or at remote locations.

In 1976 the Los Angeles-Glendale Water Reclamation Plant started operations as the first water reclamation plant in the City. The cities of Los Angeles and Glendale co-own the plant, and LA Sanitation operates and maintains it. Each city pays 50 percent of the costs and receives an equal share of the recycled water. The plant processes approximately 20 million gallons of wastewater per day

## **Hyperion Water Reclamation Plant**

The Hyperion Water Reclamation Plant is the City's oldest and largest wastewater treatment facility, and it's one of the largest in the world. The plant has been operating since 1894. The plant has been expanded and improved numerous times over the last 100-plus years. It has a capacity of 450 million gallons per dxaay (mgd), up to 800 mgd during wet weather.

Leading edge technological innovations capitalize upon the opportunity to recover wastewater bio-resources that are used for energy generation and agricultural applications. In addition, air emission controls and odor management facilities are integrated in all improvements. More of these forward-thinking strategies will become realities at Hyperion in the coming years to better protect our coastal environment and serve our communities.



The *Alive!* Interview

## The Challenge of Reclamation

On May 9, Club COO Robert Larios and Alive! editor John Burnes interviewed Traci Minamide (pronounced Minnameedee), Chief Operating Officer, LA Sanitation and Environment, 31 years of City service, about her career and duties, the current state of LA Sanitation, and how the bureau is meeting today's needs while preparing for the future.

The interview took place above the bureau's Learning Resource Center at the Hyperion Treatment Plant in Playa del Rey.

Thanks for joining us today, Traci, and giving us a tour. We tried to do this several weeks ago, but the rescue of the young man trapped in the pipe got in the way!

Traci Minamide: Right! We got word that there was a young man, 13 years old, who had fallen into the sewer. We're still trying to figure out exactly how that happened. But he was in the sewer and we were notified, along with LAPD and LAFD. Immediately we released our teams to look at the collection system map, about all of our underground sewers, to try to pinpoint where it happened and where we might be able to find him. Through our CCTV, we were able to locate him. And via the cameras that we put into the sewer, we found exactly where he was. We started lifting the maintenance holes. We looked down and he was looking up at us saying, "Help!" We found him and got him out of there.

It took about 12 hours. It was just the happiest ending you could imagine, to find him safe and well, waiting right there in that location in the maintenance hole. We were able to pull him out, and one of our guys gave him his cellphone and said, "Call your parents. Let them know that you're safe." It was a miracle. It was a very tense, very scary situation for everybody.

#### With a happy ending.

Traci: With a very happy ending, yes.

The two Sanitation employees who did the rescue - Michael Adams and Kurt Boyer - are Club Members.

Traci: Great.

So very generally now, give us an overview of your responsibilities here with Sanitation.

Traci: Sure. As Chief Operating Officer, I help our General Manager in support of the work that we do here. In Sanitation, we cover three main areas: One is on wastewater Minamide, LASAN COO. collection and treatment; another is on storm water quality; and the third is on our solid resources - our trash collection and recycling programs. My responsibility falls mainly within wastewater treatment. We call that our clean water program, and that entails the four water reclamation plants that we have. Hyperion here is our largest, and one of the largest treatment plants in the country. We have a lot of activity going on, a lot of interesting and exciting and innovative projects as well as general running of the plant 24/7 and dealing with all of the operational issues that come up every day.

#### How did you come to this position? How did you get to this point?

Traci: I finished college with a Bachelor of science degree in civil engineering and then a Masters in environmental engineering degree. I started with LASAN as an Assistant Engineer, supporting the Terminal Island, Los Angeles, Glendale and the Tillman plants when I first came to Sanitation. Then I moved into our industrial waste pretreatment program. We regulate all the industry that discharges into our sewer system. I was part of that program for several years and then part of our regulatory affairs division.



I was the Division Manager both in our industrial waste pretreatment program and then in our regulatory affairs department. We're very highly regulated. That was our main function in that division - helping make sure we were in compliance with regulations and help deal with stakeholder participation and the development of regulations. After that, I moved into the executive office and have been focusing on water reclamation since then.

#### **Changing Approach**

How has the function of the Bureau of Sanitation changed since you started? What is it more concerned with now than before?

Traci: Well, 31 years ago, it was more about how we collect waste and how we do it safely, to protect the public, to treat

it to a sufficient degree that we can discharge it and get rid of it. Nowadays, it's about resource

recovery. The shift has been that this isn't waste, this is a resource. This is water. We need to treat it to a much higher standard, and now we're not going to get rid of it. We're going to reuse it on the biosolid side, the solids treatment of wastewater. We're not just going to send it seven miles out in a pipe and discharge it into Santa Monica Bay. We're going to reuse it. Now it's used as a fertilizer and a soil amendment. We have Green Acres Farm in Kern County. It's a 5,000-acre farm. We take the biosolids and we land-apply it, incorporate it into the soil like a fertilizer, and grow

crops that are used for dairy feed. We bring them back here, and some of those crops are used to feed L.A. Zoo animals and the horses at L.A. Police Dept. We really love that full circle.

#### We love the multi-departmental stories. You're working with two other departments

Traci: Right. And another component that's really exciting, a year ago we started our bio-energy facility. As part of the wastewater treatment process, we produce a gas – we call it digester gas. That gas has a heat value. So we run it through combustion



## Michael Karsch RLACEI Board Member

Michael retired from the City of Los Angeles in 2007 after completing a little more than 31 years of City service. He joined the City in 1976, in the Chief Legislative Analyst's (CLA) office, where he spent all of his City service.

Prior to working for the City, Michael worked for Security Pacific Bank in the legal department as its first Legislative Analyst. Since he did not finish law school, he searched for a job similar to what he did when he was employed at Security Pacific. The City of LA's CLA office looked like a good fit.

Upon retiring in 2007, Michael was invited to work with the consulting firm of Ken Spiker, Sr. Ken Spiker Sr. encouraged him to join RLACEI and to serve on the Board. He chose to contribute by writing a column in the ACEBSA newsletter El Pueblo and then later Alive! His subject

matter is retirement issues, mostly looking at the financial side of government pensions in the United States.

## **National Report Cites Strength** In Local Pension Funding

LEGISLATIVE REPORT: Pension Law and Policy, By Michael Karsch

New confidence in local and state pensions in this country came from the Brookings Institution in mid-July. Their experts got together with Brandeis International Business School's Rosenberg Institute of Public Finance, Washington University in St. Louis, and the University of Chicago's Harris Institute of Public Policy to discuss recent research on municipal capital markets and state and local fiscal issues.

While prefunding of pension liabilities is a real issue for local governments, there is also the other side of the coin, which is that the pensions are sustainable and consistent with history. This is where one can reflect on the fact that nearly all governments will continue to exist and not go bankrupt. There are

exceptions, like the city of Detroit and some counties in California. By and large, the pension benefits can be paid reliably by nearly all government agencies. Contributions by active employees may have to be increased, new hires with different pensions can gradually reduce liabilities, and local cities may have to increase their budgetary

support to keep the pension plans solvent. Almost all plans for local pensions "have always operated far short of full prefunding," according to the Bookings paper, and to try for full prefunding would not be an enhancement of the general welfare. This refers to the impact that any city's full funding of the pension program by spending a larger and larger percentage of their budget on just pensions would mean cutting more and more municipal programs and vital services. The report sees slow but substantial improvement in the predicted funding shortfalls.

Wilshire Consulting reports that the aggregate funded ratio for state pension plans increased by 1.4 percent, resulting in a funding ratio of 73 percent, which is considered not too bad (80 percent is the real goal). Asset values increased 2.6 percent versus a 0.7 percent increase in liability values. Wilshire attributes the asset values increase to more contributions by the state budgets, not to exciting investment returns. Wilshire also reports that CalPERS, the largest public pension fund in the United States, is assuming that its investments will generate a return of 6.1 percent annually over the next decade. But just a one percent point change in its assumed discount rate would reduce its funded level by eight or nine percentage points, increasing its funding gap by around \$30 billion. That is CalPERS, to which the City does not belong. ■

#### **LACERS Begins Process of** Rebuilding its **Retiree Website**

ACERS is in the Liprocess of a major upgrade to its Internet website to make it more user friendly. This follows a user survey looking at what works and what needs improvement. The goal is not only to improve the overall operation of the site,

but also to make it easy to use from smartphones, since the current site is not easy to use on the smaller screens.

The first step was the in-depth survey, to which 842 retirees and beneficiaries responded along with responses from active members, staff and Board Members. Not surprisingly, Retirees used the webpages to be confident about the performance of the LACERS fund. The top reasons to visit the webpage were tabulated as: news and updates, health benefits, contact persons for questions, and forms and handbooks.

LACERS asked for comments on shortcomings of the current website, and feedback indicated that members want the pages to be easy to use from smartphones and easy to navigate. The users commented that they wanted functionality over fancy graphics and an ability to find information quickly to go to where the answers could be found. One person asked to have more information in language without jargon, while another stressed the ability to go right to the information that applied to Retirees without having to plow through the pages that do not apply to Retirees.

LACERS used computer analytics to determine how long users stayed on the homepage, an indication of how effective the homepage is in helping members. A long time spent on the webpage could mean that the member could not easily navigate to the page that contained the needed information. The goal is to make the website so that the users can quickly find the link on the homepage to calculators, or forms, or whatever is needed without going in confusing circles.

The average member spent nearly 2.5 minutes on the home page and then went on to these top destinations on the website: Active Member, Retired Member, Retirement Seminars, Calculators, and Board Meetings. This survey is one of the first steps in the process, so stay tuned for a new and improved website to help you get to what you want to know quickly. ■
