


we refine our outreach to Retirees. We wish her all the best in her future endeavors.



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

Airport Police marks five years of giving teddy bears to traveling children at LAX on Christmas morning.

What began as a way to give away surplus gifts has become a Christmas Day tradition for the Airport Police family at LAX.

In 2015, the Los Angeles Airport Police in cooperation with Los Angeles School Police, Los Angeles Port Police, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, and the cities of Vernon, Bell, El Monte and Alhambra police Departments collected teddy bears donated by Officers and employees with assistance from Kenner Unlimited, Linzy, Imperial, Los Angeles Airport Police Athletic League and Cal Plush, handed out teddy bears to the children of the pediatric unit of LA/USC Medical Center. At the end, they had extra gifts, and decided

to walk the terminals of LAX and hand out the

Thus was born a Christmas tradition that grows every year, and has become a family experience so dear to the Airport Police that no one who participates ever thinks of taking the special day off.

The Officers and employees of Airport Police fund the purchase of the teddy bears, which now surpasses 1,000. LAX also provides funding.

The Airport Police Officers who began the tradition five years ago continue to organize it today. They are Sgt. Rob Pedregon, Public Information Officer; and Motor Officers Paul Mosqueda and Nick Van Dragt. Santa resembles Steve Van Noord, the uncle of Nick Van Dragt.

"Keeping the traveling public safe and secure is our first priority, and many of us can't be with our own children on Christmas morning, but to see the happiness that Santa brings to these children fills that empty space till we can make it home to our families," said Officer Pedregon.

The Alive! Interview

A Labor of Love

Tell us how this beautiful tradition of handing out teddy bears to children traveling on Christmas morning started.

Sgt. Rob Pedregon: Sure. The first year this started - 2015 - the Motor Unit was supporting a charity cause at Children's Hospital. We all chipped in and bought some teddy bears to give to children there. That was a few days before Christmas. At the end of the event, we had a surplus of teddy bears. I thought, what are we going to do with them? We were all working Christmas Day, and I asked my partner Nick here who's always a team player. I said, "Would you be willing to dress up as Santa Claus and hand out these teddy bears?"

Ofcr. Nick Van Dragt: I said I can do one better - I actually know someone that is Santa and I asked my uncle Steve Van Noord if he would be willing to do it and he said ...

Santa (resembling Steve Van Noord): Absolutely!

When they asked me to do it, I thought, "That sounds kind of interesting to do that." The first time we did it, it was a smaller operation than it is now. It's grown every year. It was so much fun. We did it on Christmas morning, and I was hooked right away. My wife came along with me. My daughter has come a couple of times; my niece Jody has come. I tell you, it's just been great. I love doing it. It's become a family tradition for us as well.

And the Christmas beard is coming in very nicely.

Santa (resembling Steve Van Noord): It is!

Sgt. Rob Pedregon: So the Motor officers all pulled together that first year. Paul was there with us at the original event, too, and he's our sleigh rider – he carries the bears along with us. He follows behind and replenishes our supply.

That first year, it was just overwhelming the number

of bears that we had collected from ourselves and from the School Police and some of the agencies that were also participating in that charity event. We ended up with a surplus that the venue couldn't handle, so they asked us to take them back with us. We had a truck full of bears and headed back to LAX and wondered, "What the heck are we going to do with all these

The Blue Zones of Wellness

National Geographic Explorer named Dan Buettner spent years Anational Geographic Explorer names 24... 2... Are searching places in the world where people live considerably longer, healthier lives than elsewhere. His research identified five regions and named them Blue Zones. He identified nine practices that the original five regions shared. These are:

- · Move naturally
- Purpose
- Down shift
- 80 percent rule
- Plant slant
- Wine @ 5
- Belong
- Loved ones first
- Right tribe

To many people, wellness is a New Age concept that approaches health holistically. Actually, the foundation of wellness as a preventative practice dates back to 500 BC, to the ancient Greek physician Hippocrates, who believed that diet, lifestyle and environmental factors play a starring role in the health of our bodies and minds. Modern science has proven him correct.

As used here, the term "wellness" includes the good health of mind, body and spirit – which, in practice, is preventative. To ignore the health of any one of these is to put the others at risk.

My earliest memory of wellness dates back to the early 1960s. As a small child, I dragged a burlap sack along the rows of my grandmother's vegetable garden as she pulled the weeds that insisted on growing among the food that she would eventually pick

and prepare for our family. "You are what you eat." These five words spoken decades ago by my grandma still echo in my daily life. My grandmother had a high school education but kept a set of medical encyclopedias alongside her Christian Science Monitor and Readers' Digest magazines. And although she ate with health in mind, she eventually developed Alzheimer's disease in her late 60s. As it turns out, it takes more than diet to maintain mental health.

As I read the Blue Zones' Power Nine, I identified with the simple, common sense behind each practice. It became clear that by making small lifestyle changes, large positive outcomes could be achieved without excessive energy, thought or cost. In 2010, the community I live in adopted a Blue Zones Project. My community is one of three Beach Cities designated as a Blue Zone and has achieved (among other things) the lowest childhood obesity rate in the United States. A huge boost to my personal health came as a result of quitting a 40-plus-year smoking habit and volunteering in my community.

While your community may not adopt an official Blue Zones Project, most of us would like to live a long time, and of course, enjoy good health. If this is you, visit www.bluezones.com to learn more. Better yet, take the four-week Blue Zones Life Challenge and create your personal Blue Zone.

LACERS Reviews Health Management Averages

LACERS Board Update By Michael R. Wilkinson

ACERS Benefits Administration Committee **L**(which I chair) recently reviewed a report on our Health Management Dashboards as part of our plan to improve the health of our members and keep our health costs low. The reports reviewed were presented by our health consultant, Keenan and Associates, and cover the period through Dec. 31, 2018.

Starting in 2015, staff and Keenan contacted Kaiser and Anthem to identify the health problems that were most serious for our members based on the premium costs for each diagnostic category. These two plans were selected since they can provide the greatest amount of data based on serving 90 percent of our members.

The top cost categories were: circulatory (cardiovascular disease), musculoskeletal (such as osteoarthritis), neoplasms (cancer), obesity and diabetes. The claims costs for our members are closely tracked to see how we may make changes to improve our members' lives through the LACERS Well program and working with the health providers.

There is not enough space here to go over the whole report, but I am happy to share a few glimpses of the process to show how the system works. For instance, Kaiser reports that LACERS Medicare patients are keeping up with other groups for preventive care except for cervical cancer screening, where it is lower than the benchmark. Here are the numbers to show the Kaiser member Medicare participation rate by category:

- Clinical visit, 94.0 percent;
- Flu shot, 75.1 percent;

- cent; Blood glucose checked, 91.5 per-
- Body Mass Index (BMI) checked, 83.9 percent;
- Exercise level checked, 89.8 percent;
- Cholesterol level checked, 89.8 percent;
- Cervical cancer screening, 72.2 percent;
- Breast cancer screening, 89.6 percent;
- Colorectal cancer screening, 90.2

Here is a quick look at some of the Anthem data. Note that some information cannot be directly compared between Anthem and Kaiser since Kaiser reports on the Medicare members separately and Anthem does not. Anthem reports a slight decrease in the prevalence percentage of lifestyle related chronic conditions, from 81.6 percent to 81.0 percent, and a reduction in high blood pressure from 34.4 percent to 32.0 percent from 2016 to 2018. Diabetes increased slightly from 18.4 percent to 19.3 percent over the same period.

I know that's a lot of numbers, but what does it mean to each of us? We all should be getting regular doctor checkups and following up on our recommended treatments, eating right and getting that fun daily exercise on the bike, in the gym, or just walking your dog around the neighborhood. It need not be complicated, and a lot of help can be found on the LACERS Well Webpage or Facebook page.

Is Cal Supreme Court Opening Doors to More Pension Reform?



LEGISLATIVE REPORT: Pension Law and Policy, By Michael Karsch

Remember that the California Supreme Court has ruled on one major public pension issue lately, that concerning the use by local governments to allow employees to buy "air time" for additional work time not worked, which usually meant that the contributions were seldom enough for the eventual additional paybacks in pension benefits. In his 2012 pension reform package, Gov. Jerry Brown had

urged eliminating airtime. The court ruled that this benefit could be repealed without affecting the California Rule, which protects public employees who enter their government jobs with an offer for benefits that will follow them throughout their retirement.

Due to rising costs of pensions, many government agencies are forced to increase their support of the pension system at all costs. In many communities, public services are being cut back to pay for pensions, since many investment portfolios are failing to grow as fast as needed. Pensioners are living longer, which extends the support of either investments and/or taxpayer support. In March, the Supreme Court ruled that the purchase of airtime was not a vested right protected by contract law, as explained by CalPensions report on Oct. 28. The Court noted that "we have no occasion in this decision to address, let alone to alter, the continued application of the California Rule." Some had hoped to see a review of the Rule.

Now comes some other appeals to the Supreme Court on the subject of the California Rule and government pensions. As CalPensions explains, there are two appeals that have "very different views of how pensions may be cut." Both are challenges by labor unions to parts of the Gov. Brown reform package, mostly about spikes in final pay before retiring. These appeals are a consolidation of Alameda, Contra Costa and Merced County cases. The Alameda ruling sticks to the general protection of the California Rule. The article noted: "Pension cuts are allowed, without an offsetting comparable new benefit, if there is 'compelling evidence establishing that the required changes bear a material relation to the theory...of a pension system and its successful operation."

A ruling in a Marin County case "overturns the California Rule by finding employees only have a vested right to a 'reasonable' pension." The Marin case protects the amounts in a pension already earned. But the Legislature may alter the formula, prior to the employee's retirement, thereby reducing the anticipated pension, so long as the employee is not deprived of a "reasonable" pension. This does not say much to me. What is "reasonable pension"? The Supreme Court also ruled that a San Jose pension reform in 2012 could not require workers to pay more for pensions or earn a smaller pension.

What all of this says is that the State Supreme Court will be considering several pension cases from varying situations in several parts of the state, and the door appears to be open to more than just the California Rule. Almost all of the prior decisions have upheld that Rule and protecting those who have retired on a government pension.




