


LAPD hosts local celebration of National Dispatchers Week during the coronavirus emergency.



What began as a response to public comments in the media that reduced the lives of seniors to an economic equation has now become Club history.

Club CEO John Hawkins heard those comments and was upset. In response he wanted to reach out to every single Retired Member to let them know that they matter. Club staff and the Retired Los Angeles City Employees, Inc. (RLACEI) quickly got on board, and the phone calling and personal outreach started in a project called Club "Care Calls."

The phone calls to reach all (approximately) 8,000 Retired members began in late March and were completed in mid-April. Club "Care Calls'" was the biggest one-on-one outreach in the Club's history.

"It's the biggest, most ambitious outreach in the Club's 92-year history to our beloved Retired Club Members," said Club CEO John Hawkins. "And yet it's also our most personal. Our Retirees matter to



Meeting Remotely, LACERS Board Frees Up More Cash

LACERS Board Update By Michael R. Wilkinson

B difficult time we all have ahead in dealing with the novel coronavirus outbreak. We may be affected ourselves or our friends and family may be fighting this disease. Many of us may have first responders as family members working to protect us all.

The LACERS Board of Administration recently held its first meeting under the governor's stay at home order via teleconferencing. It was a little strange to be hooked up via a computer using Zoom software and able to see the fellow board members and staff, but not be in the same room. However, the LACERS staff did a great job with the technology, and the meeting went smoothly.

There was an important action taken to help the LACERS investment staff respond to the volatility of the financial markets. The Board approved increasing the maximum amount of cash in our investment portfolio from 2 to 5 percent. Why is this important? In normal times LACERS is fully invested in diversified investments and keeps enough cash for paying the retirees (yes, this is important!), capital calls for investments and other expenses as well as a reasonable cushion for unexpected events.

However, the current turbulent markets encouraged Chief Investment Officer Rod June to request the change in the cash allocation so that there will be enough cash to handle eight months of our cash requirements. The staff will use only the amount of the authority that is needed.

The argument against having a very high cash allocation when it is not necessary is that it is a drag on the investment returns since a cash account is very stable, but has a very low rate of investment return compared to other investment classes such as stocks, bonds and private equity.

The change is viewed as a temporary measure and will be reviewed in six months to decide if it is still needed. This review will ensure that we continue to get the highest investment returns that are prudent.





Emergency Preparedness: LACERS Was Ready!

More than ten years ago, LACERS began planning for a disaster. Staff worked on plans for how to respond to a very localized event impacting just the building LACERS is in. Staff also developed plans for a regional disaster like an earthquake and even worked on a plan for how to handle a pandemic, during which some staff could not report to work and the ones who could report in needed to take appropriate hygiene and distancing measures. Much thought went into these emergency plans, especially from a technology perspective. Staff ensured critical information could be accessed remotely and made sure retirement checks could be processed. Staff also ensured that investment functions could be carried out and that LACERS contractors had emergency plans in place. But there is one thing you know when you are performing disaster planning - you will never guess and prepare for the exact emergency you actually will face. The idea behind all of the planning is to try to have adequate resources available and some idea how you might deploy those resources when disaster strikes. From all appearances, LACERS has done a great job implementing its disaster plan in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. To be sure, LACERS response has had to be incremental, as you cannot plan perfectly for a specific disaster scenario. But LACERS had many of the necessary resources in place and an idea of how to roll them out thanks to good planning and preparation.



Coronavirus Making Pensions Outside LACERS Unstable

LEGISLATIVE REPORT: Pension Law and Policy, By Michael Karsch

We are in perilous times, with

people out of work, businesses closing up for good, restricting social activity to one's house, hoping to avoid catching the virus, etc. But for us Retirees, we have our pension checks and our healthcare for which we are truly thankful. As I have told my children and grandchildren, government jobs give you protection, which makes for a good life. Most did not heed my advice, sadly, but we do have freedom of choice.

Some notes I have saved are interesting relative to pension plans' viability – how are the employers handling it?

- In Illinois the Exelon Corporation in Chicago plans to inject \$541 million this year into its defined benefit plan for all subsidiaries (per Pionline.com). Their corporate support for the same plans in 2019 was \$356 million. They were taking care of their employees.
- In New Mexico via the Associated Press, the State Senate approved a proposal aimed at shoring up that state's overextended pension fund for about 110,000 government workers and retirees. The measure is addressing an unfunded liability of \$6.6 billion.
- In California's private sector, the McClatchy newspapers (Miami Herald and Kansas City Star, among others) filed

for Chapter 11 bankruptcy due to problems in their pension funds and related worries in financial strength. The newspaper group has operated for more than 160 years. It is expected to transfer management of the \$1.4 billion pension plan to the U.S. Government's Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp. The chain had built up a solid pension fund over the years but recently the newspaper industry overall has suffered serious revenue losses to the online draw of the internet. Workers will still get their pensions, but it is likely that the pensions will be less than expected.

A mid-March article in *City Journal* had a subtitle stating: "As investors flock to bonds to avoid risk, pension plans face shrinking returns." Low bond rates are becoming "more normal." There is fear in the bond market, normally a recourse for investors leery of stock market declines, that the bond market also is offering less promise. This means an increased likelihood of a recession. The bond market picture is dimmed by the coronavirus sledgehammer to the economy, but bond yields were already trending down for other reasons, per *City Journal*. Bond yields are now negative. The report states that the current environment of low interest rates and negative bond yields is especially hard on retirement accounts. As reflected in a recent *Wall Street Journal* article in its Business and Finance section, "investors fear the worst is yet to come.".
