






THE SMART MOVE

The 3 Legs of Retirement Savings


Is the "three-legged stool" method still a viable way to approach retirement planning? What is the three-legged stool approach? Retirement planners often describe the underpinnings for providing income after retirement as a three-legged stool. Typically, the first leg is Social Security. The second leg is a pension plan provided by the employer, and the third leg is savings managed by the worker. These savings may take the form of an employer-sponsored, tax-deferred plan (401k for private sector or 457B for public sector employees), an individual retirement account, or simply private savings. The three-legged stool should be viewed as a "best-practice" ideal; unfortunately relatively few retirees receive income from all three sources.

Since most municipal employees do not participate in Social Security, one leg of the stool is missing. Does that mean their retirement is in jeopardy? Not likely, but to continue to plan for and prepare for a generous income at retirement, one needs to put that missing leg back on the stool. Fortunately, most municipal employees have two strong legs, the pension and the availability of a quality deferred comp plan (the 457 plan).

The missing leg can be reattached by adding additional personal savings. To make it more convenient and systematic, it should be available through payroll deduction. The Club's partner,

Dearborn National, offers a great option with the additional benefit of self-completing elements to personal savings. The Security Builder plan offers a three-part product that provides a death benefit to pay up the savings portion for a surviving spouse, a disability benefit that continues to fund the personal savings if the employee becomes disabled and a guaranteed cash accumulation option that can be set up as a ROTH IRA for tax-free growth. The plan is available through payroll deduction for convenience and systematic contributions.



Sunday Hours Return

9 library locations see Sunday hours restored.

Sunday operating hours were restored for the Central Library downtown and eight area branches Jan. 12. The event was marked by a ceremonial ribbon cutting on that day. The nine locations are once again open from 1 to 5 p.m. Sundays, four years after they were closed due to budget cuts.

The locations with restored Sunday hours are:



The restoration of Sunday library service is made possible by Measure L, a ballot initiative overwhelmingly approved by voters in 2011. Measure L gradually restores hours and services over four years at the city's 73 libraries by increasing their share of City funding without new taxes. The return of Sunday service comes one year ahead of the schedule promised to voters.


"Re-opening on Sundays has been a top priority because it's one of the most popular days for families to visit the library," said City Librarian John F. Szabo. "Having libraries open on Sundays makes it more convenient to visit the library and get homework help, join a computer classes, search for a job, use our health, citizenship and money management resources, and participate in our many other terrific programs."

Judge in San Jose Rules Pensions May Not Be Cut

A San Jose trial court judge ruled that pensions for city workers may not be cut since their pension is a vested right, but also ruled that the city could make other changes to employee compensation that would not directly affect pension rights.

This is an interesting ruling in that it provides a way that San Jose could indirectly cut its pension costs by simply cutting the salaries of city workers and thus reduce its overall cost of labor while also scaling back its pension obligation, since the pension formula is based in part on the workers' pay.

The court case is one of the many California cases that are

under the microscope as politicians look at ways to cut costs. Other than a single opinion by a federal bankruptcy judge in Detroit, the prevailing opinion is that the governmental pension benefits of active employees and retirees cannot be reduced.

In San Jose's Measure B, the city sought to require all city workers, including police and firefighters, to contribute up to 16 percent more toward their pension. The unions challenged the matter and Superior Court Patricia Lucas ruled that San Jose went too far when it attempted to reduce the retirement benefits of active employees.

Both sides claimed victory here: The unions noting that the judge ruled that the pensions of active workers cannot be cut, while San Jose Mayor Chuck Reed was pleased that workers'

pay can be cut. It is interesting to note that as the mayor is bemoaning what he views as the crushing burden that public employee pensions impose on local taxpayers, a recent *Wall Street Journal* story titled "the Five Richest Cities in America" found San Jose number one with a median household income of more than \$90,000 per year for the metropolitan area.

Since the matter is likely to be appealed by both sides, this is only one of the early innings of a long battle. Time will tell whether the reasoning of this ruling will end up invalidating the key provisions of a state-wide initiative of "pension reform" that Reed intends to take to the voters this November to reduce pensions of current active employees. As I have noted in previous column, stay tuned.

Windfall Elimination Provision

Legislative Report: Pension Law and Policy

Remember when this column, a couple of months ago, mentioned the Windfall Elimination Provision in Social Security law? The City Council of Los Angeles and the mayor agreed in December to endorse HR 1795 (Davis) and S 896 (Begich), which would repeal the WEP and the Government Pension Offset (GPO), hence that position is now part of the City's federal legislative program.

Public employees who are entitled to collect Social Security benefits as a spouse

are often penalized through the Government Pension Offset (GPO). The GPO can result in a retiree losing all spousal benefits that they should be entitled to, including access to lower Medicare rates and death benefits. Public employees who are entitled to collect Social Security benefits on their own behalf due to other employment are also penalized under the WEP in the current law. The two bills are pending in Congress but are not moving.

Illinois Pensions

The State of Illinois is still struggling through pension reform. The legislature and governor did narrowly agree on a reform package in December,

purportedly saving the state more than \$160 billion over the next 30 years. The *Chicago Tribune* wrote that "experts check to see if math, savings add up." So time will tell if it all really helps to straighten out that state's financial standing, particularly with the rating agencies, such as Fitch, Moody's and Standard & Poor's. The unions have vowed to fight the reform, saying that it violates the state constitution ban on reduction of pension benefits. Two lawsuits have already been filed, one by retired teachers and one by state employees, but more are expected. The issue likely will end in the state Supreme Court.

Annual Notice of Right to Elect or Revoke Federal Income Tax Withholding

This annual notice is provided to notify you of your right to change your Federal income tax withholding if you choose to make changes.

For year 2014, if the taxable portion of your total annual LACERS benefit payments is less than \$20,160, you are not required to elect Federal income tax withholding. You may have to consider the potential of a 0% – 3% Annual Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) in July 2014 if you are approaching this annual limit.

A. If you choose NOT to make changes:

- No action is required on your part.
- Your current withholding remains in effect.

B. If you DO choose to make changes or to revoke your current election:

- You must complete a new Form W-4P, and return it to LACERS. You may obtain Form W-4P on the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Internet website at www.irs.gov or by contacting LACERS at (800) 779-8328.

- LACERS will process your request by the first day of the month, that is, at least 30 days after we receive the form. Mail or Fax to:

- Remember, your Federal income tax liability is based on your total income, not just your LACERS

retirement benefits. You may incur penalties from the Internal Revenue Service if your withholding and estimated tax payments are not sufficient. If you need assistance in estimating your tax, you should consult with the IRS or your tax advisor.

This Year Could Bring Pressure on Pension Plans

This is going to be an interesting year with the continued attacks on pension systems, healthcare plans and the Affordable Care Act and how they will affect our plans. Currently there are 19 bills being worked on by our State legislators that could possibly affect our members. And who knows how many reformers are lurking out there to see how many more attacks they can make on our members pensions and healthcare benefits.

One of the most publicized attacks on pension reform has been San Jose Mayor Chuck Reed's Pension Reform Act of 2014. There have been several events that have reduced the possibility of this initia-

tive passing. The first event was when the State's Legislative Analyst's Office announced the initiative's language and found the language unfavorable for passage of the bill. Next, a Santa Clara County Judge's ruling rejected the key provision of the initiative, "to eliminate the vested right of employees." And finally a Washington, D.C., poll found that just 36 percent of the California voters would approve passage of the Pension Reform Act of 2014. This is good news. And proposals like this one are one of the reasons why we need all of our retirees as members of the association to help in the fight to preserve and protect our benefits. If you need an application, call our office.


Our office has been getting a number of calls asking what the COLA will be this year. As a reminder, the determination date of our

COLA is Feb. 28. The COLA will be announced by the Bureau of Labor Statistics on March 18 and, whatever it may be, it becomes effective July 1.

By the time you read this article you should have received your IRS 1099 form. This is the form that reports the income that you received from the Fire and Police Pension Department. The law requires that the 1099 form be mailed by Jan. 31. If you didn't receive a 1099 or lost it you can get a duplicate from the Pension Department. Call the Accounting Section, (213) 978-4420 or toll-free (800) 787-4289, ext. 84420#.

Across the Pond, Starting From London

PART ONE

Hal and Co. begin a cruise that starts in London and ends in New York, with plenty of stops.



My wife, Evelyn, and I have been to the United Kingdom many times, but we have always stayed around the London area. We found a cruise on the *Caribbean Princess* that left from London (Southampton) around the British Isles and then crossed the pond to New York City.

The ports were Southampton, Guernsey (Saint Peter Port), Cork (Ireland), Dublin (Ireland), Liverpool (England), Glasgow (Scotland), Belfast (Northern Ireland), Edinburgh (Scotland), Invergordon (Scotland), Le Havre (France), Southampton (England), Bergen (Norway), Shetland Island (United Kingdom), Faroe Island (Denmark), Akureyri (Iceland), Isafjordur (Iceland), Reykjavik (Iceland), Nanortalik (Greenland), St John (Newfoundland, Canada), and New York City. It was two cruises back to back; the first part took 12 days, and part two took 16 days. We departed Aug. 14 and returned Sept. 15.

Our flight from LAX left at 7:35 p.m., and we arrived at London's Heathrow Airport at 2:05 p.m. the next day, a 10-and-a-half-hour flight. We flew business class, and we both slept about five hours. By flying business class, we were able to use the "fast pass" through immigration, which sped up the process. After collecting our luggage, we took the airport bus to the Heathrow Sheraton Hotel, where we stayed overnight. The shuttle cost £9 (\$15) for two one-way tickets. We had to wait about 20 minutes for the bus and got no help getting the bags on board; we should have taken a taxi. Luckily it was a short ride, and the hotel staff was helpful upon arrival.

The hotel was nice, and they charged "only" £15 per day for the Internet connection in the room, so we used the free Internet connection in the lobby. There was a Starbucks in the hotel that carried a number of the city mugs that Evelyn collects. We bought one here as it took the pressure off us when we went sightseeing.

We had dinner in the hotel at the sports bar. Prices are in British pounds, but they

look like dollars. A cheeseburger was £9.50, which is about \$15. However, there is also a 20 percent VAT (tax) included in the price.

We slept until almost 8 a.m. It was not as restful as we would have liked, but I think we got back on schedule. We had our Starbucks coffee that next morning, and were now looking at our email and waiting for the car that would take us to Southampton.

We then had our first problem. We got in the wrong car going to Southampton and were 20 minutes down the road before we figured it out. It was our fault entirely; I didn't ask, the driver didn't ask, and the bellman who told us the car was there didn't ask, either. No harm done, though, as our driver was waiting for us and the people whose car it was were also waiting when we got back to the hotel.

We got to the ship about 1 p.m. With 3,000 people coming aboard, it was a madhouse. We had priority boarding, so it wasn't too bad for us. When we got to our cabin, all of our luggage was there. We decided to go to the library so that Evelyn could check out some books. While I was there (it is part of the Internet room), I signed us up for our computer minutes. We each received 500 free minutes, and I purchased 100 more for \$25 (each person). I hoped that would last us for 28 days.

Our friends from Las Vegas, Elaine and Lanny Marin, were on board for the first part of the cruise.

We waited for the lifeboat drill, which took place before we sailed. After the lifeboat, drill we found Lanny and Elaine and sat in the wine bar and caught up.

We purchased the "anytime" dining package and had dinner at 7 p.m. in the Coral dining room. We had to wait only about five minutes to get a table for four. The food and the service were pretty good. We sat and talked for so long that we missed the show.

Our first port was St. Peter Port, the capital of Guernsey, one of the Channel Islands. It was to be a short visit as the ship sailed again at 2 p.m. Technically they are not part of Great Britain but a possession of the royal family. This provides a convenient tax shelter. It is only 80 miles from the coast of Britain and serves as a holiday destination for both the English and French. While English is predominant, French is also spoken. During World War II, Guernsey, along with the nearby island of Jersey, were occupied by Germany. You can read *The Potato Peel Pie Society* if you're interested in a novel about Guernsey during the war.

During my pre-cruise research, I found a bus service that circled the island in 90 minutes and cost only £2. We took the ride and, while we did see some nice scenery and lots of World War II bunkers, we all thought it was a waste of time. The town itself has a nice walking district with many shops and restaurants. We walked around for about an hour and caught the tender back to the ship. We might have been better off taking a walking tour. There is a small World War II Occupation Museum that we missed.

Dress code that night was formal. I was interested to see how many passengers got

dressed up. The fact that we were visiting 10 ports in 12 days made it less likely that people would want to go through the process of getting all dressed up for a glass of champagne and a speech by the captain. With 3,000 passengers on board, there wasn't time even to shake his hand.

Evelyn and I attended the Cruise Critic meeting and met a nice couple from Dallas. They were very well traveled and were doing the full cruise to NYC.

Guess what was back – the plate of canapés. This has been going on for the last four Princess cruises. I must say the quality has gotten better.

The day before, I received a voice mail from the maitre d'hôtel, welcoming us on board. I didn't think anything about it. I figured they had an automated system that made the calls. Well, that day, I got a call from his assistant wanting to know when I was having dinner tonight. I told him 7 p.m., and he said to come to the Islands dining room and he would have a table for us. That never happened before. I was waiting to see what came next.

We met Lanny and Elaine in the Skywalker Lounge; they had the no-host party option for suite cabins every night. For those receptions, the ship provided the food (different each night) and the passengers bought their own drinks.

We went down to the Island dining room at 7 p.m. There was a long line of people waiting to get in. We bypassed the line and I told them that Mario (maitre d') made a 7 p.m. reservation for us. Next, Mario was there welcoming us, and he introduced us to Catalini (the head waiter) and said that, from now on, we should come straight into the dining room and Catalini would have a table for us. Then Catalini showed us to a four-person table by the window. Our waiter was Alicia from Jamaica. The service and food were excellent. I know it had just been two days, but it seemed Princess had really improved their food. It wasn't bad before, but they really improved the menu.

After dinner we saw Scott Harris, a Canadian comedian, who was very funny, though I fell asleep for part of the act.

We docked in Cork, Ireland, the next morning at 8 a.m. We booked a tour with Paddywagon Tours to go to Blarney Castle. The cost was about half of what the ship's tour would have cost. The ship docked in Cobh (Cove), the port for Cork. Cobh, then known as Queensland, was the final stop for the *Titanic* on its first and final voyage. From

that point on, Evelyn was calling this cruise the "the *Titanic* cruise". We left Cobh and drove directly to Blarney Castle. Our driver/tour guide was smart to get us there early because the line to kiss the Blarney Stone can be a two- to three-hour wait. We reached the castle in about an hour. Between the short wait and the 100 steps up a circular stairway, it took Evelyn and I only 25 minutes to climb the top, kiss the stone and return to the entrance. The climb up was pretty tight and the steps were very narrow, but we both made it. You have to lie on your back while an attendant guides you toward the stone. You don't get much time before they snatch you back. It reminded me of the movie *A Christmas Story*, where Ralph wanted to ask Santa for an air rifle and he couldn't get the words out before Santa's helpers dragged him away. They took our photos at the Blarney Stone, but they weren't very good. They used a different set of stairs going down, and we could stop and look at the various castle rooms.

We did a quick walk around the grounds and then found Lanny and Elaine. We still had some time before we had to return to the bus, so we found "The Mill," a shopping opportunity.

A word about the weather – we had some rain in Southampton, but Guernsey and Cork were nice. The temperature was in the high 60s, with periods of sunshine. It was very pleasant for sightseeing.

After the castle, we took a driving tour of Cork, the second largest city in Ireland after Dublin. Until 1921, Ireland was a part

of Great Britain, and then it gained its independence except for the six counties that make up Northern Ireland, of which Belfast is the capital. If the island of Ireland were one county, then Belfast would be the second largest city. After our drive through Cork, we stopped in Kinsale, a medieval port town. We had about two hours to eat lunch and walk around the town. We found an "organic" restaurant, with no beer, only wine. The fish chowder was pretty good, but tomorrow in Dublin it was to be fish and chips.


We drove back to Cobh with the intent of walking around the town before returning to the ship, but that weekend there was a large regatta and festival in town. The streets, which are very narrow, were packed with cars, and our bus couldn't get close to the ship. We were able to get out and walk down hill to the ship, while going through the town and the festival.

We all enjoyed the tour and by kissing the Blarney Stone we have seven years of the gift of gab.



Gap Insurance for New Cars

Just when you thought you were covered for everything you needed with your insurance — along comes gap insurance.

If you are getting a new car, or recently did, you may want to read about this important coverage.

Though it may sound trivial, gap insurance is a must for people who lease their cars. And if you made a small down payment when buying a car, a gap policy can be lifesaver as well. But first, let's look at why it exists.

As the name implies, gap insurance covers what traditional auto insurance doesn't. In other words, it closes the gap between what your insurance company pays if your car is stolen or totaled and what you owe the finance company.

Let's take a test case: Say you bought your car two months ago for \$25,000. You begin making payments at about \$500 a month based on a 6 percent interest rate. Then, disaster strikes: A tree falls on your car and flattens it.

You call the insurance company and it looks into its crystal ball and decides at the time of the accident your car was worth only \$20,000. The car may only be a couple of months old, but it has already lost 20 percent of its value. Unfortunately, the finance company still wants the full amount you owe them. With interest, tax and license fees, they figure that to be \$27,000.

Yikes! There's a gap of \$7,000 between the \$20,000 that the insurance company is willing to pay you and the \$27,000 the finance company is demanding. Most folks are going to be eating Spam dinners for the next two years, but if you have gap insurance, you can safely order steak.

Apply the same scenario to someone who bought their car. If they left the dealer lot without putting several thousand dollars down, they likely owe more than the insurance company will pay if the vehicle gets totaled or stolen in the first few years. Once again, gap coverage can save the day.

And that's why gap insurance is a must for many drivers. In fact, gap insurance is usually mandated by lease contracts or included within them. If a gap policy is required but not included in your contract, you should shop around for this coverage (insurance companies sell it). If gap coverage is included in the lease, check to see how much is offered and how much you're going to be paying for it. (In some cases, lease contracts may include what is known as a gap waiver, which protects you from gap charges in the event that the leased vehicle is declared a total loss — eliminating the need for a gap policy.)

Is gap insurance necessary for people who finance their cars? Well, it depends on your coverage. If your regular insurance policy is written to pay off the fully financed amount, then you don't need gap insurance.

A few things to keep in mind when buying gap insurance:

- Although most people purchase it when a lease is initiated, some insurance companies will sell you a gap policy anytime during the lease term.
- You must be in compliance with all terms of the lease.
- Your gap insurance policy may not be honored if you don't have collision and comprehensive insurance coverage. Further, lease contracts generally require that you carry collision and comprehensive at all times.

If your car is totaled, or stolen, carefully follow all requirements made by your insurance company. For example, some companies require you to continue making loan payments on your totaled car until the money from the gap insurance is paid out.

So when initiating a car loan or lease, always remember to ask your insurance agent about gap insurance. If you have an accident, you'll be glad you planned ahead.

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





Here are some images from Dr. **Ed Krupp, Director, Griffith Observatory**, from an expedition he took with the Friends Of The Observatory last October. "We went to Greenland to view the aurora borealis, and we were successful, with three nights of clear weather and auroral displays."



"Kellyville, Greenland, near Kangerlussuaq, advertises itself as an 'incoherent' community. The radio antenna of the Sondrestrom Incoherent Scatter Radar Facility probes the ionosphere in an attempt to understand better the mechanisms involved in the northern lights."



"Most of Greenland is covered with ice, and it's about 11,000 feet deep. It's uninhabitable, but you can reach it from the coast, which is clear of the ice cap and is where people live. Ice Cap Point 660 is a sea of frozen waves."



"Icebergs break off from Greenland's Sermeq Kujalleq glacier, the most productive glacier in the northern hemisphere, and migrate down the Ilulissat icefjord, a half-frozen tongue of the sea, enter Disko Bay, and eventually make their way to open ocean. The iceberg that doomed the *Titanic* originated from here."



"Many of the icebergs in Disco Bay are small mountains."



"The Rundetårn, in Copenhagen, is a 17th-century observatory tower that was used by Danish astronomers, including Øle Römer, who attempted to measure the speed of light. The green building here, at the summit of the tower, houses a telescope used today by amateur astronomers."



Remembering Ted C. Heyl Jr. Rec and Parks

Former Rec and Parks administrator Ted C. Heyl Jr. passed away Nov. 6 in Woodland Hills. He was 78.

Ted grew up in the San Fernando Valley and graduated from Canoga Park High School in 1953, and later from UCLA. He served in the U.S. Army in Okinawa before beginning a long career in Rec and Parks. He offered selfless support to countless young people in LA's parks, on Little League and Babe Ruth teams and with many other groups. Later, Ted helped plan the rapid expansion of LA's network of parks in the 1970s and '80s as Assistant Planning Officer.

Ted was a true Angeleno and a Valley guy. (One of his favorite movies was *Chinatown*.) There are many stories of Ted's service to the Department over the many years, first as a park director and then in City Hall. Many stories made the rounds as well about Ted's remarkable knowledge of sports in general, and LA sports in particular. One colleague recalled that a sports question had stumped everyone in the office, including the self-proclaimed expert on the subject. In an elevator that day, Ted was asked the question and immediately reeled off the correct answer ("with footnotes and all, it seemed," recalled the colleague). Thereafter, Ted was the go-to guy to settle sports trivia questions.

Ted is survived by Dolores Averill, his beloved partner of 37 years. He was a devoted father, brother and uncle to his daughter, Megan Heyl of Los Angeles; sister, Mary Sawyer of Ruidoso, N.M.; brother, John Heyl of Tucson, Ariz.; and four nieces. Ted will be remembered as a modest and generous spirit and as a person who could always be depended upon when others needed his advice and support.

Steve Newcomer, Retired, Library, has visited every country on earth – 193 in all. But the longest journey was the one inside of him.



The United Nations lists 193 nation members. Steve Newcomer has been to all of them, plus many more unofficial territories and regions. He's one of a relative few in the world who have accomplished the feat. It took him 34 years, longer than he worked for the City.

His journeys cost him much in terms of the material possessions he doesn't have in his retirement, but those journeys have given him much more – a worldwide circle of friends, experiences that few can list on their résumé, and a passion for discovery that remains burning to this day.

Steve, the Library's Retired Director of Information Technologies and Collections, has hardly stopped traveling. There is always something new to discover in the world, he says, and in early January, before he returned to LAX to begin another six-month stint abroad, he stopped by the Club Headquarters to talk about his discoveries – both in the world, and inside himself.

Beyond the Comfort Zone [The *Alive!* Interview]

On Jan. 8, Steve Newcomer, Retired Director of Information Technologies and Collections, Library, stopped by the Club's administrative headquarters to chat about his travels, what he's learned, and making the sacrifices necessary to live a life of discovery. He was interviewed by John Hawkins, Club CEO.

Steve, thanks for joining us today before you head out again. Let's talk very briefly about your city employment.

STEVE: Sure. I started at the City as a Catalog Librarian in 1989 and worked my way to being the Director of Information Technologies and Collections.

And you had a career before that.

STEVE: I was always a restless kind of a person. In fact, I was surprised I ever stuck it out at the Library for 24 years, but I finally found what I enjoyed doing. I'd worked as a librarian previously. I worked bagging groceries in a grocery store. I worked for a peace group in Washington, D.C., a lobby group. I did social service and church work in Puerto Rico. I taught English in Brazil. I worked in refugee camps in Honduras on the Honduras/El Salvador border during the war. And I worked a year for American Airlines.

Got it. You mentioned a lot of really great things in your essay. I don't want to duplicate all of that, but I would imagine it's going to be impossible to name your favorite country you've been to. But maybe the two or three or five favorite countries, of the 193 you've visited?

STEVE: The things that come to mind are some of the encounters I've had, whether it be people or wildlife. Even though Antarctica isn't a country, it's one of the most spectacular places on earth and one that is at the top of my list of a place I'd like to go back to. It has stark beauty, the ice, the mountains, the sea, the penguins. It's just a memorable journey that anyone would appreciate for a lifetime, so even though it's not a country it's still on my list of favorite places.

Brazil... having lived there, I have friends, and I find the country so warm, accepting, sensual. It's a beautiful country as well. It's got everything from magnificent waterfalls and the Amazon River and the beauty of the mountains around Guanabara Bay and Rio. It's spectacular country. Rwanda, my gosh. Talk about an interesting place. Central Africa. The mountain gorillas, an experience you will never, ever forget. Hiking in the mountains and coming close to the gorillas is just awesome. I went back three times just to visit those gorillas. It was just that exciting for me.

Yemen... Yemen is a place that most people would steer clear of because of the instability and some of the unpleasant terrorist activity going on, but it's a country full of cultural fascination. The tribes. The sand dunes. The ancient cities. Fascinating place. Certainly in the top five for me.

You

must have been in the middle of some wars and contentious situations.

STEVE: A few times, yes. Somalia was a trip that was made totally by accident. I was on a plane that landed in Mogadishu, and we were detained there for a few days totally unplanned. There were some dicey moments there with a warlord and gun-toting youth. I went back to Iraq a couple of years ago now. It was much calmer at that time, but certainly there were bomb blasts going off in and around places when I was there. But you take risks wherever you go. You could be struck by a car walking across the street, so while that's always a consideration for me it's never stopped me from going someplace.

Starting Early

Why do you travel? What is that thing that makes you want to explore the world?

STEVE: I think it's genetic, I tell you. My father also liked to travel, although it was very limited at that time just to the few states where he had lived, but perhaps his interest in traveling and seeing scenery and meeting people rubbed off on me in some way.

It's plain and simple curiosity, and I've had that since I was a little kid. I've always wanted to know what was around the corner.

Have you traveled since you were young?

STEVE: As a kid we would take trips around the states, you know, whether it be up to the mountains or to New Mexico or

greater degree of independence in the near future like Kosovo. It's not a U.N. country but at some point could certainly become one.

So then did you go to Yugoslavia?

STEVE: I went to Yugoslavia when it was a united country, and I've been back since all of the separate nations split off, yes.

So the number 193 – does that take into account the political changes that have happened since you started?

STEVE: Right, and it also depends what you call a country. The United Nations has a very defined list and it's easy to go by, but there are many other dependencies and semi-autonomous regions and island groups around the world that are not fully independent, but they act in many ways as independent nations, at least to some degree.

Like Samoa.

STEVE: Yes, American Samoa, Puerto Rico, Bermuda.

Any idea what that real number would be, then, according to your own definition, not the United Nations definition but your own?

STEVE: There are travel groups and clubs out there that like to define these things, and I've always steered clear of having a strong opinion on that, but a local travel group, the Travelers' Century Club, has a board of directors that defines these things. They say there are 324 such countries, including semi-autonomous regions of the world. So I think that's as good of a number as any to use if you want to start expanding beyond the 193 U.N. countries.

Food and Other Adventures

Do you have a set of rules that you go by to stay healthy and not get sick?

STEVE: Cipro, number one. You shouldn't travel anywhere without Cipro. Cipro is a great medicine to kill anything that might end up in your stomach and disorient you. I don't go anywhere without Cipro. It's a prescription drug.

Any other tips for taking care of yourself?

STEVE: I'm very careful about eating. I steer clear of anything that hasn't been cooked or which I can't peel myself. It's simple rules like that.

Bottled water?

STEVE: Bottled water obviously, yes.


What are some memories of the things that you have experienced in terms of eating?

STEVE: It might offend a lot of people, but I've eaten dog. I have eaten camel and monkey and worms; those are some of the things that come to mind. I didn't enjoy them all necessarily, but when you're in a circumstance where that's served to you very proudly by a host family...


You don't have a choice.

STEVE: You really want to at least give it a try.


A lot of people can say, "Oh, you know, I went to another





back to see family in Indiana. Those kinds of trips we would take every summer but nothing very extensive until I was in college, and then I started branching out and taking some study abroad classes in the Middle East and Dominican Republic.

Your very first trip out of the country was to where?

STEVE: When I was a kid, my folks took us to Canada and Mexico, but I don't really count that. The first trip I took basically on my own was as a senior in college when I went to the Middle East for a class, but I took off a month before the class to go across Europe and Egypt and Jordan. That's when I really consider my trips began, the 34 years when I visited all the countries of the world.

And your final visit, to complete the 193, was South Sudan, is that correct?

STEVE: Right, South Sudan is the newest country on earth. It just became a country in July 2011. As soon as it became independent I had to go there, of course, so in November 2011 I flew there and took a two-week safari with some other people to one of the national parks.

Are there any other territories that are on the verge of becoming a nation?

STEVE: There are some that are semi-independent now that may achieve some





front of me. The fewer distractions I have, the less luggage I carry, the less burdened I am with those material things, the more I'm forced to interact with people around me. So that's also a lesson I've learned.

The Inward Journey

How has this changed you?

STEVE: It's made me appreciate that very few issues are black and white in this world. There's a lot of gray, and it's made me appreciate other people's perspectives on things much more. There's always another side to just about every story you can come up with.

The world is more complicated than people want to admit.

STEVE: Yes, people want things to be very easily right or wrong, black or white, and it's just very seldom that way.

country," and they tick that off and check that box. But it seems to me like that was never really your motivation.

STEVE: No.

It wasn't like checking boxes. It was more about adventure and discovery.

STEVE: That's right, and I had never dreamed or imagined that I could visit all of the countries in my lifetime. It was really never the goal. The goal was, as you said, adventure, curiosity, meeting new people, seeing the scenery and sights that I've read about in *National Geographic* since I was a kid. That's what it was about. But the more countries I gradually visited the more possible it seemed that I could reach that

goal of visiting them all, and so I eventually did. But yes, you're right. It was not about checking off boxes. There are a lot of people who do this, but what sets some of us apart from others is that we like to spend some time in the countries we're visiting.

Not just touch down in the airport.

STEVE: Right. So for me, wherever it's been possible, I've spent at least a few days in the country.

And this hasn't stopped you from traveling even more.

STEVE: Oh no, because there's no end to it. You have countries like China and Russia and India out there that are vast expanses, and it takes many visits to see the whole place.

You're leaving again for China next week.

STEVE: I'm going to China. China is a vast country, so I am going back to some of the provinces I haven't visited prior, and taking the bus through Laos as well and see what happens. I'll be gone about six months.

The more you go the more you realize what you're missing.

STEVE: That's exactly right. You end up going somewhere and someone locally tells you, "Oh, you really have to go over there to see..." And you never knew about that place, so it'll never end.

Do you speak any other languages?

STEVE: I speak Portuguese and Spanish, yes. And bits and pieces, a few words here in there in a variety of languages to get by.

Have you found English is pretty much universal?

STEVE: Oh yes. English is the best language to know in most parts of the world. French is a good second, though.

Has the world changed since you started?

STEVE: You bring up a good point. You can go very few places where someone doesn't have a cell phone in their hand. Even in the middle of Africa people have their cell phones or in most cases now smartphones. But that's another thing: Even though I was the director of I.T. for the Los Angeles Public Library, I'm a minimalist when it comes to technology, and most people are surprised by that. I don't own a smartphone, and I don't want to travel with electronic gadgetry. When I travel I want to leave that behind because I find that it distracts me from interacting with the culture in which I find myself. So when I travel I don't care if it's for a week or for six months, I only bring what can go in a small backpack that can fit underneath the airline seat in

You talked in your essay about preconceived notions. What preconceived notions that you had when you started this 34 years ago did you dispel, are gone from you now, or that you have rethought?

STEVE: Oh boy, that's a loaded question. It's a lot of preconceived ideas that I certainly grew up with as a kid in the Midwest that you learn aren't always the case, like kids everywhere have equal opportunity to education, or have food. It's just not true. There are people today who are literally starving in parts of the world, and kids don't have access to education the world over. People don't have access to clean drinking water. Governments are not always taking good care of their people. Religion has its dark and evil side as well as its good and charitable side. So yes, a lot of things that I as a kid grew up believing and thinking were challenged, as is the case when any of us venture out beyond our comfort zones. Here in L.A. we could have similar experiences.


What have you learned?

STEVE: One of the most important lessons I've learned is to be a bit more environmentally conscious. Good ol' Planet Earth is in peril – forests are being eliminated, wildlife habitat destroyed... there's pollution, fish shortages, overpopulation, displacement of peoples, *et cetera*. So I try to give back by assisting local environmental and development groups in some countries, whether it's planting trees or helping farmers buy seeds or dig wells or buy supplies for a school or clinic. I try to do a little bit to ensure that the next generation will inherit a livable planet.

Let's talk about some moments. Do you remember any moments that really either changed you or really touched you that remain with you now?

STEVE: There have been so many, John. In general terms it's been times when those chance encounters with people on a public bus in Guyana or going across the hills of Burkina Faso and local people strike up conversations with you. And one of them will invite you into their home and you end up spending the night or another night, and you're experiencing life as that local family lives it. Those are the special moments for me because you realize that people are very loving and accepting and welcoming, even when they may not have much to offer you, and it touches you. It reminds me that the most important things in life are not necessarily the material things. Yes, material things can add a lot of comfort to one's life and I don't belittle them, but when it comes right down to it, the most fulfilling and meaningful things in life are the relationships one builds and creates with other human beings, whether it be your next door neighbor or someone on the other side of the planet.

When there are events occurring in the world, nine times out of ten I can tell you the name of an individual living in that country who I have met and who I'm thinking of at that moment. My mind immediately goes back to that person I met on the bus or the individual who welcomed me into their home, and I'm wondering, hey, how are they doing? So in effect the thing that has most transformed me is this global family that I have developed over these 34 years.



Do you find your worldview is different than most people's? Are you a little counter-cultural?

STEVE: My worldview is such that when something happens I'm thinking of an individual. I can tell you the name of someone who might be impacted by whatever is going on in the world, whether it be political or economic or geologic. The only thing I can say is my worldview is more personalized maybe than a lot of people because I can put a name to the place, and that impacts how I view events.

Sacrifice

Many people will be reading this and saying, "This is an amazing story, and it sounds like I would like to do it myself," or something like that. But this has come at some significant cost to you.

STEVE: Oh yes. I'm certainly not a wealthy person by any stretch of the imagination. I was a Librarian for the City for 24 years. It's like any passion in life: If you're truly passionate about something you'll find a way to do it, and for me it meant living without a car, living in a small studio apartment, doing without a lot of the electronic gadgets that people like to have, living as simply as I can at home so that I can follow my passion to visit places around the world.

What steps would you recommend people take even to have a small taste of what you've done to alter their travel to the kinds of places they go? What's your advice to people who want to at least taste a little bit of what you know?

STEVE: Everybody is different. The one thing I've learned is that what I may find fun and attractive and appealing is the last thing anybody else would want to do. But I'd say find something that sparks some interest in you and talk to somebody who's been there and who can give you advice on how to get there and what to do and where to stay once you're there. Just dip your toe in the water and get a taste for it and see how it goes.

How did you meet real people in each country, when most of the tourism industry seems to me to kind of give you an experience that you pay for but you don't necessarily connect into the way real people live in each country. What advice can you give to the Club Members who are reading this to find a way to meet a real person in a real country rather than sort of the typical travel or tourist experiences that they would have had?

STEVE: Avoid the group tours. Go on your own. I mean in some places you cannot do that, but the way I've met people and been immersed in these cultures is by going on my own, taking the local transportation, getting on the local bus or train to go somewhere, walking in the streets looking for a hotel to stay in. In these prepackaged tours everything's arranged for you, so many of the opportunities to mingle with local people are very greatly diminished. I have nothing against a prepackaged tour. In some places that's all you can do. North Korea you have to go with a group. The time I went to Libya you had to go with a group. Iraq I had to go with a group.

Cuba?

STEVE: To Cuba I had to go with a group, yes.

How long ago did you go to North Korea? That is like a mystery country.

STEVE: It's the most unique place on the planet, no doubt about it. I went, I don't know, maybe eight years ago or so. There's no place on earth like North Korea.

Do you read a lot?

STEVE: I do, and I think that's why I became a librarian: What does someone with my kind of passion do for a living? My passion developed in part because of my reading. I wanted to learn about all these places on earth, and so I read a lot as a kid. And as a professional librarian you're delving into every imaginable subject every day, helping people with their research needs, so I think that's why I might've become a librarian.

How have your experiences been with Customs and Immigration Services coming back in? Do they ask you why in the world you are going into these countries?

STEVE: Yes. In fact, the least pleasant part of any trip I take is coming back into the United States and being invariably grilled by the customs officials. "Why were you there? What were you doing?" You've got people coming through the customs line with boxes and bundles and enormous amounts of baggage and they're just waved right through. I come along with my little backpack that can go underneath an airline seat and I'm forced to go into the line to have it checked. It's because of my travel history. When I came back from Afghanistan I was pulled aside and questioned at length. The armed security guards came out at LAX to the roadside where people drop off passengers and escorted me back into the building to be cross-examined. It's offensive, but it's the price I have to pay.

You had cleared. You were on your way to your transportation.


STEVE: I had cleared. I was out to catch the bus and they came out and brought me back in. But I'm not bitter, not at all. I'm still traveling.

IN HIS OWN WORDS:

The Rewards of Travel

World traveler Steve Newcomer, Library, Retired, reflects on his experiences visiting every nation on earth.

I'm convinced I was born with a "wanderlust" gene: an innate desire to relentlessly explore every corner of our earth. As a kid I'd arise along with the Colorado daybreak to walk around my small town and catch a glimpse of far off Pike's Peak before anyone else had awakened; I loved poring over maps to help plan our family's summer vacations; and there was a high school social studies report I presented on the United Nations, all the while daydreaming what it would be like to actually visit all those exotic countries and the people who call them home.

There were also college courses in Spanish and German as well as the interterm classes that took me away from campus: a cross-cultural immersion experience in the Dominican Republic and a "Middle East Today" course in Israel and the West Bank. But those were just preludes to greater adventures: a year long volunteer service experience in refugee camps on the Honduras/El Salvador border during their civil war, as well as multi-year stints in both Brazil and Puerto Rico, followed by a brief career with American Airlines, when I spent almost as much time taking free flights around the world as I did in the office.

I soon accepted the fact that I cared much more about peering over the next hill and peeking around the next corner and meeting the next stranger than I did about owning a home or a car or any of the other material things that most of my peers prized. And I slowly began to realize that my goal of world travel was indeed possible, if I were willing to forgo many of the commonly pursued comforts of life.

So, with the blessing of generous bosses at the Los Angeles Public Library who allowed me to creatively cobble together vacation time to pursue my peripatetic exploits, I have managed to find buses, trains, trucks, camels, horses, jeeps, planes with see-through floors, boats that leaked, canoes, and of course, my own two feet, to visit the 193 countries (and a lot of their territories) that make up the United Nations. I've inadvertently met presidents and warlords, eaten every manner of "food" and been bitten by bugs that don't have names; I've been treated royally by an Arabian prince, mugged by knife-wielding thieves; invited to a Ugandan teenage circumcision ceremony; interrogated by U.S. Customs officials; brushed up against by a gorilla; and mobbed by children who had never seen a white person before.

But my wanderings haven't just been about crossing international borders. The 34-year journey has been one of interacting with cultures very different from my own, and of creating my own global "family" – individuals whom I have felt drawn to and those who have helped to mold my understanding of the world. It has been a journey about receiving insights from countless people representing a multitude of languages, faiths, and economic and social conditions; and one of sharing myself and my resources with those far less privileged than me. Whether providing soccer balls for kids in Ethiopia, condoms for health workers in Cuba, materials for a house in Sri Lanka, healthcare for a woman suffering from a heart arrhythmia, tuition for a Guinean refugee, or garden supplies for farmers in Rwanda and Brazil, one of my


aims has been to assist people to achieve their own goals, while allowing my own biases and beliefs to be challenged. I set aside 10 percent of the cost of each trip to "give back" to people I meet along the way – people who will likely never have the good fortune to travel the world as I have.

Too often I compare myself with other Americans who have so much more than I do, rather than seeing that I am the wealthy one in the eyes of most of the rest of the world, having plenty to offer if I only choose to do so. The lesson I have repeatedly learned is that it's not one's economic status that provides security and fulfillment, but one's embrace of those who are different from oneself.

And the most enduring lessons often come from the most

unexpected corners of our globe: a meeting with a gay Iranian student who, facing the death penalty in his own country, could only dream of someday being open about his sexuality; the encounter with a shoeless Somali soldier who tearfully bid me farewell after I forgave him for roughing me up; and the anti-American Surinamese student who insulted me on a bus but later insisted I spend the night in his home. 





History Comes Alive!

There are few Los Angeles institutions more popular to the film and television industry than the Los Angeles Police Dept. The people who protect the nation's second largest city never cease to fascinate the tellers of both fictional drama and those trying to tell the story of the City through a specific historical lens. I just wish the media's production budgets allowed a bit more time and money for research, since the end results usually show a lack of due diligence. That's too bad, because there are so many resources in Los Angeles to choose from, and that includes the Los Angeles City Archives.

There is a new crime show on cable network TNT called *Mob City* that aired back in December. Taking place in Los Angeles starting in 1947 with the occasional flashbacks to earlier days, the show follows the efforts of a crime unit dedicated to keeping the mobsters including Mickey Cohen at bay and, the force hoped, out of the City altogether. But the story includes corrupt cops and politicians as you might expect in a story such as this one. The basic facts are somewhat based on a book written by John Buntin called *L.A. Noir: The Struggle for the Soul of America's Most Seductive City*, published in 2009.

First disclosure: John Buntin spent some time with us here at the Archives researching his book. Second disclosure: My wife is a television critic who visited the show set and saw some clips last summer as they were beginning production. Buntin studied several of our archival resources for his book; among them were the LAPD annual reports and the LAPD scrapbooks.

The annual report is required under the City Charter to keep the mayor, City Council and other officials aware of what the department considers necessary to do the public's business. The annual reports represent everything the Police Dept. did in the previous year using statistics covering numbers of crimes reported, arrests made and dollars spent. The scrapbook program was started in 1947 by the Public Relations office for in-house purposes. The books contain clippings from most, if not all, of the local daily newspapers, highlighting who was

committing the crimes and who made the arrests. They were collected and assembled in chronological order and can be very useful to follow a specific event instead of going through months' worth of microfilm.

The effect of William H. Parker becoming Chief of Police was immediate on our archival materials. For the year that *Mob City* opens, 1947, the annual report is 164 pages of densely packed tables, charts and graphs with incredible detail including which hours of what days of the week were most likely to have crime take

to do an almost impossible task. One example that year was the recruitment process in which 6,448 applicants began the selection process and only 196 survived all the exams, training and probation for a paltry 3.8 percent acceptance rate. So the annual report became a tool to promote support for the department. But the statistics weren't forgotten. They became their own published report known as the Statistical Digest and are also in the archives.

Meanwhile, the scrapbooks included clippings of crooked cops being arrested and prosecuted for a variety of crimes in addition to the petty criminals and organized criminals working in the City. Chief Parker seemed to have given the PID the ability to include the dark side of the police force in their efforts. The scrapbooks of the 1950s and 1960s give

a more complete look at what the LAPD brass saw and considered important, whereas the late 1940s books dealt more with trade show-type events than department activity.

The greatest shot in the arm for morale came in the form of *Dragnet*. First as a radio show in 1950 and later as the iconic television show, *Dragnet* has its own scrapbook in the archive with press releases, comic book strips and even real crime reporting written in the same deadpan style popularized by the show.

The image of the straight-arrow cop being the ultimate professional could not have been further from the sad truth that still existed in the 1950s. The annual reports and scrapbooks carried the message that crime of all kinds continued to increase while manpower decreased to 1.88 officers per 1000 citizens. The imagery and photographs in the reports paint a portrait of a city under siege but fighting back, as in a crusade, with new tools and knowledge. But the next page revealed a need for more of everything to keep pace with the criminals and a growing population of citizens.


If *Mob City* gets renewed, I hope the research staff will pay me a visit. There are enough real-life stories here that would support the story they are trying to tell if they are serious of showing the post-war evolution of both William H. Parker and the LAPD into the local history they are today.

place (Saturday evenings accounted for 17 percent of all crimes committed that year. Sundays as a whole were a close second at 15 percent). There was no public relations spin in the report.

That had changed by 1950, Parker's first year on the job. The Public Relations office became known as Public Information Division under the new Bureau of Administration. Now the role of the annual report was to highlight the department itself and what role it played in our public safety, quality of life and why it needed more resources



The play, told in flashback, featured Dunne going in and out of lucidity as he remembered, or didn't, the strug-

gles of his compromised position. His endless monologues were evocative but ultimately too passive for me.

Cooking with the Club

SHRIMP AND SCALLOP CEVICHE

Ceviche: To some it is the best dish ever conceived. To others, they wouldn't touch it with a ten-foot pole. Who ever heard of cooking seafood with citric juices from limes or lemons, anyway? The ingredients are not cooked with heat, so it is definitely raw.

The origin of the dish is not known for certain, but there are historical records that indicate that it was invented in the Peruvian and Ecuadorian region by mixing *chicha* (the juice of maize). This area was previously part of the Incan Empire, which had vast access to fish and shellfish. When the Spaniards arrived, the use of limes, onions as well as other foods were incorporated. While this is a delicious dish and the recipe I have below is a very full in flavor that uses very fresh shrimp and scallops instead of fresh fish, I will caution that young children and seniors should use discretion when eating. Nonetheless, this is a great appetizer for your upcoming Valentine's Day dinner. Enjoy!

Shrimp and Scallop Ceviche

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 jalapeño
- Half cup finely chopped cilantro
- 3 Roma tomatoes
- 1 medium sized cucumber
- Half cup finely chopped white onion
- 1 medium Haas avocado, diced in small cube
- Lime juice, freshly squeezed, enough to cover the surface of the bowl with the ingredients (approximately 10 limes)
- Salt and white pepper to taste
- Half pound bay scallops (70/120)*, raw and fresh, cut in half
- Half pound medium shrimp (41/50)*, raw and fresh, cut in thirds
- Bag of tortilla chips
- Mexican hot sauce

* If you've never ordered fresh seafood, here's what those numbers mean in the ingredients list above. Walk up to the person behind the counter and say, "I'd like a half-pound of the 70/120 scallops, and a half pound of the 41/50 shrimp." That should do it.

Cooking TIDBIT Use tortilla chips that don't have extra flavors other than salt. You may also use tostadas, which can be found in most super-markets. If you have the time, you can even make your tortilla chips by cutting them and letting them cook in the deep fryer.

[A Cook's Dictionary]



Ceviche:

[she-VEE-chee; she-VEE-cheh; she-VEEH] – An appetizer popular in Latin America consisting of raw fish marinated in citrus (usually lime) juice. The action of the acid in the lime's juice "cooks" the fish, thereby firming the flesh and turning it opaque. Onions, tomatoes and green peppers are often added to the marinade. Only fresh fish should be used for this dish. Pompano, red snapper and sole are the fish most often selected for ceviche (which is also spelled seviceh or cebiche).

Serves 2 – 4



1 Prepare your ingredients. Wash and dry the jalapeños, cucumber, tomatoes, cilantro, limes, shrimp and scallops.

2 Begin prepping the shrimp and scallops in a separate cutting board from the other ingredients. Put aside the avocado until step 3, when you will remove the avocado flesh and cube it with a knife.



3 Add all diced ingredients into a large bowl. This includes the shrimp and scallops as well. Then add salt and pepper. Lastly, add the juice of the limes. Mix gently with a wooden spoon. Make sure the lime juice covers the ingredients. If it does not, add more juice. Cover the bowl and place in the refrigerator for one to two hours.



4 Remove bowl from refrigerator, mix in cubed avocado, add on tortilla chips. Add a few drops of hot sauce as well. Plate and enjoy!




