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A Message From the CEO

An Active Hall of Fame

ost Halls of Fame are for heroes of the past -Ma recognition for deeds done, missions accomplished, feats achieved. Over and done. But the LAFD has a special Hall of Fame - maybe not called that, exactly that is still quite active, thank you very much. That's LAFD Fire Station 80, protecting the planes and passengers that come to LAX from all over the world to visit our city.

In our cover story interview this month, Capt. II William Wick considers ARFF - Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting - Fire Station 80 a kind of Hall of Fame. Sounds a little too proud, I'm sure some are saying. But he makes a point.

The LAFD is loaded with tremendous and experienced talent all over the City. But the unique challenges of fighting aircraft fires demand a different kind of response. It's hard to train for aircraft crashes, since (thank God) they rarely happen in real life. So it's critical that Fire Station 80 employs three platoons of Firefighters who have already seen it all, done it all, fought it all, and learned massively from each experience. They're seasoned long before they get there. Of course they train every day, but the bulk of their leaning is already done. It's really the only way. And when that's the goal, it only makes sense that the staff at Fire Station 80 contains some of the best of the best. You don't get promoted from Fire Station 80; you retire from it.

ARFF Fire Station 80 is notable for what it does not do. It's not focused on any issues inside the terminals. It doesn't handle medical emergencies, or hazmat situations. (There are other Fire Stations at LAX that handle those.) Fire Station 80 exists to rescue aircraft in trouble. That's its entire mission. And of course it does it very well.

As always, there's a story behind our covering this month's main feature. We started asking about Fire Station 80 maybe a year ago, but at that time officials expected to be receiving new Fire apparatuses. So we waited, and I'm glad we did. The new Crash 80 fire engines are awesome!

But they pale in comparison to the quality of the staff. There's no need to visit Cooperstown or Canton. We have Hall of Famers right here at LAX, very much active and engaged, and not just plaques on a wall. They're actively keeping us, and world travelers, safe, and we're all the better for it.

Special thanks to Capt. I Mike Tombrello, Club Member, who was delighted to lead our Alive! team on a tour, and Charles Pannunzio, Airports, for setting it up.

I have to give a shout-out this month for our tremendous readers and how much they love Alive! Just two examples - your contributions to both our Father's Day feature and our children's coloring contest nearly blew our doors off! We received 107 entries for our coloring contest, which is incredible. But even more that - you sent more than 110 Father's Day entries for our annual tribute section (and as I write this, they're still coming in!). That's a record! 



Filling the Gaps With Critical Illness Insurance

t is becoming the nature of health insurance that any major illness inevitably results in large out-of-pocket costs. As a result, many employers are expanding their voluntary benefit programs to include critical illness insurance.

Generally speaking, critical illness insurance provides a fixed, lump-sum payment following the diagnosis of any illness listed in the policy, which can include cancer, heart attack, stroke, paralysis, kidney failure and more. The benefit payments are made directly to the insured and can be used for any purpose, such as covering deductibles, medical co-payments, income shortfalls and travel expenses.

Employees typically elect coverage ranging from \$10,000 to \$250,000 each for themselves and their spouses. The premiums are not tax-deductible for an individual purchasing coverage, but the benefits are received tax-free. Premiums are priced based on factors including the policyholder's age, gender, health status (typically with a pre-existing condition exclusion), family medical history, use of tobacco and the state where they reside.

Critical illness insurance has its own niche, separate from and complementary to:

- Broad-based health policies, which pay care providers (rather than the policy holder) for covered expenses;
- Long-term care insurance, which typically pays only if one of the basic life functions is inhibited (e.g., feeding, bathing, ambulation);

"Critical illness insurance is not designed to replace other insurance policies but rather to supplement them," said Bob Hamilton, a principal with Bean Hamilton Corporate Benefits in Little Rock, Ark. "These policies can help pay the costs that are being shifted from the employer to the employee" through higher deductibles and other out-of-pocket costs.

How It Works

Critical illness coverage played an important role when Paul Kerr's wife was diagnosed with cancer. Following the initial cancer diagnosis, the Kerrs received a \$25,000 lump-sum benefit, which could be used for anything the Carlsbad, Calif.based couple needed.

The couple relied on those benefits to cover \$8,000 in out-of-pocket costs not covered by their health insurance plan roller coaster when the thing hits. Critical illness insurance is a way to help stabilize things on the financial side.

That is exactly the role intended for critical illness coverage. Research conducted by insurer MetLife estimates that the costs associated with recovering from a critical illness are \$35,500, most of which is linked to lost income.

"The chances of being diagnosed with a critical illness or experiencing an accident are steadily increasing, as are survival rates, which leads to growing financial challenges for the affected family," noted Lawrence Daurelle, president and CEO of Reliance Standard, an insurance provider.



Social Divestments: Good or Not?

Legislative Report: **Pension Law and Policy, By Michael** Karsch

re social divestment policies in a Appension portfolio good for all of those concerned, like the shareholders, the pensioners and the taxpayers? In an article in the *Daily Caller* News Foundation, Pete Sepp of the National Taxpayers Union asserts that oil divestment proponents put "people over profits, but they fail to realize that divestment harms real life human beings - both shareholders and taxpayers." We know the environmental side of the issue, speaking out against businesses that arguably hurt the environment. But

stock holdings, there will be created a hole in the portfolio, which eventually has to be reinvested elsewhere, which could turn into "underfunding," which means finding another investment that is, one hopes, going to match the growth expected in, say, oil stocks. Depending on how much had been invested, the gap left must be filled elsewhere, and one hopes as successfully.

CalSTRS (the teachers fund) divested from coal in its portfolio, but CalPERS, the largest public pension fund in the United States, refused to do so, saying that they keep their fossil fuel equities to allow the pension fund to "use its considerable sway to persuade companies to do better by the environment." In the meantime,

to accomplish a divestment of such CalPERS keeps its investment and does not have to deal with selling it at a loss and then trying to build back up with other equities.

In the United Kingdom, the Secretary of State for the Department of Communities and Local Government explained in 2015 that "Divisive policies like fossil fuel divestment undermine good community relations and harm economic security of families ... a pension fund's primary concern should be the pursuit of a financial return on their investments, including over the long term." Several investment policies generally require promoting good financial return on investments.

In April and May 2015, Hal and Evelyn took a land tour of Southeast Asia, starting in Bangkok and including Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam, Malaysia and Taiwan. In each place they hired a private car and guide, except for Taiwan.

Hanoi, Vietnam, April By Hal Danowitz, 28, 2015: We began our Secretary, RLACEI city tour of Hanoi, the

capital of Vietnam and the country's second largest city. Its population was estimated at 7.5 million for the metropolitan jurisdiction.

I must have drunk some bad water out of the tap in the hotel, the Nikko Saigon, and I have been hit with Ho Chi Minh's revenge. I can't even think of food, so I had some rice at breakfast.

We left the hotel a 9 a.m. heading to the Ho Chi Minh Memorial Complex, which houses the former leader's embalmed body and the stilt house where he lived. There was a three-hour wait to see the body, so we decided to skip that part. I have to admit the line moved well but not well enough for us to try. In 1986 we were in Beijing and asked to see Mao's tomb. We were driven right through Tiananmen Square and saw him. No waiting, just in and out. I guess those were the good old days.

We drove a short distance to the Temple of Literature, one of the best surviving examples of Vietnamese architecture. It was founded in 1070 and is dedicated to Confucius.

Hanoi looked like any other Asian capital, with lots of new buildings, cars, motorbikes and well-dressed people.

We visited the Museum of Ethnology, which had exhibits on the 54 ethnic groups that inhabit the country. We finished up our tour with a drive around the various districts, seeing the opera house and St. Joseph's Cathedral.

We returned to the hotel and prepared to fly to Ho Chi Minh City (Saigon) the next day.

On April 29, we had to leave the hotel for the airport at 6:30 a.m. for our 8:30 a.m. flight. Vinny, our travel guide, had confirmed our flight and got us two aisle seats on the 777. The next day was a public holiday commemorating the 40th anniversary of the unification North and South Vietnam. On holidays the Vietnamese return to their families' villages. Village is the term they use for their hometown. In both Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City, the streets were lined with flags. I think if we stood still long enough someone would attach a Vietnamese flag to us. The plane was filled with whole families: grandparents, grandkids and all other relatives. Again we had to take a bus from the tarmac to baggage claim, and we waited at least 20 minutes for our bags. Ours came out first, so that was a plus. We found our guide, Kan, and started our city tour. Ho Chi Minh City (HCMC), formerly named and still also referred to as Saigon, is the largest city in Vietnam. Its population is just more than eight million. Our first stop was Chinatown; it seemed there was a large Chinese population here. We walked through the Temple of Sing How and then drove to see City Hall, Notre Dame Cathedral, the central post office and the opera house. It was a totally uninspiring tour. We did stop at a Vietnam coffee house and had coffee, followed by cold tea, together with a number of snacks. That was interesting. Also, the tables and chairs were sized like children's furniture. We stopped at the Ben Thank Market, the largest in HCMC. Evelyn managed to buy a few things after some hard

The next day we planned to visit the Cu Chi Tunnels and

then the Cao Dai Great Temple. I was feeling better, so whatever it was had passed, but I will not be


brushing my teeth with hotel tap water ever again. We had dinner at the Chinese

restaurant in the hotel. We were served an eightcourse tasting menu, and it was wonderful. The table was set with chopsticks and Chinese soup spoons, but what was different was a spoon and chopstick rest combined into one on the table. How long

just took all that with a grain of salt. We saw the various booby traps and spider holes, and we got to go through a replica tunnel. It was so small that I had to crawl most of the way. It was interesting to see the complex. Remember, the Vietnamese call the war the "American War."

We then drove another hour to Tay Ninh the birthplace of looked like a place to hang out the next day.

We had dinner in the hotel. Evelyn had the seafood buffet, and I had a hamburger. The burger was okay, but the buffet was outstanding – there were all kinds of sushi, crab, lobster and tons of other stuff.

The next day, May 1, we got to sleep in to almost 8:30 a.m., which helped us catch up on some sleep. We had not had much time to just relax, so we planned to take that day to just do nothing. Our flight out of HCMC wasn't scheduled to land in Kuala Lumpur until 10:30 p.m. We were to lose an hour and then be back at the airport in Kuala Lumpur

to find them in LA.? At the coffee stop in Ho Chi Minh City.

The next day,

April 30, we met our guide at 7 a.m. for the 90-minute drive to the Cu Chi Tunnels. The tunnels formed an important Vietcong base during the Vietnam War. The streets were not crowded, with it being a public holiday. We were the second car on the parking lot. Our car that day was a Ford twin cab F-150. It was not as comfortable as the van we had yesterday, and there was no ice chest for cold water. Of all of our guides, this one seemed to care less about what we wanted. This was our only stop that had an American (during the war) influence, and I wondered if that affected the service.

Getting to the tunnels early was smart, and we were able to see the exhibits without the crowds. The tunnels, which cover more than 200km, were originally built during the French Indochina war in 1948, and expanded during the Vietnam War. The tunnels were built so that villagers could help each other and not be seen by the French.

We were shown a propaganda film from 1967, which highlighted the "brave" Vietcong villagers in their fight against the Americans. I

the Cao Dai religion, a fusion of Buddhism,

Confucianism, Taoism, Christianity, Islam and native Vietnamese spiritual beliefs. In the Cao Dai Great Temple, we participated in the daily prayer session from the upper balcony of the temple. The temple was quite beautiful, and the floor plan was a little like a mosque – it was open, with pillars supporting the roof, but rectangular in shape.

We returned to the hotel around 3 p.m. Our guide told us he would not be taking us to the airport the next day, and we would be picked up a 4:30 p.m., which would be fine, except we had to be out of the hotel at 2 p.m. He said there was nothing they would or could do. We left not on good terms. I asked the hotel for the extra two hours, but they wouldn't do it. They said we could pay for the room until 6 p.m. (\$84). It seemed to make sense to just pay and not sit in the lobby for three hours.

I was getting a little tired of Asian food, so we walked next door to the Now Zone Mall, and we had some ice cream. We took a short walk around the hotel area, but it was too warm. We checked out the pool area and that at 10:30 a.m. the next day for our flight to Sandakan on Borneo (Malaysia). We were looking forward to four nights in Borneo before flying to Taiwan.

After breakfast on May 1, we took our time and did a little packing and then sat by the pool until 2 p.m. We left the hotel about 4:15 p.m. and, with no traffic, we were at the airport and checked in a little after 5 p.m. We used the \$5-per-hour airport lounge until our flight was called. While we waited for the plane, Evelyn's stomach became upset.

Our Malaysia Air flight was about 45 minutes late in departing HCMC. We made up some of the time and landed only 20 minutes late. After the normal entrance processing, we found our driver and drove one hour to the Shangri-La Hotel in downtown Kuala Lumpur. Now, why our travel agent couldn't have booked an airport hotel I don't understand, as we had just five hours' sleep before we had to get up and go back to the airport at 7:30 a.m. the next day. The hotel was nice – what little we saw of it – but the breakfast buffet was the best yet.



GOUT AVOIDANCE "What can I eat if I have gout?"

– LACERS Member, Orange County

▼out, once touted as the "disease of Gkings," occurs when high levels of uric acid in the blood cause crystals to form and accumulate around a joint. A painful form of arthritis, gout was often suffered by those who overindulged in a "rich man's diet": fatty red meats, seafood and alcohol, and the excess weight that followed. Today, we know that purine, a naturally occurring substance that breaks down to uric acid in the body, is the true culprit behind gout flare-ups. Therefore, eating (and perhaps living) like a "pauper" may be better than it sounds for both health and longevity.

Consider these familiar recommendations, in relation to gout management:

Weight loss. Being overweight increases the risk of developing gout and puts excessive pressure on the joints. Losing weight has been shown to lower uric acid levels, but care should be made to avoid fad, low-carbohydrate diets, which may increase ketones, a precursor to uric acid. A moderate decrease in overall calories (especially fats and sugars) and an increase in activity is a better, longlasting approach.

Protein. Many protein-rich foods are also high in purines, so it's important to choose healthier versions (including low-fat or lean varieties), and be mindful of portion sizes. Animal products (sweetbreads, liver, kidneys, meat extracts), seafood (anchovies, sardines, herring, mackerel and scallops), and beer

(from the yeast) contain moderate to high levels of purines and should be avoided. Good alternatives are low-fat dairy (yogurt, skim milk), lean poultry, and vegetarian protein sources (beans, lentils).

Fruits and Vegetables. A diet rich in unprocessed fruits and vegetables has, for centuries, been the healthiest of options. And while some vegetables including asparagus, spinach, peas, cauliflower or mushrooms contain higher amounts of purines, studies show that they do not significantly contribute to the uric acid levels in the blood. Similarly, beans and lentils, which contain moderate amounts of purines, are a safe, alternative source of protein.

Water. An increase in water consumption has been linked to fewer gout attacks, and staying hydrated with plain water can help with weight loss, headaches, fatigue and more. Aim for eight to 16 glasses of fluids a day.

A healthy lifestyle will not cure gout, but it can make significant improvements in the frequency and duration of symptoms. Talk to your doctor to see if medication therapy is right for you.

Getting Lean With Protein What is Protein?

Protein is one of three macronutrients that the body needs to survive and thrive. Although macronutrients (protein, carbohydrate, and fat) provide calories, their behind-the-scenes role is much more complex. Proteins, made up of amino acids, act as building blocks for bones, muscles, cartilage, skin and blood. They regulate hormones, provide vitamins and minerals, and boost the immune system.

How much protein is recommended daily?

Lean Protein Is the Key

Most Americans eat an adequate amount of protein, but would benefit from leaner, less processed versions of their favorite foods, and choosing plant-based options. The Recommended Daily Allowance for protein is 56 grams a day for adult men and 46 grams a day for adult women. To put in this in perspective, here are some common protein-rich foods:

How to **Choose Lean Proteins**

Choose lean or low-fat meat and poultry (eight percent or less fat).

Select some seafood that is rich in omega-3 fatty acids, such as salmon, trout, sardines, anchovies, herring, Pacific oysters and Atlantic and Pacific mackerel.

Processed meats including ham, sausage, frankfurters and luncheon or deli meats have added sodium. Check the "Nutrition Facts" label to help

contain protein, including meat, poultry, seafood, dairy and eggs, but plant-based foods including soy products, nuts, and seeds are also good sources of this nutrient. Additionally, protein-containing foods provide what's often coined the "energy" or B vitamins (niacin, thiamin, riboflavin, and B6), vitamin E, iron, zinc and magnesium.

Since each source of protein has a unique nutrient profile, selecting a variety of these foods can improve the quality of one's diet and overall health.

Because nuts and seeds are high in calories, eat them in small portions and use them to replace other protein foods, like some meat or poultry, rather than adding them to what you already eat. In addition, choose unsalted nuts and seeds to help reduce sodium intake.

Some protein-rich food are naturally high in saturated fat and/or processed with arteryclogging trans-fats. These include fatty cuts of beef, pork and lamb; regular (75 percent to 85 percent lean) ground beef; regular sausages, hot dogs, and bacon; some luncheon meats, including regular bologna and salami; some poultry, including duck; and egg yolks. To help keep blood cholesterol levels healthy, limit the amount of these foods you eat.

An Honor From the President

LAPD Training Officer Don Thompson gets award from President Obama.

The accolades keep coming for LAPD Training Officer III Don Thompson for his heroic actions on Christmas Day 2013. And now he's been honored by President Obama.

As *Alive!* chronicled two years ago, Training Officer Thompson was driving to work at LAX southbound on the 405 in West LA on Christmas Day when he saw a northbound vehicle hit the median guard rail and exploded into flames.

Training Officer Thompson parked in the carpool lane, jumped out of his vehicle, jumped over the guard rail and rescued the unconscious driver just before the car was engulfed in flames. The passenger survived, and Officer Thompson was burned in the action.

For his heroism, Training Officer Don Thompson received the LAPD's Medal of Valor in 2014, and now he's received an honor with the same name – the Medal of Valor – from President Barack Obama.

Training Officer Thompson received his medal personally from the president in a ceremony May 16 in the White House. He



was one of 13 – including three others from Southern California – to receive the honor.


The Medal of Valor from the president is awarded to public safety officers who have "exhibited exceptional courage, regardless of personal safety, in the attempt to save or protect others from harm," according to the White House. It is the nation's highest honor for police.

"People have said, 'You know, you're a hero,'" Training Officer Thompson told *Alive!* at the time. "But in my heart, I don't feel that I'm a hero. I did something good. I protected someone. Yes, I put my life in jeopardy, but just helping someone – everyone should do that. Everyone's okay, so I'm happy.

"Everyone should be more selfless," he believes. "It seems that people are becoming a bit more selfish, caring about what they can get for themselves, as opposed to doing what's best for people in general. I totally respect people for being selfless."

This month we take you to Pacific Palisades. I wanted to find a hike that had a little more than just the beautiful landscapes to appreciate, so this month we take a trail known not for its beautiful views but for the history of the area.

Let's begin!

History: It's quite a story. This area was purchased by Winona and Norman Stephens, who reportedly believed that when Germany won World War II, this would be a great place to live and begin a new life. But of course that did not happen; Germany did not win the war, and the area was taken by the U.S. government. The Stephenses were taken into custody. However, during that time, more than \$4 million was spent on building structures, some of which are still standing today, including the gate, which was reportedly designed by famed L.A. architect Paul R. Williams.

This past February, Rec and Parks began dismantling many of the buildings, which were havens for taggers and others who were up to no good. The area, managed by the City of L.A., is back open. The Hike: The hike is fairly easy, and some of the structures are still standing, but in reality most are just shells of the actual buildings. The structures that were built were a power station, a machine shed, a fully irrigated hillside for growing food, raised gardens, a massive water tank and also a place to store diesel fuel. The stairs that most people walk now were also built so that other people who lived and farmed in the area could connect with each other and also patrol the area.

The hike area is changing; I took the opportunity to take the hike before the structures were gone. If you get the chance, take the hike and enjoy the views of a slice of Southern California with an interesting past. The area is quite beautiful. I recommend you visit that area to see it for yourself. And if you decide to explore what's left of the buildings, then please be careful.

The FBI National Academy is a professional course of study for U.S. and international law enforcement leaders that



roken landing gear ... flat tires ... fuel spills ... onboard or crash P fires ... fuselage damage in flight – these and other similar situations are the kinds of sticky emergencies that Fire Station 80 at LAX is ready to deal with.

Staffed and ready 24/7, this Fire Station, unique in the City in that it's owned by Airports and funded mostly by the federal government, receives about one emergency call per day. But those situations are very unique, so the LAFD personnel assigned to Crash 80 are not newbies - they have more experience in the field than just about any other LAFD Fire Station. And of course they're trained for the kinds of one-of-a-kind emergencies that only one of the world's largest airports will experience.

Mines Field, the forerunner of LAX, opened in 1928, and the LAFD began its presence at the airfield in 1941. The current ARFF Fire Station 80 - Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting - is the fifth Station 80 facility at the airport, and is one of the best in the world.

Here, catch a glimpse of the men at Fire Station 80, and see how they go about keeping LAX safe and sound. ■

We don't go on any other responses outside the airport unless there is an airplane crash in and around the general area - Santa Monica, West L.A., and maybe closer down to the Harbor area. We would

Great, thanks for hosting us. We'd like to start with this: What's your career path been here at the LAFD?


Capt. William Wick: Well let's see -I spent my first five years as a Firefighter. In that time I was also a Paramedic. Then I was promoted to Engineer with six years on the job. I drove a fire apparatus for six years, then made Captain. I've Been a Captain since 1998, a Captain I and Captain II. I served a couple terms of what we call Special Duty, or Administration - one as a Training Officer and one as a Public Information Officer. I've been assigned to the Harbor, South Central Los Angeles, mostly Downtown,

a little stint in the Valley, and for the past seven years here at Fire Station 80 at LAX.

Okay, got it. Mike?

Capt. Mike Tombrello: I was a Fireman for four years and was promoted to Engineer. In 1999 I was promoted to Captain I. I've been mostly in South Central L.A., and spent a lot of time

Got it. You gave us a lot of great information during our tour of Fire Station 80, but let's

start there - give us a brief overview of what Fire Station 80 is all about, what it's tasked to do and how it goes about that.

Capt. William Wick: We're just one station out of 105 Fire Stations in the LAFD. Our sole responsibil-

respond one apparatus. However, 99 percent of our responses obviously are in the airport area, the AOA – the Airport Operating Area. We are responsible for talking with the pilot, being advised by him or her on what they need. Obviously if there's a crash, we're responsible for, number one, extinguishing the fire; number two, evacuating the people. If there's no fire, number one is evacuation - securing the airplane so that we can enter so that we can evacuate people, getting people to what's called a triage area so we can treat them and start taking them to the hospital in the quickest, most expedient manner.

You don't do medical emergencies? That's the task of other Fire Stations?

Capt. William Wick: Most Firefighters here have a minimum of 20 years' experience in the field. All of them are EMTs and some of them are paramedics; if we do have an emergency, if we have an evacuation, once we get the people off the airplane, the airplane is secured and obviously it's not on fire, then we would have the responsibility of treating patients. But not normally do we respond to medical emergencies. We have other Fire Stations in and around this area that do that for us.

Which Fire Stations?

Capt. William Wick: There are basically four Fire stations that cover LAX. Fire Station 80 – us – is for ARFF, Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting. Fire Station 51 mainly is for emergency medicals, though they're a fire suppression company, also; 95 is for general fires, general emergencies, and it has a specialized Hazmat taskforce; and then Fire Station 5 is a general fire company with Urban Search and Rescue. We've got the entire gambit specifically placed in this general area for the airport for those specific needs.

What's a typical day like here at Fire Station 80?

Capt. William Wick: Your turn.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: We get in about 5:30 in the morning. We talk to the person we are relieving and exchange any pertinent information, anything that happened to the rig, any incidents that we had, equipment used, things like that. At about 7:30 a.m. we'll have a lineup with the Captains. We'll do the timekeeping. We'll go through any new information that comes through our portal and anything else that we've gotmemos from the chief, emails and pertinent information that needs to be passed on dealing with the daily operations of not only Fire Station 80 but of the department itself.

We'll try to get in at least one drill a day, dealing with either aircraft familiarization, airport familiarization, emergency operations, communications, something along that sort. The FAA mandates so many training hours per year and they audit our books, too. Training is something that we have to really keep track of; that's a real biggie. And the crew will exercise after that, and then the cook will go out shopping. We'll do general housework and apparatus maintenance throughout the day. That's basically it for the day, while we wait for a call to come in.

When a Call Comes In

Talk about the red phones and what happens when a call comes in. Where does it come in from, and then what happens?

Capt. Mike Tombrello: If an airplane's in distress, the pilot notifies the control tower. The tower notifies us via that red phone. They call it the crash phone.

the estimated time of arrival. Once I get that, I will let Metro Dispatch – OCD – know what kind of assignment do we want. I'll usually make it a full assignment, which assigns everybody in the battalion to that certain runway. We all go to our assigned staging places, and everybody basically gets put into play. We just wait for the plane to come down, and 90 percent of the time they come down without incident.

Right. You average about one incident a day? Capt. William Wick: That's about right.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: And then fuel spills, too.

Got it. You then relay that information to Captain II?

Capt. Mike Tombrello: Yes, I'll relay it to the Captain II, the ARFF Commander, and everybody else is going to be listening on that tactical channel. Everybody on that assignment is going to be hearing the same size-up I'm giving them, so now they have an idea of what's coming in, and what to expect.

Right. And then Captain II establishes a discrete channel connection with the pilot.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: Yes, where he can talk directly to the pilot and he can talk to the tower, too. He does mostly all of the talking when it comes to the tower and the pilot itself.

Right, got it. And then you have a mandate to get to the site in three minutes or fewer?

Capt. William Wick: To the farthest runway. The mandate by the FAA is to get from midfield to the farthest runway.

That dictates the speed of your vehicle and all sorts of different things, I would imagine.

Capt. William Wick: Response time depends on how fast the communication comes to us, how fast the crew gets to the rig, how fast they put on their PPEs – personal protective equipment– how fast they get on the apparatus, how fast they start it, how fast they drive it, what means and routes that they use as far as the fastest, most expedient, and so on. That sometimes changes based on the time of day and how many airplanes there are. The big one is if the air traffic controller

has given us allowance to use the runways as access. That doesn't normally happen. However, that's the plan. If there's a major emergency, an Alert 3, and an airplane has crashed, it's the traffic controllers, under letter of agreement with us, that they're going to try to close that entire complex, that side of the airport, so that all the planes have to stop and we now get use of any taxiway or runway. Even we have to ask permission to get onto the runways discreetly through the airport traffic controller before we cross

Really?

Capt. William Wick: Yes, they're gigantic.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: That's a big airport. It takes you about a half hour just to get to your other satellite fire station.

Capt. William Wick: Denver's kind of the same way, too. They're all over the place. They're huge.

Those are relatively new airports, and so they have a lot more room and space.

Capt. William Wick: Right.

This Fire Station 80 is a relatively new facility.

Capt. William Wick: Right. It was 2010 is when we got it. LAWA put billions of dollars in the new Tom Bradley International Terminal. The old Fire Station 80 was in the way of the new taxiway that shuttles those new aircraft, the Airbus 380. They didn't have a turning radius in front of our Fire Station, so they needed another area to put us. They came to us and asked, "Where's the best place?" and this is the best-centered place that we can meet that time criteria to respond from.

I see. It has a lot to do with that mandates.

Capt. William Wick: Everything is based on that mandate.

Unique

What do you do here that's unique and different than any other Fire Station in the LAFD?

Capt. William Wick: Good question. What we don't do is what is unique. Ninety-nine percent of the Fire Stations in L.A., other than our helicopter pilots and our boats, is responsible for just about everything – Hazmat, brush fires, EMS obviously, fire prevention, rookies, and so forth. We only deal with aircraft.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: Aircraft.

Capt. William Wick: If the building's on fire or someone's having a heart attack, we call 911. We are mandated by the FAA to deal only with aircraft and be available 24 hours, so we can't get caught up in everything else.

We have what's called an ARFF certification – you cannot work at this station without an ARFF– Aircraft Rescue Firefighting certification, a state and federal mandate. That incorporates knowing what blue and green lights are, taxiways, runways, aircraft familiarization, communications and everything that goes about doing the job that we do. There are probably fewer than 70 people out of the 3,200 on the LAFD who are Aircraft Rescue Firefighting certified. There aren't many people who can actually work here, but we can work everywhere else.

What about Hawthorne Airport, Torrance, Santa Monica or even Long Beach? Do you cover other surrounding airports?

Capt. William Wick: The smaller airports aren't mandated by FAA to have any fire protection. They're normally controlled by the surrounding municipality. Hawthorne has Hawthorne Fire Dept. and now L.A. County. Torrance has Torrance Fire Dept. They don't have any particular rescue service, other than Long Beach. They do have ARFF apparatus like us, but they're not mandated like us. It's a much smaller airport.

What does it take to get the ARFF certification?

Capt. William Wick: There are ten categories that are mandated by the FAA. It's basic aircraft familiarization and airport familiarization, communications, safety, tools and equipment, extinguishing agents, evacuation, cargo and a couple others. They want to ensure that, above and beyond, a regular firefighter who extinguishes a Class A-type fire knows the differences that an airplane presents. It's the construction of it, the type of fuels, the capacities with the tens of thousands of gallons of Jet-A fuel; the electronic systems; how to get into the airplanes; how to deactivate/activate doors; fuel systems and so forth within the particular airplanes; and how to drive around this airport in a safe, expedient manner as far as the taxiways, runways, night and day. Communications is a big deal. They talk a different language than we do. When I talk on one radio I talk one way. I talk plain English. But when I talk on the airport radio, I talk technically, the way that they use it- Alpha, Bravo, Charlie, and so forth, and Wilco. Firefighters don't use any of those terms.

The crash phone.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: Right. And that's a direct line. A couple other stations in the battalion have that red phone, so they can listen, too, if they want. But I'm in charge of picking up the phone and talking to the air traffic controller with the pertinent information. It will be either an Alert 2 or Alert 3 ...

...meaning ...

Capt. Mike Tombrello: That there's something wrong. Basically a plane's in the air, and there's an in-flight emergency of some sort. He might be having a hydraulic problem. It might be a flap problem, something along those lines that he's trying to rectify. If it's an Alert 3, it's usually something that's imminent; it's going to crash or it is happening right then, which requires a whole different dispatch. So I'm getting that information and I basically will make that decision on the information that they're giving me.

And you write it down on that clipboard, that sheet.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: Yes, exactly. The controller will tell me what runway they have cleared for the plane. He'll let me know the airline, flight number, amount of fuel, the type of plane coming in, the amount of people onboard, and again, stopped all his aircraft from coming in, then he can give us permission to drive on the runway. We can't do that until he tells us to do that. That's the plan so that we don't have to drive in and around this whole airport just to get to a crash.

Big Operation

Is this the biggest fire station in the City, and maybe the biggest at an airport in the United States?

Capt. William Wick: Not quite. Fire Station 27 is big.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: 21 is big. It's about the same size, if not bigger.

Capt. William Wick: But it's one of the largest, if not the largest, Fire Station, based on square footage and manpower. 16 people per shift.

And I would say we're probably third as far as Aircraft Rescue Firefighting. We compare with Dallas, O'Hare and Atlanta Hartsfield as far as the size of our Fire Stations, the amount of apparatus we bring and the amount of people. The only place that brings more people to an aircraft emergency is Dallas. They're a bigger airport. They have eight fire stations surrounding their airport.

So one way is "plain speak," and the other is "plane speak."

Capt. William Wick: Right, right.

About **Fire Station 80**

The current Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting (ARFF) facility at LAX, Fire Station 80, opened Nov. 22, 2010. The \$13.5 million facility was paid for mostly by the Federal Aviation Administration (through passenger fare fees and the Federal Stimulus Act) and airport revenue bonds. Fire Station 80, owned by Airports, was built as a replacement for an earlier 25-year-old facility. There has been an LAFD facility at the airport since 1941.

The 13-month construction project, which began September 2009, was completed under budget.

With approximately 28,000 square feet of space on two floors, ARFF Crash 80 is double the size of the previous one and includes seven bays to house and maintain all the station's rescue and firefighting vehicles and other large emergency-response equipment, including mass casualty decontamination units, of which some had been previously stored outdoors in a coastal environment. There is also ample living, administrative and training areas for 16 firefighters assigned to each 24-hour shift. One of the bays has a hydraulic lift capable of raising 100,000-pound firefighting apparatus so that maintenance can be performed more quickly on-site rather than at the LAFD's maintenance facility in downtown Los Angeles. The footprint of the former Station 80 fits inside the floor of the fire apparatus bays of the new facility.


The ARFF Station 80 is located midway between LAX's north and south airfield complexes with a total four runways and 2,400 feet further west of the passenger terminal area than the former station. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require at least one ARFF apparatus capable of arriving at the midpoint of the furthest runway within three minutes.

sion to respond to the scene of any aircraft emergency at LAX. During the past 70 years, Station 80 firefighters moved into two other facilities while their responsibilities grew to include responding to fuel spills, aircraft fires, airborne medical emergencies, radiological and hazardous materials incidents, evacuation assistance, terrorist activity such as bomb threats and hijackings, and standbys for high-level national and foreign dignitary arrivals.

Other LAX Fire Stations RFF Station 80 is one of three LAFD stations located on airport property. Station 51 is also located on the

was built in 1994 at a cost of \$4 million. Firefighters train at this facility to maintain their annual certifications in aircraft rescue and firefighting with the goal of increasing passenger survivability during aircraft incidents. In 2009, Station 80 personnel responded to 825 calls and 182 incidents at LAX.

Crash 80 Personnel

Dersonnel who staff Station 80 are recognized as among the finest aircraft rescue and firefighting specialists in the country and are well respected in the aircraft firefighting community. Along with the FAA, Station 80 plays an integral part in developing standard operating guidelines when using ARFF apparatus and more specifically, High Reach Extendible Turrets and Forcible Entry Procedures. These skill sets are considered invaluable while conducting lifesaving operations during aircraft incidents.

ire Station 80 has provided fire protection to LAX since October 16, 1941. The original station was a five-room bungalow. A pumper with a 60-gallon chemical tank (containing

sulfuric acid and baking soda) was assigned to the fire station. In 1943, a crash wagon was assigned to Fire Station 80.

The live fire training facility at the southwest corner of LAX is used sparingly.



Bringing the Fight to the Fire

he stars of LAFD Fire Station Crash 80 – other than the personnel - are six new Aircraft Rescue Firefighting (ARFF) apparatuses. The new apparatuses, which cost \$5.7 million total, give the on-airfield ARFF Station 80 additional capacity for carrying water and other firefighting agents, and provide redundancy so firefighters can cover two emergencies simultaneously. The six new apparatuses replace the airport's existing four, three of which are being reassigned to LAX's sister airports at Van Nuys and LA/Ontario International, and the fourth remaining at LAX as backup. The new

ARFF apparatuses far exceed the FAA requirements for fire protection at a large commercial airport. These cutting-edge ARFF fire

trucks will enable the LAFD to better serve the traveling public and support the airport's operations mission of providing the traveling public with a safe and efficient airport, and to proudly

serve our passengers by engaging in a high level of customer service and ongoing enforcement of Federal Aviation Administration regulations with regards to safety," said LAFD Chief Ralph Terrazas.

The new apparatus are 2015 Panthers manufactured by Rosenbauer America in Montana, Minn. Each six-wheel-drive (6X6) vehicle features a state-of-the-art, 54-foot-long, high-reach extendable turret equipped with a spray nozzle and a piercing nozzle. The spray tip is capable of dispensing

Fire Station 80 was originally located on the south side of the airport but was moved to a more central location to better cover the center of the south runways. On May 29, 1956, a new Fire Station 80 was dedicated and was located at 10435 S. Sepulveda Blvd. Ten years later, Eighties North, a substation located at the intersection of "Taxiway Sierra" (a plane taxi-way) and "Service Road Echo" (a vehicle service road) was activated for rapid response to the north runways.

A third Fire Station 80 was opened in May 1985 just west of the terminal complex. The fourth (and current) Fire Station 80 opened in 2010.

Three other Fire Stations operate at the airport – Fire Station 51 includes a paramedic team; Station 95 includes a hazardous materials task force; and there is a live fire training facility at the southwest corner of LAX.

A Station

Fire Station 80 is a big facility with an important mission – assisting aircraft at LAX that are in trouble. Here's how the Firefighters at Crash 80 accomplish their mission.

Captain's Office

Although communications equipment exists throughout Fire Station 80, the main desk and observation area – mandated by the FAA – are on the station's second floor. Here, Captains I and II can directly observe the activities at LAX, and can respond to emergency calls.

The binoculars are especially important, as pilots who need visual confirmation of potential problems (landing gear malfunction, blown tire, etc.) can perform a low fly-by, and the Captains on duty can take a visual reading of the situation and report directly to the pilot.

The Crash Phone

This phone connects directly to the LAX Control Tower, and other Fire Stations in the Battalion can monitor these direct communications. At left: Capt. I Mike Tombrello at the Crash Phone. If he were to pick it up, it would ring immediately in the LAX Air Traffic Control center.



At left: The "Blue Line" slim line phone (left of the red Crash Phone) rings when there's an aircraft emergency over or in the ocean; this phone connects to various first responder units, including the U.S. Coast Guard, L.A. County Lifeguards, the LAPD, and others.

Binoculars are helpful when aircraft, sensing a landing gear problem, perform a flyby; FS 80 Firefighters can provide a visual check.



At Times, Exciting

What's the most exciting part about working in a Fire Station at a major international airport?

Capt. Mike Tombrello: There's always something happening, and the potential that something that can happen. You're always anticipating and waiting. You're hoping it doesn't come, but to me that's what's exciting. There's always movement, 24/7. If you work at a regular Fire Station, it calms down and you sleep at night, but here, there's always something happening.

Capt. William Wick: They use the term sometimes about being assigned here - "the Hall of Fame" - when you get here, you come to the Hall of Fame, because no one comes here with one, two, five, 10 or even 20 years of experience. Everybody comes here with 25-plus years of service.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: That's self-proclaimed!

Capt. William Wick: Right, there you go - it takes a tremendous amount of time to get here. You work through the LAFD for 20 or 25 years and you work hard. You have worked at very busy stations, in brush areas and downtown and Skid Row. You've been to a lot of fires, you've seen a lot of dead people at car accidents and fires and so forth, and you've done CPR a hundred times. and now you're required to learn this ARFF training. But you know that if, for whatever reason, you do have that big crash, that you're more experienced than anybody else that's going to do it on our job, because you've done it, just in a different way. We've been to boat fires, we've been to train wrecks and things like that, and we're going to use all that experience that we have. Mike and I were both on the Chatsworth and the Glendale train crashes and the high-rise



fire downtown. Our members are very seasoned and experienced, which makes them exceptionally prepared for an aircraft crash that can be very dangerous and complicated to sort through and manage. If you do get that once-in-a-lifetime airplane crash, it's going to be us with our experience that's going to be able to handle it, rather than that five-year guy who may not have that same experience

We've been to those fires, with the people screaming and jumping out of buildings, and the coordination that it takes at those train wrecks, and it's our goal to bring hundreds and hundreds of years of experience to that particular incident.

That's why we self-proclaim ourselves as the Hall of Fame because we are confident that the

How is that make it different?

Capt. William Wick: We serve three masters here. Normally, on the streets, we serve one master, the Fire Dept., and we do everything based upon the command-and-control of the LAFD. Here, we're in somebody else's property under somebody else's rule. Our three masters there's the FAA, number one, because ultimately they're responsible; number two is LAWA; and then number three is the Fire Dept. We always get there first, and it's our responsibility to deal with the incident before everybody else gets out there. And then the surrounding companies come, and then our chief officers. We are always responsible, the entire time, for the airplane and the passengers.

A Passion

What do you love about your job? Capt. William Wick: Sleep!

We've been able to use everything that we've acquired through our other adventures and administration. We're responsible for fire protection, which we've been doing our entire life. We're in charge of training our members, which we've been doing as officers. We've been able to learn a completely different mindset. For me it was in some ways a large weight lifted off my back, and then a large weight placed upon my back.

We feel proud about doing it the way we do, because the LAFD is a very outstanding organization. We hope on game day we'll bring all that together.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: I like the people I work with. I love it. It's a good group of guys, and the camaraderie and the friendships you build throughout the years are good.

Did you request this service? Did either one of you like aviation before you came here?

Capt. William Wick: Yes. I did.

Capt. Mike Tombrello: I had always wanted to fly. I never did do it, but there's still time, I guess.

There's always that interest in aviation. How do these big things get in the air? It's crazy. And then how do they land them? That's always just amazed and intrigued me. It's good to just actually be a part of it in this way.

You have a fantastic patio. I know it's loud. Do you ever sit out there and just watch planes, or are you way over that now?

- Capt. Mike Tombrello: Oh yeah. I do.
- Capt. William Wick: Sure, we still do it.
- Capt. Mike Tombrello: Still do it.

Capt. William Wick: We're looking forward to more planes coming through here, to tell you the truth.





Time for the Open Houses!

Three of Sanitation's incredibly popular open houses are scheduled through June 25.

You can "Discover Recycling" at the 2016 Sanitation Open Houses.

Three of Sanitation's six waste shed district yards are scheduled to have open houses this month in a series of free Saturday events. (The other three yards' open houses have already occurred.)

The Open House program showcases Sanitation's residential curbside collection programs with the promotion of proper recycling practices and information about bulky item collections. Each event will feature trash truck and equipment demonstrations in addition to facility tours, information booths, recycling games, and refreshments. post made from residential yard trimmings, and learn about "closed loop" recycling. More than 2,200 vegetable plants were potted and given away to residents in 2014. Sanitation will

also partner with "City Plants" to provide 50 fruit and 50 shade trees for adoption by City residents, on a first-come-served basis at each yard, while supplies last. (City residents must present valid identification with their city address or a current DWP bill to adopt a tree. Note: The limit is one tree per property address.) Used tires from City residents will also be collected, which is provided by a grant from CalRecycle. (City residents must present valid identification and a current DWP bill to drop off used tires. Note: A maximum of nine passenger and/or light truck tires will be accepted, but tires on rims and used tires from businesses will not be accepted.)

In 2014, nearly 7,000 residents attended the open houses with 290 City Employees who volunteered their time to give back to the neighborhoods they serve.

Sanitation's Lopez Canyon Environmental Center will host an activity booth about the City's green bin recycling program and give away small vegetable plants. Visitors will plant saplings to take home, use mulch and com-

In 2003, Sanitation launched its first open house at the West Los Angeles district yard. The goal of the program was to reconnect the refuse collection truck operators, on a volunprogram removed the need

for Sanitation collection operators to exit their trucks and manually lift and empty residential trashcans. In the following years, the program grew to promote recycling and proper disposal practices as well as to improve access to L.A. Sanitation services. The program expanded in 2005 to add the East Valley, West Valley, North Central, and South Los Angeles district yards. In 2006, the Harbor district yard was added to provide Citywide coverage.

Residents attending the open houses have grown from approximately 200 visitors in

2003 to nearly 7,000 in 2014. The popularity of the events can be traced to City and Sanitation leaders as well as City Employees who volunteered their time to transform the six yards into fun learning centers. By combining solid waste, wastewater to clean water and recycling education with refreshments, music and games, Sanitation provides the opportunities and partnerships that supports a more livable and sustainable city.

Figueroa Plaza Restoration

On Dec. 8, 2014, the 221 Figueroa Tower, a Cityowned building, suffered major damage caused by the Da Vinci Apartment building fire. The heat of the fire shattered more than 300 windows with shards of glass blanketing the area below, and melted window shades, computers, desks, filing cabinets, chairs and other equipment, causing more than \$80 million in property damage. The emergency sprinklers went off, causing substantial damage to office furniture and other building contents and flooding the garage areas. Six City departments had to be moved to temporary locations with hundreds of City employees displaced. In an extraordinary show of teamwork within General Services, among other City agencies and with the private sector, the 221 Figueroa Tower was completely restored for occupancy in less than a year. The building reopened and former tenants returned to their newly rebuilt offices. Today, work continues on the re-stack of both towers and with new City tenants moving back in from leased locations.

Hollyhock House Restoration

Hollyhock House is Frank Lloyd Wright's first Los Angeles project. Built between 1919 and 1921, it represents his earliest efforts to develop a regionally appropriate style of architecture for Southern California. Wright himself referred to it as California Romanza, using a musical term meaning "freedom to make one's own form." Taking advantage of Los Angeles' dry, temperate climate, Hollyhock House is a remarkable combination of house and gardens. In addition to the central garden court, each major interior space adjoins an equivalent exterior space, connected either by glass doors, a porch, pergola or colonnade. A series of rooftop terraces further extends the living space and provides magnificent views of the Los Angeles basin and the Hollywood Hills.

The Hollyhock House Phase III project team was comprised of Project Restore (grants administrator and restoration manager), Public Works/Engineering (architect and project manager), Cultural Affairs (curator and operator), and General Services (general contractor). The project included the restoration of the garage, chauffeur quarters, entry loggia, main entry, dining room, living room entry, north and south hallways, music room, reading alcove, library, pergola, sun room and balcony, terrace retaining wall, interior plaster, exterior stucco, two reflecting pools, and the courtyard landscape.

The Hollyhock House project involved almost every trade/shop – carpenters, plasterers, masonry, HVAC, sheet metal, plumbing, electrical, roofing, cabinet makers, painters, cement finishers, etc.

The Hollyhock House is a local historic landmark, national historic landmark, and has been nominated a World Heritage Site by the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).

Buzzed Driving Is Still Impaired

n California and every other U.S. state, the legal limit to drive after drinking is a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 percent. That limit is set by individual states, and it took 21 years for all states to lower the legal alcohol concentration to the current limit. Now, safety experts are questioning whether .08 is low enough.

One recent study found that drivers who were "minimally buzzed" or "buzzed" were often to blame for fatal accidents. The term "minimally buzzed" includes drivers who had a BAC of .01, which is well within the legal limit. Researchers examined more than 570,000 fatal accidents between 1994 and 2011. The results: Drinking and driving with any alcohol in the body is dangerous and leads to more severe accidents.

The study focused on drivers with a BAC between .01 and .07 percent. The results showed that drivers with a BAC of .01 percent are 46 percent more likely to be blamed for car crashes than the other drivers involved in the collisions. The higher the BAC, the more often the drivers are blamed.

The lead author of the study, a sociologist at UC San Diego, says the results show that no blood alcohol content is low enough to be safe for driving. He thinks the legal BAC in the United States should be lowered, based on the study results.

Federal Safety Board Recommends Lowering Legal Limit

The National Transportation Safety Board agrees with the lead author's position. A year ago in May – months before the study results were published - the federal agency recommended that states lower the legal BAC for driving. It suggests lowering the BAC to .05. According to the NTSB, at .05, some drivers have problems with depth perception. Cognitive abilities are impaired at .07. Changing the standard to .05 could save almost 1,000 lives a year, according to the agency.

In 2010, alcohol impairment was a factor in nearly a third of all traffic-related deaths in the United States, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. That's 10,228 people. In

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Arizona, state traffic statistics show there were 5,444 alcohol-related crashes in 2012, the most recent year for which data is available. Thirty-four percent of all traffic

fatalities in the state were alcohol-related.

Your Best Defense Against a **Drunk Driver Is to Buckle Up Every Time**

Every person in every seat should be buckled up on every trip. Seat belts reduce serious injuries and deaths from crashes by about 50 percent.

Primary enforcement seat belt laws allow police to stop vehicles just because someone is not wearing a seat belt. These state laws are effective in increasing seat belt use.

There are proven ways to prevent people from drinking and driving.

At sobriety checkpoints, police stop drivers to judge if they are driving under the influence of alcohol. More widespread, frequent use of these checkpoints could save about 1,500 to 3,000 lives on the road each year.



Minimum legal drinking age laws prohibit selling alcohol to people under age 21 in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Keeping and enforcing 21 as the minimum legal drinking age helps keep young, inexperienced drivers from drinking and driving.

Ignition interlocks prevent drivers who were convicted of alcohol-impaired driving from operating their vehicles if they have been drinking. Interlocks are effective in reducing re-arrest rates from drinking and driving by about two-thirds while the device is on the vehicle.
