

Rhino Bye-Bye

■ Zoo's Sumatran rhino to be relocated from LA Zoo to reinforce captive breeding program.

Z00 — Andalas, the first Sumatran rhinoceros born in captivity in more than 100 years, will leave his Los Angeles Zoo home of three years later this week to go to Indonesia. Andalas will become the first Sumatran rhino ever to be transported from the United States to Indonesia as part of an international breeding program. He will join two female rhinos at the Sumatran Rhino Sanctuary in the Way Kambas National Park on the Island of Sumatra.

"Andalas' journey to Indonesia is vital to the future of Sumatran rhinos," said Zoo Director John Lewis, "This breeding program is just one example of the extent zoos will go to in order to save a species from extinction."

Andalas (the original name of the Island of Sumatra) received great fanfare when he was born Sept. 13, 2001, to rhinos Emi and Ipuh at the Cincinnati Zoo. His birth marked the first time that a calf was born at a zoo since 1889 when a live birth was recorded at the Calcutta Zoo in India. His mother Emi, who had several unsuccessful pregnancies prior to having Andalas, has been on loan to the Cincinnati Zoo from the LA Zoo since 1995.

The Sumatran rhinos, which can weigh 1,300 to 1,800 pounds, are the smallest and hairiest of the rhino species. They have a reddish-brown coat covered sparsely with long hair. Considered the most endangered of all rhino species and one of the most endangered mammal species on earth, it is estimated that 70 percent of the Sumatran rhino population has been lost in the last two decades. The primary cause is poaching due to the demand for its horn that is believed to contain medicinal properties by some Asian cultures. Today, a population of less than 300 ani-

mals is thought to exist in isolated pockets of Malaysia and Indonesia.

The Los Angeles and Cincinnati Zoos are working closely with the International Rhino Foundation (IRF) to protect this species in its home range. The continued loss of animals in the wild, however, makes the success of the captive breeding program that much more important. This program was established as a collaborative effort among the Malaysians, Indonesians and Americans.

During his journey, Andalas will travel to Indonesia with Los Angles Zoo Chief Veterinarian Dr. Curtis Eng and his LA keeper Steve Romo. "I am extremely excited and privileged to be part of this historic event. This is a significant accomplishment in any conservation program. This is what we live for - helping conserve animals and contributing to programs that will sustain the species' population long term," said Zoo Veterinarian Dr. Curtis Eng.

Once in Indonesia, Veterinarian Robin W. Radcliffe of the Rhino Conservation Medicine Program, in partnership with Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine and the International Rhino Foundation, will oversee the health of Andalas and the other rhinos in their protected home in Sumatra.





Alive! Editor, Cover Guy Only *Look* Like Twins



■ Will LA Go Wireless?

Wi-Fi — Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa Feb. 13 declared "the start of Los Angeles version 2.0," announcing a plan to roll out what would be the largest municipal Wi-Fi network in the country.

Bidding for the project may begin as soon as this fall with a target of mid-late 2008 construction and early 2009 completion. It could cost up to \$60 million to cover Los Angeles' 470 square miles, City ITA Assistant General Manager Mark Wolf told the Los Angeles Times.

"On a practical level, this means providing integral, high-speed solution for entertainment companies to juggle simultaneous projects in real time at lower cost with reliable teleconferencing, for example," Villaraigosa said.

Two tiers were being discussed: a slower, free service, and a faster, fee-based service. Details are still being worked out at press time.

"With LA Wi-Fi, we are dedicating ourselves to the idea that universal access to technology makes our entire economy stronger," Villaraigosa said.

Councilman Tony Cardenas, who heads the City's information technology committee, said the Council has supported past efforts that included Wi-Fi hot spots at Pershing Square downtown and the Marvin Braude Center in Van Nuys.

Prepared for Severe Weather

This is the time of year when Californians are dealing with weather conditions that can change very rapidly.

This could endanger your safety at home as well as on the road. The following information may save you or someone in your family during an emergency.

- Never drive or wade across swift running water.
- Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths.
- Be aware of any high tide warning.
- Never turn your back to the ocean or any fast moving water.
- Never leave children unattended during periods of flooding or severe
- Never let children play or ride bikes near deep puddles or flood control
- If you see someone in the water, don't jump in. You could become the next
- Stay away from downed power lines and electrical wires.
- Call 9-1-1 to report all emergencies.

Have sandbags, hand tools, and plywood ready for use if you live in the canyons, hills, or areas that are either prone to flooding or has had a recent brush fire. In Los Angeles City, you can get sand and/or bags at your local fire station. If the weather forecast calls for a chance of flooding, make sure you listen to a radio or television station for updated information. Plan for bad weather before it arrives by having emergency supplies, such as flashlights, water, bedding, a radio, medical supplies, shovels, plastic, tape and gloves. Do not forget your pets. Have leashes, crates, food and identification for them. If told to evacuate, do not wait. Evacuate the area immediately.

Be sure your entire family knows where your emergency meeting place is. Make sure your fireplace is cleaned regularly and that it has a spark arrestor. Have a working smoke and carbon monoxide alarm. Check them at least once a month. If you have a hearing and/or vision impairment, make sure you have a special alarm. Check rain gutters regularly and keep them clear of tree branches and debris. Take photographs of important objects and documents for insurance purposes. During a power outages, have flashlights available. Never use candles. Never use a hibachi, barbeque, or cooking stove indoors for heating or cooking. Keep family and emergency telephone numbers available. Keep cell phones charged.

Crime Drops at LAX

LAX — The Law enforcement officials at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) reported Feb. 2 that overall crime in 2006 dropped 6.4 percent compared to 2005. This includes a 24 percent drop in property crime as passenger volume in 2006 of more than 61 million travelers was just under the 2005 level. The total number of crimes reported last year was 2,520, compared to 2,694 in 2005.

"LAX continues to be one of the safest airports in the world, and one of the safest areas in all of Southern California," said Los Angeles Airport Police Chief Brian A. Walker. He attributed the results to proactive crime prevention and joint law enforcement efforts, increased uniformed and plain-clothes officers and canines on patrol, crime trend analysis, and a comprehensive system of surveillance cameras.

Property crimes, which include non-violent theft from individuals, as well as burglaries from businesses and vehicles, decreased 24 percent to 973 incidents in 2006 from 1,273 in 2005. Theft from persons and petty and grand thefts dropped 20 percent to 850 incidents in 2006 from 1,068 in 2005. Burglaries from airport businesses rose to 17 incidents last year from six in 2005, and most of these were reports of random shoplifting. Vehicle burglaries (from locked cars) dropped 63 percent to 44 incidents last year from 118 in 2005. Theft from motor vehicles (from unlocked cars) dropped 34 percent to 46 incidents from 70 in 2005. Out of 14,007,612 vehicles parked last year in LAX's passenger terminal area parking structures and economy parking lots, 16 vehicles were reported stolen. This is compared to 11 stolen vehicles out of 14,502,409 parked at LAX in 2006.

"The majority of all property thefts at LAX were potentially preventable opportunity thefts, during which victims either did not pay attention to their belongings or surroundings, did not lock

doors or close windows after parking their vehicles, or left valuable items in plain view in parked vehicles," said Chief Walker. He added that officers conducted telephonic follow-up investigations from which 27 percent of property theft victims reported their property was found in other belongings, or returned by the airlines or Airport Police's Lost and Found Unit. Officers are continuing to contact property theft victims to determine whether more reports can be similarly cleared.

There were no homicides, rapes or kidnappings among the nine incidents of violent crime reported in 2006. This is compared to five incidents of violent crime in 2005, including the killing of an on-duty Airport Police officer. Aggravated assaults stayed the same at three incidents for 2006 and 2005. The number of reported robberies increased to six last year from one in 2005. However, according to Airport Police, there have been no robberies reported since last Nov. 4, when officers arrested three suspects who were about to commit a second robbery of a cashier's booth in an airport economy parking lot. In the airport environment, one arrest often leads to the resolution of several crimes. The number of arrests dropped seven percent to 1,206 last year from 1,299 in 2005.

Reports of vandalism to vehicles increased from 48 in 2005 to 59 incidents last year. An estimated 25,670,000 million vehicles used Central Terminal Area roadways last year.

The number of simple batteries dropped 22 percent to 50 incidents last year from 64 in 2005.

Miscellaneous "other" offenses, the largest single statistical category, increased nine percent to 1,429 incidents in 2006 from 1,304 in 2005. However, Airport Police attribute this increase to proactive law enforcement actions and new federal passenger and checked-luggage screening



measures. Miscellaneous offenses include doing business without a license, misusing a handicapped placard, loitering, disturbing the peace, forgery, driving without a license or with a suspended license, possession of prohibited items or weapon violations, being drunk in public, and violations of the City's solicitation ordinance that Airport Police began enforcing last November after a federal court injunction was lifted.

Proactive law enforcement actions by the Airport Police Ground Transportation Enforcement Unit, which regulates commercial vehicles within the Central Terminal Area, resulted in the arrests of several "bandit" drivers operating illegally at LAX and the impoundment of 268 vehicles throughout the year.

LAX experienced a 24 percent decrease in drug-related offenses, totaling 142 incidents last year compared to 186 in 2005. Chief Walker attributed much of this decrease to enhanced passenger security screening procedures implemented by the U.S. Transportation Security Administration, including requiring passengers to remove jackets and other outerwear and pat-

downs during secondary screening.

Also included in the miscellaneous category is the offense of attempting to carry a prohibited item (kitchen knife, fireworks, cigarette lighter, scissors, etc.) aboard an aircraft. The number of seized items decreased 56 percent to 101 incidents last year from 233 in 2005. Almost all of the 153 weapon confiscations (brass knuckles, butterfly knife, firearms, batons, nunchakus, etc) on airport property in 2006 occurred at federal passenger security screening stations. There were 147 weapons confiscated in 2005.

The crime statistics are compiled from reports filed by Los Angeles Airport Police and the Los Angeles Police Department substation at LAX. The statistics cover the 3,600 acres of LAX property, including passenger terminals, parking lots, aircraft ramps, cargo areas and offices.

More than 61,041,066 travelers used LAX in 2006, a decline of seven-tenths of one percent from 61,489,523 passengers in 2005. Including non-traveling visitors and airport workers, airport officials estimate the total population of the airport in 2006 at 153 million.



Club Raises Fees Modestly

Alive!: How does the raise in membership fees benefit Members?

Brian Trent: The Club will not have to reduce its level of customer service that Members have come to expect. For an active employee, the increase amounts to 3 percent a year over the last four years.

The Club is not trying to make money. The Club still doesn't make money on the sale of tickets

because we believe that Members deserve the lowest ticket price. 





New Service to Ontario, Palmdale

■ Two City airports see enhanced service partially to relieve pressures at LAX.

AIRPORTS — New service is coming to the City's inland airports to better serve residents in those areas, and to relieve congestion at LAX.

On Feb. 5, Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa announced the largest expansion of air service in the 84-year history of LA/Ontario International Airport (ONT) and the re-opening of LA/Palmdale Regional Airport (PMD) to commercial airline jet service this summer.

Houston-based ExpressJet, the nation's largest regional airline, and one of Fortune magazine's most admired airlines, has selected LA. Ontario as the focus city for a new airline it is launching this spring. ExpressJet will inaugurate

> 29 daily flights Ontario between April 2 and May 14, which will serve 14 new nonstop destinations.

The new service represents a 25 per-



cent increase in daily departures at LA Ontario and a 63 percent increase in the number of nonstop destinations available from Ontario. ExpressJet will become the 14th airline to serve the airport, which was named "Best Alternate Airport" in Southern California by Forbes.com. The facility served seven million passengers in 2006 and is forecast to serve 30 million by 2025.

"I am elated that ExpressJet chose LA/Ontario International as the hub for its West Coast flight operations," Villaraigosa said. "This action is the latest tangible evidence that the refocused aviation priorities and air service marketing efforts of my administration are working."

The ExpressJet Ontario operation is expected to create more than 600 direct jobs for the Southern California economy, including pilots, flight attendants, aircraft mechanics, ramp workers and passenger service personnel based at

Villaraigosa also announced that LA Palmdale will re-open with the start of new service by United Airlines June 7. United will provide regional jet service to San Francisco International Airport (SFO). The effort to initiate commercial service received a boost from a \$900.000 small community air service grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation, enabling the City of Palmdale to provide incentives for scheduled service at LA Palmdale. Under the small community program, Airports was also allowed to contribute an additional \$1 million to help support the start up period for United's service.

"Until now, LA Palmdale had been the Antelope Valley's field of dreams, but today's historic development means that jet service is about to become reality at Palmdale," Villaraigosa said.

"We are at long last achieving our goal to have dependable service by a well-known carrier that will attract large numbers of travelers to this high-potential airport and effectively serve the community's air travel needs," he added.

LA Ontario and LA Palmdale are owned and operated by Los Angeles World Airports. which also operates Los Angeles International (LAX) and Van Nuys (VNY) airports.

"The twin actions will jumpstart our aggressive growth plans for LA's regional airports and ensure that LAX will no longer have to carry the burden of meeting a greater-thannecessary share of region's demand for air service," Villaraigosa

"This is a great step in the right direction," said Councilman Bill Rosendahl, whose district includes LAX. "If we are to meet Southern




California's air travel needs, we must expand service within airports that are located throughout the region. These airports have the potential to serve as major hubs for our traveling public."



Officers Save a Life

AIRPORTS — Four Los Angeles Airport Police officers were recognized for their heroic actions in saving the life of a female traveler at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) this January.

On Jan. 5, at approximately 6:15 a.m., Los Angeles Airport Police Officers Marlon Coronado, Gina Luttenegger, Charles Pierce and Brian G. Davis immediately responded to an emergency radio call of an unconscious woman on the sidewalk at Terminal 6. The officers collectively manually performed cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) on the traveler until the arrival of Los Angeles Fire Department paramedics, who continued life-sustaining measures using an automated external defibrillator (AED). The traveler was taken to Centinela Hospital in Inglewood. She reportedly made a full recovery

Newsbriefs

GRAND AVE. PROJECT

The City Council unanimously approved the Grand Avenue project in a 13-0 vote Feb. 13. The project is a public-private partnership with the Related Company,

Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA), Los Angeles County, and the City of Los Angeles that will redevelop a large portion of the Civic Center, which currently houses parking. Councilwoman Jan Perry serves as Vice Chair of the Joint Powers Authority (JPA) for the project.

"The Grand Avenue project is a catalytic investment that will change the entire region, attracting people throughout the City and abroad to downtown Los Angeles. It will have a positive impact on our local economy by generating job opportunities for people at all skill levels," said Councilwoman Perry. "Through the JPA, the City and County have worked well together to negotiate the best deal for the people of Los Angeles and for the future of this region."

The Grand Avenue project includes City/County land that extends south from Grand Avenue along First Street and two parcels on First Street east of Grand Avenue. The project includes a hotel, retail and office space, residential units, and a 16-acre Civic

Park. 20 percent of the housing will be affordable and will be devel-

> oped on-site along with the market-rate housing to create a truly mixedincome community. Phase I of the development will provide 100 units of low income housing with 35 percent of the units at 35 percent Area Median Income (AMI) and another 65 units at 50 percent AMI. "By ensuring that the afford-

able housing component was integrated into the project, we have created an opportunity for people to live near their place of work. And, the recreation and job opportunities made possible by this project will result in a broad range of benefits for the people of Los Angeles" Councilwoman Perry added.

Additionally, Phase I of the project will produce approximately 9,900 construction jobs and 3,100 permanent jobs. As part of the agreement, the developers have agreed to a 30 percent local hiring requirement. In addition, they have contributed \$500,000 to the CRA job-training trust fund.

NEW HOLLENBECK STATION


Councilmember José Huizar joined Police Chief William J. Bratton, City engineers and a host of community members for a ceremony Feb. 15 to mark the halfway point in construction of the new Hollenbeck Community Police Station in the community of Boyle Heights.

The Hollenbeck Replacement Police Station is an important component of Councilmember Huizar's vision of a mini civic center in Boyle Heights, which will eventually include the Boyle Heights Constituent Services Center, a modernized Benjamin Franklin Library, and the newly opened LANI Pocket Park. The emerging civic center will provide communities throughout the Eastside with easy access to a wide range of important services and amenities.

"This is another example of the great things that can be accomplished here in Boyle Heights if we all work together," Huizar said. "Creating safer communities is my top priority, and the men and women of the LAPD are part of that community. I am honored to be part of this great day as we bring the Hollenbeck Replacement Police Station one step closer to completion." In addition to housing the officers of the LAPD Hollenbeck Division, plans for the new station include a meeting room that will be available for community use.

The new facility is being built with funding from Proposition Q, a Citywide Public Safety Bond Measure that yielded \$600 million for the purposes of improving, renovating, expanding and constructing public safety facilities. The Hollenbeck Replacement Station is one of ten Proposition Q-funded projects currently under construction throughout the City that include police stations, jails and a new Emergency Operations Center. The project is scheduled for completion in the first quarter of 2009.



Legislative Update:



Cruising Down Under

ast March, our travel group - Myrna, Last March, our maver group

Don, Effie, Pierre, Evelyn and I – decided to plan a cruise from Australia to New Zealand. After some research we selected the Holland America Line's MS Statendam. We had sailed around South America on its sister ship and had enjoyed the experience.

We booked a cabin with a balcony, and at the time I made the reservation I asked for a quote for an upgrade to business class for our air transportation. I was told that it would be \$3,600 each, and knowing that the current price for business class was more than \$6,000 per person, I decided to take the upgrade. In July I was told the price had raised to \$4,600 each, which was still below the normal cost, but then I was told that I would also have to pay the economy class fare of \$1,400 in addition, which made this no longer a bargain. I declined and searched the Internet to see if I could get a reservation using United Airlines mileage, which, it turned out, was not available. I was aware that Air New Zealand was "partner" with United and I tried to use mileage for their flight but they didn't allow it, even though I would get United miles if we flew Air New Zealand. While I was dealing with Air New Zealand, I discovered that they had a class of service called premium economy, which had the same service as their busi-

ness class (they have no first-class), but the seats were not as large. The cost was \$1,000 more than economy class, and we and Myrna and Don decided to try it out. Effie and Pierre had taken the economy class air offered by the cruise line and were leaving one day before us.

The whole airfare thing really unset me, so I wrote a letter to the president of Holland America, whose offices are in Seattle. I received a reply from his executive assistant who apologize for the problem and offered us \$200 credit on our shipboard account. It goes to show you that it doesn't hurt to let management know when there is a problem.

Our next task was to book hotels in Sydney and Auckland. We would be in Sydney for two nights and Auckland for one night. In Sydney we stayed at the Sheraton on the Park and in Auckland at the Hyatt Regency. Both were excellent and in perfect locations.

Our flight left Los Angeles on New Year's Day evening and because of the International Date Line we arrived in Sydney in the morning Jan. 3.

On every trip I try to get Evelyn to take as few clothes has possible, but I fail every time. This trip we had three large bags and one smaller bag, and we each had one carry-on. I was concerned that we would be over the weight limit, but when we checked in they weighed all of our bags at the same time, and we passed.

After checking in, we used Evelyn's membership in United's Red Carpet Club to get into the Air New Zealand international lounge. It was a nice place to spend the two hours before our flight, with lots of food and free drinks. We boarded our 747 and took our seats upstairs. After dinner I took a sleeping pill, which I had not done before, and awoke in time to have breakfast before we landed in Auckland, where we changed planes for our flight to Sydney. We arrived in Sydney around 10 a.m., and after clearing customs and immigration we took a taxi to our hotel.

time. Not something Americans are used to. I don't think the service was intentionally bad or rude, but culturally different. After dinner the time change was catching up with us and we returned to the hotel.

In the morning we stopped at the local Starbucks, a must for Evelyn, as she tries to buy a coffee mug with the name of each city we visit. She was not able to find one with Australia or Sydney on it, but in New Zealand she was more successful.

After our coffee we walked to Circular Quay and took a one-hour harbor cruise, which showed us the same sights we had seen on our tour yesterday, but from the water. There are longer cruises, but one hour was long enough.

After the cruise we walked around the Rocks and did a little shopping. Evelyn brought a large mask to hang on our wall, and we had it shipped home. The shipping cost more than the mask, but it was worth it not to have to carry it on the rest of the trip.

We walked to the end of the Quay toward the Opera House and found a café for lunch. This time the food was good, but the service continued to be poor. Everyone is very nice. so it must be just the way things are done







Umbrellas Offer Protection

Should you buy an umbrella?

The answer I'm tempted to give is, "It doesn't rain that often in Southern California, so don't bother." (Sorry for the tacky joke.) Probably, the first question we should answer is, "What is an umbrella?" We're talking insurance, of course.

The Umbrella Liability Policy gets its name from the concept that this policy comes down on top of your other policies, and "covers" them (and subsequently, you). Umbrella insurance is "over-and-above" coverage. An umbrella policy doesn't replace your homeowners or car insurance, but it extends them to cover liability claims in excess of the amount your underlying policies cover.

No one plans on having a bad accident, and we certainly hope you don't. But in today's society, the amount that you could be sued for can easily run into the millions.

If you own a pool, a trampoline or a dog, experts say you absolutely need umbrella insurance. If you own an edgy cat, collect guns, have a child who plays football, or tend to bump into things in the supermarket parking lot, you need umbrella insurance, also.

Another benefit of an umbrella liability policy is that a good policy can actually provide you coverage for things that you don't have coverage for elsewhere. If you ever rent a Jet Ski or boat while on vacation, or borrow your neighbor's scooter for a spin around the neighborhood, then you will benefit from knowing that often your umbrella policy can provide coverage for these exposures also.

When an individual decides to sue you after slipping on your sidewalk, being bitten by your shepherd, getting in the way of your ninth hole tee shot, or being sideswiped by your Suburban, their attorney will look for "deep pockets." Your assets, your earnings and even your future earnings potential will be closely scrutinized.

If you own a home in Southern California, a sailboat, a chunk of Google stock, or just hold a degree, you are well worth going after. The attorney will try to get the lion's share of the settlement from other players, perhaps the crew who put down the sidewalk or the golf course's architect, but he still will try to shake a few bucks loose from you. And while these dollars might not mean much in terms of the overall settlement, to you they could mean the loss of your home, your savings and part of a paycheck for years to come.

Umbrella liability policies generally are written in increments of \$1 million and are surprisingly affordable. Some policies cover legal expenses, and some do not. Ask, and be sure to cover legal expenses if you can, as they can be exorbitant. Every policy has exclusions; read them carefully because they can put large holes in your safety net. If damage caused by certain breeds of dog is not covered, for instance, and you own that dog, then that policy is not for you.

For about \$200 to \$300 per year you can buy a \$1 million personal umbrella liability policy. The next million will cost about \$75, and \$50 for every million after that. In the big picture, they are extremely affordable.

Because the personal umbrella policy goes into effect after the underlying coverage is exhausted, there are certain limits that usually must be met to purchase this coverage. Most insurers will want you to have about \$250,000 of liability insurance on your auto policy and \$300,000 of liability insurance on your homeowners policy before selling you an umbrella liability policy for \$1 million of additional coverage.



THE ALIVE! INTERVIEW

LOS ANGELES PORT POLICE

As part of a feature on the Port Police Dive Team that Alive! was working on, Lt. Mike Graychik, leader of the Dive Team, invited Alive! to accompany them on several dive operations. These photos depict one of those operations on Feb. 6.

One week later, Alive! met with Lt. Graychik to talk about his Dive Team and the operation that we witnessed. Ultimately, no illegal contraband was discovered. The Port was safe that day.

We thank Lt. Graychik and his extraordinarily professional team for their cooperation.

HISTORY OF THE DIVE TEAM

Alive!: How did the dive team come about? Why was it established?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Originally the con-

cept was for drug interdiction, and the main focus was with DEA and Customs doing hull searches on the big ships, looking for drugs. That was the original idea behind the dive team.

We also did recovery dives looking for evidence: When cars would go under the water, we would recover the vehicles; we would recover drowning victims; we would recover evidence that might have been thrown in the water, like weapons or drugs, those types of investigations. We've had a few homicides where bodies have been dumped in the harbor and we've had guite a few accidents where vehicles or fishermen have gone into the water and drowned. And so we've been instrumental in assisting to recover numerous types of vehicles and victims and evidence throughout the harbor.

Alive!: How many officers are there in the Port

Lt. Michael Graychik: Right now there are 102.

Alive!: How many on the dive team?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Diving is a collateral duty for the officers, and currently we have about 15 divers.

Alive!: Why do officers become part of the dive team? What are the reasons behind it; what are their motivations?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Most of the lure for the Port Police is the maritime environment, and some officers are interested in the boating aspects. Some are interested in the dive team aspect. Some are interested in working for a department that has a priority of Homeland

Security, which one of the Port Police's; one of our fundamental priorities is Homeland Security and terrorism. The port is an asset for the City, the region and the nation. So a primary focus for the Port Police officers is interdiction of terrorism.

Alive!: What was your motivation?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Definitely the maritime component. I've always been interested in boating and diving. I've been diving since I was 11 years old and I was a lifeguard with the City.

Alive!: Where?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Up in the valley, Sylmar, and the other one was in the Devonshire area. I've been diving and always involved in boating and body surfing and beach activities, so definitely the water was a draw for me.

Alive!: How much of the schedule during the work week does the dive team spend diving?

Lt. Michael Graychik: That's a tough question to answer. There are a lot of variables that come into play. Currently, the dive team assignment is a collateral duty, so some of it depends on time availability for the officers, some depends on if we get called out or not. So each officer who's assigned to the team is focused on dedicating time to the dive team throughout the workweek, but it varies on an individual basis from day to day. If there's a call out, then that's our focus for that week or for that day. And it changes, but the Port Police is in the process of dedicating a full time dive team to the Port. Once that takes place, there's going to be divers out there every single day.

TOWARD FULL-TIME DIVING

Alive!: Talk about working toward a full-time dive team. That's a new development. What's the process or the schedule for that? How long is this going to take?

Lt. Michael Graychik: The Port Police is hiring, and we're building up our department to help secure the Port. As the weeks and months progress, we're going to begin initiating a full time maritime unit, which will include a full time

dive team as part of that. There's going to be officers who are trained for a higher level of security checks on other boats - working with the Coast Guard, the Sheriff's Department, the Long Beach Police Department and the LAPD, doing inspections on boats. They're going to have more advanced training for what we call tactical boardings, so we're getting ready to implement that in the next few months.

Alive!: So, you're building up the department into a full time maritime contingent; that's great. What's the impetus for that; what's driving that?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Prior to 9-11, there wasn't a focus on maritime security that there is now. And post-9-11, the Port has taken seriously the maritime threat and is dedicated to increasing our numbers waterside to help mitigate any threats to the Port that could be from

MEMORABLE OPERATIONS

Alive!: Tell us some of the more memorable operations with the dive team.

Lt. Michael Graychik: There was one about two or three years ago now where a female and her daughter were murdered and wrapped up in a diver's weight belt and thrown into the harbor. When the bodies began to decay, they bloated and floated up under a fishing boat, and we recovered the mother and her four-year-old daughter. So that was memorable.

We've had a few narcotics recoveries that were very rewarding. A couple of different recoveries of bodies, of victims that have drowned in the Port or driven off a dock and ended up in harbor waters, and those are all memorable to me.

I don't want to give out too much information, but we check the large ships for drugs that could be stowed away underneath, contraband that's hidden underneath the ships.

ALIVE! GOES ON A MISSION

Here, Lt. Graychik details the actual Homeland Security operation that Alive! has documented with photos on the cover and on these pages. —Ed.

Alive!: Take us through that day. Narrate our photos a little bit if you can.


Lt. Michael Graychik: Sure. That day originated with the United States Coast Guard. They had received information about possible contraband onboard a ship, so they activated a dive call out with the P-DOG, the Port Dive Operations Group. They had briefings.


Alive!: P-DOG?

Lt. Michael Graychik: P-DOG. The acronym: Port Dive Operations Group. And they met with the port stakeholder, public safety dive agencies, which included the Port Police, LAPD, LA Fire, Long Beach Police, Long Beach Fire and the U.S. Coast Guard. And then we discussed our diving operations as a group, and then we went back to our own teams and prepared our own team's concept of operations. We agreed on a meet time for the dive call out on the day of operations. We went and had a team briefing.

Alive!: We were there, after your official

Lt. Michael Graychik: So you saw how we prepared our own teams, and then we met as a group and had a group briefing. Group assignments were doled out, so each dive unit had an assignment and some groups were responsible for rescue in case there's a diving emergency within our groups.







WORKING TOGETHER AND SHARKS

Lt. Michael Graychik: Drug interdiction is a priority for us, and we work with other agencies like the Coast Guard, the DEA and Customs ... and also now we have other dive team partners that we work with like the LAPD, the Long Beach Fire Department, the Long Beach lifeguards. All of us together are called the Port Dive Operations Group.

Like the operation [that Alive! documented on these pages], that was with the Port Dive Operations Group, the five other public safety agencies. That's a big part of diving in the Port now, the multi-agency diving. And it's a partnership where, if one agency has a dive call out, they can call up this Port Dive Operations Group, and the partner agencies will come to their assistance and act as a force multiplier for a largescale diving operation. Where you might have had six or eight divers before, now you have at your fingertips, you have 25, 30 divers at your disposal.

Alive!: A few years back we did a story on City employees who took the



for the L.A. Zoo. They do all the work in the tanks, and they get in the water with their scuba gear. I was just wondering if you -

diving training



Lt. Michael Graychik: [Laughing] They don't have sharks there, do they?

Not those employees, but we dive with Rec and Parks, with the lifeguards; we dive with the LAPD and the LAFD.

And we dive with the County Sheriff's office, with the Long Beach Police and Fire, and with the United States Coast Guard. And on some occasions we've dove with other agencies for training, or we've gone to call outs in other areas with some other agencies.

Alive!: So you're not going to go diving in tanks with sharks?

Lt. Michael Graychik: I don't think so; that's not my first option.

Alive!: Have you seen any sharks?

Lt. Michael Graychik: I've seen quite a few sharks. Not real big ones, luckily.



Then, we commenced with the diving operation. At the conclusion we reported back to our meeting place, and we had a group debrief. That concluded our operation.

Alive!: Do these call outs come very often?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Probably several times a month. A couple times a month at

Alive!: Sometimes you're the lead agency, and sometimes you're called on to assist?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Right. The dynamic of the group is that whichever group originates the call is the lead agency, or if there's a certain responsibility or jurisdiction, then the group with the jurisdiction and responsibility would by default be the lead agency. But generally speaking, the originating agency is the leader, the incident commander. And then they request the other agencies to support their operation.

Alive!: Our day on the mission with you was pretty typical of how it happens?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Very typical.

Alive!: These guys have done this before; they're all pros, to say the least?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Right. We've been doing this for a few years now; the Port Dive Operations Group is part of the Area Maritime Security Committee, which is an authority of the Coast Guard.

Alive!: And sometimes the crew of the ship isn't even aware of potential contraband issues?

Lt. Michael Graychik: It's fair to say that some smuggling operations can hide contraband underneath the ship without the ship knowing it. You can say that.

Alive!: It's possible.

Lt. Michael Graychik: Absolutely. Some smugglers are capable of inserting narcotics onto the ship without the ship being aware of it.

Alive!: That also must mean that you are aware of people who are diving into the Port who you don't recognize? Some bad guys would have to go out to that boat before anybody else does, surreptitiously, and under water. So you're on the prowl not only underneath the boat but on the shore, for people who might be going out there to grab that contraband?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Correct. But we don't know if it the ports of L.A. and Long Beach are the destinations for that contraband; the ship has many ports of call before it comes here and many ports of call after it leaves here. So it could be in transition from one place to another place and we just happen to be on the route. So it is possible that we're able to intercept it mid-route, midstream.

NATIONAL MODEL **OF TEAMWORK**

Alive!: It was amazing to watch how coordinated all the teams were. Not only your own team -- you guys were really coordinated, you knew exactly what you were doing, it was like clockwork, it was so professionally done -- but that's just one bit of it. You were coordinating with all these other agencies.

Lt. Michael Graychik: Right, right.

Alive!: How long has it taken all these agencies to work together to produce that kind of organization and efficiency?

Lt. Michael Graychik: We've been working together like that for a few years now, so it's been a lot of meetings, a lot of talking, a lot of planning, and we continue to evolve as a dive group. We have meetings that we go to, and we discuss ways to improve our operation and ways to make it safer. We're always dealing and talking. We don't get into a rut where we're not able to change it. We talk about issues, we discuss them, and then we modify the way we do things. Remaining flexible and having an open line of communication with the other agencies is key to making it that successful.

Alive!: We hear a lot about one of the problems in securing our nation is sort of territorialism amongst different agencies. But it couldn't have been less that.

Lt. Michael Graychik: Right.

Alive!: Was that a concerted effort to make sure that territorialism didn't get in the way of doing a great job?

Lt. Michael Graychik: It is a concerted effort, and within the Port community here we all are very aware of each other's jurisdictions



and each other's duties. We meet and discuss things so often, that I think the lines are pretty clear on what types of incidents fall within each agency's scope of responsibility. So the lines for us are pretty clear, and we don't have a lot of confusion as to who does what. Communicating a lot, talking about things, and letting everybody know what's going on are instrumental in making sure that the public safety runs smoothly in the Port.

Alive!: The FBI and some other national organizations use you guys as models?

Lt. Michael Graychik: That's correct. The Ports of L.A. and Long Beach are models for the nation in terms of diving operations by local public safety agencies.

Alive!: What do they like about it? Your organization? Your efficiency? Your cooperation?

Lt. Michael Graychik: All of those things. All of those things are critical to running a big dive operation like that.

Alive!: Public agencies all around the country are coming to you for help on how to put together their programs?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Yes. We're modeling public safety diving for the rest of the nation here in the Port.

PRIDE: PROFESSIONAL **PROTECTION**

Alive!: It was obvious and evident that you love what you're doing: what you're doing is efficient and well run and is a great service to our country. There must be a lot of pride in being part of this team.

Lt. Michael Graychik: There is a lot of pride. Diving, especially in a port environment, is not something that you can do if you don't have a lot of dedication and determination and conviction. There are so many factors and variables and safety issues that have to be addressed, it's not for the meek or weakhearted; you have to be very devoted to it. There's a lot of training involved; there's a lot of work involved in running a smooth, safe dive operation. So they are very dedicated and they do take a lot of pride in that. And they do recognize that they're helping detour terrorism in the nation's number one commercial port.


Alive!: It's a dangerous job?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Public safety diving is very dangerous.

Alive!: Even over and above the training you receive as peace officers, it's probably even more dangerous in some ways.

Lt. Michael Graychik: Sure.

Alive!: It seems like an added level or added ingredients for danger there.



Lt. Michael Graychik: It's dangerous, but we try and mitigate the danger by taking a lot of safety precautions, by doing a lot of training and employing the latest diving safety features that we have at our disposal. You can always mitigate danger by doing different things, and we work very hard at mitigating the danger as much as possible.

A DIVER, TO THE END

Alive!: Do you miss getting in the water?

Lt. Michael Graychik: I do miss it. I get in the water at least a few times a year, and I'm thankful for those days.

Alive!: You and your officers, when you're away from the job and vacationing, do you guys decide to go diving for recreation?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Absolutely. Yes, we do. We have a few guys who go to different places around the world, and they frequent some of the popular diving spots for recreational diving, too.

Alive!: What's your favorite place to dive?

Lt. Michael Graychik: Lake Mojave. Lake Mojave's my favorite place because that means I'm waterskiing and relaxing in the boat.

Alive!: Thank you very much.

Lt. Michael Gravchik:

Sure. You're welcome.





The Enlightened

Eddy's interest in writing a book on the streetlights of Los Angeles stems from his experience on that Board, having to evaluate and choose from various examples of street light fixtures for the city of Los Angeles.

In Genesis in the Bible, it is written that God created light to separate the earth from darkness, and God saw that it was good. So it would appear that more light should bring more good.

When I published a little book on street lighting in Los Angeles in 1972, I observed

that there were 185,000 streetlights in the City. The Bureau of Street Lighting told me that there are now some 220,000 light standards in place (leaving still another one-third of the City still to be lighted). This is really a stupendous number, and there is nothing quite like the lighting system of Los Angeles anywhere else in the world in size and quality. Arriving on a night flight into LAX is a thrilling experience.

Of course, it was not always like this in Los Angeles. In the pueblo days, when the sun went down it was really dark. Harris Newmark, prominent wholesale grocer and revered historian, recorded of later days, in Sixty Years in Southern California, 1853-1913, that:

"What made these [early] street conditions more trying was the fact that on hot days roads and sidewalks

were devoid of shade, except for that furnished by a few scattered trees or an occasional projecting veranda; while at night (if I except the illumination from the few lanterns suspended in front of barrooms and stores) thoroughfares were altogether unlighted. In those nights of dark streets and still darker tragedies, people rarely went out unless equipped with candle-burning lanterns, at least until camphene was imported by my brother, after which this was brought into general use. Stores were lighted in the same manner: first with candles, then with camphene and finally with coal-oil, during which period of advancement lamps replaced cruder contrivances."

The City Council required by ordinance

"Every owner or occupant of every store, hotel, barroom or public house of any kind, and also each and every person occupying a house having two rooms or more facing the street, shall hang a light outside of the door of his or their building, the first two and one half hours of every dark night, under penalty of two dollars for the first offense and five dollars for each subsequent offense."

However, historian J.M. Guinn noted that later, when the price of gas fell:

"The citizens, proud of the cosmopolitan airs the city was assuming, banished lanterns from their house fronts and on streets where the glimmer of the gas failed to penetrate, the belated pedestrian groped his way homeward in darkness. The collapsed condition of the city's exchequer did not permit of a line of lampposts on each side of the street, nor any in the middle of the blocks. If the first lamp was on the northeast corner of a cross street the next would be at the southwest corner of the second cross street and so on zigzagging down the street.

"Although the city was outgrowing its olden-times methods and customs and becoming modernized, the caballero - the horseman - was still in evidence on the streets. For a pedestrian to have to carry a step ladder to light the street lamps when a horse could be substituted for the ladder would have been humiliating to the proud spirit of the dons. A boy of 15 or 16 years had secured the contract from the council to light the lamps. He had trained his horse for the work. Starting out from the Plaza on the gallop the horse would halt at the first lamppost, the rider standing in his stirrups quickly lighted the lamp, at a touch or signal from his master the horse was off on a run for the

next lamp and so on down the line, horse and man leaving a line of light behind them. The citizens were very proud of their lightning lamplighter and never failed to call the attention of visitors to their improved system of lamp-lighting."

However, in 1869, the Los Angeles Star did not share this pride:

"The gas lamps of the City have been so increased of late, we suppose, or we are a City of such magnificent distances between lamps, that one man on foot is no longer able to attend to the wants of our benighted citizens, and supply them with the effulgence emanating from the gasometers; consequently, we have our street illuminator rushing around the streets in the evening on horseback, lighting the lamps. The horse is already well trained to his duty, and rushes like a quarter horse from post to pillar. This is our substitute for lighting the City simultaneously by electricity."

The pressure was on, contracts were let, light standards were manufactured, and at 8:20 p.m. Dec. 30, 1881, the first two of six 150-foot masts carrying three arc lamps each were switched on by Mayor James R. Toberman.

Still, not everybody was thrilled. According to Boyle Workman (The City That Grew. 1932):

There were many objections voiced to electricity. It was said to be a menace to ladies' complexions, to be bad for the eyes, producing color blindness. It was accused of causing optical illusions, of magnifying objects. Chicken owners were warned that the light would keep their chickens awake. And it was condemned as a costly experi-

Those first light standards were quite simple and completely functional in design. But in 1905 Broadway between First Street and the intersection with Main Street was lighted by the City's first incandescent ornamental system. This installation supported enthusiastically by the business community consisted of 135 posts, each equipped with six small glass globes enclosing a 16-candlepower lamp, and one large glass globe enclosing a 32-candlepower lamp. The lights burned until midnight with the exception of two at each intersection, which burned the entire night. It was compared favorably with New York City's Great White Way. You can see them in the Plaza and on Seventh Street between Figueroa and Flower.

With the rapid development of the city, Public Works recognized the need for con-

centrated attention. The Bureau of Street Lighting was established in 1925. Today the Bureau headquarters is housed in dramatic new facilities at the Department's recently acquired building at 1149 S. Broadway. It has 247 employees and a yearly budget of \$20 million.

And with the proliferation of the City's streets and neighborhoods, there has grown a proliferation of light standard designs - there are some 500 styles scattered about our town. At one time or another, styles ranged from those with arms and globes that resemble torches to arms and globes supported by dragon-like figures to sexy caryatids on Wilshire Boulevard in MacArthur Park (Sheila Klein's "Vermonica Street Lighting Sculpture"

in a shopping mall parking lot at Santa Monica Boulevard and Vermont Avenue is composed from 25 of those styles).

The lighting sources have evolved, too. According to Ed Ebrahimian, the Bureau's director, the City has progressed from installing incandescent lamps, which must be replaced every six months, to mercury vapor in the 1950s and 1960s, to high-pressure sodium in the 1970s. The energy crises of the 1970s were a significant motivation to use less energy and save operating costs. The crises propelled the City's migration to the use of high pressure sodium lamps, which have significantly increased their efficiency and effectiveness.

Ed Ebrahimian told me that, for the first time ever, the Bureau has initiated the use of night crews to patrol the entire lighting system. Crews replace many of the lights that are no longer working (even before they are reported), observing and fixing most problems on the spot. Using current technology, the Bureau's field crews also receive information from the public via 3-1-1. Once a lightout is reported, the Bureau's repair crews have the task of making the fix the next day. In addition, the Bureau has started the deployment of a wireless, Web-based realtime incident reporting system for light outages. A sensor in each light standard auto-

matically detects the malfunction and reports the location back to the Bureau. The Bureau repairs approximately 50,000 streetlights each year.

Unfortunately, all this installation and maintenance may result in some ugliness: aged standards are cannibalized; non-ornamental cobra-headed standards are installed where they destroy the unity of design of ornamental systems; and advertising often hangs obtrusively and ominously on standards on principal boulevards throughout the City.

By the way, the use of those inoffensive but defenseless poles for advertising is not news. In the minutes of the Board of Municipal Art Commissioners appears the following:

"On Aug. 3, 1921, the Commission duly adopted a motion to the effect that the Board of Public Works and the Police Commission be advised this Commission is opposed to the placing of advertising matter on street lighting standards, or other structures over public property - it being their understanding that such advertising is prohibited by Ordinance No. 32.603 (New Series). On Aug. 17, 1921, the Art Commission received the assurance of the Police Commission that the provisions of this ordinance, prohibiting such advertising would be rigidly enforced."

More happily, the present administration appears to be devoted to preserving our attractive ornamental designs where they clearly define the neighborhood or street and add to their beauty and uniqueness. At the same time, the Bureau's own staff has even come up with its own original ornamental creations. Thus does Los Angeles follow the biblical direction by bringing us both light and good, with, in the words of John E. Fisher, Assistant General Manager of the Office of Transportation Operations, Transportation, "Enlightened Street Lighting."

Add the turkey meatballs; stir.




Add the stock and cover with lid and let simmer. Stir occasionally.






